On the day consumers start perusing newly launched federal online health exchanges, Republican governors who oppose President Barack Obama's insurance overhaul have been largely silent. But the law is going into effect without them. Thirty-six states, most of them Republican-controlled, have opted to let the federal government run the exchanges where consumers can shop for individual policies from private insurance firms. Consumers are getting their first opportunity on Tuesday to buy policies on the exchanges, even as the law remains at the core of congressional budget gridlock that has caused a partial federal government shutdown. The exchanges' funding isn't affected by the shutdown. A spokesman for Georgia Gov. Nathan Deal dismissed the sweeping law as "a federal issue" and said his boss had no plans to discuss the launch of the exchanges. State workers in several other GOP-run states were ordered to refer all questions from residents to federal officials. In Oklahoma, state employees were instructed to tell residents they are "not trained or certified to answer questions about the Federal Insurance Marketplace."

President Barack Obama has met with Republican and Democratic leaders in Congress to try to break a deadlock that has shut down the federal government, but a solution seemed unlikely as both sides dug in for what could be a long stalemate. Obama on Wednesday met with Republican Speaker of the House of Representatives John Boehner, House Democratic leader Nancy Pelosi, Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid and Senate Republican leader Mitch McConnell. Without raising the debt ceiling the government could run out of money to pay its bills by the middle of the month, which could trigger a debt default for the first time in US history. Immediately after the talks John Boehner said that President Barack Obama again refused to negotiate with them to end a government shutdown.

Consumers trying to use the health-care law's new online insurance markets faced long waits and technical breakdowns for a second day, continuing a rocky start for a system at the center of President Obama's Affordable Care Act. While a federal website serving 36 states was working faster today, some users were still unable to create accounts or reach online enrollment counselors. New York State's health insurance exchange, which crashed under the weight of 10 million web visits yesterday, was offline again this morning and encouraged people to try back later in the day. Operators answered phones on the first day, Oct. 1 2013, of Obamacare at an eHealth Insurance Services Inc. call center in Sacramento, California.

California on Thursday joined the growing list of states that allow immigrants who are in the U.S. illegally to obtain driver's licenses - a measure supported not only by Latino activists but by police chiefs and insurance authorities. Democratic Gov. Jerry Brown signed the bill in front of a cheering crowd of immigrants and their supporters, predicting other parts of the country will follow the example set by the nation's most populous state. The licenses, which are expected to become available no later than January 2015, will carry a special designation on the front and a notice stating that the document is not official federal identification and cannot be used to prove eligibility for employment or public benefits. Ten other states have enacted measures to give driver's licenses to immigrants in the country illegally, many of them in the past year, according to the National Immigration Law Center.

Duration: 45 secs Topic: EVACUATIONS ORDERED AS TROPICAL STORM KAREN NEARS US COAST Time: 7:34 PM Synopsis:

Authorities issued mandatory evacuation orders for low-lying areas south of New Orleans on Friday as a weakened Tropical Storm Karen closed in on the Louisiana coast after disrupting U.S. energy output. Karen's top winds were holding at 50 mph, down from 65 mph a day earlier, and National Hurricane Center forecasters in Miami said the storm was expected to strengthen somewhat but remain a tropical storm. Oil output in the U.S. Gulf of Mexico had been cut in half as oil and gas firms shut platforms and evacuated some workers in preparation for the storm. The Gulf accounts for about 19 percent of U.S. oil production and 6 percent of natural gas output.

President Obama and House Republicans, battling over who was at fault for the four-day partial shutdown of the federal government, found one point they could agree on Friday: Federal workers sent home during the shutdown should get back pay when the government reopens. The Republican-controlled House is set to vote on the Federal Employee Retroactive Pay Fairness Act Saturday. The agreement was a rare moment of accord in an otherwise intractable standoff over government spending, the Affordable Care Act and the debt limit. The two sides traded shots Friday over which side was responsible for the shutdown, which began Tuesday after Congress failed to pass a spending bill for the new fiscal year.

The House on Saturday unanimously approved legislation to provide retroactive pay for furloughed federal workers after the government shutdown ends. The vote was 407-0. Approximately 800,000 government employees have been furloughed during the shutdown, although the Pentagon announced Saturday that it will call 300,000 of its furlough civilian employees back to work. Although the White House has said it "strongly supports" the legislation, it's unclear how the Senate will proceed on the measure.

