Researchers at the University of Arizona have noticed it too, and they're busy developing the technology to harness it. It's called "agrivoltaics" and involves growing food in the shade of solar panels. Not only does it increase crop yield while using less water, it also improves solar panel efficiency. Agrivoltaics is now being tested throughout the region, including at Biosphere 2 and at Manzo Elementary School in Tucson, where it's also being used as an educational tool for kids.

This historic recipe of the Chinese chorizo has been re-created and distributed to local restaurants that are putting a modern spin on this sausage as it is used to highlight the story of its humble past.

More importantly perhaps, Udall called on all Americans to move away from our emphasis on economic growth and consumerism and toward quality of life, and a new politics centered on beauty, frugal living, appreciation of nature and the arts, and a recognition of the Earth's limits.</p>
