Politics, Law, & Economics

April 7, :60, The Armstrong Williams Show, The Armstrong Williams Show, Armstrong Williams interviews a panel of journalists, exploring current social, current events, and political issues. Today's topic is: Who can you trust?

On April 8, "Through the Decades" remembers the day Clint Eastwood was elected Mayor of Carmel, California in 1986. We also take a look back on the day David Lynch's television drama "Twin Peaks" premiered on ABC in 1990, and on the day of her birth, we profile actress Patricia Arquette.

April 14, :60, The Armstrong Williams Show, The Armstrong Williams Show, Armstrong Williams interviews a panel of journalists, exploring current social, current events, and political issues. Today's topic is: Trump Impeachment.

April 15, "Through the Decades" relives the tragic terrorist attack at the Boston Marathon in 2013, where two bombs went off near the finish line. We also take a look back on the day North Korea shot down a U.S. spy plane in 1969, killing all 31 on board, and on the day of her birth, we profile British actress and screenwriter Emma Thompson.

April 16, "Through the Decades" goes back in time to remember the day one of the deadliest mass shootings occurred on campus at Virginia Tech in 2007. We also take a look back on the "crime of the century" on the day the men who ambushed a mail rail in 1964 were sentenced to prison. And on the day of his birth, we profile actor Jon Cryer.

April 16, :60, The Dick Cavett Show, Muhammad Ali jokes about his rivalry with Joe Frazier, Richard Kleindienst discusses the then on-going Watergate investigation.

April 19, "Through the Decades" remembers when the U.S. launched their clandestine "Bay of Pigs Invasion" in 1961. We also take a look back on the day American viewers first encountered "The

Simpsons” on “The Tracey Ullman Show” in 1987, and on the day of her birth, we profile actress Jayne Mansfield.

We also take a look back on the day the musical “Rent” opened on Broadway in 1996, and on the day of her birth, we profile actress and producer Michelle Pfeiffer.

We also take a look back on when a public “feud” between Jack Benny and Fred Allen debuted on the radio in 1932, and on the day of his birth, we profile actor and former wrestler professional – Dwayne “The Rock” Johnson.

May 3, :60, “Through the Decades” remembers the day America heard charges that President Ronald Reagan and First Lady Nancy Reagan used astrology to determine the timing of key events. We also take a look back on the day the President of Exxon – Sidney Reso – was kidnapped and later found dead, and on the day of his birth, we profile folk artist Pete Seeger.

May 5, :60, The Armstrong Williams Show, The Armstrong Williams Show, Armstrong Williams interviews a panel of journalists, exploring current social, current events, and political issues. Today’s topic is: Is Everyone Smoking Weed?

May 7, "Through the Decades" goes back in time to relive when Allied Corporation and others were indicted by a grand jury for polluting the environment in 1976. We also take a look back on the day Vladimir Putin was sworn in as President of Russia in 2000, and on the day of her birth, we profile film director Amy Heckerling.

May 8, :60, On The Dick Cavett Show, Beverly Sills speaks about her voice and finally becoming a doctor, Don Rickles quips about his career beginning as an insult comic, columnist Earl Wilson talks about scooping the newspapers about smallpox vaccination, Phyllis Kirk discusses the legacy of her film House of Wax and being a "freaky fan" of Stanley Kubrick.

And on the day of his birth, we profile Billy Joel.

May 10, :60, "Through the Decades" remembers the day Nelson Mandela was sworn in as President of South Africa in 1994. We also take a look back on when Sony's Betamax was introduced in 1975, and on the day of his birth, we profile dancer and choreographer Fred Astaire.

May 11, 1:30, **Heroes at Home**, Six military heroes share their personal experiences of service in Operation Iraqi Freedom and Enduring Freedom. Each account is different, but all are touching examples of the sacrifices ordinary men and women make to protect our freedom. During the interviews, each family is surprised with a weekend getaway and a home make-over.

May 11, :60, "Through the Decades" remembers the day Marilyn Jean Buck was arrested in 1985 for the famed Brinks robbery in 1981. We also take a look back on the day life and career of reggae music pioneer Bob Marley, who passed on this day in 1981. And on the day of his birth, we profile stand-up comedian George Carlin.

