Synopsis: President Barack Obama says Democrats and Republicans must work together in the new year and share responsibility for moving the country forward. In his weekly radio and Internet address, Obama said Saturday that lawmakers must return to Washington next week prepared to make serious decisions about how to grow the economy in the short run and stay competitive in the future. "I'm willing to work with anyone of either party who's got a good idea and the commitment to see it through," Obama said. "And we should all expect you to hold us accountable for our progress or our failure to deliver." Obama said his New Year's resolution is to do everything he can to grow the economy, create jobs and strengthen the middle class, though he warned that the economic recovery is still fragile as the calendar turns to 2011. The president taped his weekly address from Hawaii, where he is spending the holidays with his family. Senator-elect Kelly Ayotte of New Hampshire delivered the Republican weekly address, and said the next Congress marks a new chapter for the country and the GOP." 01/02/11

Topic: STATE "DREAM ACT"

Synopsis: Maryland would offer in-state college tuition benefits to undocumented immigrants who have attended state high schools and whose parents are taxpayers if a measure being proposed by state Democrats becomes law. The proposal, which will be introduced by Sen.-elect Victor R. Ramirez (D-Prince George's) when the General Assembly convenes next month, is certain to generate controversy at a time of heated debate about illegal immigration, gaping state budget shortfalls, and intense competition for coveted spots at the University of Maryland and other state universities. Montgomery College came under attack this year for offering tuition benefits to illegal immigrants. "The citizens of Maryland do not offer in-state tuition to their fellow Americans" who aren't state residents, said House Minority Leader Anthony J. O'Donnell (R-Calvert). "Why would we offer in-state tuition to people who violated our laws to get here?" But supporters of the measure say students who attended Maryland high schools should be encouraged, and not discouraged, to attend college, regardless of their legal status. Duration: 30

Topic: OBAMA SIGNS BILL

Synopsis: U.S. President Barack Obama Sunday signed into law a bill that funds medical care for firefighters and other responders to the Sept. 11 attacks in 2001. The five-year, \$4.3 billion measure will provide medical treatment for emergency responders sickened by toxic dust inhaled at the World Trade Center site in New York in the days following the attacks. It also includes a health program for responders sickened by the toxic debris and establishes a victims' compensation fund. Victims have five years to file claims. Thousands of firefighters, police and other rescue and cleanup workers contracted respiratory problems and other illnesses from working at the World Trade Center site in the aftermath of the attacks.

Topic: NEW CONGRESS

Synopsis: Two early showdowns on spending and debt will signal whether the new Congress can find common ground despite its partisan divisions or whether it's destined for gridlock and brinkmanship that could threaten the nation's economic health. Not all of the bickering in the 112th Congress that convenes Wednesday will be between Republicans and Democrats. House Republicans, who will assume the majority after four years in the minority, will include numerous hard-right freshmen whose unyielding stands on the deficit, in particular, could severely test soon-to-be Speaker John Boehner's ability to bridge differences and pass major bills.

Topic: SCHWARZENEGGER EXITS OFFICE

Synopsis: California Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger, the former action-movie hero, said he would "blow up the boxes" of state government when he became governor of the nation's most populous state more than six years ago. California poses special challenges for those who occupy the governor's chair: Its cap on property taxes limits the chief executive's options, and its free-wheeling voter-initiative process can undermine a leader's best-laid plans. Even so, Mr. Schwarzenegger's struggle to improve the state's finances amid an uncertain economy illustrates the difficulties looming before the nation's 26 new governors, many of whom face fiscal problems much like those facing California in 2003. Mr. Schwarzenegger came to office after an extraordinary recall election to replace Democratic Gov. Gray Davis that featured 135 candidates, from established state politicians to minor celebrities such as actor Gary Coleman. As Mr. Schwarzenegger leaves office Monday, the bureaucratic "boxes" he targeted remain. Although Mr. Schwarzenegger, a Republican, successfully collaborated with the Democratic-dominated legislature to pass a landmark greenhouse-gas emissions law, he failed to solve the state's fiscal crises and leaves Gov.-elect Jerry Brown with a projected \$28 billion budget shortfall through June 2012.

Synopsis: A blood test so sensitive that it can spot a single cancer cell lurking among a billion healthy ones is moving one step closer to being available at your doctor's office. Boston scientists who invented the test and health care giant Johnson & Johnson will announce

Monday that they are joining forces to bring it to market. Four big cancer centers also will start studies using the experimental test this year. Stray cancer cells in the blood mean that a tumor has spread or is likely to, many doctors believe. A test that can capture such cells has the potential to transform care for many types of cancer, especially breast, prostate, colon and lung. Initially, doctors want to use the test to try to predict what treatments would be best for each patient's tumor and find out quickly if they are working. 1/04/11

Topic: GAY MARRIAGE APPEAL

Synopsis: A U.S. appeals court mulling California's controversial gay marriage ban said Tuesday it needs more legal guidance before it can decide the important constitutional issues at stake. California voters banned gay marriage in 2008 by approving so-called Proposition 8. But last year a federal district court ruled the measure unconstitutional. Supporters of the gay marriage ban appealed, but then-Attorney General and now Governor Jerry Brown refused to sign on to the appeal. Then-Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger also took the same stance. In an order released Tuesday, the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals asked the Supreme Court of California whether initiative supporters have the authority to defend a ballot measure when public officials refuse to do so.

Topic: COLORADO FINGERPRINTS PROGRAM

Synopsis: Colorado will now participate in a nationwide effort to track illegal immigrants after the governor signed a memorandum of understanding Tuesday. Gov. Bill Ritter (D-Colorado) said the state has signed a memorandum of understanding with the Immigration and Customs Enforcement Agency (ICE) that would allow local communities to run the fingerprints of alleged criminals through state and federal websites to determine citizenship status. Colorado took steps to ensure civil rights and state laws were respected in the agreement with the immigration agency.