The upper chamber was not expected to vote on it Saturday, and the Senate will not be in session Sunday. Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid said on the Senate floor that it is "cruel" to promise pay in the future but not allow federal workers to go back to work while the shutdown continues.

The government shutdown is lurching into a second week after a fruitless weekend on Capitol Hill. A rare Saturday session was dominated by now-familiar shutdown messaging from Democrats and Republicans in the House and Senate, with each side trying to blame the other for keeping the government shuttered. Even House-passed legislation that would pay federal workers prompted an angry reaction from Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid. There were no signs of serious negotiations over the weekend, and the longer the standoff drags on the more likely the fight will bump up against the Oct. 17 deadline to raise the debt ceiling - setting the stage for a giant battle over fiscal policy in the coming weeks. More than a dozen lawmakers took to the Sunday shows to keep making their rhetorical case about which side is being unreasonable in the congressional stalemate.

A possible national default loomed closer on Monday as the partial government shutdown lingered, rattling markets in the U.S. and overseas. A gridlocked Congress betrayed little or no urgency toward resolving either of the threats. Stocks got a case of the jitters on Wall Street, and halfway around the world China stressed the importance for the international economy of raising the U.S. debt limit. "Safeguarding the debt is of vital importance to the economy of the U.S. and the world," Vice Finance Minister Zhu Guangyao said, according to the official Xinhua News Agency. China holds \$1.277 trillion in U.S. Treasury bonds, second only to Japan. At home, the political rhetoric was unchanged -- and generally uncompromising -- while a new poll suggested Republicans are paying a heavier price than Democrats for the deadlock.

U.S. interrogators headed to an American warship in the Mediterranean to question a suspected Libyan al-Qaida operative linked to the bombings of U.S. embassies in Africa, as new details emerged Monday about plots planned by a Kenyan militant who escaped a U.S. raid in Somalia. The two operations, thousands of miles apart in Africa and approved by President Barack Obama, signaled an American readiness to go after militants in nations where authorities are unable to do so, even years later. The suspect captured in Tripoli is under U.S. federal indictment but was being held in military custody aboard the USS San Antonio in international waters -- detained under the laws of war as an enemy combatant. A computer expert known as Abu Anas al-Libi, he is accused of using an early-generation Apple computer to assemble surveillance photographs in Nairobi ahead of the deadly 1998 bombing of the U.S. Embassy, according to a former U.S. law enforcement official. The surveillance information was presented to Osama bin Laden, who approved the bombing, said the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity because he wasn't authorized to speak about the case.

An immigration rally on the National Mall ended in several arrests Tuesday afternoon. The "Camino Americano: March for Dignity and Respect" was held as scheduled despite the Mall being closed for the government shutdown. Several popular Latino artists and members of Congress were also in attendance to call on Congress to approve comprehensive immigration reform. During the afternoon, dozens of people broke off from the main group and blocked 1st Street NW, in an attempt to show how much they are willing to put on the line for immigration reform and a path to citizenship. According to Capitol Police, 200 demonstrators refusing to move were arrested around 4 p.m. and charged with crowding, obstructing and incommoding. Included were several Democratic congressmen, including civil rights activist Rep. John Lewis (D-Ga.).

President Barack Obama and House Speaker John Boehner are increasing the pressure on each other to bend in their deadlock over the federal debt limit and the partial government shutdown. Even as they do, there are hints they might consider a brief truce. With the shutdown in its eight day Tuesday and a potential economy-shaking federal default edging ever closer, neither side was showing signs of capitulating. Republicans were demanding talks on deficit reduction and Obama's 2010 health care law as the price for boosting the government's borrowing authority and returning civil servants to work, while the president wanted Congress to first end the shutdown and extend the debt limit. Amid the tough talk, though, were indications that both sides might be open to a short-term extension of the \$16.7 trillion borrowing limit and a temporary end to the shutdown, giving them more time to resolve their disputes.

Topic: SALMONELLA OUTBREAK Time: 8:07 PM Synopsis:

A salmonella outbreak linked to raw chicken from California involves several antibiotic-resistant strains of the disease and has put at least 42% of the victims in the hospital, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said Tuesday. There have been no deaths linked to the outbreak. Thirteen percent of those sickened have salmonella septicemia, a serious, life-threatening whole-body inflammation, said Caroline Smith DeWaal, food safety director of the Center for Science in the Public Interest in Washington. DeWaal was briefed by Christopher Braden, director of the division of food-borne illness at the CDC. As of Tuesday, 278 people in 18 states have been sickened in the salmonella Heidelberg outbreak. Interviews with some of the patients have linked it to chicken produced by Foster Farms at three California plants, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) said Monday. The CDC has been hampered in tracing the outbreak because the government shutdown meant the agency had to shut down PulseNet, a national network of public health laboratories that looks for trends and matches reports to spot food-borne illness outbreaks. It's one of the agency's most important tools in detecting such problems.

