Topic: Substance Abuse

Guest: Shereda Finch, director, Council on Substance Abuse

Tim and Ms. Finch discussed temptations of those with substance abuse problems during the holidays and how hard it is for them to remain sober or off drugs during this time. It's important for those in recovery to have people around them that are aware of their goals and to support those goals, which may mean having events with no alcohol present. They discussed how the center gets clients and the expansion of their services to 6 additional counties – the River Region counties in addition to Dallas, Wilcox, and Perry. A number of clients come through drug intervention, family intervention, court intervention, jail systems, and they welcome pathways to recovery. They also talked about the heroine epidemic (and others) is how difficult it is to treat and assist those addicted to it. She explained that addictions are diseases (and are individualized diseases), therefore treatment and recovery are individualized as well. Recovery is an individualized choice. Other topics include - peer support programs, and activities that involve the whole family, available referral services, prevention services, recovery services, and partners in the area that assist them. Viewers were told how to register for their upcoming training event titled "Gender, Genetics, and Substance Abuse". Since 2010 they have seen over 700 folks come through their doors and have documentation on them all

Topic: Scaleback Alabama

Today the ladies and Tim talked about this yearly program where teams compete to see who can lose the most weight. In its 10th year, this weight loss competition for adults in the state starts in January and ends in April. The goal is for participants to lose at least ten pounds and is a safe, gradual weights loss of 1 pound a week. Teams are comprised of 2 people so everyone can have a partner. The hospital participates so they can be healthy and encourage others to be healthy also. Participants are encouraged to be mindful of what they eat, what they drink, to get more exercise, and to get the adequate amount of sleep. Teams were larger in the beginning, and the winner would be the person who lost the most weight. Prizes of \$1,000, \$500, and \$250 are given to the winners, and there are individual prizes as well. Health tips are given to contestants weekly. In its 10th year, Scaleback educates and empowers participants to get, and stay healthy.

Topic: Mt. Zion AME Zion Church Memorial Annex

The Mt. Zion A.M.E. Zion Church's Memorial Annex is the old church, and the new church was built in 1999. On December 5, 1955 at 3 P.M. a mass meeting was called. From December 5, 1955 – April, 1968 is the Civil Rights life of Dr. Martin Luther King. His Civil Rights live was born at Mt. Zion A.M.E. Zion church at that mass meeting where he accepted his role. It is also where the Montgomery Improvement Association was formed, along with the Civil Rights Movement. Pastor Shuford talked about activities in the denomination that are being highlighted, and the 66th Anniversary Celebration activities of the Bus Boycott. They also talked about Mr. Everett's book that he wrote that tells about the Meeting at Mt. Zion. It includes pictures of those in attendance, and the three main topics that were discussed at that meeting. The Bus Boycott lasted 382 days just because city leaders wouldn't listen. A website was given for more information on the Annex that will be a museum, and where and how donations can be made.

Topic: Alabama Industrial Training Group
Guest: Gary Weaver

Mr. Weaver went over the preparation process with Tim. Once they're contacted by a company, it usually takes 90 days (after getting everyone involved) for the preparation process before they have the first group of people ready to go. Only about 85% that successfully complete the program are offered employment. When screening prospective hires they look at everything – skills, ability, attitude, punctuality, enthusiasm, personality, motivation, and attendance. They worked with Hyundai to screen and train the people that work there, and Hyundai is considering opening another plant, hopefully in Montgomery. They discussed the Union and things that they can't mitigate for a business such as pay, benefits, and leadership. They talked about minimum pay and what companies are willing to pay as well as what AIDT can offer a company that is willing to come here (different training, facilities, and programs). Washout factors and turnover were discussed as well. AIDT have an 85-90% success rate. There are no charges for their services.

The Museum is Montgomery's best kept secret. Ms. Milledge discussed upcoming exhibits, and one that is closing today which is the "Remembering the Bus Boycott". The artwork for this exhibit was created by students in 4th grade through high school depicting things from the Montgomery Bus Boycott. They had over 100 entries and judges narrowed them down to approximately 30. Exhibits are "Once and Again: Still Lives" by Beth Lipman who is a glass artist and her pieces huge are amazing. They will be on exhibit through January 31. "Abundance and Pleasure: Still Lives and Focus" will close on January 31 as well. This artwork is from historical to contemporary, and everyone is encouraged to come out and enjoy these exhibits before the 31st. The Museum has afterschool art classes – Art 1 and Art 2; toddler art classes, and classes for seniors as well. Topic: Child Abuse, Proposed Bill