Topic: 112TH CONGRESS STARTS

Synopsis: Almost as soon as they take control of the House at noon Wednesday, Republicans will embark on a 20-day plan aimed at undoing major aspects of President Barack Obama's agenda as they seek to take advantage of the weeks before the Senate's return and the president's State of the Union address. The first move will come Friday, when the House begins the process of repealing the new health care law. House leaders will then quickly begin to identify tens of billions of dollars in proposed spending cuts and to ease regulations that businesses find burdensome. Much of what Republicans do will be symbolic, given that Democrats still control the Senate and the White House. But the quick action will allow Rep. John A. Boehner (R-Ohio), the incoming speaker, and House Republicans to follow through on campaign pledges and to try to establish their party as a bulwark against what they see as an out-of-control government. Topic: BIRTHRIGHT CITIZENSHIP EFFORT

Synopsis: Lawmakers in at least 14 states have said they are committed to passing the legislation targeting birthright citizenship. They are taking aim at the 14th Amendment, which grants U.S. citizenship to children born here even if their parents are in the country illegally. The lawmakers disagree with that practice, they say that illegal immigrants and their children are sapping taxpayer-funded services and attracting more illegal immigrants to the United States. Among these states is Arizona, whose state Senator, Russell Pearce, will unveil the bill on January 5 in Washington, D.C. as well as lawmakers in Alabama, Arizona, Delaware, Idaho, Indiana, Michigan, Mississippi, Montana, Nebraska, New Hampshire, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Texas and Utah. Arizona's anti-illegal-immigrant bill, SB-1070, was also based on model legislation that could be easily copied by states, and at least seven states are likely to pass bills similar to the first Arizona immigration overhaul this year. 1/06/10

Topic: JOB CREATION

Synopsis: A new report is raising hopes the government's official report Friday on last month's job creation could be a blockbuster. The private payroll firm, Automatic Data Processing, says companies added nearly 300,000 jobs in December. While some economists see reasons to doubt the numbers, the ADP report and another showing strength in service industries are generating optimism the unemployment rate might start to fall. Economists say it takes up to 300,000 new jobs a month to reduce the jobless rate significantly. There's other good news. The Labor Department said last week the number of people applying for unemployment benefits had fallen to its lowest point in two and a half years. And the staffing firm Challenger, Gray & Christmas said Wednesday layoffs fell last month to the lowest level since June 2000. Duration: 30

Topic: VACCINES

Synopsis: In 1998 Doctor Andrew Wakefield, a British surgeon and researcher, claimed a link between the measles mumps rubella vaccine and autism. But now a prominent medical journal said doctor Wakefield's study was, in fact, an "elaborate fraud." Working for the British medical journal, investigative reporter Brian Deer debunked Wakefield's study showing eight children developed autistic symptoms within, on average, a week after receiving the measles mumps rubella shot. By cross referencing the actual medical records of the children-- Deer says he found doctor Wakefield falsified their data in his study. That, in fact, some of the children had actually developed symptoms before vaccination, some were deemed normal months afterward and some never had the disease at all. All of which leaves parents in America with some wrenching decisions.

Topic: BIRTHRIGHT CITIZENSHIP

Synopsis: On his first day in the majority, Rep. King declared his intention to lead the Republican Party on an anti-immigrant, anti-Latino crusade. King introduced new legislation that would "eliminate birthright citizenship for children when both parents were illegal immigrants." King's efforts coincided with a new push by like-minded state legislators also announced yesterday. Together, the efforts are a radical attempt to change the intent and application of the Fourteenth Amendment of the Constitution, and will have long-term political implications for the GOP

Topic: US ECONOMY REPORT

Synopsis: Mixed news in the much-anticipated December jobs report. The unemployment rate dropped a massive 4-tenth -- from 9.8 to 9.4 percent. Experts say the drop in that number "may" be attributable to seasonal hiring for the holidays. But the Labor Depts. tally of people actually hired by employers in December was much less that economists predicted. President Obama is scheduled to talk about the jobs numbers while touring a small business in Maryland today, and will also announce Gene Sperling as the new head of his National Economic Council. The Federal Reserve chairman, Ben S. Bernanke told senators on Friday that he expected the recovery to be "moderately stronger" this year.

Topic: HEALTH CARE REPEAL COSTS

Synopsis: U.S. Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius and California Insurance Commissioner Dave Jones are vowing to push back against massive health insurance rate hikes proposed by Blue Shield of California. Blue Shield has implemented two rate hikes since Oct. 1 and plans another for March 1. Some policyholders would pay 59 percent more in premiums once all three increases take effect. The rate hikes come just as the Republican controlled House begins debate today and holds a procedural vote to repeal President Barack Obama's landmark health care law. Also Americans are closely divided over whether the new Republican-controlled House should vote to repeal the health care law that was enacted just last year, a Gallup Poll finds. 46% of those surveyed Tuesday and Wednesday say they want their representative to vote for repeal; 40% want the law to stand.

Topic: OBAMA ECONOMY

Synopsis: President Barack Obama is talking up the latest economic news as a clear trend toward an improving economy. The President used his weekly radio and Internet address today to press for bipartisan action in the newly divided Congress on measures to spur growth. He presented the December jobs report in a positive light even though it fell short of what economists had been looking for and even though the drop in unemployment came partly because some people stopped looking for work. The private sector added 103,000 new jobs in December and the unemployment rate fell from 9.8 percent to 9.4 percent. Obama pointed to 12 straight months of private sector job growth for the first time since 2006. And Obama says each quarter has been stronger than the last. Obama attributed increasingly optimistic economic forecasts in part to the tax cut deal he negotiated last month with Republicans, a payroll tax cut and assorted other tax breaks.

Synopsis: The average price for a gallon of gasoline in the United States rose 9.32 cents from three weeks before, but the price increases have slowed and could stop rising, according to an industry analyst. The national average for self-serve regular, unleaded gas y

Topic: CALIFORNIA BUDGET

Synopsis: Gov. Jerry Brown proposed a budget Monday that would slash funding to most areas of state government and maintain a series of tax increases for five years to close California's huge budget deficit. The Democratic governor released his first budget proposal since winning election last fall. He called for \$12.5 billion in spending cuts, including reductions in welfare, social services, health care for the poor and a combined \$1 billion cut to the University of California and California State University systems. Brown also wants the Legislature to call a special election in June to give voters an opportunity to continue hikes in the income, sales and vehicle taxes for five years. His proposal relies on new revenues of \$12 billion.

Topic: GUN CONTROL

Synopsis: A longtime Senate gun control advocate announced plans Monday to introduce legislation banning high-capacity ammunition clips like the one linked to a weekend shooting that left six dead and an Arizona congresswoman gravely wounded. Sen. Frank Lautenberg, D-N.J., said he would introduce the measure to re-establish a prohibition that lapsed in 2004 on clips that feed more than 10 rounds at a time. Officials have said that Rep. Gabrielle Giffords, D-Ariz., was shot in the head over the weekend by an assailant armed with a

semi-automatic pistol and a 33-round clip. Six people were killed in the attack, and the congresswoman is one of 13 others who were shot. She remains hospitalized in Tucson, Ariz., after surgery for a wound to the head.

