<p>3. History</p>	<p>JFK: American Experience Forever enshrined in myth by an assassin’s bullet, Kennedy’s presidency long defied objective appraisal. Recent assessments have revealed an administration long on promise and vigor, and somewhat lacking in tangible accomplishment. His proposals for a tax cut and civil rights legislation, however, promised significant gains in the months before his assassination. While maturation, as evidenced in the handling of the Cuban missile crisis, was apparent, the potential legacy of the New Frontier will forever be left to speculation.</p> <p>JFK &amp; LBJ: A Time for Greatness Fifty years ago, President Lyndon B. Johnson, now chiefly remembered for the Vietnam War, engineers two of the most important laws passed by Congress – the 1964 Civil Rights Act and the 1965 Voting Rights Act. This special examines how LBJ transforms America.</p> <p>LBJ: American Experience Revisit the presidency of Lyndon B. Johnson who used his mastery of the legislative process to shepherd a collection of progressive programs only to have his visions of a Great Society swallowed up in the quagmire of Vietnam.</p> <p>Nixon: American Experience Examine the complex life and career of Richard Nixon, whose legacy includes both ending America’s involvement in Vietnam and the Watergate scandal. 	<p><b>Jimmy Carter: American Experience</b>  This biography traces an ambitious country boy from a peanut farm in Plains, Georgia, to the Oval Office. It examines his leadership failures during the turbulent 1970s and explores the role religion played in his career. Since leaving the White House, Carter has devoted himself to bringing peace to war-torn countries, eradicating life-threatening diseases, and housing America's poorest citizens.</p> <p><b>Reagan: American Experience</b>  This two-part production follows the influence of family, religion, and anti-communism on Ronald Reagan during his youth in Illinois, rise and fall in hollywood, stormy governorship of California and triumphant ascendancy to the U.S. presidency in 1981. This second episode focuses on what may prove to be Reagan's principal legacy: his battle with the Soviet Union and his resolve to end the Cold War. The program ends with Reagan's poignant letter to the American people disclosing that he has Alzheimer's disease.</p> <p><b>Dick Cavett's Watergate</b>  It was a slow-moving devastating crisis that changed America forever. Forty years ago -- as a result of the complicated, but dramatic, tale of a criminal conspiracy to cover up misdeeds by President Nixon and his top advisers -- there was a sense that the government was in danger of collapsing under the weight of the scandal. From 1972 to 1974 the Watergate scandal was frequently a part of The Dick Cavett Show.</p> <p><b>George H.W. Bush: American Experience</b>  Look back at the life and career of our 41st president, from his service in World War II and his early career in Texas to his days in the Oval Office, first as vice president to Ronald Reagan, then as the leader who presided over the first Gulf War.</p> <p><b>9/11 Inside The Pentagon</b> On September 11, 2001, Flight 77 slammed into the Pentagon, killing 184 people. What happened behind the walls of the Pentagon is a largely untold chapter in history.
