Frank Church, who successfully guided the 2.3 million-acre wilderness designation through Congress. Outdoor Idaho travels deep into The Frank to document the essence of this vast expanse of mountainous wilderness.</p> <p>Outdoor Idaho “Valley of the Tetons” On the quiet side of the Teton Mountains, Idaho’s eastern county of the same name offers summer and winter outdoor recreation, abundant wildlife, major migration routes, ranching, farming, and panoramic views of the Tetons.</p> <p>Outdoor Idaho: Idaho’s Scenic Byways” Cameras capture scenes from the state’s system of more than 2,400 miles of official Scenic, Historic or Backcountry byways. The routes crisscross the state to reveal natural wonders, geologic and historic sites, and the varied topography of Idaho.</p> <p>Outdoor Idaho “My Excellent Adventure” Is there an adventure that you’ve always wanted to experience? That’s the question we posed to our Facebook friends. The result is an hourlong special that features eight stories, including a family backpacking trip into the wilderness; a raft trip down the Middle Fork of the Salmon River; an expedition to the top of Idaho’s tallest mountain; an elk bugling adventure; and “cat-skiing” in knee-deep powder. While the majority of the workers ultimately returned to China, they left a substantial impact on the West, through the infrastructure they built and the Western culture they influenced. This illuminating documentary features extensive interviews with Eva Schloss to help tell the story of her brief friendship with Anne, their lives in hiding, and Otto's thinking after Auschwitz's liberation and, ultimately learning of Anne's diary.</p> <p>Mark Twain In his time, Mark Twain was considered the funniest man on earth. Yet he was also an unflinching critic of human nature, using his humor to attack hypocrisy, greed and racism. Local Community Interest</p>	<p>Outdoor Idaho "Creative License" For singer-songwriter Casey Kristofferson, the mountains of central Idaho are a majestic backdrop against which to write and record his mountain music. Sculptor John Grade found his muse in the form of a lava tube at Craters of the Moon National Monument and creates a wooden sculpture based on a digital scan of the tube's interior. Alexandra Paliwoda forges iron into functional art from her blacksmith shop in the valley of the Tetons near the Wyoming border. And Jon Mills chases storm clouds across the desert to capture digital images of stunning desert lightning storms in southern Idaho – he's even been hit by lightning.</p> <p>Outdoor Idaho "Wild Horses" Mustangs are a symbol of our Western tradition, yet they are often reviled, as they compete for resources with livestock and wildlife in an ever-changing environment impacted by range fire and drought. Health</p>	<p>Second Opinion “Opioids to Heroin Addiction” Experts say the heroin epidemic, which is a growing problem nationwide, is largely spurred by people who first become addicted to prescribed opiate pain medications. As the pills become more expensive and harder to obtain, people move on to the cheaper and more potent high that heroin can provide.</p> <p>Second Opinion “Kidney Transplant” With the increase of chronic diseases such as Type II Diabetes, the need for kidney transplants is on the rise. Both deceased and live donors are needed, and experts shed light on the organ transplant process.</p> <p>Second Opinion “Lead Poisoning” Even small amounts of lead can cause serious health problems- particularly in young children. While the national media focuses on Flint, Michigan, patient Yvette Reynolds shares her personal story, taking viewers behind the headlines of what some have called a national epidemic.</p> <p>Second Opinion “Drug Overdose” Only two months since their son Patrick died of a heroin overdose, Mary and Joe Mullin courageously share their story with viewers. They tell their very personal experience of Patrick’s decline into opioid use, and then heroin addiction and treatment.