Topic: IMMIGRATION SANCTUARY CITIES

Synopsis: Gov. Rick Perry wants to abolish "sanctuary cities" that he says provide haven for illegal immigrants in Texas, but he isn't yet saying how he wants that accomplished. Perry said Wednesday he doesn't know yet whether he wants local police and sheriff's deputies asking the immigration status of drivers pulled over. He declined to offer details about how Texas could get rid of so-called sanctuary cities that are in conflict with state and federal immigration laws. Houston has long been assailed by conservatives as a "sanctuary city" because police there generally don't ask about immigration status during patrols or investigations. The city has bristled at the label. Democrats say they've identified more than 40 bills this session that would crack down on illegal immigrants.

Topic: FORECLOSURES IN THE U.S.

Synopsis: The bleakest year in foreclosure crisis has only just begun. Lenders are poised to take back more homes this year than any other since the U.S. housing meltdown began in 2006. About 5 million borrowers are at least two months behind on their mortgages and more will miss payments as they struggle with job losses and loans worth more than their home's value, industry analysts forecast. "2011 is going to be the peak," said Rick Sharga, a senior vice president at foreclosure tracker RealtyTrac Inc. The outlook comes after banks repossessed more than 1 million homes in 2010, RealtyTrac said Thursday. That marked the highest annual tally of properties lost to foreclosure on records dating back to 2005. One in 45 U.S. households received a foreclosure filing last year, or a record high of 2.9 million homes. That's up 1.67 percent from 2009. For December, 257,747 U.S. homes received at least one foreclosure-related notice. That was the lowest monthly total in 30 months. The number of notices fell 1.8 percent from November and 26.3 percent from December 2009, RealtyTrac said. Duration: 30

Topic: NEW SCHOOL MEALS PROGRAM

Synopsis: Lunchroom classics like Tater Tots and chocolate milk may fall victim to whole-wheat pasta and leafy greens under proposed changes released today by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. New federal standards would apply to school lunches subsidized by the federal government and provide the most dramatic re-envisioning of school meals in 15 years. The guidelines aim to reduce the country's excessive childhood obesity rate and teach kids healthy eating habits. They would establish calorie limits on school meals for the first time, gradually reduce sodium in food, limit trans fats and increase servings of fruits and vegetables.

Topic: WARNING ABOUT ACETAMINOPHEN

Synopsis: The FDA is calling on drug makers to lower the amount of acetaminophen in prescription painkillers, which have long been linked with potentially fatal cases of liver damage. ACCIDENTAL OVERDOSES: Acetaminophen is a widely-used pain reliever and fever reducer used in over-the-counter drugs like Tylenol. But FDA officials say many consumers don't realize that prescription pain killers like Vicodin also contain the ingredient. Combining the two types of products can lead to accidental overdose.

Topic: SECURITY BORDER FENCE

Synopsis: President Barack Obama's administration plans to pull the plug on the troubled "virtual fence" project that was meant to better guard stretches of the U.S. border with Mexico, a senior lawmaker said Friday. The project, being run by Boeing Co, has cost about \$1 billion so far and was meant to pull together video cameras, radar, sensors and other technologies to detect smugglers trying to cross the porous border. "The SBInet program has been a grave and expensive disappointment since its inception," Representative Bennie Thompson, the senior Democrat on the House of Representatives Homeland Security Committee, said in a statement which noted that the Department of Homeland Security was ending the project. Thompson said that nearly \$1 billion had been spent for only 53 miles of coverage in the project that started during the administration of former President George W. Bush. A DHS spokesman had no immediate comment and a Boeing representative was not immediately available for comment. The SBInet project has faced setbacks, missed deadlines and cost overruns. The future of the project has been in doubt for some time after bipartisan criticism by lawmakers and also from DHS Secretary Janet Napolitano. 1/15/11

Topic: TYLENOL RECALL

Synopsis: Johnson & Johnson said Friday it is recalling nearly 47 million packages of Tylenol, Sudafed and other nonprescription drugs manufactured at a Pennsylvania facility that has already been subject to a series of massive recalls, battering the company's household brand. The latest recall affects certain lots of Tylenol, Benadryl and Sudafed products because of insufficient cleaning procedures, though the company does not believe that quality was impacted. The company also recalled certain lots of Rolaids tablets because they do not include certain labeling information. The recalls are aimed at wholesalers in the U.S., the Caribbean and Brazil. Consumers do not have to take any action, the company said. Consumers who have the products can continue using them. All of the products were made at the company's plant in Fort Washington, Pa., before it was shuttered in April following a Food and Drug Administration investigation. FDA inspectors found a slew of manufacturing problems at the plant, including equipment covered with thick layers of dust and others held together with duct tape.

Topic: MIDDLE SCHOOL DRUG TESTING

Synopsis: To reading, writing and arithmetic, add drug testing for students as young as elementary-aged. In Today's Living, a small town in New Jersey is offering that option to families. You might be surprised at just how many are signing up. "What kind of changes took places in 1500 B.C.?" These students at the Belvidere Elementary School may soon add drug testing to their list of lessons." This week, the board of education will vote on a plan to randomly test 6th, 7th and 8th graders to see if they're under the influence of drugs. Principal Sandra Szabocsik says, "We really want to use it as a deterrent. We're hoping if kids are at a party or someone's house or hanging out they're not going to get involved in drinking or drugs because tomorrow could be a drug testing day." The program is voluntary and both parents and students have to sign up for it.

Topic: GM RECALL

Synopsis: General Motors is expanding an earlier recall of some 2011 model-year trucks and SUVs to fix a problem that could cause the vehicles' rear axles to lock. The recall, originally announced in December, now covers 26,751 Cadillac, Chevrolet and GMC trucks and SUVs. The models affected are: Cadillac Escalade, Escalade ESV, Cadillac EXT, Chevrolet Avalanche, Colorado, Silverado, Suburban, Tahoe; and GMC Canyon, Sierra, Yukon and Yukon XL. GM said rear-axle cross pins, used to hold the axle in place, weren't properly heat-treated and may not be durable. They can fracture, interfere with the axle and cause it to lock. The driver could then lose control of the vehicle. 1/16/11

Topic: HYPERTENTION & HEART ATTACKS

Synopsis: High blood pressure in childhood is associated with higher blood pressure or hypertension in adulthood, according to a study by researchers at the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health. Their analyses of previously published blood pressure tracking studies over the last four decades show a consistent relationship between children's blood pressure levels with their blood pressure levels as adults.

