President Barack Obama urged Republican lawmakers on Saturday, October 1, to spell out exactly what they can and cannot support in his 447 billion U.S. dollar plan to create jobs, saying it was "time for Congress to get its act together." Obama, whose re-election chances in November 2012 are clouded by high unemployment and a sluggish economy, has said his jobs bill should be funded mainly by ending tax breaks for corporations and limiting deductions for the rich. Republicans oppose those ideas, along with some of Obama's fellow Democrats. But Republican leaders, wary of being cast as foes of job creation during tough economic times, have said there are some elements of the plan worth considering. "Some Republicans in Congress have said that they agree with certain parts of this jobs bill. If so, it's time for them to tell me what those proposals are," Obama said in his weekly radio address.

California-based Manning Beef is recalling 80,000 pounds of beef products over possible E. coli contamination, the U.S. Department of Agriculture said, "The establishment is recalling a variety of beef primal and sub primal cuts ... and manufacturing trimmings due, in part, to insanitary conditions as reflected by an unusually high number of confirmed positive E. coli test results, the USDA's Food Safety and Inspection Service said Friday. The beef products were produced on Sept. 23 and shipped from the Pico Rivera, California, operation to retail establishments and food service centers in Arizona and California and to another federally regulated establishment in Nebraska, the USDA statement said.

The State Department issued a worldwide travel alert on Saturday warning of the possibility of anti-American attacks in response to the killing of two top al Qaeda members. The warning came a day after U.S. officials said Anwar al-Awlaki, identified as "chief of external operations" for al Qaeda's Yemen branch, was killed in an attack by missiles fired from multiple CIA drones in Yemen. "The death of Awlaki, in the near term, could provide motivation for anti-American attacks worldwide from individuals or groups seeking to retaliate against U.S. citizens or interests because of this action," the State Department said. The drone strike also killed Samir Khan, an American who served as editor of a glossy magazine used as a propaganda and recruitment tool by al Qaeda in the Arabian Peninsula.

For people trying to quit smoking, the drug cytisine works better than a placebo, and its comparatively low cost makes it an appealing alternative to newer stop-smoking medications, researchers say. Over the course of a year, researchers found cytisine, a nicotine substitute, more effective than a placebo in helping smokers stop the habit, and the researchers said its affordability could be an advantage in poorer countries.

"My wife, my son - I have to get back to them," Daniel kept telling himself, from the moment he was arrested in Seattle for driving with an expired license, all the way through the deportation proceeding that delivered him to Mexico in June. Nothing would deter him from crossing the border again. He had left his hometown at 24, he said. Twelve years later, he had an American son, a wife, near-fluency in English and three brothers in the United States. "I'll keep trying," he said, "until I'll get there." This is increasingly the profile of illegal immigration today. Migrant shelters along the Mexican border are filled not with newcomers looking for a better life but with seasoned crossers: older men and women, often deportees, braving ever-greater risks to get back to their families in the United States - the country they consider home. They present a challenge to American policymakers because they continue to head north despite obstacles more severe than at any time in recent history. It is not just that the American economy has little to offer; the border itself is far more threatening. On one side, fences have grown and American agents have multiplied.

Every DV lottery entrant must have at least a high school education or its equivalent as defined by local requirements or have two years of work experience within the past five years in an occupation requiring at least three years of training or experience. Federal authorities in California are cracking down on the state's medical marijuana industry, four U.S. attorneys in the state announced. Prosecutors have stepped up campaigns to break up businesses that take shelter under a state law allowing patients to possess marijuana for medical use, sending warning letters, filing civil forfeiture lawsuits, and prosecuting criminal cases, the attorneys said. "It's the new California gold rush," Andre Birotte Jr., the U.S. attorney for the state's central district, said during a press briefing. "There's an epidemic of these marijuana stores." Authorities said a large for-profit marijuana industry has developed since the state passed Proposition 215 in 1996, which enabled patients with medical needs for marijuana -- dictated by illnesses such as cancer or AIDS -- to possess the drug for therapeutic relief. They emphasized, however, that they will focus their efforts on curbing illegal activity, and patients in need of the drug will still be able to get it.

At least 69 people have contracted the disease in 2011. That's almost three times higher than what doctors have seen in the last five years.

21 people have now died from contaminated cantaloupes. The melons have a form of bacteria called listeria. The Center for Disease Control and Prevention now says at least 109 cases have been reported in 24 states. More reports could come in because the disease can take up to two months to develop in a person. This listeria outbreak is the deadliest food-borne illness of its kind in the United States since 1998. The cantaloupe grower has recalled its melons and they should be off store shelves by now. Health officials say refrigeration or water will not kill the bacteria; instead the melons should be thrown out.

