BRIEF OUTLINE OF NEWS STORY: Drunken ex-lawyer convicted in child neglect case and fifth drunk driving conviction. Son of nearby radio personality at Plymouth, WI.

EXHIBIT, IF AVAILABLE: A Sheboygan father was sentenced to three and a half years in prison and five years of extended supervision Tuesday for neglecting a child and his fifth drunken driving conviction. Both counts are related to an incident in which two of his children fell out of the back of a van he was driving in May. According to the complaint, Robert W. Horsch, 41, was driving his van at the roundabout at Eighth Street and Indiana Avenue when his two sons fell out of the back without him noticing. Witnesses cared for the children, one 22 months and the other 3, until police arrived. They were transported to the hospital. The 3-year-old suffered road rash on his back and upper buttock area, abrasions to his chin and a chipped front tooth. The 22-month-old, who fell out of the van naked, also suffered road rash on his shoulder, back and top of his buttock, in addition to a skull fracture, the complaint said.

BRIEF OUTLINE OF NEWS STORY: Neenah man charged with boating crash that killed two last summer

EXHIBIT, IF AVAILABLE:A Neenah man is charged with two counts of homicide by intoxicated use of a vehicle in a boating crash that killed two sisters on Lake Winnebago last summer.

Boats operated by Brian Sullivan and Kim Laabs collided about 4,500 feet off Paynes Point on August 18 at about 10:30 at night.

Twenty-six-year-old Lauren Laabs and 20-year-old Cassie Laabs were thrown from their boat and drowned. They weren't wearing life jackets.

According to the criminal complaint, Sullivan, 44, said he had about four beers but stopped drinking four or five hours before the crash. However, his blood test showed a blood-alcohol concentration of 0.093, above the legal limit of 0.08.

Mr. Laabs tested with a 0.026 BAC, well below the legal limit.

Sullivan faces up to 25 years in prison and a \$100,000 fine on each of the felony charges.

BRIEF OUTLINE OF NEWS STORY: Massive car crash on Interstate 41, claims one life, injures 71 more.

EXHIBIT, IF AVAILABLE: One person died and 71 people were hurt in a massive pileup during whiteout conditions on Interstate 41 in Neenah, according to the Winnebago County Sheriff's Office.

The Sheriff's Office confirms 131 vehicles were involved in the chain reaction crash. 66 people were treated and released, while 5 have been further admitted for their injuries.

Other drivers and passengers were safely removed from their stranded vehicles. They were taken to Gloria Dei Lutheran Church in Neenah for a warming shelter. The American Red Cross provided blankets, food and beverages for people impacted by the crash.

Nearly 500 vehicles were stopped behind the crash and were re-routed. Crews spent the day cleaning up the mess and almost all vehicles have been removed. It has also been reported that seven hundred and seventy two 911 calls were placed regarding the incident.

BRIEF OUTLINE OF NEWS STORY: Norovirus cases showing up in WLAK and WGBW coverage areas.

EXHIBIT, IF AVAILABLE: Cases of the norovirus are popping up in Northeast Wisconsin, and some are mistaking it for the flu. Often called the "stomach bug" Norovirus causes vomiting and diarrhea. The norovirus attacks the stomach instead of your respiratory system. Unlike the flu there is no treatment for the norovirus. People can normally resolve it within about 5 to 7 days." The norovirus is year-round, but the most cases often flare up between November and April. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said the best protections from the norovirus include washing your hands with soap and water. Also make sure to handle and prepare your food safely. Right now is also the peak time for flu cases, which can lead to some confusion about what's making you sick.