Topic: HEALTHCARE SURVEY

Synopsis: As lawmakers shaken by the shooting of a colleague return to the health care debate, an Associated Press-GfK poll finds raw feelings over President Barack Obama's overhaul have subsided. Ahead of a vote on repeal in the GOP-led House this week, strong opposition to the law stands at 30 percent, close to the lowest level registered in AP-GfK surveys dating to September 2009. The nation is divided over the law, but the strength and intensity of the opposition appear diminished. The law expands coverage to more than 30 million uninsured, and would require, for the first time, that most people in the United States carry health insurance. The poll finds that 40 percent of those surveyed said they support the law, while 41 percent oppose it. Just after the November congressional elections, opposition stood at 47 percent and support was 38 percent.

Topic: IMMIGRATION REFORM IN UTAH

Synopsis: There is a consensus on immigration: authority is Federal. State Rep. Stephen Sandstrom recognizes this but proposes that Utah help with enforcement. State Sen. Luz Robles recognizes this but proposes that Utah grant work permits and start registering undocumented immigrants. Rep. Sandstrom has been tweaking his proposal to conform to recent court decisions. He argues that the proposal copies federal law into Utah law. In practice, this would impose added burden on federal agencies, most particularly Immigration and Customs Enforcement. The U.S. Supreme Court has found similar burdens unconstitutional. Sen. Robles has been tweaking her proposal, but the carrot side of her carrot-and-stick approach is problematic. The work permit directly violates federal law: Title 8 United States Code Section 1324a prohibits employment of unauthorized aliens. The Supremacy Clause renders the state work permit unconstitutional. Besides, Utah should not make and issue fraudulent documents.

Topic: APPEALS TO COURT ON SB 1070

Synopsis: Arizona's immigration law finally got its day in court after being watered down in July. The Ninth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals heard arguments for and against Senate Bill 1070 on Monday. Debate included whether Arizona could enforce immigration laws without conflicting with federal law. The proceedings were broadcast live on C-SPAN. Gov. Jan Brewer signed the bill into law last April, but four key provisions were put on hold by U.S. District Court Judge Susan Bolton in July after the U.S. Justice Department filed a lawsuit against Arizona and Brewer. John Bouma, Arizona's private lawyer for the case, argued that the state is not trying to alter federal immigration laws, but is asking to enforce federal law at the state level.

Topic: AFL-CIO ON JOBS CREATION

Synopsis: Politicians are too obsessed with budget cuts when they actually should spend more on public works projects that would create jobs, the head of the nation's largest union federation said Wednesday. AFL-CIO president Richard Trumka said the rush to trim federal

and state budgets was shortsighted, would hurt middle-class workers and do little to spur economic growth. "Too many of our politicians are doing the opposite of what works," Trumka said in a speech at the National Press Club. "Destroying our public institutions, crushing working people's rights and living standards and failing to invest in education. We know this model, and we know where it leads -- catastrophe." Unions face growing hostility from Republican-led state legislatures, and unionized public employees are trying to fend off cuts to salaries, pensions and other benefits. Trumka also offered a subtle challenge to President Barack Obama, who has worked to mend ties with business. He accused Washington politicians of living in "an Alice-in-Wonderland political climate" where the wealthy get tax cuts but "we cannot fund the basic functions of government, let alone invest to build the infrastructure of the future." Union leaders are urging Obama and other leaders to spend trillions of dollars on high-speed mass transit, smart utilities and roads and bridges. Trumka said the U.S. is falling behind the global economy because "we have let our transnational business titans convince our politicians that our national strength lies in their profits, not our jobs." Asked if he is concerned about Obama's recent overtures to business groups, Trumka acknowledged some frustration, but laid most of the blame on Republicans for trying to obstruct the President's agenda.

Topic: ARIZ. GOVERNOR'S PLAN FOR MEDICAID CUTS ADVANCES

Synopsis: Arizona legislative committees have endorsed Republican Gov. Jan Brewer's plan to seek federal clearance to suspend Medicaid health care coverage for 280,000 low-income people to help balance the state budget. The committees voted along party lines Wednesday after the opening of a special session called by the governor to consider her plan to seek a waiver. The committees' votes clear the way for action Thursday by the full House and Senate. The waiver would be to the federal health care overhaul's "maintenance of effort" requirement. That requirement prohibits states from reducing Medicaid eligibility below early 2010 levels, and applies until the overhaul expands Medicaid coverage in 2014. Republicans voted for the bill. Democrats voted against it.

Topic: CRACKDOWN ON ILLEGAL WORKERS GROWS

Synopsis: The Obama administration plans to intensify a crackdown on employers of illegal immigrants with the establishment of an audit office designed to bolster verification of company hiring records. In an interview, John Morton, chief of U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement, a unit of the Department of Homeland Security, said the Employment Compliance Inspection Center would "address a need to conduct audits even of the largest employers with a very large number of employees." The center would be announced Thursday, he said. Topic: CERVICAL CANCER & HISPANIC WOMEN

Synopsis: Most invasive cervical cancer research in the United States has been conducted on non-Latino-White (NLW) and African-American women. Incidence, mortality, stage at diagnosis and survival indicators for invasive cervical cancer in Latino women in California are compared to NLW and African-American women. A model is presented which depicts structural, behavioral, genetic and biological risk factors for invasive cervical cancer. A literature review of risk factors and their association with invasive cervical cancer was conducted using MEDLINE and PsychINFO databases to determine if ethnic differences in risk factors explain observed differences in morbidity and mortality. Latino women experience a significantly higher incidence and mortality associated with invasive cervical cancer than NLW women. The review of risk factors found that rate differences of cervical cancer screening, early detection and human papilloma virus (HPV) type-specific infection explain much of the disparity in disease burden. Further research must clarify if ethnic differences exist in risk factors associated with ethnic variation in HPV-type prevalence in both cases and their sexual partners, in host immune responses, and multiparity.

The panel - which is seeking to draft a comprehensive immigration bill before the next state legislative session starts in January - also received a report comparing Georgia and Arizona's laws on the issue. "I am not sure we will adopt Arizona's law, but we will come up with our own," said Sen. Jack Murphy, R-Cumming, co-chairman of the Joint House and Senate Study Committee on Immigration Reform. Jan Brewer signed into law the nation's toughest legislation against illegal immigration. Topic: INDIANA CITIZENSHIP RULING

Synopsis: Federal judge says Indiana cannot deny paternity documents for children born in the U.S. just because their parents are illegal immigrants and don't have Social Security numbers. U.S. District Judge Tanya Walton Pratt issued the ruling Thursday in a lawsuit filed by parents who say a state policy violates their children's rights. Under the policy, paternity affidavits filed by unmarried parents must contain

both parents' Social Security numbers or be sent back to county health offices unrecorded. The judge says denying parents the ability to establish legal paternity amounts to discrimination against children who are American citizens. Pratt issued a preliminary injunction barring the policy. State health officials say the policy was meant to reflect state and federal law. State attorneys haven't decided whether they'll appeal.