May 13, :60, "Through the Decades" remembers the day Pope John Paul the II became the target of an assassination attempt in 1981. We also take a look back on the day Winnie Mandela – wife of Nelson Mandela – was convicted of kidnapping in 1991. And on the day of his birth, we profile music legend Stevie Wonder.

May 19, :60, The Armstrong Williams Show, The Armstrong Williams Show, Armstrong Williams interviews a panel of journalists, exploring current social, current events, and political issues. Today's topic is: Credit and Debt.

May 26, :60, The Armstrong Williams Show, The Armstrong Williams Show, Armstrong Williams interviews a panel of journalists, exploring current social, current events, and political issues. Today's topic is: Veteran's.

May 27, :60, "Through the Decades" remembers the day Christopher Reeve experienced an equestrian accident in 1995 that would leave him tragically paralyzed. We also take a look back on the day Chicago launched its Century of Progress World's Fair Exposition in 1933, and on the day of his birth, we profile actor Louis Gossett.

May 28, :60, "Through the Decades" goes back in time to recall the death of Phil Hartman in 1998, who was the victim of a shocking murder-suicide. We also take a look back on the day Texas businesswoman Linda Finch completed Amelia Earhart's ill-fated journey six decades later. And on the day of her birth, we profile soul-singer Gladys Knight.

May 31, :60, The Dick Cavett Show, Gerald Ford welcomes Dick Cavett into his family home and discusses being called "Vice President", his exercise routine, and Richard Nixon's connection to the then ongoing Watergate investigation. Dick Cavett also interviews Betty Ford, their children, and the Ford's neighbors.

June 2, :60, The Dick Cavett Show, Tony Curtis takes audience questions about his films, Federico Fellini discusses the response to his film Satyricon, and F. Lee Bailey talks about press coverage and trial of My Lai Massacre.

June 4, :60, "Through the Decades" remembers the day Bruce Springsteen's hit song "Born in the USA" was released in 1984. We also take a look back on the day Martin Luther King Jr.'s murderer, James Earl Ray, became the target of a stabbing attack in 1981, and on the day of her birth, we profile actress and filmmaker Angelina Jolie.

June 13, :60, "Through the Decades" remembers the day Daniel Ellsberg released the Pentagon Papers in 1971. We also take a look back on the day Lyndon Johnson nominated Thurgood Marshall as the first African American to serve on the Supreme Court. And on the day of her birth, we profile actress and author Ally Sheedy.

June 17, :60, "Through the Decades" remembers the Watergate scandal of 1972 on the day five men were arrested. We also take a look back on the day the Statue of Liberty arrived in America in 1885, and on the day of his birth, we profile comedian and actor Joe Piscopo.

June 17, :60, On The Dick Cavett Show, Rose Kennedy discusses her response to family tragedy, Dr. Harry Gordon talks about the Special Olympics, Dizzy Dean reminisces about his baseball career, and Hollywood reporter Bob Thomas reveals behind the scenes knowledge about Gone With the Wind.

We also take a look back on the day "Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone" was published in 1997, and on the day of his birth, we profile actor, comedian and producer Sean Hayes.

Arts, Entertainment, & Leisure

April 1, :60 The Dick Cavett Show, Bette Davis discusses what it's like getting pied in the face, and Peggy Wood reveals what Oscar Hammerstein said after her audition. Both actresses talk about breaking into acting, what to say after a bad performance, and trying to top past parts. Dick Cavett also shows off his stage make-up skills.

On April 2, :60 "Through the Decades" goes back in time to remember the day a 232-day strike in Major League Baseball finally came to an end in 1995. We also take a look back on the day a bomb ripped a hole in Flight 840 while flying over Greece in 1986, and on the day of his birth, we profile television's "NYPD detective" Christopher Meloni.

April 2, :60, The Dick Cavett Show, playwright Tennessee Williams discusses Marlon Brando, his relationship with his father, his impression of William Faulkner, and why he chose his first name. Viewers also get an intimate look inside Williams' house and around New Orleans.

On April 3, :60, "Through the Decades" remembers the day a plane traveling from New York City to Minneapolis suddenly dropped in the sky before pilots made an emergency landing in Detroit in 1979. We also take a look back on the day the Duchess of Windsor's jewelry auction was held in 1987, and on the day of his birth, we profile Hollywood comedian and actor Eddie Murphy.

