Certified mastectomy fitter Denise Newby talks about services she offers at the Pink Alternative right here in Dothan. Newby SFX: I'm the only stand alone breast prosthetic fitter business in the Wiregrass as far as I know. a lot of the other areas that did provide prosthetic services are not full service. So I provide services that other areas don't. Here they receive a mastectomy bras which are pocketed bras that hold a silicone prosthesis or other form of prosthesis they can also get turbans here or other mastectomy needs. Camisoles is a post-op surgical garment that the women receive only immediately after surgery. Normal the surgery is done there in the hospital overnight and then the next day they go home. These garments are helped to manage the tubing that the women have after surgery. There drainage tube the bulb that is in the tubing this garment is designed to help manage that because it has pockets underneath it helps to hold everything in place where is before sometimes they have to pin the bulk to their clothes with its garment they don't have to do that. Also helps once the breast is remove its also pocketed and it has what is called puffs to help mimic a breast until they can get the breast prosthetic. They come in different colors and whatever the lady chooses to purchase it in and we also have a

				top that is called Voletta which is also part of the healing process. It gives the woman something to wear until she can get to the prosthetics because this is six weeks time frame before they can wear any prosthetics because you got a lot of the body to heal and you don't want to do anything to cause an infection so these are post-mastectomy care garments. Deborah SFX: How would someone come and be fitted? Denise SFX: First of all, after seeing their doctor Post-Op or either their regular doctor it would need a prescription to file Insurance unless they pay out of pocket. But once they receive the prescription then I received the phone call for appointments. I do accept walk-ins but they get an appointment and they come in there's a consultation to take the place. Then they're fitted and process begins from there to get them fitted for Prosthetics. You know the thought that once you have mastectomy done you can't wear nice things. So here you get a wide variety of bras whether it be plain and simple to something really nice and lacy you get a variety of colors the same as you would if you not had surgery before. I've been a fitter since 2011 and its become a service that gives you a warm fuzzy feeling. Because it's a need and you're able to help someone regain their confidence so that's very important. Al SFX: You know when I did my scan to do the follow up scan its called a pet-scan my reaction to that was hopefully everything is okay and once I got Dr. Atkinson said everything was clear everything was cancer free at this point I was just excited. It was a rough road I rejoiced and thanked God for all his provisions at the time I still do and just very thankful for the support that I got from all of the doctors and nurses from everybody there at Southeast Health they were just wonderful people. Deborah SFX: So how does it feel to be a Champion of Hope Honoree for this year? Al SFX: I was surprised by being approached by that and you know being honored non the less that I can first of all share my story about my cancer treatments and cancer survival but more importantly to give a little back to participate in something that raises funds that stay right here in the area through Southeast Health and it just going to be an awesome event. Then all of a sudden a song, a conversation somebody maybe having, a picture, a movie, then they want to make a call just to see they just can't let go. But to heal you have to let go. It's okay to miss someone and still say goodbye. Move forward with your life because now it the time for you to full-fill your dreams your purse your goals. Deborah SFX: Boyd says it's sometimes difficult to get out of a bad situation for many reasons.

some can't get out because of that. abuser. you sit next to them in church.

Karen SFX: One if maybe finance the other it maybe fear and then the one that's number one for me is love. You know you may love that person so deeply that

Deborah SFX: A lot of people are surprised to hear that females between the ages of 16 and 23 are three times more likely than the rest of the population to be abused.

Karen SFX: I cover nine counties and I've been in every one of the schools and there is not one time I have not come across one girl one teen that has not been in an abusive relationship and you learn it young. Most people think that abuse starts in adulthood when in fact it doesn't it starts in a person's youth. And so some of what that young person sees in their household or whoever they are around they model then they take on those abusive behaviors. And you learn it young. That's why it's good to talk bullying with the elementary students because if you see a bully you have a potential

Deborah SFX: What does a victim look like?

Karen SFX: You, me, her, him there is no particular look it could be anyone you never know. Sometimes

Deborah SFX: We are finding that Domestic Violence does not only happen to women. But an increasing number of men are being abused. Just this month in the City of Dothan two men were either stabbed or shot by a female companion. Boyd says the House of Ruth is here to help anyone who is in need of getting away from an abuser

Karen SFX: There is no difference in helping a male as a female. All the services we provide to the female we provide to the males. Most services the males ask of us are court accompaniment. They would like for someone

				Deborah SFX: Every nine seconds a woman in the U.S. is beaten on assaulted. Each second is an opportunity to take action. There are many ways to help including raising awareness, advocating or volunteering. Bringing about awareness about domestic violence is close to my heart because my cousin Yolanda Rene Cooper of Chicago, Illinois was a victim of domestic violence between 1994 and 2008. Today she is a survivor. Rena survived being shot four times by a complete stranger after she was put out of her home by her ex-husband. Rena Cooper tells her story.
				Rena SFX: The last Sunday of 2008 I was coming home from church and I pulled into my driveway and there was a person who came from behind a tree I had never seen this person before. I actually thought that they were going to visit neighbors next door. We're talking 10:30 at night. When I walked towards my porch I saw the person coming on my angle. And because I was unable to alert the people in the house I decided to go back to my vehicle and be able to call the police. But when I got halfway back to the vehicle he called me out of my name and told me not to move and he cocked a pistol at me. I turned to my right to run. He let off the first shot
				SFX: Gunshot After that I feel to the ground because I believe that shot is the one that hit my spinal cord and nicked it to cause me to paralyzed and he stood over me and shot me three more times

				Rena SFX: And then proceeded to walk down the street away from the area. I never lost consciousness. I got to the hospital the last thing I remember are they telling me they were putting me under. I was in surgery for four and a half hours. Found out that all of my vital organs were hit except for my heart. One bullet was an in an out a graze. Two bullets richest off of every organ except for my heart. I was in the hospital paralyzed in ICU by the fifth day I was up walking by the eighth day they had released me home to my parents. From there I have my own organization 4 My Voice Matters which is a non for profit organization geared towards bringing awareness to domestic violence and also suicide. The number 4 for the number of times I was shot and My Voice Matters because in the midst of my marriage I lost my voice and once I got it back I promised God I would never loose it again. I also lost a girlfriend to gun violence via domestic violence four months after I was shot and her sister wanted me to come and share my story at a Walk in her honor six years later. Since then I have been able to speak across the country even internationally. I've written a book. The name of my book is "Assassination Avoided, Destiny Defined" and it's a two time internationally best selling book on Amazon.com. Basically help them start over again. A lot of times they are having to start completely over whenever they have been through a traumatic experience like that.

The House of Ruth provides them with clothing if they need it. If they are going to a job interview they help them with clothing for the interview that would be appropriate so they can help them get that. And they also they help feed them every meal. Every meal is provided for them there. They help them with transportation anything that they can help them with they do.