Synopsis: A federal judge declared the Obama administration's health care overhaul unconstitutional Monday, siding with 26 states that argued people cannot be required to buy health insurance. Senior U.S. District Judge Roger Vinson agreed with the states that the new law violates people's rights by forcing them to buy health insurance by 2014 or face penalties. He went a step further than a previous ruling against the law, declaring the entire thing unconstitutional if the insurance requirement does not hold up. Attorneys for the administration had argued that the states did not have standing to challenge the law and that the case should be dismissed. Justice Department spokeswoman Tracy Schmaler said Monday the department strongly disagrees with Vinson's ruling and intends to appeal.

Synopsis: Americans need to cut salt, eat less but at the same time eat more fruits and vegetables, the Obama administration said Monday in releasing its latest set of dietary guidelines. They also advise Americans to drink water instead of sugary drinks, cut fat and switch to whole grains. The "bottom line" is that Americans are too fat, said Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack in releasing the guidelines. More than one-third of children and two-thirds of adults in the United States are overweight or obese. The new dietary guidelines include 23 key recommendations for the general public, and six for specific groups such as pregnant women. General recommendations include avoiding oversized portions, choosing foods with lower sodium, and eating more fruits and vegetables.

Topic: PEW ON ILLEGAL IMMIGRATION

Synopsis: After a drop-off during the recession, illegal immigrants seeking to sneak across the U.S. border may be ready to move again. A new study released Tuesday finds the number of illegal immigrants living in the U.S. last year was roughly 11.2 million, a number virtually unchanged from 2009. In that year, the level of illegal immigration declined for the first time in two decades, dropping 8 percent from 2007, as a sour economy and stepped-up border enforcement made it harder or less desirable for undocumented workers to enter from Mexico. The number of illegal immigrants in the U.S. labor force also was unchanged last year at 8 million, representing about 5 percent of workers in the U.S., after hitting a peak of 8.4 million in 2007, according to the nonpartisan Pew Hispanic Center, which based its analysis on census survey data. States posting some of the biggest declines in the number of illegal immigrants since 2007 included Florida, New York, Colorado and Virginia. Unauthorized immigrants in three Mountain West states -- Arizona, Nevada and Utah -- also edged lower. In contrast, illegal immigration was on the rise in Louisiana, Oklahoma and Texas, with the combined populations of these states increasing from 1.6 million in 2007 to 1.8 million last year, according to the study.

Topic: SMOKING IN PARKS- NY

Synopsis: Lawmakers have voted to extend New York City's smoking ban to parks, beaches -- and Times Square. The ban approved Wednesday by a vote of 36-12 is one of the most ambitious outdoor anti-tobacco efforts in the U.S. City Council Speaker Christine Quinn says the new law will save lives and make New York a healthier place to live. The smoking ban will cover some 1,700 parks and 14 miles of public beaches plus boardwalks, marinas and pedestrian plazas. The law will go into effect in 90 days. New York City outlawed smoking in bars and restaurants in 2002. Backers of the ban say even brief exposure to secondhand smoke can pose health risks. Synopsis: New Mexico Governor Susana Martinez signed an executive order on Monday that requires police to ask people they've arrested for their immigration status. The executive order rescinds a policy that prohibited police from asking about an individual's immigration status that was established by former-Governor Bill Richardson. Gov. Martinez's executive order prohibits police from inquiring about an individual's immigration status if they are a victim of a crime, but puts an end to what she called "sanctuary policies" that were encouraged by former-Governor Richardson. New Mexico is one of three states that still issues driver's licenses to illegal aliens, but Gov. Martinez's executive order coincides with the introduction of a bill in the state legislature that would end that practice.

Topic: DRIVER LICENSES DEBATE FOR THE UNDOCUMENTED

Synopsis: Democratic legislatures showed opposition to an executive order by Gov. Susana Martinez that orders police to question the immigration status of all criminal suspects. Democratic legislators from the House and Senate held a press conference on Thursday criticizing the executive order, saying it would lead to racial profiling against Hispanics. "I know we are in America but are we in New Mexico or Arizona?" Sen. Mary Jane Garcia, D-Dona Ana, asked at the press conference. Garcia said that her father had once been questioned by federal authorities while working on his southern New Mexico farm. "The executive order undermines community policing efforts and creates barriers for immigrants and mixed status families to contact the police and serve as witnesses in the criminal justice system," said Senator Tim Keller, D-Albuquerque, in a press release. Rep. Antonio "Moe" Maestas, D-Albuquerque, was concerned that the order would frighten women away from reporting domestic violence. According to Maestas, a former prosecutor, said that in cases of domestic violence police can consider both people suspects in the crime.

Topic: RAHM EMANUEL PLANS TO CREATE THE CHICAGO VERSION OF "DREAM ACT"

Synopsis: In recent months, former White House Chief of Staff Rahm Emanuel has been widely criticized by immigration reform advocates who say he did not throw enough support behind the DREAM Act when he was in Washington. Emanuel has disputed those claims, and is now out to prove just how much he supports giving the children of immigrants a chance to attend college in the United States. The Chicago for Rahm campaign issued a press release Thursday evening touting Emanuel's plan for immigration reform. In Chicago. "Just because Congress has yet to pass the Dream Act doesn't mean we will wait for progress in Chicago," Emanuel said in a statement. "All children in Chicago deserve to have access to a quality education, and we will make sure they have that opportunity." Emanuel's plan would not provide a path to citizenship as a national DREAM Act would, but would "allow these children to access the same financial aid opportunities as every other child," according to his campaign. "The number one prohibitive reason people don't go to college is cost," Emanuel said in an interview with Telemundo Chicago. "So I want to take a part of the DREAM Act, which Sen. (Richard) Durbin introduced, and make Chicago the first city in the country to adopt a Chicago DREAM Act."

Topic: NINTH CIRCUIT RULES IN FAVOR OF INMIGRANTS

Synopsis: Today, MALDEF welcomed the Ninth Circuit's ruling in *Vicente v. Barnett*, upholding an Arizona jury verdict against a vigilante rancher operating along the Arizona-Mexico border. The Ninth Circuit affirmed the jury's decision that the vigilante was liable for assaulting a group of immigrants he found on public land. As a result of today's ruling, the rancher will be forced to pay approximately \$87,000 in damages. The Ninth Circuit ruled that the rancher, Roger Barnett, was not entitled to claim self defense, because he admitted that none of the migrants he assaulted had threatened or attacked him. The Ninth Circuit also upheld the jury's award of punitive damages against Barnett. "We are very pleased with the Ninth Circuit's verdict. Today's ruling sends the strong message that vigilantes will not be tolerated in Arizona" stated David Hinojosa, MALDEF's Southwest Regional Counsel and attorney in the case.