BRIEF OUTLINE OF NEWS STORY: Ex-State Senator who lost, tapped to lead State Dept. of Workforce Development

EXHIBIT, IF AVAILABLE: Gov.-elect Tony Evers has named Caleb Frostman, a Democratic lawmaker and resident of Sturgeon Bay, secretary of the state's Department of Workforce Development. Evers announced Thursday that Frostman, former director of the Door County Economic Development Corp., will lead the department. Frostman has represented the region since winning the June special election for the state Senate. He lost the seat to Rep. Andre Jacque, a Republican from De Pere, in the November election. "I look forward to harnessing the power of our incredible team at DWD to increase the capacity of all Wisconsinites to enter the workforce, remain in the workforce, and just as importantly, to help them advance within it," Frostman said Friday morning. Frostman said he shares Evers' vision "of a prosperous Wisconsin for all and look forward to putting our collective shoulder to the wheel to ensure Wisconsin's economy works for both its employees and its employers through smart programming, strategic investments in our workforce, and connecting the dots from all angles to deliver a decided economic advantage for Wisconsin into the next decade and beyond."

BRIEF OUTLINE OF NEWS STORY: Bloomberg predicts ShopKo is heading for bankruptcy protection

EXHIBIT, IF AVAILABLE: Shopko is preparing to file for bankruptcy after its parent company has been unable to find a buyer for the Green Bay-based retailer, according to a report in Bloomberg.

Earlier this week, the discount retailer announced plans to close 39 stores in 19 states at the end of February following a liquidation sale that began Friday. Most of them are Shopko Hometown stores.

Bloomberg's unnamed sources say there is no guarantee Sun Capital will file for bankruptcy protection if selling the retailer fails, or that the investment firm will negotiate a plan to save the company.

Sun Capital bought Shopko in a bidding war for about \$1 billion in 2005. Sun Capital's plan was to close under-performing stores and beef up merchandise to compete with the likes of Walmart and Target.

Shopko was founded in Green Bay in 1962. The company says it currently has 363 stores in 24 states

BRIEF OUTLINE OF NEWS STORY: ShopKo files for protection in Chapter 11 of US Bankruptcy court

EXHIBIT, IF AVAILABLE: Shopko has announced it has filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy. The announcement comes after days of speculation the company would do so. The company states they will be closing a further 38 stores, relocating more than 20 optical centers to freestanding locations, and hold an auctioning process for their pharmacy business. Shopko says throughout the process, all Shopko Optical centers and pharmacies will remain open.

The company adds they will be growing their Optical centers by opening additional freestanding Optical locations during 2019.

“This decision is a difficult, but necessary one,” said Russ Steinhorst, Chief Executive Officer.

“In a challenging retail environment, we have had to make some very tough choices, but we are confident that by operating a smaller and more focused store footprint, we will be able to build a stronger Shopko that will better serve our customers, vendors, employees and other stakeholders through this process.”

In a press release, the company says it has secured \$480 million from secured lenders, led by Wells Fargo, to fund operations during the bankruptcy process. They say the funding ensures suppliers and other business partners and vendors will be paid for goods and services.

BRIEF OUTLINE OF NEWS STORY: Green Bay
Diocese releases clergy names of sexual abusers.

EXHIBIT, IF AVAILABLE: A Wisconsin diocese has released the names of more than 40 clergy members with substantiated allegations they sexually abused a minor. The Green Bay Diocese posted the names of 46 clergy on its website Thursday. Bishop David Ricken apologized at a news conference to the 98 known victims of sexual abuse by the clergy in the diocese since 1906. Ricken called for any other victims to come forward. The diocese has conducted an internal investigation since September to identify the clergy members. The Green Bay Press Gazette reports only 15 of the 46 clergy members are still alive. One name was withheld pending further review, since the priest has contested his inclusion.

BRIEF OUTLINE OF NEWS STORY: Total sobriety for anyone under 21 on snowmobiles proposed in legislature. Co-sponsor is area State Senator.

EXHIBIT, IF AVAILABLE: A bipartisan measure is aiming to address a vulnerability in Wisconsin state law related to alcohol use and snowmobiling. Sen. Andre Jacque and Rep. Cody Horlacher are co-sponsoring the measure, which would establish a complete sobriety requirement for anyone under the age of 21 who plans on operating a snowmobile.

"It's absolute sobriety for under 21 because you're not supposed to be drinking under the legal drinking age anyways," Jacque said.

The author's idea for the bill comes from concerns from law enforcement about the state's high number of alcohol-related fatalities.