Guest: Randall Houston, Elmore Count District Attorney

District Attorney Houston is proposing a bill during the Legislature session that will increase penalties for child abuse. He came on today to discuss legislation introduced as Winston's Law that is named for a child that is the subject of criminal prosecution. He was 4 years old at the time, and Mr. Houston is going before the Legislature to push for stiffer penalties for abuse of a child. He said Winston's was the worst case of child abuse (where the child lived) that he has ever seen. All agencies and service organizations that he has contacted are in support of the bill as well as all District Attorneys that he has talked to. His District is 2,000 square miles, and is comprised of Elmore, Autauga, and Chilton counties. They prosecuted 43,000 cases in 2014. 180,000 people live in these Counties, so they are seeing all kinds of crimes. More violent burglaries such as home invasion are taking place lately. Elmore County is still seen as a rural county but it is not rural anymore. 80,000 residents still there and it is now a bedroom community for Montgomery. Mr. Houston discussed their outreach program, "Helping Families Initiatives" for children which starts with truancy problems in schools, and goes from there. It has been very successful.

Topic: Children's Concert

Guest: John Jackson, Director, Capitol Sounds Concert Band

Mr. Jackson came on to talk about their first upcoming children's concert that will promote and support school bands and music programs throughout the River Region Area. When budgets are cut, usually the Arts (including music) end up on the chopping blocks. His band is sponsored by the city and the Department of Recreation, and they put on several performances during the year to give back to the community. The idea behind the children's concert was to do something they hadn't done before. The Capitol Sounds Bank averages about 50 members, and they play a little bit of everything – the music is kind of broad – they play something for everyone. The Children's Concert will be at Sydney Lanier High School on February 6 starting at 3 P.M. It is aimed at children in the 4th, 5th, and 6th grades who want to join a school's band. The concert is sponsored by the school system, and the Arts Council of Montgomery, and is free of charge. He and Tim also discussed auditions and where the viewer can go for more information on the concert.

Topic: Mental Illness & “Healthy Minds Network”
Guest: Lynn Beshear, Envision 20/20
Linnea Connelly, Consultant, Auburn University, Montgomery

Today’s guests discussed the upcoming conference with Patrick Kennedy on mental illness. Because of his and his family’s issues with the disease, Mental Health has become his #1 project. Mental illness is a \$114 billion dollar issue for businesses. The main reason for the conference is to open us conversation about the illness. The #1 barrier to care is the stigma . . . people are afraid to talk about themselves or their family members. Ms. Connelly is a coordinator of the event. She has been working with 2020 on this project, and the access to health care for the past two years. They are helping to facilitate, bringing key players together; helping them plan strategically with data collection and research. AUM’s role in the conference is to make sure the right topics are being talked about, and that they have the data to back up research. Insurance coverage and cost of treatment was discussed. The Mental healthcare system is affected by so many different sectors – law enforcement, mental healthcare system, education, businesses, and families. There are a lot of moving pieces. The largest mental hospitals in the country are jails. The conference will be held at the Renaissance Hotel on Wednesday, March 30 from 9 A.M. to 3:30 P.M. The cost is \$120.00. Topic: Family Guidance Center, Work Ready Program
Guest: Yolanda Adams, Family Guidance Center

Ms. Adams came on to talk about the Family Guidance Center’s Work Ready! Program that serves young adults 16-24 years old, who are not in school and live in Montgomery, Autauga, Elmore, Lowndes, Crenshaw and Butler Counties. She discussed the free services that Work Ready! Offers – the hands on readiness experience; assistance with job search and the how-to’s of getting employed; guidance in entering college; vocational college or a credentialing program and help to enroll in and finish a GED. She discussed funding, how long the program has been in existence, and who will benefit from the school. The program is open to the homeless, those with disabilities, individuals subject to the juvenile or adult justice system, those in foster care, low income persons, pregnant persons, etc. Those who are younger than 16, and those older than 24 at the time of enrollment, are not eligible to participate in the program. She told viewers how to get involved in the program, and who to contact for more information. Ms. Adams also talked about the Family Guidance Center, and upcoming events there.