If the partial government shutdown continues into late October, America's veterans will feel the impact. That message was delivered to Congress today by Veterans Affairs Secretary Eric Shinseki. He told a House panel that about 3.8 million veterans won't receive disability compensation next month if the shutdown lasts another couple of weeks. In all, more than \$6 billion in payments to more than five million beneficiaries would be halted during an extended shutdown. In some areas, like health care delivery, there have been few adverse effects. In others, such as reducing the backlog of disability claims, the impact is clearer.

The recent government shutdown is estimated to cost the United States \$1.6 billion for every week that the government is shut down. Calculated by the global economic consulting firm IHS Global Insight, this figure translates into about \$300 million per day, or \$12.5 million per hour of government closure. While the nation scrambles to find an answer to the chaos atop Capitol Hill, American college students, including those on Mount Oread, remain mostly oblivious to the real-world implications of the recent government shutdown.

Topic: ACLU FILES COMPLAINT AGAINST BORDER PATROL Time: 8:25 PM

Synopsis:

The American Civil Liberties Union is seeking a federal government probe into allegations of constitutional rights violations by U.S. Border Patrol agents in Arizona. In a letter sent Thursday to the Department of Homeland Security, the ACLU cites five cases in which the group says U.S. citizens were subject to illegal searches, detentions and excessive force. The group is asking for an investigation into the individual complaints as well as a comprehensive review of Border Patrol policies. The complaint comes two weeks after the federal government settled an ACLU lawsuit filed over similar allegations in Washington State. While admitting no wrongdoing in that case, Border Patrol agreed to retrain agents, among other things. Border Patrol officials were not available for comment due to the partial federal government shutdown.

West coast poultry producer Foster Farms made headlines on Monday evening after the partially operational U.S. Department of Agriculture announced an outbreak of Salmonella linked to chicken grown by the firm. At least 278 individuals have fallen ill in 17 states, mainly in California, after mishandling or undercooking the contaminated raw chicken meat, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. In a press release following the announcement, the farm noted that it was not recalling any of its chicken products from the three central California processing facilities tied to the outbreak.

Dengue fever, a mosquito-borne illness uncommon in the United States, has re-emerged in Houston, a new study says. The study by the Baylor College of Medicine shows the virus has been transmitted in Houston, the first evidence the disease so prevalent in the developing world has spread to a major U.S. city in large numbers. A professor of tropical medicine at Baylor and the study's principal investigator said her team found that 47 of 3,768 individuals tested in Houston for West Nile virus from 2003 to 2005 were positive for antibodies to acute dengue infection. The study found two of the 47 died from the infection. The cases suggest there was a dengue outbreak in 2003.

The Obama administration said last week it would allow states to use their own money to pay for park operations. Utah was the first to accept the offer, and all five national parks in the state reopened Saturday. Colorado also reached agreement to reopen Rocky Mountain National Park, and tourists returned Saturday to the Grand Canyon in Arizona. In Washington, monuments along the Mall have remained closed, as have the Smithsonian museums, including the National Zoo. Claude Moore Colonial Farm in McLean reopened last week; the National Park Service owns the land, but private donations and fees pay for the farm. The Statue of Liberty reopened Sunday with New York footing the bill. South Dakota, helped by several donations, started paying the National Park Service to reopen Mount Rushmore on Monday.

The victims of the Boston Marathon bombing were on the minds of runners and spectators at the 36th annual Chicago Marathon on Sunday, though for many, thoughts of Boston served more to motivate than to scare. Dramatically increased security and memorial signs, bracelets and shoelaces were evidence of a changed landscape when the runners lined up at Grant Park's starting line. This year, about 45,000 marathoners registered and organizers said 40,230 crossed the starting line, up 2,000 from last year. Race staff said the 39,115 finished the race Sunday, topping the record of 37,475 last year. Nearly 2 million spectators cheered on the athletes, according to a city spokeswoman. The 26.2-mile marathon started at 7:30 a.m. at Monroe and Columbus, winding through 29 neighborhoods continuing as far north as Addison, as far west as -Damen and as far south as 35th, finishing in Grant Park at Columbus.

