association or isolation from former friends and Self-harm or significant changes in emotional well-being.

Over half a million Georgians stand to lose their Medicaid coverage this year due the end of pandemic era cover-										
age. As a result of recent federal changes, Georgia has reevaluated the eligibility of about two-point-seven million										
Medicaid and Peach Care for Kids recipients. It's important for people to respond to requests for information, as

4. Issue: BRAIN-EATING AMOEBA FOUND IN OUR STATE Date/Time: 8/15 1pm Duration: 1 HR										
Naegleria fowleri infection, a rare infection which destroys brain tissue, causing brain swelling and usually death										
has returned to Georgia. The ultra-rare infection is s a result of warming temperatures but is most commonly										
found in the South. The amoeba thrives in our warm freshwater lakes and ponds. Infections can occur after the										
amoeba enters the body via the nose and travels to the brain.										
5. Issue: COVID SUMMER SURGE IN SOUTH GEORGIA Date/Time: 8/22 1pm Duration: 1 HR										
A summer surge in COVID-19 cases has spiked the number of people in the hospital with serious complications										
from the virus. Thus far, Colquitt County, hospitalizations are up 67% percent. The CDC does not track infections										
anymore, meaning hospitalizations are one of the only data clues we have to understand how fast the virus is										

spreading and where. The omicron variant still appears to be dominant.
