Ford said the SUVs have a steering issue caused by a flaw in the ball joint of the steering wheel. Ford says the issue has been linked to six injuries.</p> <p>The Consumer Product Safety Commission is suing Amazon to force the online retailer to accept responsibility for recalling potentially hazardous products sold on the site. The products are sold by third party merchants. Amazon said it has already removed most of the items.</p> <p>If you can get by without your car you might be able to sell it for a profit. The Wall Street Journal reports one consumer sold his year-old Chevy Silverado to the dealer for three thousand dollars more than he paid for it. Used car prices are surging because of historically low inventory.</p>

Fed by hot temperatures and intense winds, the Bootleg has been burning since July 6th. In neighboring Canada, heat waves have also fueled hundreds of fires. Lord we pray for protection for the firefighters battling these wildfires.</p> <p>A Texas church network has announced that it is canceling a children's camp event after around 80 participants of an earlier youth camp event tested positive for COVID-19. The South Texas District Church of the Nazarene had planned on holding the camp this week. Several of the newly infected were fully vaccinated. Lord we pray for healing for all with COVID.</p>

We’re honored ‘grateful for the opportunity to join Franklin’ the team on this tour.</p> <p>A missing section of Jerusalem’s city wall, built during the First Temple Era to protect the city from outside attacks, has been discovered during excavations in the City of David National Park. As reported by Israel National News, the excavations were conducted on behalf of the Israel Antiquities Authority, in partnership with the City of David Foundation, as a part of a development project at the National Park. The recent discovery of the section of the ancient wall connects to two other sections that were uncovered in the eastern slope during the 1960s and 1970s, respectively. Following years of debate, the new excavation verifies that the remains were undeniably part of the eastern wall of ancient Jerusalem.</p> <p>According to new data from the annual State of the Bible survey by the American Bible Society, regular readers of the Bible both faced more stress and more hope in 2020. According to the survey, one-quarter of Americans reported experiencing moderate levels of stress, while 10 percent reported experiencing stress at high levels. According to results of a hope agency test, ‘Bible-engaged’ people score 71 out of 100 when asked if the statements of ‘If I were in trouble, I know I could get out’ and ‘I can think of many ways to reach my goals’ were true. Bible-disengaged people, on the other hand, scored about 14 points lower.</p>

Marine Corps Gen. Kenneth McKenzie Jr. announced Monday evening that the last of the U.S. troops stationed at the Kabul airport had left, completing the military’s drawdown in the country, even though hundreds of Americans likely remain. Lord we pray for the protection of the Americans remaining in Afghanistan and for all Christians and missionaries still in the country.</p> <p>Louisiana residents may be in the dark for weeks as officials take stock of the damage from Hurricane Ida. Ida made landfall on Sunday with 150mph winds, the fifth strongest to ever hit the US mainland. Hundreds of thousands remain without power. About 5,000 National Guard members have been deployed to aid search and rescue. Lord we pray you guide all storm victims and the aid groups helping them out</p>

That’s not why they were there.</p> <p>Anthony Muobike, from Edmonton, Canada, loves basketball, and plays for hours a day in his driveway. He was using branches as a net and dribbling for up to 4 hours a day. Ian Ray, who has lived in the neighborhood for over a decade, noticed the teen’s skills and put out a call for help on Facebook. ‘He was just a kid who dribbled a basketball - all day, all night’ Ian told Global News. ‘I kind of figured it would be cool if he had a net.’</p> <p>Ian ended up raising \$750, but the post garnered so much attention, Canadian Tire swooshed in and donated a brand new net. The money raised has now been added to a gift card for Canadian retailer Sport Chek, so that Anthony can pick up some more basketball gear.</p> <p>Anthony was stunned when neighbors arrived bearing gifts. ‘I thought that whenever I dribble it made a racket and people want to sleep or something like that’ he said. ‘I did not know that dribbling that ball, practicing at least maybe two or four hours a day, would actually have an influence.</p> <p>The whole endeavour has seemingly tugged at the heartstrings of many -- including Anthony’s idol, Lebron James.</p> <p>It’s a lot to take in’ Anthony’s mom Leticia Moubike said. ‘My heart is full of joy. I’m overwhelmed... all I can say is thank you so much. The Moubike family only moved into the neighborhood last year, and Leticia said she’s grateful for the sense of community.</p> <p>The messages I saw, the love, the support, Im so proud to live in this community’ Leticia said.</p>

Jakes' The Potter's House are raising aid for approximately 25,000 families affected by the recent severe earthquake in Haiti. United MegaCARE, the humanitarian group of The Potter's House, announced Monday that they were joining Perfecting Faith Church of New York and Tabernacle of Glory in Miami, Fla. To provide relief to Haitians in need.</p> <p>Congregants at Oak Hills Church in San Antonio, Texas, cheered and applauded their pastor Sunday after learning that each family present at worship services had been gifted \$100 to cover their own needs or "pay it forward" to anyone else they chose. The church reportedly gave out 762 envelopes at two services and expects to distribute another 60 more as more families attended church than they planned on Sunday.</p> <p>The Bible-based series The Chosen is no longer simply a streaming hit. Two years after it first launched, The Chosen is now a worldwide streaming ministry. Season one, which premiered in 2019, includes subtitles in more than 90 languages, including seven languages (Spanish, Arabic and Chinese, among them) in audio dubbing. Season two, which debuted on Easter, is available with subtitles in more than 30 languages – with dozens more on the way. Just as impressive: The series has been streamed more than 250 million times from viewers all over the world, including from such diverse nations as India, New Zealand, Nigeria and the United Arab Emirates. They are facing the prospect of weeks without electricity in the oppressive, late-summer heat. Ida ravaged the region's power grid, leaving all of New Orleans and hundreds of thousands of other Louisiana residents in the dark with no clear timeline on when the electricity would come back on. Some areas outside New Orleans also suffered major flooding and damage to homes and businesses. Lord we pray your hand guides the recovery efforts in Louisiana.</p> <p>Tens of thousands of people have been evacuated from the shores of Lake Tahoe in northern California as a major wildfire continues to spread. The Caldor Fire has already burned more than 191,000 acres, with just 16% of the fire brought under control. Sweet treats are nothing new at London's Luciano by Gino D'Acampo restaurant, but for birthday girl Natalie Te Paa, who is totally blind, the best wishes were spelled out in Braille. What gave the message an even greater meaning was that there was no advance planning involved. When the restaurant crew learned the dinner Te Paa was sharing with friend Claire Sara was a birthday celebration, they took it upon themselves to find and recreate the Braille translation that summed up their best wishes in well-chilled chocolate. Te Paa could barely believe her fingertips as she traced over the raised confectionary dots.</p> <p>"My mind was blank for a second and then I was like, 'Is this in Braille?'" Ta Paa said. "I've never had anything happen like that before. It was wild. They just really did go above and beyond."</p> <p>Natalie's friend recorded her reaction to the Braille in chocolate and posted it online. While restaurant manager Giovanni Galluccio maintains the impromptu gesture was simply part of the customer service they strive to extend to all their patrons, clocking in with close to 16 million views to date, the internet judged the extraordinary act of kindness extra special.</p> <p>As Te Paa said, "The fact that people have responded so much and so well to it just shows how much the world needs kindness right now, how much the world needs a message of hope, needs to see people doing things and going above and beyond for each other." Just 13% of respondents told the news outlet that they had no plans to get the vaccine at any time.