President Barack Obama says that if Republicans can't resolve the standoff over the debt ceiling and the partial government shutdown, "we stand a good chance of defaulting." The agency, Martha's Table, is also offering assistance to federal employees who are not being paid and need emergency aid. The visit comes on the 14th day of the shutdown and just three days before the Treasury says Congress must increase the nation's borrowing limit or risk a government default. Later Monday, Obama was meeting with the bipartisan congressional leadership. Obama says the problem is politicians using brinkmanship to extract partisan concessions.

Many families in the state of New Jersey are still struggling to rebuild after Super storm Sandy struck nearly a year ago, destroying swathes of the East Coast of the U.S. On October 29, 2012, a killer combination of weather systems morphed into monster Super storm Sandy, which killed nearly 200 people, and caused an estimated 65 billion US dollars in damage, making it the second costliest cyclone in the United States behind Hurricane Katrina. In one of the hardest hit seaside towns, Union Beach, many residents and businesses are blaming insurance companies, saying they are dragging their feet when it comes to paying out on insurance policies.

Synopsis:

In the past five years, Homeland Security officials have jailed record numbers of immigrants, driven by a little-known congressional directive known on Capitol Hill as the "bed mandate."The policy requires U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) to keep an average of 34,000 detainees per day in its custody, a quota that has steadily risen since it was established in 2006 by conservative lawmakers who insisted that the agency wasn't doing enough to deport unlawful immigrants. But as illegal crossings from Mexico have fallen to near their lowest levels since the early 1970s, ICE has been meeting Congress's immigration detention goals by reaching deeper into the criminal justice system to vacuum up foreignborn, legal U.S. residents convicted of any crimes that could render them eligible for deportation. The agency also has greatly expanded the number of undocumented immigrants it takes into custody after traffic stops by local police. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) officials say that they are not needlessly jailing immigrants to meet a quota and that they find plenty of candidates for detention and deportation by targeting criminals who pose a threat to public safety and border security.

Topic: RETIREMENT NEEDS TO BE POSTPONED Time: 7:25

Synopsis:

Stung by a recession that sapped investments and home values, but expressing widespread job satisfaction, older Americans appear to have accepted the reality of a retirement that comes later in life and no longer represents a complete exit from the workforce. Some 82 percent of working Americans over 50 say it is at least somewhat likely they will work for pay in retirement, according to a poll released Monday by the Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research. The survey found 47 percent of working survey respondents now expects to retire later than they previously thought and, on average, plan to call it quits at about 66, or nearly three years later than their estimate when they were 40. Men, racial minorities, parents of minor children, those earning less than \$50,000 a year and those without health insurance were more likely to put off their plans.

President Barack Obama said on Tuesday the frantic stop-and-go effort in Congress to avoid a debt default and end a government shutdown is ``a mess" as a gloomy mood descended over the White House with time running out to a Thursday deadline. Obama, who is to meet Treasury Secretary Jack Lew on Wednesday, and his Democratic backers stressed there is still time to avoid a historic default even as efforts to reach a deal in Congress floundered on Capitol Hill. The president seemed hopeful in television interviews he gave in late morning, but those hopes were dashed later in the day when Republicans who control the House of Representatives failed to muster support for alternatives to a Senate plan that had bipartisan support.

More than half of low-wage workers employed by the largest U.S. fast-food restaurants earn so little that they must rely on public assistance to get by, according to a study released on Tuesday. This ends up costing U.S. taxpayers billions of dollars a year, the study said. Data from the U.S. Census Bureau and public benefit programs show 52 percent of fast-food cooks, cashiers and other "front-line" staff had relied on at least one form of public assistance, such as Medicaid, food stamps and the Earned Income Tax Credit program, between 2007 and 2011.

President Obama slammed the partisan standoff "spectacle" that he said had damaged the economy and America's international credibility, and called on Congress to pass a comprehensive budget, immigration reform and a farm bill by year's end. He praised "Democrats and responsible Republicans who came together" to pass a last-minute deal to reverse a partial government shutdown and narrowly avert the expiration of the federal borrowing authority. Before the bill to end the budget impasse even hit President Obama's desk Wednesday, he and congressional Democrats had pivoted to what they hope is the next big legislative battle: an overhaul of the nation's immigration laws including citizenship for the nation's 12 million undocumented immigrants.

