Date	Program Summary
10/1/23	Climate can flip to a new state, quickly. Is strangely rising methane a signal of a "termination event"? <b>Dr. Euan Nisbet</b> , Royal Halloway, University of London with worrying new science. We explore abrupt climate shifts with <b>Prof. Niklas Boers</b> , Technical University of Munich and PIK. He tells us about global reorganization of atmospheric circulation in the past – glimpses of our future – or now?

10/8/23	Special investigating air pollution: hidden warming, long-range damage with drought & rain – and to your health. New science with <b>Geeta Persad</b> on missing climate risk of aerosols. Followed by a replay of <b>Leon Simons</b> : termination shock of cleaning up air pollution. Is it behind this year's record-smashing heat?
10/15/23	During global heat records, a world-scale carbon burst is still pouring out of Northern Canada's wildfires – bigger than the emissions of most countries. Explore with Professor Justin Angle author of "This Is Wildfire: How to Protect Yourself, Your Home, and Your Community in the Age of Heat." Then re-thinking the big picture: Adrian Parr's new work "Earthlings; Imaginative encounters with the Natural World."
10/22/23	New tested science shows your body's heat tolerance is much lower than experts assume. <b>Dr. Daniel J. Vecellio</b> warns of "Greatly enhanced risk to humans" as humid heat stress strikes billions of people sooner than expected. We just lived through: the big heat jump of 2023. Why? What happened? Spoiler alert: we are entering a time of multiple crises.
10/29/23	How big-name companies insuring coal could crash the economy and the planet – a new interview with <b>Carly Fabian</b> of Public Citizen. After Biden's approval of massive new "natural" gas expansion, we review the risks with a replay interview – Harvard's <b>Dr. Scot</b> <b>Miller</b> . UK photographer <b>Robert Leslie</b> covered lasting damage in the American South, years after Hurricane Katrina (replay).
11/5/23	Is the "Green New Deal" a solution or another problem? Rethinking our options first with <b>Dr.</b> <b>Ted Trainer</b> , founder of The Simpler Way in Australia. From Cambridge, political economist <b>Jeremy Green</b> finds dangerous myths in the New Deal for an overloaded system. Look out for the growth monster wearing green clothes!
11/12/23	Global warming is accelerating, at double the rate just a dozen years ago. The target of 1.5 degrees Celsius is "dead as a door-nail". Earth will warm not 3 degrees, but 4.8 degrees C – 10 degrees F. – according to former NASA scientist <b>James Hansen</b> in his new paper "Global Warming in the Pipeline". Press Conference Nov. 2 NYC. Then <b>Dr. Kaitlin Naughten</b> from the British Antarctic Survey, lead author of a new paper revealing Antarctic melting now cannot be stopped. All this and more according to a stunning new peer-reviewed paper led by

	famous NASA scientist <b>James Hansen</b> . Other top scientists disagree. Is Hansen right this time?
11/19/23	Behind all the crisis, the wealth machine pulls money up to the one percent. The worse things get, the less for everyone else. Author and activist <b>Marjorie Kelly</b> : ""Wealth Supremacy: How the Extractive Economy and the Biased Rules of Capitalism Drive Today's Crises." How long can we keep burning fossil fuels before losing a livable climate? 2030? From Imperial College London, <b>Dr. Robin Lamboll</b> led a team study "Assessing the size and uncertainty of remaining carbon budgets". The reality is: we are on a short carbon fuse.
11/26/23	Fossil fuel producers expand production while promising to reduce emissions. They plan to keep mining and pumping carbon past the year 2050. The "2023 Production Gap Report" shows brain-breaking disconnects in word and deed. Co-Lead Author <b>Michael Lazarus</b> explains. Then "Record-high CO2 emissions from boreal fires in 2021". Wildfires of 2023 were worse. <b>Dr. Philippe Ciais</b> , Associate Director of a French climate lab tells us where all that burned carbon goes – heating the planet.
12/3/23	We are sinking in heavy weather. Elders are up to 75% of climate-driven fatalities in developed world disasters. Seniors expert <b>Danielle Arigoni</b> on her new book book "Climate Resilience for an Aging Nation". Then <b>Lauren Stuart</b> , Scientific Officer for the World Meteorological Organization who just reported on the crazy first half of 2023. We toss in a bit of <b>James Hansen</b> and news from Germany.
12/10/23	UN head <b>António Guterres</b> : "Record global heating should send shivers down the spines of world leaders." Ice-world has tipped – no going back. <b>Dr. Twila Moon</b> from National Snow & Ice Data Center new "State of the Cryosphere 2023 Report". The ozone hole is back! <b>Hannah</b> <b>Kessenich</b> "Potential drivers of the recent large Antarctic ozone holes" – and how it changes weather in Southern Hemisphere.
12/17/23	Experts find food riots are possible in the United Kingdom as climate change ramps up. From Cambridge <b>Aled Jones</b> outlines how food stress boils over. Around the world, crops may not be planted or harvested when it gets too hot to work outside. From Columbia University, <b>Connor Dunn Diaz</b> reports. <b>Dr. Vanessa Andreotti</b> on final care for an Age on life support: – "Hospicing Modernity".

12/24/23	With research into heat and the limits of human health <b>Dr. Ollie Jay</b> , Director of the Heat and Health Research Incubator at the University of Sydney. Doctor and University of Sydney <b>Professor Adrienne Gordon</b> explains her specialty in care of mothers and the unborn during heat waves. Then film-maker <b>Nick Breeze</b> wraps it up with <b>Dr. Jack O'Connor</b> : Tipping Points and Interconnected Disaster Risks. Temperatures are soaring this summer in the southern hemisphere. South America is cooking, setting hundreds of new records. Recently in Australia, Sydney Airport set a new December heat record 43.5 degrees C – 110 Fahrenheit – hottest early summer day in 44 years and 18 degrees C. above average. Australians dread a "horror summer" of heat and fire.
12/31/23	If we clean up air pollution, the weather gets hotter and wilder. From Norway, Dr. Bjorn Samset explains the stakes. Then from Harvard, Dr. Francesca Dominici reveals shocking new science: just a short exposure to bad air kills seniors!
