This three-part series explores the dazzling imaginations and extraordinary experiments of the maverick geniuses who harnessed the power of electricity to light our cities, communicate across the seas and through the air, create modern industry, and enable the digital revolution.</p> <p>Everyday Miracles This two-part documentary takes an awe-filled look at scientific discoveries and complicated industrial processes behind some common creature comforts. It reveals little pieces of domestic magic among household items and is fun for the entire family.</p> <p>Dialogue “Education Policy: What Works?” David Driscoll and Eric Smith, former state commissioners of education of Massachusetts and Florida, respectively, talk about the politicization of education policy and related topics. Local Community Interest</p>	<p>Outdoor Idaho “Helping Henry’s” The Henry’s Fork of the Snake River is a waterway that rises from mountain springs to flow south for 120 miles through majestic scenery where it is known for trophy trout. This program meets with people along the river whose efforts help protect this eastern Idaho treasure.</p> <p>Outdoor Idaho “The Frank” The largest forested wilderness in the lower 48 states lies in the heart of Idaho. <i>Outdoor Idaho</i> travels deep into The Frank to document the essence of this vast expanse of mountainous wilderness.</p> <p>Gorongosa Park – Rebirth of Paradise “Parts 1 – 4” Idaho resident Bob Poole, who is host, narrator and wildlife cameraman for this miniseries, spent two and a half years working on this miniseries for PBS and National Geographic International. The programs document efforts to restore the Mozambique national park that was ravaged by 15 years of civil war.</p> <p>Into Africa: The Idaho-Gorongosa Connection After years of civil war, Mozambique’s Gorongosa National Park is devastated. Idaho philanthropist Greg Carr first brings money to the restoration project, then time and his on personal effort. His book <i>Before They’re Gone</i>, about his family’s adventures hiking through some of America’s most endangered national parks, won an honorable mention in the National Outdoor Book Awards.</p> <p>Outdoor Idaho “Palisades by Season” Experience the seasons in eastern Idaho’s Palisades on the South Fork of the Snake River near the Wyoming border. With a reservoir, prize river fishing spots and more than 400,000 acres of wildlands in the region, each season brings a new attraction.</p> <p>Nature “River of No Return” Isaac and Bjornen Babcock head into the Frank Church – River of No Return Wilderness for a yearlong honeymoon. They capture the beauty and wildlife with their cameras within the wilderness in the heart of Idaho. This episode follows the hunt in the Panhandle, the Owyhee County area and eastern Idaho. Observing the progress of three Chinese teenagers, all obsessive Internet gamers, this program considers whether the rehabilitation program is too harsh – or if it might serve as a model for the rest of the world.</p> <p>POV “When I Walk” Jason DaSilva is 25 years old and a rising independent filmmaker when a diagnosis of multiple sclerosis changes everything – and inspires him to make another film. The result is a candid and brave chronicle of one young man’s struggle to adapt to the harsh realities of MS, while holding on to his personal and creative life.</p> <p>Second Opinion “Managing Diabetes” Disability and premature death are not inevitable consequences of diabetes. Physical activity and dietary interventions, self-management training, ongoing support, and, when necessary, medications can help control the effects of diabetes.