BRIEF OUTLINE OF NEWS STORY: Farm losses continue to mount due to winter extreme conditions

EXHIBIT, IF AVAILABLE: State officials are asking farmers to report losses due to large amounts of snow, extreme cold and high winds as soon as possible, according to a release.

Officials with the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection said farmers have experienced barn collapses, shed damage and livestock loss over the past week.

Officials are reminding farmers to report property damage to their insurers, including livestock losses.

FSA has safety net programs that may be helpful for farmers who lose livestock due to bad weather, according to the release. A disaster designation in their county would also make farmers eligible for low-interest loans if they cannot access private financing.

BRIEF OUTLINE OF NEWS STORY: Area Senator introduces bill making sex with farm animals a felony.

EXHIBIT, IF AVAILABLE: A Republican legislator is re-introducing his bill to make bestiality a felony.

Sen. Andre Jacque sent a memo to his colleagues on Tuesday seeking co-sponsors. He introduced the same bill during the last legislative session when he was a state representative in reaction to a case involving a Town of Eaton man, convicted of molesting a horse. The Assembly passed the measure but it died in the Senate.

Under current state law having sex with an animal is a misdemeanor. Jacque's bill would make bestiality, distributing materials depicting sex with an animal and harboring or providing an animal for sex felonies punishable by up to six years in prison.

Anyone convicted of bestiality would have to register as a sex offender

BRIEF OUTLINE OF NEWS STORY: Well contamination widespread in WLAK and WGBW coverage areas.

EXHIBIT, IF AVAILABLE: With snow melting and rain in the recent forecast, the Department of Natural Resources is reminding Wisconsin residents to watch out for well contamination.

Private well owners are encouraged to note any change in color, smell or taste to their drinking water as seasonal precipitation can lead to local flooding.

The DNR said in a release that well owners who notice flood waters very near or over their wells should consider their water contaminated.

If that is the case, the DNR says you should:

1. Stop drinking your water and find another safe source to use.
2. Properly disinfect your well before using again.
3. Sample the drinking water before consumption to ensure safety.

Wells in pits, basements or other low-lying areas are especially at risk of contamination due to bacteria and other contaminants that flood waters and runoff may carry, the DNR said.

The DNR's Private Water Section chief, Leisa Lehmann, recommends using a licensed well driller or pump installer to properly pump out, disinfect and test wells to ensure safe drinking.

BRIEF OUTLINE OF NEWS STORY: ShopKo has no buyers for department stores. Liquidation underway.

EXHIBIT, IF AVAILABLE: Wisconsin-based retail chain Shopko Stores plans to close its remaining 120 department stores by mid-June. Those closings will affect an additional 5,000 employees. Shopko officials said despite its best efforts, it was unable to find a buyer. The company will be winding down its retail operations starting this week. The retailer, headquartered near Green Bay, filed for bankruptcy protection in January, citing excessive debt and ongoing competitive pressure, and began announcing store closings. The company is evaluating strategic options for its optical business, officials said. The company says it will not move forward with the auction that it previously contemplated, and Gordon Brothers will oversee a liquidation process that is expected to conclude 10 to 12 weeks from now. CEO Russ Steinhorst says in a statement "this is not the outcome that we had hoped for when we started our restructuring efforts."

EXHIBIT, IF AVAILABLE: A judge has set a \$1 million cash bond for a man accused of killing a father and daughter in Manitowoc.

Karl M. Hess, 35, appeared via video for his bail hearing in Manitowoc County Court.

Hess, an Appleton resident, is being held at the Manitowoc County Jail on two counts of 1st Degree Intentional Homicide for the September shooting deaths of Richard Miller and his daughter, Jocelyn Miller. Charges have yet to be filed.

According to Manitowoc County District Attorney, "A criminal complaint will be filed either today or early Monday, At Thursday's hearing, the prosecution said the crimes were premeditated. The D.A. says Hess shot and killed Richard Miller with the intent of stealing the 51-year-old man's money. The D.A. says Hess then went into Jocelyn Miller's room and shot the 19-year-old.