Facebook Inc removed a restriction for users under 18 that previously limited who could see their online postings from photos to musings on the world-wide social network. The No.1 online social network said that teenagers would now be able to manually alter the setting and share information with the public. Until

now, a teenager's postings on Facebook were only viewable to their friends, and to the friends of their friends. The change comes as Facebook faces increasing competition from a new crop of mobile and social services, such as SnapChat and WhatsApp, which have proven popular with younger users.

The prolonged glitches with the ObamaCare website are frustrating many of the president's most highvalued customers -- the young, tech-savvy generation that helped him win two terms and whose participation is critical to the success of the health care exchanges. "You see this situation especially with college students," Michael Cipriano, a student at American University told FoxNews.com on Friday. "They get frustrated, which creates a disincentive to sign up". President Obama is depending on young people being the backbone of his signature, 2010 health care law. Typically among the mostly healthy Americans, their premiums were supposed to help finance coverage for the elderly, poor and others with long-term illnesses and more frequent emergency-care visits. However, the glitches and other problems that have plagued the exchanges since they went online Oct. 1 could put the plan in jeopardy. The administration runs healthcare.gov for the 36 states that chose not to have their own sites. The 14 other states and the District of Columbia run their own site but are still part of ObamaCare.

The Obama administration is approaching two million deportations, a milestone that immigration advocates decry and enforcement hawks dismiss as a failing of the president's immigration policies. Exactly when the number will be reached is unknown, possibly by year's end or more likely early in 2014. But its close enough for immigration activists to invoke the number as they clamor for Congress to move on immigration reform legislation and press President Barack Obama to suspend deportations. Enforcement hawks see the number as a statistics gimmick spun by the administration to appear it has been tougher on immigration enforcement than it actually has. Immigration activists have been organizing around the coming two millionth deportations, having met in Phoenix last weekend for what they dubbed "the conference" .They've chained themselves to buses loaded with immigrants headed to deportation hearings, to and along the White House perimeter.

From 2007 to 2010, the suicide rates for pre-teens and teens steadily inched up. According to the Centers for Disease Control, the suicide rate for those aged 5 to 14 was 0.7 (per 100,000 population) in 2010, up from 0.5 in 2007. For teens, the rate was 10.5, up from 9.7 in 2007, the highest rate it's been in more than a decade. Suicide rates have been rising among almost every demographic group for the last several years. While the economic downturn is routinely blamed by many suicide researchers for the increase, for those under 24, experts often link the rise in rates to bullying <u>especially</u> via social media. For 15- to 24-year-olds, suicide is the third leading cause of death, and a 2008 review of bullying research by the Yale School of Medicine confirmed links between suicide and bullying, with some studies showing that bullying victims were anywhere from two to nine times more likely to report thoughts of suicide.

Roughly half a million Americans have applied for health insurance through new federal- and state-run exchanges under President Barack Obama's signature healthcare law, an administration official said on Saturday. That figure comes as problems with the federal marketplace's entry portal serving 36 states, the website Healthcare.gov, have thwarted consumers from shopping for federally subsidized health coverage and drawn derision from Republicans, who oppose the law, popularly known as Obamacare. The acknowledgement of the number of applicants, late on a weekend evening, appeared to be part of a ramped-up damage control effort by the White House.

The post also said that "our team is bringing in some of the best and brightest from both inside and outside government to scrub in with the team and help improve healthcare.gov." America's Health Insurance Plans, an insurance-industry trade group, had offered HHS additional backup late last week, according to a person familiar with the matter. A spokesman for the group said Sunday that insurance-industry experts have been working with officials to improve the system all along.

The study was published today in the online edition of the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences (PNAS). This method offers the possibility of inducing large numbers of hair follicles or rejuvenating existing hair follicles, starting with cells grown from just a few hundred donor hairs. It could make hair transplantation available to individuals with a limited number of follicles, including those with female-pattern hair loss, scarring alopecia, and hair loss due to burns." According to Dr. Christiano, such patients gain little benefit from existing hair-loss medications, which tend to slow the rate of hair loss but usually do not stimulate robust new hair growth.

In response to eight deaths in three months due to fires in converted garages, a joint council committee proposed making it a misdemeanor violation to rent out such garages. The penalty would be a \$1,000 fine. As part of a package of recommendations, the panel also suggested forcing landlords to pay to relocate tenants from illegal garages to legal apartments. It also proposed a \$217,000 education program to teach tenants about the risks of living in garages. But most significantly, the committee disregarded a controversial proposal by a task force of city officials to legalize converted garages that meet minimum safety regulations. The proposal to legalize converted garages was also blasted by nearly a dozen homeowner groups--mostly from the San Fernando Valley--who argued that legalizing such dwellings would ruin the single-family atmosphere of many city neighborhoods.