April 3, :60, On The Dick Cavett Show, Michael Caine addresses marriage rumors and working with Laurence Olivier in their film Sleuth, director Joseph Mankiewicz reveals what to say when receiving an Oscar, and Neil Simon discusses playwrighting.

April 5, :60, Featured on The Dick Cavett Show is Jack Paar, discussing his nerves, his memories of Judy Garland, and an infamous confrontation while host of The Tonight Show.

We also sit down with singer Richard Marx to reflect on how the stories of the day influenced the sounds of the time, and on the day of his birth, we profile actor Dennis Quaid.

April 9, :60, The Dick Cavett Show, Kirk Douglas talks about being the only boy in a family of six sisters, appealing the rating for his film Scalawag, and his health regime. Dudley Moore and Peter Cook discuss why they were kicked off an Australian show, violence on film, their comedy style, and their accents.

April 11, :60, The Dick Cavett Show, George Harrison jokes about his Beatles career, and Ravi Shankar discusses playing the sitar

April 12, :60, The Dick Cavett Show, director Ingmar Bergman discusses how his childhood shaped his art, the slapstick clip in his first film Prison and a stylish close-up in his film Wild Strawberries. Then actress Bibi Andersson talks about teaming with Bergman, a bad filmmaking experience, and her work in the film The Touch.

April 13, :60, Through the Decades celebrates our favorite offerings from 1970s Hollywood including, the unlikely boxing hero named Rocky, John Travolta's disco dancing in Saturday Night Fever, and the epic space battle Star Wars.

April 15, :60, The Dick Cavett Show, Phyllis Diller jokes about her plastic surgery, Milton Berle remembers the beginning of his career and takes audience questions, and Lawrence Welk discusses his autobiography Wunnerful, Wunnerful and his "nice guy" image.

April 17, "Through the Decades" remembers the day the soap opera "General Hospital" aired its 10,000th episode in 2002. We also take a look back on the day Sirhan Sirhan was convicted for the murder of Senator Robert Kennedy in 1969, and on the day of his birth, we profile comedian Martin Lawrence.

April 17, :60, The Dick Cavett Show, Woody Allen quips about meeting the Queen, and Ruth Gordon discusses being in show business for 54 years and What Ever Happened to Aunt Alice?. Then, Gina Lollobrigida drops by to surprise Dick Cavett.

April 18, :60, The Dick Cavett Show is Carroll O'Connor discussing popularity after All the Family, the controversial nature of his show, and insider information about the pilot.

April 22, :60, The Dick Cavett Show, Cloris Leachman explains why she never thought The Last Picture Show would get made, Woody Allen quips about dating and his film Play It Again Sam, Muhammad Ali talks boxing and being aware of injustice, and Ann Welbourne discusses the Community Sex Information Service hotline and misinformation about sex.

April 24, :60, The Dick Cavett Show, Jack Lemmon remembers life before his big break , a prank his wife played, and his film The Out-of-Towners. Then Orson Welles discusses acting older than his age when he was younger, doing King Lear in a wheelchair, how his ignorance influenced Citizen Kane, and meeting William Randolph Hearst in an elevator.

April 25, :60, The Dick Cavett Show, comedy duo Bob and Ray showcase their humor including the character Wally Ballou and their Komodo dragon routine. Then Don Adams talks about touring with Mae West, the Get Smart voice, and his television series Check It Out!

April 26, :60, Academy Awards The Post War Years, :60, Now for the first time ever, an amazing series that traces every "Best Picture", "Best Actor", "Best Actress", and "Best Director" winner from the first half-century of the Oscar's. Enjoy fascinating behind-the-scenes anecdotes about the stars and their classic films. Relive the history of the first fifty years of Oscar winners through scenes from the most memorable movies of all time.

May 2, :60, The Dick Cavett Show, journalist Jimmy Breslin compares city and suburban life, Howard Cosell discusses his friendship with Muhammad Ali and the impending "Fight of the Century", Joe Louis shows clips from his 1935 fight with Max Baer and his 1938 fight with Max Schmeling, and Barbara Loden talks about making her film Wanda.

May 3, :60, The Dick Cavett Show, George Burns quips about smoking and working with wife Gracie Allen, Cliff Gorman talks about his Broadway play Lenny, Jim Bouton remembers his baseball memories and working with Howard Cosell, and Sly Stone discusses his musical influences.

