Both Tunisia and Egypt's revolutions resulted in a change of government, and later in 2011, Libya's government also fell to rebels. Suzanne Maloney, a scholar at the Saban Center for Middle East Policy at the Brookings Institution, talks about the reasons why the uprisings are occurring, and their potential effects on the United States. 6. Local School Budget Cuts	<p>DIALOGUE "School Budget Cuts 2011"</p> <p>Last March, Governor Butch Otter and State Legislators slashed Idaho's public school budget for the third year in a row. Now that schools are back in session, school officials and patrons know what programs and services have gotten cut and can begin assessing some of the larger effects of leaner revenues. This program unveils the results of a second statewide survey of Idaho's school superintendents. 7. Wildlife	<p>OUTDOOR IDAHO "WORKING FOR WILDLIFE"</p> <p>This program explores the interesting and challenging ways that Idahoans are attempting to assist wild animals, including rehabilitating orphaned black bear cubs so they can be transplanted back into the wild; recovering bird species like the California Condor; tracking wolverines and winter recreationists, to see if they can co-exist in high mountain areas; collaring deer in the winter through an elaborate process of helicopters, fences and volunteer deer tacklers; and taking baby cutthroat trout from Henrys Lake to high mountain lakes.</p> <p>DIALOGUE "Bighorn Sheep"</p> <p>In 2005 the chief of the U.S. Forest Service directed the Payette National Forest to change its 2003 plan to protect bighorn sheep viability. The species has been declining rapidly, in part due to pneumonia transmission from domestic sheep that graze in the same areas. Egger expanded his efforts to bring nonprofit organizations together in 2006 when he became the co-convener of the first Nonprofit Congress. For decades it has also been the center of controversy. But the conflict over how best to use these public lands has now become consensus, the result of eight long years of hard bargaining. A collection of local groups with diverse viewpoints found common ground and worked together to craft landmark legislation known as the Owyhee Initiative.</p> <p>OUTDOOR IDAHO “The People’s Land”</p> <p>It was a trust forced on the West more than a hundred years ago, one that has defined us ever since.