Topic: NEW UNEMPLOYMENT RATES

Synopsis: The U.S. unemployment rate fell sharply to 9 percent in January from 9.4 percent in December, as more than 620,000 previously jobless people found work, the Labor Department said Friday. There was a net gain of 36,000 jobs - the lowest level in four months - but economists blamed bad weather for the weak number. Given that "886,000 workers could not show up for work the week the survey was taken because of inclement weather means we had an undercount pretty severely," said Diane Swonk, chief economist with Chicago-based Mesirow Financial. "At least a portion of those...had new jobs." She pointed to gains in the number of self-employed, which rose by 165,000 to 9.7 million, the highest total since last May, as positive news. The Labor Department data includes separate surveys of households and businesses. The construction industry lost 32,000 jobs, and in the transportation and warehousing industry, courier and messenger jobs dropped by 45,000 over the month. Manufacturing added 49,000 jobs, and retail trade jobs grew by 28,000. "Hiring was suppressed last month and will likely rebound in February," said Neil Dutta, an economist at Bank of America Merrill Lynch.

Person-to-person transmission of the disease is highly unlikely, Hughes told CNN in an e-mail. Lindsey Graham (R-S.C.) and Chuck Schumer (D-N.Y.) have rekindled their alliance on immigration reform, taking some early steps to test the political will for addressing the contentious issue this year. Their call list hasn't focused so much on House and Senate members who've been reliable pro-immigration votes in the past. Instead, they're looking to a strange-bedfellows mix of conservative and liberal constituencies that can provide a "safety net" of support, as Graham put it, once the issue heats up. For all the groups getting a call from the pair, it is the presence of Graham himself who elevates the odds - however bleak - that the Senate could move on a comprehensive, bipartisan overhaul bill. Several committee members,

meanwhile, raised tough questions about parts of the bill. Synopsis: Indiana State Sen. Mike Delph, R- Carmel not only wants to implement an Arizona style bill but wants to bar the use of any language but English in most government transactions. Senate Bill 590 is a thirty page proposal and includes: -requires state and local law enforcement officers who stop anyone for violating a law or ordinance to ask for proof that the person is here legally if the officers have "reasonable suspicion" that the person is not a citizen or legal visitor - Businesses that hire illegal immigrants can be shut down. Most government transactions, documents and meetings would be in English. The state would shut down their Spanish language portal and printing forms, ballots in other languages -The state will bill to Congress for reimbursement of all costs for undocumented residents in Indiana. -No financial aid, scholarships or grants for education at U of I and would have to pay out of state tuition. - Cities and counties would be barred from limiting the enforcement of federal immigration laws. (No Sanctuary Cities) According to the Pew Hispanic Center, Indiana was estimated to have 120,000 illegal immigrants in 2009, up from 10,000 in 1990.

Topic: LACK OF SLEEP AND HEART ATTACKS

Synopsis: We all know that getting enough shut-eye is good for us, but now a new study suggests that getting too little sleep can increase the risk of heart attack, stroke and other cardiovascular disease that can result in early death. Researchers found if you sleep less than six hours, or have disturbed sleep you have a 48% chance of developing or dying from heart disease, and a 15% chance of having or dying of a stroke. The study, published in the European Heart Journal, is a meta-analysis of 15 other sleep studies. A meta-analysis integrates a number of studies into one study. Researchers followed nearly 475,000 adults from eight countries including the United States, United Kingdom, Japan, and Israel for seven to 25 years.

Synopsis: Smokers now face another risk from their habit: it could cost them a shot at a job. More hospitals and medical businesses in many states are adopting strict policies that make smoking a reason to turn away job applicants, saying they want to increase worker productivity, reduce health care costs and encourage healthier living. The policies reflect a frustration that softer efforts - like banning smoking on company grounds, offering cessation programs and increasing health care premiums for smokers - have not been powerful-enough incentives to quit. This shift - from smoke-free to smoker-free workplaces - has prompted sharp debate, even among anti-tobacco groups, over whether the policies establish a troubling precedent of employers intruding into private lives to ban a habit that is legal.

Synopsis: Arizona lawmakers are trying to widen the state's illegal immigration crackdown with a proposal to require hospitals to confirm whether patients are in the country legally. The National Conference of State Legislatures says it knows of no other states considering similar bills. The proposal being heard late Monday by the Arizona Senate's judiciary committee would require hospitals to contact immigration authorities if a patient is an illegal immigrant. Arizona lawmakers passed a bill last year that required local police, while enforcing other laws, to question the immigration status of those they suspect are in the country illegally. Topic: NEW IMMIGRATION PROPOSAL

Synopsis: Senator Orrin Hatch came to The Heritage Foundation on Friday to present his forthcoming immigration bill-"The Strengthening our Commitment to Legal Immigration and America's Security Act.", and the content of his bill, are a step in the right direction on immigration and border security-given that President Obama used his State of the Union address to make another case for amnesty. The bill was written in collaboration with members of Congress from states along the southwestern border. The bill addresses key areas in which law enforcement has been lacking under the Obama Administration. Heritage has proposed an alternate "three-legged stool," absent amnesty-and including internal enforcement, border security, and reforms to the legal immigration system.

Synopsis: A new report says energy drinks are under-studied, overused and can be dangerous for children and teens. Doctors writing in the medical journal Pediatrics say the dangers include heart palpitations, seizures, strokes and even sudden death. The ill effects are caused mostly by too much caffeine or similar ingredients. Some cans have four to five times more caffeine than soda. The authors want pediatricians to routinely ask patients and their parents about energy drink use and to advise against drinking them. The report says energy drinks often contain ingredients that can enhance the jittery effects of caffeine or that can have other side effects including nausea and diarrhea. It says they should be regulated as stringently as tobacco, alcohol and prescription medicines.

Topic: CITY OF BELL LATEST: IMMUNITY

Synopsis: A ranking Bell administrator who earned more than \$400,000 for watching over the city's finances has been offered limited immunity in exchange for her testimony in a corruption case accusing city leaders of looting the city's treasury, defense lawyers said. Lourdes Garcia, Bell's director of administrative services, took the stand Monday afternoon, the third witness in a corruption case that accuses six current or former City Council members of misappropriation of public funds. Prosecutors are in the midst of a preliminary hearing to determine if there's enough evidence to order the six to stand trial. The part-time council members are accused of earning nearly \$100,000 a year by drawing pay for serving on boards and committees that rarely met or met for only a few minutes at a time. In addition, former City Administrator Robert Rizzo and his former assistant, Angela Spaccia, are accused of misappropriating public money.

