Section II: Most Significant Programming

- A. Legal Help For The Poor: Broadcast on March 31 at 5:45 a.m. Duration: 15 minutes. A segment of the program *Focus* featured Bryson Whitney, attorney with Memphis Area Legal Services, Inc. (MALS) who discussed the need for free legal help for low income and elderly persons. MALS provides free legal assistance in civil (non criminal) matters to persons in Fayette, Lauderdale, Shelby and Tipton counties in Tennessee.
- B. Rainforest Preservation: Broadcast on February 21 at 10:20 a.m. and February 23 at 3:20 p.m. Duration: 9 minutes per segment. A segment of the program *E-Town* featured Sophia Watkins, founder and director of the Forest Fund, who discussed efforts being made to save the Amazon rain forest.
- C. Cleaning Up Neighborhoods: Broadcast on February 7 at 10:20 a.m. and February 9 at 3:20 p.m. Duration: 8:41 minutes per segment. A segment of the program *E-Town* featured Dara Schoenwald from VolunteerCleanup.com who discussed ways to engage volunteers to clean up their neighborhoods and encourage people to reduce their reliance on single-use plastics.

- D. Clean Water In Africa: Broadcast on March 21 at 10:20 a.m. and March 23 at 3:20 p.m. Duration: 9:36 minutes per segment. A segment of the program *E-Town* featured Sarah Evans, founder and board co-chair of Well Aware, a nonprofit that funds and implements clean water systems for impoverished communities in Africa. Well Aware is known for its sustainability model in building lasting water systems with high impact.
- E. Marine Debris: Broadcast on January 3 at 10:20 a.m. and January 5 at 10:39 p.m. Duration: 10:39 minutes per segment. A segment of the program *E-Town* featured Chris Pallister founder of Gulf of Alaska Keeper. Pallister's organization has hundreds of volunteers who have spent over 30,000 hours helping remove over a million pounds of toxic plastic debris from over a thousand miles of critical coastal habitat, restoring and enhancing rich inter-tidal ecosystems in the process.
- F. Health Resources In Low Income Communities: Broadcast on February 14 at 10:20 a.m. and February 16 at 3:20 p.m. Duration: 11:02 minutes per segment. A segment of the program *E-Town* featured Kathleen Hower from Global Links, who discussed ways to develop health improvement resources in low income communities and efforts to promote environmental stewardship in the U.S. healthcare system.
- G. Climate Change: Broadcast Monday thru Friday at Noon, January thru March 2019. Duration: 1:30 minutes per segment. *Climate Connections* is a daily program that is designed to educate the public about all issues concerning climate change. Among the topics discussed this quarter were how cities are cutting carbon pollution, improving climate education in Mississippi, connecting Latinos to climate action, problems faced by airports due to climate change, increased flooding, and farming of corals.
