Section II: Most Significant Programming

A. Coronavirus In Shelby County: Broadcast on March 14 at 5:45 a.m. Duration: 15 minutes. The program *Focus* featured Dr. Kenneth Ward from the Department of Public Health at the University of Memphis. As part of an ongoing series on Coronavirus and its impact on Memphis, Dr. Ward discussed where Shelby County stood as far as virus prevention and vaccination programs on the one year anniversary of the pandemic.

B. Hunger In Memphis: Broadcast on March 28 at 5:45 a.m. Duration: 15 minutes. The program *Focus* featured Anwar Arafat, Imam of the Memphis Islamic Center, who discussed the Memphis Islamic Center's partnership with the Mid-South Food Bank. The Memphis Muslim community is starting an ongoing program to collect funds and pantry staples to help with the problem of hunger in Memphis.

C. Water Infrastructure: Broadcast on January 14 at 10:20 a.m. and January 16 at 3:20 p.m. Duration: 9:00 minutes per segment. A segment of the program *E-Town* featured Catherine Coleman Flowers, Environmental Health Advocate for the Center for Rural Enterprise and Environmental Justice who discussed failing water and waste sanitation infrastructure in rural areas and its role in perpetuating health and socioeconomic disparities.

D. Industrial Pollution: Broadcast on January 7 at 10:20 a.m. and January 9 at 3:20 p.m. Duration: 12:10 minutes per segment. A segment of the program *E-Town* featured Anne Rolfes from the Louisiana Bucket Brigade. Rolfes discussed how for more than 20 years, the Louisiana Bucket Brigade has partnered with communities just a fenceline away from industrial sites that pollute our air, water and soil. Week after week, they are helping residents amplify their voice and overcome challenges to create a healthier, pollution-free future.

E. Renewable Consumer Goods: Broadcast on January 21 at 10:20 a.m. and January 23 at 3:20 p.m. Duration: 8:40 minutes per segment. A segment of the program *E-Town* featured Peter Muir from Fixit Clinic who discussed their programs and seminars to teach people how to repair and reuse many basic consumer products rather than throwing them away and creating more garbage. Nearly 300 Fixit Clinics have been held to date, hosted by municipal and county governments, recycling and environmental organizations, school systems, colleges and universities, and public libraries.

F. Climate Change: Broadcast Monday thru Friday at Noon, October thru December 2020. Duration: 1:30 minutes per segment. *Climate Connections* is a daily program that is designed to educate the public about all issues concerning climate change. Among the topics discussed this quarter were: the Texas power outages, hurricanes, recent books about climate change, racist housing policies that create environmental inequality, and how humpback whales are having to change their migration patterns due to climate change.