May 4, 60, Through the Decades looks back on the world of comics, including the brilliant cartoonist who introduced the world to Charlie Brown, the teens behind Superman, and the man who helped create many of Marvel's heroes.

May 6, :60, "Through the Decades" remembers the day the Chunnel Tunnel opened in 1994 – connecting the British and French. We also take a look back on the day the former director of the CIA, William Colby, was found dead in a Maryland river in 1996. And on the day of his birth, we profile actor, filmmaker and Hollywood heartthrob George Clooney.

May 6, :60, Featured on The Dick Cavett Show is Orson Welles in an interview from 1973. Welles discusses his beginning in show business, working as a magician, and turning down a scholarship to Harvard.

May 7, :60, Featured on The Dick Cavett Show is three-time Emmy winner David Lloyd (writer for Taxi, Cheers, and The Mary Tyler Moore Show), Larry Gelbart (creator of M*A*S*H) and Pat McCormick

(writer for Get Smart and The Red Skelton Hour). They discuss writing for actors, what makes a good joke, and stand-up comedy.

May 12, :60, The Armstrong Williams Show, The Armstrong Williams Show, Armstrong Williams interviews a panel of journalists, exploring current social, current events, and political issues. Today's topic is: Mother's Day.

May 13, :60, Featured on The Dick Cavett Show is a panel of screenwriters including Marshall Brickman (Annie Hall), Bo Goldman (One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest), and Robert Towne (Chinatown). They talk about writing for actors, the pressure of directing, and the simplicity of scripts.

On May 15, :60, "Through the Decades" remembers the day Las Vegas was founded in 1905, and recalls when President Nixon accepted Abe Fortas' resignation letter to end his tenure as an associate justice on the Supreme Court in 1969. And on the day of her birth, we profile Australian actress Cate Blanchett.

May 16, :60, "Through the Decades" remembers when the Academy Awards began in 1929 – establishing itself as Hollywood's biggest night. We also take a look back on the day an elementary school in Cokeville, Wyoming was held hostage by a couple in 1986, and on the day of his birth, we profile Pierce Brosnan – also known as the superspy "James Bond."

May 20, :60, "Through the Decades" remembers the day "Roseanne" aired its final episode in 1997 – that is, until its 2018 revival. We also take a look back on when America said goodbye to Frank Sinatra during his star-studded funeral in 1998. And on the day of her birth, we profile singer and actress Cher.

May 21, :60, "Through the Decades" goes back in time to relive the moment "The Bob Newhart Show" aired its finale in 1990. We also take a look back on the day the Yuba City High School choir's bus tragically crashed in 1976, and we profile Laurence Tureaud – better known as "Mr. T."

May 21, :60, On The Dick Cavett Show, Gig Young discusses his image and film Lovers and Other Strangers, Barbara Walters talks about tips for talking to practically anyone including President Lyndon Johnson, Melvyn Douglas speaks about his character in I Never Sang for My Father, journalist Frank Reynolds critiques political television advertisements, including the famous Daisy commercial.

May 22, :60, "Through the Decades" remembers the day the first Pac-Man game was installed in a Tokyo movie theatre in 1980. We also take a look back on the day President Johnson delivered his blueprint for a better America in 1964 – an agenda known as "The Great Society." And on the day of his birth, we profile the host of "The Price is Right," Drew Carey.

May 22, :60, On The Dick Cavett Show, Laurence Olivier and Joan Plowright talk about an influential traffic stop, developing their characters for the theater, and raising their children, including the time Olivier dressed up as Santa.

May 23, :60, The Dick Cavett Show, Rosemary Clooney and Margaret Whiting discuss their sister acts, working with each other, the songwriting history of "Tenderly", and their memories of Bob Hope and Bing Crosby.

May 24, :60, The Dick Cavett Show, Laurel and Hardy expert Leonard Maltin showcases clips from the duo, Veronica Lake chats about her famous hairdo, author William Saroyan theorizes about his writing style and culture, and journalist Anthony Grey discusses being held hostage by the Chinese government.

May 24, :60, Through the Decades celebrates the phenomenon of Star Wars from the perspective of the fans. With interviews of creators of the Star Wars Rebels to the author of George Lucas's biography, we trace the Star Wars journey from concept to pop culture landmark in American history.