Topic: Black History
Guests: Dr. Richard Bailey, Historian

Dr. Bailey's specialty is the post-civil war period in the south called reconstruction. Last year, and the beginning of this year, with all of the anniversaries taking place, Alabama is a goldmine for any historian to delve into, get his feet wet, and reflect on the past events in Alabama's history. Tim and Dr. Bailey discussed the end of the civil War, and the period known as Reconstruction. Academically, politically, and socially there were forces at work to make sure the fruits of the Civil War wouldn't be around in the south. However, the forces of good prevailed beginning with the Reconstruction Act 1867, African-Americans across this nation, not just in the south secured the right to vote – it is called enfranchisement, which changed the tune for everything in the south. This is when events began to change for African-Americans and Dr. Bailey and Tim talked about why things changed at this time. Blacks served in the Alabama Legislature during Reconstruction, and there were 103 African-Americans serving in local offices (city, county commission, and probate judges office. Basically Reconstruction was a slow success, and the Klan started their rise during this time. The first African-American ran for statewide office in 1870, and he ran for Secretary of State. He lost the race. Oscar Adams was the first African-American to be elected to statewide office (Alabama State Supreme Court) in 1982. They also discussed the recent gallop pole that ranked Alabama the #1 Conservation state in the nation.

Topic: Habitat for Humanity
Guest: Nick Mielke, Executive Director, Montgomery Habitat For Humanity

Tim and Mr. Mielke talked about the origin of the organization – it was started by two Montgoerians in 1926 in South Georgia. It began in Montgomery in 1987, and it has been around almost 30 years. Habitat International has built over 800 million homes around the world. Habitat for humanity locally has helped over 80 families get into homes in 30 years. They serve strictly Montgomery County. The families put in 400 equity hours as they have to work to earn the opportunity of owning a home. There are 36 affiliates in the State of Alabama. It was explained how Habitat get the homes – they don't really purchase them. He went over the application proves, and the requirements applicants must have. Mr. Mielke talked about the annual fundraiser with the Harlem ambassadors that will be held on February 20th at 3 P.M. at Faulkner University. Tickets are \$10, and kids 8 get in free. Topic: Alabama's Democratic and Primary Elections
Guest: Steven Reed, Probate Judge, Montgomery County

Judge Reed talked about the upcoming elections. There is a Probate Judge in every county in Alabama, and the Judge is the chief election official. They have to get everything in place before the election, and work very closely with the Board of Registrar's and the Circuit Clerk to ensure who the proper voters are. He went over everything that his have to do before the election. Alabama doesn't have party registrations so voters can vote for either party during the primary. They discussed ways to improve elections and Tim asked about weekend voting, and voting on line. Some states already have elections on Saturday. Judge Reed said turnout varies depending on the election, and he is hoping for a big turnout on March 1st. Judge Reed went over what a voter needs in order to vote – the types of IDs to bring (any government issued photo ID, driver's license, and people can get a free voter's ID at the Board of Registrar's office); provisional ballots, etc. Polls are open from 7 A.M. – 7 P.M.

Monnie Wills has made a name for himself in Hollywood as a versatile and creative film producer. He has produced not only major studio films, but independent features and thought provoking documentaries. Originally from Montgomery, Alabama, Wills is a graduate of The University of Texas at Austin. After spending 15 years in Los Angeles, he recently relocated back home to Montgomery where he now resides. Charlseley Adkins relocated to Alabama, and she and Mr. Wills formed Biscuit - a Filmmaking Company - this year. She spent the last five years at the production company, Harbinger Pictures, the company behind the acclaimed motion picture, “The Help”. She began her first year as Harbinger's Director of Development and then was promoted to Vice President of Development and Production. Charsley and Mr. Monnie discussed Montgomery and the kinds of movies they would like to do here – they are keeping their eyes out. Tim and Mr. Wills talked about how the city has changed, and how it felt to come back to Montgomery after living and working in California. They discussed previous movies made in the city state, and how they fared. Monnie has a movie coming out April 19 on video on Demand and DVD, and they will go from there. They talked about their backgrounds in producing, and the experiences they have had in the movie business, writing, directing, and production values. Topic: Alabama Emergency Management Agency

