Section II: Most Significant Programming

- A. Community Health: Broadcast on July 7 at 5:45 a.m. Duration: 15 minutes. A segment of the program *Focus* featured Dr. Ken Ward, Director of the Division of Social and Behavioral Sciences at the University of Memphis, who discussed the success and work of the Community Health Improvement Plan. This plan was launched by 60 different Memphis agencies in 2015 due to the proliferation of dialysis treatment centers, especially in neighborhoods where demographic factors associated with kidney disease are prevalent, as well as an acute demand in the Memphis area for kidney transplants due to high rates of hypertension, diabetes and obesity.
- B. Military Veterans: Broadcast on September 5 at 10:20 a.m. and September 7 at 3:20 p.m. Duration: 6:50 minutes per segment. A segment of the program *E-Town* featured Michelle Angela, director of The Veterans Garden Project, who discussed using gardening to help military veterans transition from active duty to civilian life. Gardening gives veterans the chance to learn new skills, begin to reconnect with others and find a new purpose in life.

- C. Science Education: Broadcast on July 18 at 10:20 a.m. and July 20 at 3:20 p.m. Duration: 8:21 minutes per segment. A segment of the program *E-Town* featured Jane Zelikova from 500 Women Scientists who discussed how science is still perceived by many to be primarily a white male occupation and how we need better access to science education for women and minorities.
- D. Computers For Low Income Families: Broadcast on August 1 at 10:20 a.m. and August 3 at 3:20 p.m. Duration: 7:18 minutes per segment. A segment of the program *E-Town* featured Mark Dibner, from the Kramden Institute who discussed their program to refurbish and fix older computers to donate to middle school honor roll students who could not afford home computers.
- E. Help For The Incarcerated: Broadcast on August 15 at 10:20 a.m. and August 17 at 3:20 p.m. Duration: 14 minutes per segment. A segment of the program *E-Town* featured Gary Fine, founder of Prisoner Express who discussed their program to create an opportunity for incarcerated men and women to get information and education through newsletters and various education programs. The goal of Prisoner Express is to help prisoners with the isolation and alienation of prison life.
- F. AIDS Orphans: Broadcast on July 25 at 10:20 a.m. and July 27 at 3:20 p.m. Duration: 8:56 minutes per segment. A segment of the program *E-Town* featured Twesigye Jackson Kaguri from the Nyaki Orphan Project who discussed the plight of children left behind because of the HIV/AIDS epidemic in Africa. Nearly 14 million AIDS orphans live in sub-Saharan Africa.
- G. Climate Change: Broadcast Monday thru Friday at Noon, July thru September 2019. Duration: 1:30 minutes per segment. *Climate Connections* is a daily program that is designed to educate the public about all issues concerning climate change. Among the topics discussed this quarter were: increased flooding, reusing abandoned industrial sites, effect of hot autumn weather on high school athletes, clean water and decreasing transportation pollution.
