BRIEF OUTLINE OF NEWS STORY: Wisconsin Finally Hits 50% of Population Receiving One Dose of Covid-19 Vaccine.

EXHIBIT, IF AVAILABLE:

More than half of Wisconsinites have gotten at least one dose of the COVID-19 vaccine, according to the state Department of Health Services.

The DHS said 2,915,969 have received at least one shot, which is 50.1% of the state's eligible population. Health officials said 2,716,790 people have completed the vaccine series, or 46.7% of Wisconsin.

The state's first shots went into arms in December. Since then, a total of 5,562,607 doses have been administered throughout Wisconsin.

BASED NICOLET NATIONAL BANK CONTINUES
EXPANSION WITH AG LENDER ACQUISITION**

Nicolet National Bank in Green Bay announced a definitive agreement to acquire County Bankcorp, the parent company of Investors Community Bank, based in Manitowoc, in a deal worth \$219 Million dollars. It's an 80% stock, 20% cash deal, put together to strenghten Nicolet's farm lending portfolio. Investors Community Bank was founded by former employees of U.S. Bank in Manitowoc who specialized in agricultural lending. Investors does business in 60 of Wisconsin's 72 counties, today. Investors also does business in Michigan, and has only four branches. 60% of their business is farm loans, compared to Nicolet's 4%.

PROMISES TO SIGN BILLS ON POLICE REFORM

Gov. Tony Evers promises to sign bills banning chokeholds and making other policing changes passed by the state Assembly, while also calling on lawmakers to go farther to make law enforcement more accountable and transparent.

Evers said Wednesday that he would sign four bills that passed with bipartisan support. The Assembly failed to vote on a fifth bill as scheduled that would set a statewide use of force policy for police, and extend protections for officers who report abuses.

It was stalled due to objections from the Milwaukee police union and despite winning broad bipartisan support in the Senate.

Former Wisconsin governors Scott Walker and Jim Doyle may not agree on much, but there is at least one thing they agree on — the importance of Wisconsinites getting vaccinated.

The former governors teamed up for a Public Service Announcement with UW Health to promote the importance of the COVID-19 vaccine and its role in ending the pandemic and getting Wisconsin back to normal.

Walker and Doyle appear with UW Health Dr. Jeff Pothof in the 30-second ad.

Both Walker and Doyle have been vaccinated.

As of Wednesday, a total of 5,291,294 doses of the COVID-19 vaccine have been given in Wisconsin, according to the state's Department of Health Services. About 48.7% of people in the state have received at least one dose of the vaccine

A Wisconsin state lawmaker compared a nonprofit children's museum's mask policy to the Nazi Party in a social media post that is generating outrage and calls for an apology. Republican state Rep. Shae Sortwell shared a Facebook post on Friday by the Central Wisconsin Children's Museum in Stevens Point detailing its mask policy. The museum said masks would be optional for those who show their vaccination cards and masks would be mandatory for everyone else over age 5. Sortwell posted on Facebook that "The Gestapo wants to see your papers, please."