Guest: Art Faulkner, Director

Mr. Faulkner discussed the season we've had so far in Alabama. Because of the torrential flooding in December – New Year's, President Obama declared 39 counties in the state disaster areas. Recently, there has been a couple of rounds of severe weather, and the busy season is just getting started. In Alabama, we always have to be prepared for many different weather patterns even in a 24 hour period. They talked about tornado warnings, shelters, and what people should do when they are under a tornado watch or warning, and when a weather alert is first given. Mr. Faulkner's agency wants people to be prepared at all times. Straight line winds, lightning, and hail all impact people, and more people in the state are killed by lightning instead of tornados. Flooding can creep up unexpectedly. Even 6 or 8 inches of water can be a very deadly situation when trying to drive areas where there are flooded roads. The difference between flooding and flash flooding was discussed, and most people are killed in flash flooding. He said a person should get out of the car when they hear a tornado warning while driving. They discussed the April 27, 2011 tornados in Tuscaloosa, and what the governor did about community and individual shelters. He said individuals should only purchase FEMA approved shelters for homes. Today's guests brought with them a resident of the Zoo, "Mudd", who is a grey banded king snake, around 8 years old, and can live to 20 years old. He is a non-venomous snake who visits schools, kindergarten, churches, nursing homes, etc. Steven talked about the 40th Zoo Weekend coming up. It was only 6 acres when it first started with a few animals, and is now a zoo with 40+ acres that holds 5 continents, a Mann Museum, rides and attractions, and they have come a very long way. Topic: City of Greenville

Guest: Dexter McClendon, Mayor, Greenville, AL

Greenville's population was 8,100 in the last census, and was up 15% from the prior census. The Mayor talked about Greenville's positive outlook because of the upswing of the economy. The city is fairly dependent on traffic that passes through, and those that stop and spend their money. Greenville's main attractions are the businesses, and the golf course that brings a lot of people into their town. They have a small airport that they've spent \$7-8 million in improvements over the past 15 years using grants. His police department is one of the best they've ever had with a chief that has been there since 1984. They talked about the recent shooting of a Black man by a Montgomery policeman, and the Mayor said they have looked at racial profiling for years, and have people come in and talk to them to make sure they are pro-active in many areas. On legislative issues – he's O.K. with speed cameras in parked police cars; he doesn't like them telling him what to do, just like they don't want anyone in Washington telling them what to do. They talked about home rule and gave an example of Birmingham voting to raise their minimum wage to \$10 per hour, and the Legislature disapproved of this saying there should be a statewide minimum wage. He works well with the County Commission. They don't bring up a lot of controversial things or new laws. He'd like for the city to have more jobs which would solve all of their problems.

Topic: The City of Tuskegee

Guests: Mayor Johnny Ford, Mayor, Tuskegee, Alabama

The Mayor gave a status update on Victoryland Casino and Racetrack, and he has called on the U.S. Department of Justice to intervene and determine why the State's Attorney General is using his office working with the Native Americans to keep Victoryland closed. 2,000 people are out of work because of this, and they are losing millions of dollars for their schools, the county, the city, and Tuskegee University. The same machines that are outlawed in Tuskegee are used by the Native Americans in their facilities. He talked about the new hospital that is being built in the city. The Center will be completed this year, and the hospital in the next couple of years. On the recent Montgomery police shooting, he said his Police Department is doing well. He is more concerned with black-on-black crime and supports the President on his gun control efforts. When discussing home rule, he said the cities have home rule, and he served in the Legislature, and they are no smarter than Mayors of cities. He thinks the minimum wage should be \$15 per hour. On the speed camera issue, he disapproves as they don't bring in as much money as they'd like.

Mayor Evans is in his second term as Mayor of the City. He was first elected in 2008 and had previously served as a city councilman. He and Tim talked about the history, the beauty, and the businesses that are in Selma. Last year's 50th Anniversary Celebration of the Montgomery-Selma March had a huge financial impact on the city, county, and state as well. People used hotels in surrounding areas while in town for the event. It drew dignitaries from all over the United States and visitors from all over the world as well. President Obama and his family visited the city, and spoke at the event during last year's celebration. The celebration this year, though smaller, impacted the city as well. Mayor Evans jokingly said that if they could just charge people to walk across the Edmund Pettis Bridge, it would bring in millions of dollars each year. Mayor Evans voiced his concern over crime in the city, would like to see it decreased, but thinks his police department is doing a good job. He supports home rule, and would like to see the minimum wage raised for workers; he is O.K. with speed cameras in parked cars – he has gotten ticketed, and paid the fine, saying he can now tell people that if he paid his fine, they can pay theirs as well.

ADRS provides services across a lifetime through four major programs: Alabama's Early Intervention System, serving birth to age 3; Children's Rehabilitation Service, serving birth to age 21; Vocational Rehabilitation Service, serving adolescents and adults, (last year this program served 30,248 Alabamians with disabilities, assisting 4,206 in becoming successfully employed); and the State of Alabama Independent Living (SAIL) Service/Homebound, serving people with the most disabilities. Ms. Burdeshaw explained exactly what all of these programs do, the locations of the services, and why they are important, the role the department plays in helping students with disabilities to do well in school, and the importance of technology with disabilities.
