Education	<p>Science Trek “Soil” Guest scientists answer students’ questions about soil.</p> <p>Science Trek “Asteroids and Comets” Asteroids are small, rocky objects left over from the formation of our solar system. Comets are leftovers too, made of dust, rock and ice. These small worlds can tell us what the early solar system was like.</p> <p>Science Trek “Insects” Insects are the most numerous and diverse of all animal groups on earth. There are nearly one million known species of insects, and more are being discovered each year.</p> <p>Science Trek “Volcanoes” A volcano can be described as part of Earth’s plumbing system. Why are these different ecosystems important to the plants and animals in the state? Why are they different? Viewers will visit a class at the Discovery Center of Idaho and experience an unexpected way students learn to code.</p> <p>Science Trek "Zoology" Zoologists study animals of all shapes and sizes. Zoologists help us understand how animals live and interact with the world. Outdoor Adventures</p>	<p>Outdoor Idaho "Idaho Fairways" Outdoor Idaho cameras visit some of the state's golf courses that cater primarily to locals and are gathering places for the community. Some are on naturally challenging terrains, others are designed and created; some are built by farmers, others by a more formal process. From hillsides to canyons, from sharing space with an airport to links behind protective woods, Idaho's small courses offer unique experiences.</p> <p>Outdoor Idaho "A Middle Fork Journey" Outdoor Idaho explores 100 miles of the free-flowing Middle Fork of the Salmon. Cameras follow rafters, on both guided and independent trips, who meet the challenges of the river, experience the changing scenery, and encounter wildlife. The show also explores the surrounding countryside, considers the effects of fire, and reports on a dramatic logjam.</p> <p>Outdoor Idaho "Owyhee Adventures" On first glance the Owyhee Desert is a desolate, lonely and forbidding place. But beyond the sage and endless horizon are hidden gems, narrow canyons, creeks and rivers, which hold immense beauty.</p> <p>Outdoor Idaho "Valley of the Tetons" On the quiet side of the Teton Mountains, Idaho's eastern county of the same name, offers summer and winter outdoor recreation, abundant wildlife, major migration routes, ranching, farming, and panoramic views of the Tetons.</p> <p>Outdoor Idaho "Climbing Idaho" Today's rock-climbing enthusiasts support climbing gyms, clubs and advocacy groups - no longer the exclusive band of wanderers of just a few decades ago. 5. History	<p>The Vietnam War “D��j�� vu” After a long and brutal war, revolutionaries led by Ho Chi Minh end nearly a century of French colonial rule. With the Cold War intensifying, Vietnam is divided: communists hold the North, while America supports an untested regime in the South.</p> <p>The Vietnam War “Riding the Tiger” President Kennedy and his advisers wrestle with how deeply to get involved in South Vietnam. As the increasingly autocratic Diem regime faces a growing communist insurgency and widespread Buddhist protests, a grave political crisis unfolds.</p> <p>The Vietnam War “The River Styx” With South Vietnam in chaos, Hanoi accelerates the insurgency, sending combat troops to the South. Fearing Saigon’s collapse, President Johnson escalates, authorizing sustained bombing of the North and deploying ground troops in the South.</p> <p>The Vietnam War “Resolve” Defying American airpower, North Vietnamese troops and materiel stream down the Ho Chi Minh Trail, while Saigon struggles to pacify the countryside. As an antiwar movement builds at home, GIs discover that this war is nothing like their fathers’ war.</p> <p>The Vietnam War “This Is What We Do” Enemy body counts and American casualties mount as GIs chase an elusive foe and face deadly ambushes and artillery. While Hanoi lays plans for a massive surprise offensive, the Johnson Administration reassures the public that victory is in sight.</p> <p>The Vietnam War “Things Fall Apart” Seeing the violence and brutality of the Tet Offensive unfold on television, Americans begin to doubt Johnson’s promise of “light at the end of the tunnel.” LBJ decides not to run again. The country is staggered by assassinations and unrest.</p> <p>The Vietnam War “The Veneer of Civilization” With the country at odds over the war, draft-age Americans face wrenching choices. After chaos roils the Democratic Convention, Nixon narrowly wins the presidency. In Vietnam, soldiers on all sides witness terrible savagery and unflinching courage.</p> <p>The Vietnam War “The History of the World” When troop withdrawals begin, soldiers left in Vietnam ask what they are fighting for. News breaks of a shocking massacre at My Lai, and questions grow about the war’s rectitude.