Unlike other federal agencies, the IRS requires employees and those who work on agency contracts to comply with federal tax laws. That means they have to file returns on time and either pay all the taxes they owe or enroll in a payment plan. But the agency should do a better job of monitoring whether workers continue to follow tax laws afterward. In making his case Thursday, Obama said both parties would benefit in polls if Congress made a deal to address the fate of the nation's 12 million illegal immigrants.

While the applications don't mean that many people have fully enrolled for health insurance under the new system, the figure represents a significant increase in those who have been able to start the process in recent days. House Oversight Committee Chairman Darrell Issa on Thursday raised the threat of a possible subpoena if Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius doesn't respond to his panel's questions and requests for documents about problems with the Obamacare website.

A disproportional number of Latino construction workers in New York City die while on the job compared to their coworkers of other races, according to a new report. From 2003 to 2011, three-fourths of construction workers who died were either U.S.-born Latinos or immigrants, according to a review of all of the fatal falls on the job investigated by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration, an agency of the federal Labor Department. The data we have demonstrates that Latinos and immigrants are more likely to die in these types of accidents. Construction safety advocates and a study by the New York State Trial Lawyers Association cited safety violations on job sites run by smaller, non-union contractors and an unwillingness by some undocumented workers to report violations as main reasons for the high number of deaths among Latino workers. They are not providing the training and the safety equipment that are required by law. While New York may have a surprisingly high number of deaths of Latino construction workers, numbers nationwide for Hispanic deaths on the jobs are also greater than any other group.

As a result, the program has more than doubled in cost since 2008, now costing almost \$80 billion a year. That large increase in spending has turned the program, now called the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, or SNAP, into a target for House Republicans looking to reduce spending.

Food banks across the country, stretched thin in the aftermath of the recession, are bracing for more people coming through their doors in the wake of cuts to the federal food stamp program. The cut, she says, also means she will have to buy more canned fruits and vegetables, forgoing her daughters' favorite fruit, kiwi, and buying packaged meat.

The measures were not included in a revised policy announced on Sept. 25 that calls for more training and better record-keeping.CBP considered the proposed curbs "very restrictive," Fisher told The Associated Press. L.A. City Council approved a request for proposals to build a citywide Wi-Fi network in an effort to stimulate economic growth and "bridge the digital divide." The exact cost of the effort and the type of Internet service provided will depend on the proposals. Councilman Bob Blumenfield who spearheaded the idea, said providing basic Wi-Fi services could cost from \$60 million to \$100 million. A much faster Internet access system, which would involve installing fiber-optic cables in homes and businesses, could cost up to \$5 billion, according to the city's Information and Technology Agency. Dozens of cities across the country provide basic Wi-Fi service, but only a few provide fiber-optic Internet. They include Kansas City and Austin, which made deals with Google to connect fiber cables to every residence. Basic Internet usage there is free, but residents can pay extra for faster connections and television service. Cities have used different funding formulas, with Wi-Fi providers providing discounts in some cases in exchange for permission to advertise. Council members say expanding access to the Internet would allow those who can't afford to pay for Internet access to better compete. They say it would also augment a \$1-billion plan at Los Angeles Unified School District to provide 650,000 iPads to teachers and students. An estimated 30% of student households are without broadband access. Nationwide, an estimated 85% of Americans use the Internet, and 70% of American adults have a high-speed broadband connection at home. The city last tried to implement citywide wireless access in 2007, but dropped the plan two years later after officials concluded it would be too expensive.

But he declined to say whether lawmakers will consider any legislation this year or whether the issue will slip to 2014, when the politics of congressional elections further diminish chances of action. The No. 3 House Republican, Rep. Kevin McCarthy of California, had told immigration advocates last week that the House won't vote this year but possibly early next year.

The change means that those immigrants can apply to legally live in the United States. Margaret D. Stock, an Alaska-based immigration attorney and retired Army reserve lieutenant colonel, said the latest directive would likely impact thousands of military families.