Topic: IMMIGRATION FINGERPRINTS PROGRAM

Synopsis: A rapidly expanding federal program that identifies illegal immigrants when they're arrested and fingerprinted became operational in Denver and in El Paso and Arapahoe counties on Tuesday. Colorado Department of Public Safety spokesman Lance Clem said Secure Communities was launched in the three jurisdictions, the pilot sites in the state for the program. Colorado is the 39th state to join the program, which is active in more than 1,000 jurisdictions in the country, according to U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement, which operates Secure Communities. The initiative was launched in 2007 and ICE has said it hopes to have it in every jail in the country by 2013. The program checks arrestee's fingerprints against FBI and Department of Homeland Security databases to determine the person's legal status and

arrest record. Critics argue it creates an incentive for racial profiling. Opponents say that because people's fingerprints are checked upon arrest, immigrants can be placed in deportation proceedings even if charges are ultimately dismissed or they're not convicted of a crime. Denver Mayor Bill Vidal calls it "worrisome" and said it should be monitored closely.

Synopsis: Layoff notices wouldn't necessarily mean the employees will lose their jobs this year, but the district is legally required to notify workers if their positions are in jeopardy. A separate notice would have to be sent by June 30 to notify employees if they would actually lose their jobs. Topic: UTAH IMMIGRATION BILL SEEKS MIDDLE GROUND IN DEBATE

Synopsis: In state legislatures across the country, most of the immigration bills being debated aim to crack down on illegal immigration. Legislators are trying to cut off illegal immigrants from receiving public benefits, deny their U.S.-born children citizenship and force them out of states by granting local police the power to enforce immigration laws. Protesters rally for immigrant rights at the Utah Capitol in Salt Lake City last month. The state is trying to find constructive ways to handle immigration. One bill filed in Utah is being viewed as the possible middle ground that has proven so elusive in a hyper-charged immigration discussion. IMMIGRANT ADVOCATES TO PROTEST NJ DETENTION CENTER

Synopsis: Immigration advocacy groups are planning to march more than three miles across Newark to protest a proposed immigration detention facility that will likely be built in New Jersey. Federal immigration officials told The Associated Press in December that the details of a service agreement were being worked out for a 2,700-bed facility in Essex County. A spokesman for Essex County said this week the agreement has not yet been finalized. The protesters plan to march Thursday from Newark's federal building to the Essex County Correctional Facility. The existing detention facility there will likely be expanded to accommodate additional detainees. Protest organizers say there are more humane and cost-effective solutions to immigrant detention, such as releasing people to their families while they await legal proceedings.

Synopsis: Top state lawmakers filed the latest legislation Wednesday to prohibit so-called "sanctuary city" policies, saying that local governments would risk losing state grant money if they prohibit employees from enforcing state or federal immigration laws. Some voiced concern that the legislation would interfere with police chiefs' oversight of their officers and detract from a focus on local crimes. The sanctuary city issue is among topics declared an emergency by GOP Gov. Rick Perry. Psychology professor Ellen Bialystok at York University in Toronto studied 450 people with Alzheimer's. Those who were bilingual were diagnosed between four and five years later than those who spoke only one language. Synopsis: A year after enacting the controversial law known as SB1070, Arizona legislators continue to line up additional measures targeting illegal immigration. Synopsis: Ford said Wednesday that it would recall 144,000 F-150 pickup trucks because front-seat airbags could inflate even though the vehicle hadn't been involved in a collision. The recall involves trucks built at Ford's now-closed Norfolk, Va., factory from November 2004 to June 2005 and sold in the 2005 and 2006 model years. The automaker said it was aware of 238 incidents of inadvertent airbag deployment in the trucks, causing 77 injuries but no deaths. The Senate Appropriations Committee became the first state legislative committee in the nation to pass a package of bills intended to challenge the practice of granting citizenship to children born in the U.S. to illegal immigrants. Synopsis: Federal authorities can now screen the immigration status of arrestees in every county in California. Through January, the agency had arrested 65,000 people in California who were identified through the program. Immigration officials say more than 70

percent of them had a criminal conviction. The program began in California in 2009 and is currently being rolled out across the nation. Under the program, arrestees' fingerprints are checked against Department of Homeland Security records and immigration officials are notified when there is a hit. The program has faced ardent criticism from immigrant advocates who say involving local police in immigration enforcement discourages illegal immigrants from reporting crimes.

Synopsis: The Obama administration plans to distribute \$1.3 billion to female and Hispanic farmers who claim they were discriminated against by the federal government. The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced a process for distributing the money Friday. The move comes after Congress approved a separate \$4.6 billion settlement for black and Native American farmers who claimed discrimination. Though some lawmakers alleged the claims process for black farmers was rife with fraud, the administration has pushed to extend settlement money to other minority groups. "The Obama administration has made it a priority to resolve all claims of past discrimination at USDA, and we are committed to closing this sad chapter in USDA's history," Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack said in a statement Friday. "Women and Hispanic farmers and ranchers who allege past discrimination can now come forward to participate in a claims process in which they have the opportunity to receive compensation

Synopsis: Turn down the heat -- take off the pounds! A study in the International Journal of Obesity links home temperature and lack of sleep to obesity. Violators could face up to two years in jail and a fine of up to \$10,000. But it is an exception included in the bill that is drawing attention. It is a tough immigration bill with a soft side that protects those who hire unauthorized immigrants "for the purpose of obtaining labor or other work to be performed exclusively or primarily at a single-family residence." Texas state Rep. Aaron Pena, a Republican, said the exception is a wise one.

Synopsis: Georgia House of Representatives passed an Arizona-like immigration law on Thursday in a mostly partisan vote 113-56. Under the Illegal Immigration Reform and Enforcement Act of 2011 all employers would have to use E-verify to ensure they don't hire illegal immigrants. Right now only government workers have to be checked out by E-verify, according to federal laws. Another provision in the law would make it a felony to present false documentation when applying for a job, with a possibility of 15 years in prison and a \$250,000 fine. H.B. 87 would also authorize law enforcement officers to verify citizenship and immigration status, when enforcing other laws, as long as they have a "reasonable suspicion" that the subject is an illegal immigrant. In addition, the legislation goes after those who transport and hide illegal immigrants, or in any other way encourage them to enter US without legal documents.

