Traveling the Bluegrass:

February 1: Emily Cleaver with the U. S. Forest Service says the annual Bison auction returns to Land Between the Lakes Saturday, February 3. Cleaver talks about the bison that will be sold, why the auction is taking place, how to participate, and the success of the elk and bison prairie.

February 28: Young farmers from across the state will gather this weekend in Madisonville for the Kentucky Young Farmers Convention. Young Farmer Advisor Troy Muse says the annual gathering features some important speakers, a lady's program, and some annual awards.

February 29: Kentucky FFA Foundation Executive Director Sheldon McKinney says the organization is launching a new website designed to connect graduating FFA members across the state with potential employers. McKinney says businesses and upcoming graduates can find out more at kyffaworks.org.

March 1: Kentucky native Brian Pennington says the Fellowship of Christian Farmers International is using walking sticks as a way to connect with visitors each year at the National Farm Machinery Show and other events. Pennington, who grew up in Prestonsburg, says their group hands out several walking sticks each year in return for a few minutes to share their Christian message.

March 4: National Agriculture Statistics Services David Knopf says Kentucky saw some gain and some losses during the last five years. Knopf breaks down the 2022 Census of Agriculture that was released in February and talks about the impact on Kentucky.

March 5: Kentucky based Lonestar Rodeo Company is kicking off another season that will take them across the eastern United States. Lonestar's Rachel Boyd talks about the rodeo season, the clowns, specialty acts and other highlights of this year's rodeo season.

March 6: The Kentucky Heifer Initiative partnership between Farm Credit Mid-America and the Kentucky Cattleman's Association is helping Sophia Smith purchase a heifer to raise on the family farm. Smith talks about her essay, her role on the farm, and what kind of heifer she plans to buy.

March 7: Kentucky Junior Cattleman's Association member Nate Crumley says he wanting to use the money from the Farm Credit Mid-America Junior Heifer Initiative to purchase a black Hereford heifer to add to his show string. Crumley talks about applying for the grant, his involvement in the farm, and what he is looking for in a heifer.

March 8: Senior Farm Credit Mid-America Heifer Initiative winner McKenzie Bell says she became interested in applying for the grant after taking a class at the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture. Bell talks about the breed of heifer she plans to buy and how the heifer will expand the stocker operation on their farm.

March 11: Commonwealth Agri Energy is celebrating 20 years of using corn from Kentucky farmers to produce ethanol, corn oil, distillers' dry grain, and carbon dioxide. General Manager Mick Henderson talks about the beginning of the plant, the growth over the years, and the changes in perception since the start.

March 12: A cattle farmer from Fredonia was recently recognized by the Kentucky Gelvieg Association for his dedication to the industry after starting with one heifer when he was in the eighth grade. Brian Gill talks about his start in the cattle business, about the breed he raises, and how his herd has grown.

March 13: A farm family from Glassgow recently had the top selling heifer at the Kentucky Gelvieg say at the Kentucky Farm Bureau Beef Expo. Carrie Tillman-Derossett, who is also the Logan County 4-H Agent, talks about the heifer they sold, their start in the cattle business, and the legacy of their farm.

March 14: Morgan Dietrich with Case IH talks about the news suspension system that will soon be available on their quad-track line of tractors. Dietrich talks about the development of the suspension system, how will improve comfort for the operator, and when the new line of tractors will be available.

March 15: Kentucky Pork Producers President Eric Heard says the new partnership with the Tennessee Pork Producers Association will be a huge win for both states. Heard talks about the aspects of the partnership, how both states gain, and the importance of sharing the message about pork.

March 18: We meet Jackson County farmer Eddie Neely who raises cattle and hay on his farm. Neely talks about his history in farming, how they got started, and other details about his heritage in agriculture.

March 19: Kentucky Agriculture Commissioner Jonathon Shell says he is focused on several priorities during his first term. Shell discusses the priorities, how he wants to accomplish them, and the reaction of farmers and the agriculture community to his goals.