The Obama administration issued a new policy on Friday that will allow immigrants in the United States illegally who are close relatives of active military troops and veterans to stay and move toward becoming permanent residents. The long-awaited memorandum, coming after three years of deliberations by Department of Homeland Security officials, was an effort to untangle knots in immigration law that left many soldiers worried that their immigrant family members could be deported while they were deployed. The administration applied the policy broadly, extending it to all active-duty members of the armed forces, to reservists including the National Guard, and to all veterans. Their spouses, children and parents will be eligible for a "parole in place," a term that means they will be authorized to remain in the United States and many can proceed with applications for legal residency.

Unless Congress acts very quickly, some 1.3 million workers will lose their extended jobless benefits on December 28. Democrats were scrambling late Wednesday to link an extension of benefits to a budget deal that is expected to get a vote as soon as Thursday. But if the effort fails, they will come back at it in 2014. And House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, did not slam the door shut on the possibility of renewing the jobless benefits eventually. When asked whether he would consider allowing an extension of the funding, he said he told President Obama he would keep such a plan on the table. The White House, along with Democratic leaders, had hoped to extend the benefits before they expired this year. But those plans seemed to diminish on Tuesday, when Sen. Patty Murray, D-Wash., and Rep. Paul Ryan, R-Wis., unveiled their bipartisan budget deal that did not include any last-minute reprieves for the Federal Emergency Unemployment Compensation program. Because the House plans to leave on Friday, the vote on the budget package is expected very soon. The White House had wanted the benefits included in the budget, saying that besides the 1.3 million people who will lose their benefits on Dec. 28, an additional 3.6 million people will fall out of the unemployment insurance program in the first half of the year without an extension. Democrats, along with a few Republicans, want to have a chance to renew the jobless benefits. A group of moderate House Republicans sent a letter to their leaders saying: "We respectfully request that the House consider a temporary extension of emergency unemployment insurance to protect an essential safeguard that has aided Americans who have endured through a weak economy".

The Federal Communications Commission voted 3-2 Thursday to consider lifting its ban on in-flight cell phone use. On the same day, the Federal Department of Transportation and three members of Congress took steps to block those calls. Secretary of Transportation Anthony Foxx said in a statement to CNN that he is looking into the possibility of banning in-flight calls, citing its aviation consumer protection authority. The DOT will determine whether allowing calls is "fair to consumers." Many people consider the idea of cell phone conversations annoying in the close confines of a plane, and some are casting it as a consumer 20 rudest things people do on planes. Meanwhile, Senator Dianne Feinstein (D-California) and Senator Lamar Alexander (R-Tennessee) introduced legislation on Thursday to ban cell phone conversations on commercial airline flights. House Rep. Bill Shuster, (R-Pennsylvania) has also introduced a bill that would prohibit in-flight voice communications but allow text messaging. Those actions come as the FCC considers whether it should lift its decades-old ban on cell phones on aircraft. Are the two government entities working at cross purposes? Perhaps. But each cites its individual and independent mandates. The FCC has banned in-flight calls for technical reasons. But new technology has made that ban obsolete, the commission says, and there's no reason to continue it. The DOT, which includes the Federal Aviation Administration, is entrusted with safe air travel, but also with protecting the rights of air travelers. The FCC has been pelted with criticism in the last several weeks after the commission's new chairman made the announcement. The current requirement that cell phones may not be used in-flight would actually be expanded to include all bands, said Wheeler, unless airlines install new on-board equipment that prevents interference with terrestrial networks.

For adults aged 60 and older, they are recommending a higher treatment threshold, prescribing medicine only when blood pressure levels reach 150 over 90 or higher. Too aggressive blood pressure treatment can cause fainting and falls in older patients, or bad interactions with drugs they're already taking for other illnesses, panel members said. The panel does endorse the lower target of 140 over 90 for younger adults - and for all adults who also have diabetes or kidney disease. The guidelines released Wednesday are based on a review of the most rigorous kind of medical research - studies in which patients are randomly prescribed drugs or dummy pills - published since the last update in 2003.

About half of the raw chicken breasts in a nationwide sampling carried antibiotic-resistant superbug bacteria, a U.S. consumer group said on Thursday, calling for stricter limits on use of the medicines on livestock. It could be more difficult to treat people if they became ill after eating chicken with the antibiotic-resistant bacteria, said Consumer Reports, which describes itself as the world's largest independent product-testing organization. The group said it tested for six types of bacteria in 316 raw chicken breasts purchased from retailers nationwide during July. Almost all of the samples contained potentially harmful bacteria; some 49.7% carried a bacterium resistant to three or more antibiotics, according to the group, and 11% had two types of bacteria resistant to multiple drugs. Resistance was most common for the antibiotics used for growth promotion and disease treatment of poultry. Consumer Reports urged passage of a law to restrict eight classes of antibiotics for use only to treat humans and sick animals.