Police agencies in California will no longer be able to freely impound cars from sober but unlicensed drivers who are stopped at drunk-driving checkpoints under legislation signed Sunday by Gov. Jerry

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Brown. Under the new law written by Assemblyman Gil Cedillo (D-Los Angeles), if a sober driver is caught at a DUI checkpoint without a valid license, law enforcement officers must release the car to a qualified driver representing the registered owner. In cases where a legal driver is not readily available, AB 353 says, the vehicle is to be released to one later at the impound yard. Some Latino lawmakers have alleged that sobriety checkpoints have been misused by some cities to unfairly target illegal immigrants who do not have a driver's license. Because cities can hold cars taken from unlicensed drivers for 30 days, the accumulated impound fees can turn out to be more than the car is worth, resulting in some drivers losing their cars.

In one of the largest expansions of health coverage to the uninsured, Los Angeles County is enrolling hundreds of thousands of residents in a publicly funded treatment program and setting the stage for the national healthcare overhaul. The county hopes to register as many as 550,000 patients and is assigning them to medical clinics for services at no cost to them. At the same time, the county is transforming its healthcare system to be less focused on acute care and more on primary care. The changes are expected to reduce costs, streamline care and attract patients.

Good news on the tuberculosis front: The World Health Organization reports that TB rates are dropping for the first time. The WHO 2011 Global Tuberculosis Control Report was released today at a Washington news conference, and it details the strides that have been made globally in eradicating TB. Among the 258-page report's findings: The number of people who contracted TB fell from a high of 9 million in 2005 to 8.8 million in 2010. Deaths dropped from 1.8 million in 2003 to 1.4 million in 2010, and the death rate plummeted 40% from 1990 to 2010. Cure rates are high -- in 2009, 87% of people who had TB were cured, but the report also found that a third of likely TB cases are never alerted, so it's not known if those people were diagnosed and treated. Some countries have shown that the extra effort and money put into fighting the disease have paid off. Kenya, Tanzania and Brazil have all seen TB rates decline in the last 10 to 20 years. China's progress has been substantial, with death rates dropping by almost 80% from 1990 to 2010. The frequency of TB was also cut in half in that time.

More U-S homes are entering the foreclosure process, but they are taking longer to get sold or repossessed by lenders. That's according to the latest report from market researcher RealtyTrac. Foreclosure filings went up less than one-percent from the previous quarter. But, that was fueled by a 14-percent jump in first-time default notices. That means lenders are cracking down more on those who have fallen behind on their mortgage payments. The days to complete the foreclosure process took an average of 336 days in the third quarter. That's the highest level since 2007.

There is little movement on the job front. The Labor Department reports that the number of Americans filing for their first week of benefits dropped slightly-- very slightly. We're talking 404-thousand claims, compared to 405-thousand the week before. New claims for unemployment benefits have been around the 400-thousand mark since early April. Economists say that's too high to move the unemployment rate down.

About 378,000 pounds of ground beef have been recalled in California and Nevada after testing determined it may be contaminated with E. coli, posing a potentially serious food poisoning risk. The Commercial Meat Co. ground beef recall was announced by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS) on October 11, after routine testing found E. coli O157:H7 in the

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ground beef. Although there have been no illnesses reported in connection to the recalled ground beef, E. coli O157:H7 is one of the more common causes of food poisoning in the United States.

Yesterday, an Atlanta appeals court blocked a portion of the law that required schools to track the immigration status of students. Proponents say it's opens up jobs for legal residents, but the law has been creating unintended consequences. Almost a hundred people lined up, waiting for the Jefferson County Courthouse in Birmingham to open. Once it does, a security officer barks instructions. The lines are long in Birmingham partly because of budget cuts, but lines at courthouses across the state have lengthened since Alabama's immigration law went into effect. The law requires anyone doing business with the state, such as car tags and licenses, to prove he or she is allowed to be in Alabama. Mobile County is spending \$150,000 for equipment to comply with the law.

Officials said the number of those convicted of crimes was up 89 percent from 2008.

Officials say this is the deadliest food-borne illness outbreak in the U-S since 1998.

Stocks rose, snapping a seven-day decline in the Standard & Poor's 500 Index, after Thanksgiving retail sales climbed to a record and amid speculation euro-area leaders will boost efforts to end the debt crisis.