Synopsis: Utah lawmakers have approved an immigration package that includes an enforcement law reminiscent of Arizona's but tempered with a guest worker program for illegal immigrants. The immigration measures approved by both chambers Friday night would allow illegal immigrants to get a permit to work in Utah. But they also include a requirement that police check the immigrant status of anyone stopped for a felony or serious misdemeanor. Supporters say the entire package balances economic needs and compassion, while opponents argue it will likely encourage more illegal immigration. Lawmakers initially balked at the enforcement measure, HB 497, because of what some viewed as a likely backlash. But sponsor Rep. Stephen Sandstrom, R-Orem, garnered enough support for passage after amending it to focus on more serious crimes.

Synopsis: A new survey says the average price of regular gasoline in the United States has jumped 33 cents per gallon in the last two weeks. The Lundberg Survey of fuel prices released Sunday says it's the second biggest price increase over a two-week span on record. Topic: IMMIGRATION PACKAGE IN UTAH

Synopsis: With the immigration package, passed in both chambers of the Republican-controlled Legislature late Friday, Utah made a sharp break with the hard-line trend in state immigration legislation that has been led by Arizona, which passed a strict enforcement law last April. Utah's package includes measures to tighten enforcement against illegal immigrants that echo Arizona's tough stance - like a requirement that the police check the immigration status of anyone arrested on a felony or a serious misdemeanor charge. Synopsis: Gas prices continued to rise Monday, driven higher for nearly two weeks straight by the turmoil in Libya, with analysts expecting prices to keep climbing. The national average price for a gallon of regular gasoline rose six tenths of a cent to \$3.509, according to a daily survey by motorist group AAA. Prices at the pump can vary widely among states, due in large part to vastly different levels of gasoline tax. Gas prices have increased for 13 days in a row, rising nearly 34 cents in that time. Synopsis: New census data shows Latinos and Asians accounted for virtually all of California's population growth over the last decade. Data from the 2010 U.S. Census released Tuesday shows Latinos grew by 28 percent and Asians grew by 31 percent. Non-Hispanic whites saw their numbers decrease between 2000 and 2010 by 5 percent, and the state's African-American population dipped by 1 percent. Demographers say Latinos are growing faster than other groups because most Latinos are of child-bearing age while the rest of the population tends to be older. California's population grew 10 percent over the decade to 37.3 million. But growth lagged behind other western states and California failed to pick up additional congressional seats for the first time after a census.

Synopsis: Nearly 12 million people in the United States are cancer survivors, almost four times as many as 40 years ago, reflecting big strides in cancer detection and treatment and the effect of an aging U.S. population, U.S. health officials said on Thursday. But many of the survivors face a lifetime of side effects caused by their treatments, according to figures released by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the National Cancer Institute. The plaintiff attorneys are asking a mediator judge at the hearing Thursday to recommend the release of files relating to the sexual abuse of children by priests. The release of the

files has been in dispute since the archdiocese settled more than 550 cases for a record-breaking \$660 million in 2007. But the church wants a more limited release and says disclosing the priests' confidential files violate their privacy rights and their religious freedom.

Topic: MARYLAND IN STATE TUITION BILL

Synopsis: Maryland state senators on Monday signed off on legislation that would make undocumented immigrants eligible for in-state tuition benefits at the state's public colleges. After a lengthy and emotional debate, the Senate voted 27 to 20 to approve the measure, shifting one of the legislative session's most high-profile and controversial immigration bills to the House of Delegates. Sen. Victor R. Ramirez (D-Prince George's), the lead sponsor, spoke to dozens of students seated in the gallery who would benefit from the measure, and told his story of arriving legally in the United States from El Salvador at age 5. Republican opponents and some Democrats said the state should not be subsidizing the cost of higher education for illegal immigrants, and that their objections were a matter of fairness. The measure passed by the Senate is a scaled-back version of what proponents initially envisioned. It calls for Maryland high school graduates, regardless of immigration status, to initially qualify for tuition breaks only at the state's community colleges.

Officials with the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission said they do not expect harmful radiation levels to reach anywhere in the U.S. from Japan. "The agency decided out of an abundance of caution to send these deployable monitors in order to get some monitors on the ground closer to Japan," Jonathan Edwards, director of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's radiation protection division, said this week. The additional monitors are being deployed in response to the ongoing nuclear crisis in Japan, where emergency workers are attempting to cool overheated reactors damaged by last week's magnitude-9.0 earthquake and tsunami. The EPA already monitors radiation throughout the area as part of its RadNet system, which measures levels in air, drinking water, milk and rain.

Topic: GOP DRAFTS LEGISLATIVE ASSAULT ON ILLEGAL IMMIGRATION

Synopsis:

Congressional Republicans are drafting legislation that would require the federal government to develop a plan to add more fencing, sensors, agents and even drones to stop every illegal entry into the United States. The legislative effort offers another example of how a more conservative Congress has steered the immigration debate away from the Obama administration's two-pronged push for reforms and improved border security, and toward strict enforcement of immigration laws. In December, a lame-duck House controlled by Democrats passed the

Dream Act, a reform that would have created a path to citizenship for some young illegal immigrants in the U.S., but it was narrowly defeated in the Senate. The Democrats' Senate majority means the latest legislation is unlikely to pass, but the goal may be more political. By continuing to spearhead such measures, Republicans, who feel they are in agreement with most voters, hope to force Democrats to take a position on immigration issues in advance of the 2012 campaign.

Topic: HISPANIC LABOR FORCE INCREASE

Synopsis:

Latinos earn less than whites or African Americans, the U.S. Labor Department says in a report released Thursday. "There are 50.5 million Latinos in the country," Labor Secretary Hilda Solis said in a conference call to present The Hispanic Labor Force in the Recovery, the first study of Latino workers at the national level. "At nearly 23 million, people of Hispanic or Latino ethnicity represented 15 percent of the United States labor force in 2010. By 2018, Hispanics are expected to comprise 18 percent of the labor force," the report says. The document said that while the recession officially ended in July 2009, overall unemployment peaked at 10.1 percent in October of that year, when joblessness among whites reached a high point of 9.4 percent. Black unemployment peaked in April 2010 at 16.5 percent, while the Hispanic jobless rate topped out at 13.2 percent last November. Last year, 59 percent of Hispanics 16 and older had jobs, compared with 59.4 percent among whites and 52.3 percent of blacks. Black women, however, were more likely to be employed than their white or Latino counterparts. A big disparity was seen in the educational level of the employed, with 36.1 percent of whites older than 25 holding a university degree in 2010 compared to 26 percent of blacks and 16.9 percent of Hispanics.