All 1,800 students and staff at a southern California high school will be screened for tuberculosis Friday after 45 students tested positive for possible exposure. The Riverside County Department of Public Health and state officials have determined there is a possibility of exposure to other Indio High School students, though "the risk of transmission appears to be moderately low." According to a letter-to-parents on the school's website, officials said there is one active case of tuberculosis and they do not fear an outbreak. "The entire school is being tested out of an abundance of caution," said Riverside County Public Health Officer Dr. Cameron Kaiser. Students will have to return to school in Indio, California, on Monday to have the test results evaluated, the letter says. Without verification of a current TB testing and results, students won't be allowed to return to school after the holiday break on January 6, the school said. County health officials expanded the testing to the entire school "after results of an initial screening were higher than expected," spokesman Jose Arballo Jr. said in a statement. Officials tested 131 students on Monday, and 45 of them tested positive to possible exposure to the illness. "Someone who is exposed does not necessarily have active tuberculosis, a condition that must be confirmed with more tests," Arballo said. On Thursday, follow up X-rays identified five students who require further examination.

More than 850,000 people piled on to the federal health insurance website Monday, the last day to log on and sign up for health insurance coverage that begins January 1st. "It's something like lining up for Election Day", the administration says, "If you are standing in line when the polls close, you get to come in and vote." Experience shows many Americans will wait until the last possible minute to buy health insurance. There's nothing like a deadline to focus the mind. And in this case, experience also shows that people who waited may have fared better than people who tried to sign up early, although really lastminute users may have to line up. Signing up for health insurance is a multi-step process. The White House and Health and Human Services Department are also scrambling to make sure that people take the last step and pay their first premium so the insurance actually begins. It's not been easy for people using the federal website and some of the state sites. The Obama administration says the federal site is finally working well, but it's not entirely clear if the so-called back end is working as it's supposed to, transmitting the correct information to insurance companies

The expiration of benefits for 1.3 million jobless Americans this weekend will exacerbate the worst period of chronic unemployment in post-war history, the chairman of the White House council of economic advisers warns. The expiring programme, which provides emergency help for the long-term unemployed, was introduced after the banking crash in 2008 to cushion the impact of the recession but is due to end on Saturday. Congress had an opportunity to continue it, but failed to agree on an extension before breaking for Christmas. Although recent improvements in the economy have boosted overall job growth, economists are concerned that long-term unemployment rates remain higher than at any time between 1948 and the recent financial crisis. Republican critics claim that ending the programme will force recipients to find work, but new research suggests it will have the opposite effect, and will encourage them to drop out of the labor market entirely, according to Jason Furman, chairman council of economic advisers. Similar studies by the Congressional Budget Office and JP Morgan have suggested that ending the programme will knock between 0.2 and 0.4 percentage points off the US economy's growth rate and that the country will lose out on 240,000 jobs due to lower demand in 2014. Democrats are planning a fresh push this week to highlight the issue. On a media conference call, House minority leader Nancy Pelosi argued for the extension of the benefits. "Unemployment insurance is part of the safety net of our

country; not just for individuals but for the economy," said Pelosi in the call on Monday. "It is one of the biggest stimuli for the economy." But Pelosi's fellow Democrat, Senate majority leader Harry Reid, conceded more than a week ago that it was too late for Congress to act on the extension this year after it was left out of a hard-fought budget compromise between the parties.

Office workers in search of <u>snacks</u> will be counting calories along with their change under new labeling regulations for vending machines included in President Barack Obama's health care overhaul law. Requiring calorie information to be displayed on roughly 5 million vending machines nationwide will help consumers make healthier choices, says the Food and Drug Administration, which is expected to release final rules early next year. It estimates the cost to the vending machine industry at \$25.8 million initially and \$24 million per year after that, but says if just .02% of obese adults ate 100 fewer calories a week, the <u>savings</u> to the health care system would be at least that great. The rules will apply to about 10,800 companies that operate 20 or more machines. Nearly three quarters of those companies have three or fewer employees, and their profit margin is extremely low, according to the National Automatic Merchandising Association.

Someone smoking one pack a day for 30 years or 2 packs a day for 15 years, for example, would have a 30 pack-year smoking history.