May 28, :60, Featured on The Dick Cavett Show, Peter O'Toole talks about nervousness, how Katharine Hepburn influenced his career, playing a mad man in his film The Ruling Class, and falling off a camel while filming Lawrence of Arabia.

May 29, :60, The Dick Cavett Show, Angela Lansbury discusses reprising the lead role in Mame and shows a clip from Bedknobs and Broomsticks, Billy Eckstine talks about racism in show business, journalist Janet Flanner remembers traveling to Paris and Truman Capote's first job at The New Yorker, and Roy Jenkins shares insights about the Shadow Cabinet in England.

May 30, :60, "Through the Decades" remembers the day athlete Steve Prefontaine passed away in 1975. We also take a look back on when the Lincoln Memorial was unveiled in the nation's capital in 1922, and on the day of his birth, we profile voice actor Mel Blanc.

May 31, :60, "Through the Decades" remembers the day season one of "Survivor" premiered in 2000. We also take a look back on the day Johnstown, Pennsylvania suffered from a storm in 1889, and on the day of his birth, we profile movie star Clint Eastwood.

June 1, 1:30, The Beatles: From the Beginning to the End, This documentary follows the rise of The Beatles to a worldwide phenomenon. Capturing their first appearance in night clubs and on the "Ed Sullivan Show", these "behind the scenes" moments give glimpses into the lives of John, Paul, George, and Ringo that are rarely seen.

June 1, 1:30, Everlasting: An Unauthorized Tribute to Diana, Princess of Wales, Princess Diana of Wales touched the lives of many people with her effortless elegance, her genuine reliability, and her kind devotion. This documentary examines one of history's most beloved public figures -- from her sons, Princes William and Harry, to her charitable campaigns for landmine victims and AIDS organizations

June 1, :60, Through the Decades looks back on the shows that gave us big laughs on the small screen, including The Andy Griffith Show, The Golden Girls, and The Mary Tyler Moore Show.

June 4, :60, On The Dick Cavett Show, basketball player Bill Russell plays word association, Michael Caine does a John Wayne impression, and Phillipe Cousteau talks sea life including sharks and seals.

June 10, :60, "Through the Decades" goes back in time to relive the moment television viewers said farewell to "The Sopranos" as the season finale aired in 2007. We also take a look back on the day the first Apple II personal computer was released in 1977, and on the day of her birth, we profile Hollywood songbird Judy Garland.

June 11, :60, "Through the Decades" remembers the day Steven Spielberg's action-packed dinosaur film "Jurassic Park" was released in 1993. We also take a look back on another one of Spielberg's high-grossing films – "E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial" – which was released in 1982. And on the day of his birth, we profile actor Gene Wilder.

June 12, :60, "Through the Decades" remembers the day New York serial killer David Berkowitz – also known as "Son of Sam" – awaited his fate in a courtroom in 1978. We also take a look back on the day Indiana Jones first appeared in the film "Raiders of the Lost Ark" in 1981, and on the day the world lost him, we profile actor Gregory Peck.

June 18, :60, On The Dick Cavett Show, E.G. Marshall remembers slip-ups on live television, and David Susskind talks about his talk show. Then, the team from The Advocates demonstrate a television court trial.

June 24, :60, "Through the Decades" remembers the day Mary Pickford signed a contract in 1916 that would make her Hollywood's first million dollar actress. We also take a look back on the day "Hopalong Cassidy" debuted in 1949, and on the day of his birth, we profile Beach Boys singer and songwriter Brian Wilson.

June 25, :60, "Through the Decades" remembers the day President Reagan's Secretary of State, Alexander Haig, stepped down in 1982. We also take a look back on the day "Sleepless in Seattle" starring Meg Ryan and Tom Hanks premiered in 1993, and on the day of her birth, we profile singer and songwriter Carly Simon.

Social Justice

On April 4, :60, "Through the Decades" remembers the day Dr. Martin Luther King was assassinated and recalls his legacy as a peaceful activist who struck the world with his unshakeable faith. We also take a look back on the day the band "Starship" revitalized its sound in 1987, scoring a number one hit with "Nothing's Gonna Stop Us Now." And on the day of his birth, we profile Australian actor Heath Ledger.
