The program includes footage of Jewell and her band performing.</p> <p>Into Africa – The Idaho-Gorongosa Connection Idahoans love a good comeback story, especially one that involves other Idahoans. Gorongosa National Park, in the African country of Mozambique, is such a story. Once blessed with thundering herds of wildlife, Gorongosa was ravaged and broken by a brutal civil war that decimated the wildlife and the infrastructure. The government closed the million acre park ... until Idahoan Greg Carr decided to help return Gorongosa to its former glory. 4. Outdoor Adventures	<p>Outdoor Idaho “Winter Carnival” This program showcases some of the interesting and offbeat events of this 10-day party and finds side trips unique to the area and the season. Watch the McCall Winter Carnival’s Mardi Gras Parade, the event that sets the tone for the party. Follow contenders over the four days of the Idaho Snow Sculpting Championship as artists take a solid block of snow and create art.</p> <p>Outdoor Idaho “A Trip to the Moon” Characterized by one of the only continental hot spots in the world, Idaho’s Craters of the Moon National Monument encompasses three-quarters of a million acres of lava flows, sagebrush, rolling hills — and a few surprises. And it may be as close as any of us will ever come to a trip to the moon.</p> <p>Outdoor Idaho “Adventure Idaho” This special reveals how Idaho’s unique landscape of outrageous geology lends itself to adventure and seeks the meaning of adventure while documenting historical and modern versions. <p>5. Health</p>	<p><b>Second Opinion “Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder”</b>  Post-traumatic stress disorder, or PTSD, is a debilitating mental disorder that can occur after a terrifying event. It was first brought to attention by returning war veterans, many of whom had been wounded in battle. Zachary Bell, former U.S. Marine, shares his story of horror in Afghanistan and his battle to regain his mental health after serving our country.</p> <p><b>Second Opinion “Special Edition: Ebola”</b>  The Ebola virus causes an acute, serious illness, which is often fatal if untreated. Ebola virus disease (EVD) first appeared in 1976 in two simultaneous outbreaks, one in Nzara, Sudan, and the other in Yambuku, Democratic Republic of Congo.</p> <p><b>Second Opinion “Advances in Alzheimer’s Disease”</b>  Recent medical studies raise the possibility of blood tests capable of predicting who is at risk for developing Alzheimer’s disease. Joanne Mee DeHond shares her mother’s struggles with Alzheimer’s and the questions that linger regarding her mother’s care and her own health.</p> <p><b>Outdoor Idaho “Nature’s Healing Power”</b>  This episode features stories of Idahoans who have found strength and solace in nature as they confront illness and injury. It also shines a spotlight on four Idaho nonprofits that offer outdoor retreats for cancer survivors and disabled veterans — and the dedication of their volunteers.</p> <p><b>Dialogue “Living With Cancer”</b>  This program profiles Cari Hug, a resident of Cambridge, ID, who has been living with metastatic breast cancer for 16 years. Hug talks about her physical and emotional journey. Professor Cheryl Jorcyk of Boise State University talks about her research into a treatment for metastatic breast cancer; and Dr. Dan Zuckerman, medical director of St. Luke’s Mountain States Tumor Institute, talks about the challenges and successes of cancer screening and treatment in a rural state.</p> <p><b>Cancer: The Emperor of All Maladies “Magic Bullets”</b>  The search for a cure for cancer is the greatest epic in the history of science, spanning centuries and continents. 	<p>Cancer: The Emperor of All Maladies          “The Blind Men and the Elephant” This episode picks up the story in the wake of the declaration of a “war on cancer” by Richard Nixon in 1971 and the search for a cure. In the lab, rapid progress is made in understanding the essential nature of the cancer cell, leading to the revolutionary discovery of the genetic basis of cancer, but few new therapies become available. History</p>	<p>American Experience “Big Burn”          In August 1910, a massive wildfire sweeps across the Northern Rockies, including parts of the Idaho Panhandle, devouring more than 3 million acres in 36 hours. More than 78 firefighters perish in the flames. A third of the town of Wallace is destroyed. The catastrophe defines the fledgling U.S. Forest Service and the nation’s fire policy for much of the 20th century.</p> <p>The Italian Americans “La Famiglia/Becoming Americans”          These opening episodes provide the context for the great flight from the Mezzogiorno region of southern Italy. By the late 19th century, Italians begin to put down roots and “Little Italys” spring up in urban areas throughout the U.S. But the first generation, holding onto language and culture, is branded as “outsiders” and mistrusted by non-Italians.</p> <p>The Italian Americans “Loyal Americans/The American Dream”          A second generation of Italian Americans begins to enter the labor movement, politics, sports and entertainment. Fiorello LaGuardia becomes mayor of New York City. Joe DiMaggio, the son of a San Francisco fisherman, becomes a baseball powerhouse and an American hero.</p> <p>Dialogue “Honoring Anne Frank”          In commemoration of the 70th anniversary of the death of Anne Frank in the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp, this episode features a 1996 Boise speech of Miep Gies, one of the Dutch protectors of the Frank family, and the person who saved Anne’s diary.</p> <p>Red Star Line: A Story of Immigration          Between 1873 and 1934, the Belgian shipping company Red Star Line transported approximately 2 million migrants from Antwerp to New York. What makes the Red Star Line unique is that it mainly transported Eastern Europeans to the United States, many of whom were of Jewish origin. Black History</p>	<p>Independent Lens “Through a Lens Darkly: Black Photographers and the Emergence of a People”  This film explores the role of photography in shaping the identity, aspirations and social emergence of African-Americans from slavery to the present. The film probes the recesses of American history through images that have been suppressed, forgotten and lost. The film brings to light the hidden and unknown photos shot by African-American photographers. The images open a window into the lives of black families, whose experiences and perspectives are often missing from the traditional historical American canon.</p> <p>AMERICAN MASTERS “August Wilson: The Ground on Which I Stand”  From Wilson’s roots as an activist, playwright and poet to his indelible mark on Broadway, this program captures the legacy of the man some call America’s Shakespeare. Wilson’s work includes a series of 10 plays, The Pittsburgh Cycle, for which he received two Pulitzer Prizes for drama. Each is set in a different decade, depicting the comic and tragic aspects of the African-American experience in the 20th century. Film and theater luminaries such as James Earl Jones, Viola Davis, Phylicia Rashad, Laurence Fishburne, Charles Dutton and others share their stories and experiences of bringing Wilson’s rich theatrical voice to the stage.</p> <p>INDEPENDENT LENS “American Denial”  This film chronicles the story of Swedish sociologist Gunnar Myrdal’s 1944 investigation of Jim Crow racism in the American South. The study was used as a springboard to explore the power of subconscious biases that still affect notions of race and class today.
