On May 17, the South Umpqua School District will refer bond measure 10-186 to voters. If the proposed bond levy passes, the district would build a new K-8 school in Canyonville and add vestibule entry and exits as security initiatives at Tri-City and Myrtle Creek Elementary schools, completing the highest priority maintenance projects remaining from the 2019 facilities plan.

If approved by voters, the district would issue \$20.9 million in bonds and receive a 4 million dollar state matching grant towards the proposed projects. The estimated tax rate would be <u>One dollar fifteen cents per one thousand dollars of assessed value</u> for 30 years, beginning in January of 2023.

If passed, the owner of a property assessed at 200,000 dollars would pay an estimated 230 dollars in additional property taxes per year for 30 years, an average of \$19.16 per month.

If the proposed measure does not pass, the tax would not be assessed, and the projects would not be completed.
