The man who has become the first Ebola patient to develop symptoms in the United States told officials at Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital on Sept. 26 that he had just arrived from West Africa but was not admitted that day because that information was not passed along at the hospital, officials acknowledged Wednesday. The man, Thomas E. Duncan, was sent home under the mistaken belief that he had only a mild fever, a hospital administrator said; the information that he had traveled from Liberia, one of the nations at the heart of the Ebola epidemic, was overlooked. Some members of the Liberian community in the Dallas area said that given the spread of the disease in their home country, they were skeptical of the health information being released publicly, adding that public gatherings were being canceled out of fear of possible contagion.

The hands-free systems let drivers do things like tune the radio, send a text message or make a phone call while supposedly keeping their eyes focused on the road, but many of these systems are so error-prone or complex that they require even more concentration from drivers rather than less. The studies were released by the AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety and the University of Utah.

When it comes to working for tips, one add-on isn't quite so welcome: widespread sexual harassment. Tipped restaurant workers are suffering from endemic sexual harassment in their workplaces, thanks to their minimum wage of \$2.13 per hour that has remained unchanged since 1991. That's according to a new study from Restaurant Opportunities Center (ROC), a group that advocates for the rights of restaurant workers. The federal minimum wage is \$7.25 an hour. Because tipped workers like waitresses depend on customers to make sure they earn enough to make ends meet, many feel they must put up with unwanted behavior, the study found. Given that tipped restaurant workers are predominantly women, representing two-thirds of the country's wait staff, the issue raises the question of how the economic uncertainty of tips may lead to gender-based sexual harassment.

Twenty-one of the men and women indicted were arrested Thursday and pleaded not guilty to the drug conspiracy in U.S. District Court in Riverside, according to Corey Lee, assistant U.S. attorney.

According to Cal Fire, by Friday night, the Applegate fire has burned about 459 acres and is 55 percent contained. Crews fought the wildfire along Interstate 80 to the northeast of Sacramento in Placer County, California. Seven small fires started in the same area Wednesday and merged into the larger blaze along I-80. That prompted the closure of eastbound lanes on Interstate 80 on Wednesday as crews fought to tame the blaze, but all lanes have since been reopened.

No direct flights from Liberia, Sierra Leone and Guinea were arriving at JFK on Saturday, Port Authority officials said. All the passengers from those countries had connected on flights through European airports, including those in Paris and Brussels.

"Our Kmart store payment data systems were infected with a form of malware that was undetectable by current anti-virus systems," department store operator Sears Holdings, which owns retailers Kmart and Sears, said in a statement. There was no evidence that online customers at kmart.com had been affected, and the company gave no indication as to how many cards were compromised.

The director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said a "breach of protocol" caused a health care worker at a Dallas hospital to contract Ebola. The health care worker, a female nurse at Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital, had "extensive contact" on multiple occasions with Thomas Eric Duncan, the first person diagnosed with Ebola in the U.S., who died last week, Dr. Tom Frieden said in a press conference Sunday. The health care worker's case is the first known case of the disease being contracted or transmitted in the U.S. Frieden said the CDC is evaluating other health care workers who may have had the same breach of protocol as the nurse. Duncan arrived in Dallas in late September, realizing a long-held ambition to join relatives. He came to attend the high-school graduation of his son, who was born in a refugee camp in Ivory Coast and was brought to the U.S. as a toddler when the boy's mother successfully applied for resettlement.

Her family identified her as Nina Pham, 26. Pham contracted Ebola while treating Thomas Eric Duncan, the Liberian national who died on Wednesday, Oct. 8, ten days after being admitted to Texas Presbyterian Hospital. Disease detectives with the CDC have several times interviewed the Texas nurse who contracted Ebola and believe there are "inconsistencies" in the type of personal protective gear that she wore and with the process used to put the gear on and remove it, according to an official with direct knowledge of the situation. Health authorities will make daily visits to dozens of other Dallas healthcare workers who cared for Duncan. The workers have been monitoring their own health, including taking their own temperature.

Topic: AMENDMENT 2 FAILS IN FLORIDA

Although polls have found almost 90 percent public support for medical marijuana in Florida, a state measure that would have legalized cannabis for medicinal purposes failed on Tuesday. A majority of voters approved Amendment 2, about 57 percent, but state law requires a supermajority of support -- 60 percent or higher -- so the ballot initiative failed to pass. Amendment 2 would have legalized marijuana for medical purposes in Florida. The measure proposed allowing doctors to prescribe cannabis for debilitating medical conditions, which the bill defined as cancer, multiple sclerosis, glaucoma, hepatitis C, HIV, AIDS, ALS, Crohn's disease, Parkinson's disease or other conditions for which a physician believes that the medical use of marijuana would likely outweigh the potential health risks for a patient.

Voters on ballot initiatives in 41 states gave a resounding thumbs-up to recreational marijuana and higher minimum wages, while dividing on abortion-related measures and GMO labeling. Scores of measures that thickened ballot booklets from Alaska to Florida included a ban on bear baiting (overturned), immigrants IDs rejected and gun background checks (approved). In Colorado, voters rejected a proposal to add unborn human beings to the state's criminal code, a measure that some feared could ban abortion. And in North Dakota, voters rejected a right-to-life state constitutional amendment that abortion rights advocates feared would have ended legal abortions there. The North Dakota measure would have declared the inalienable right to life of every human being at every stage of development must be recognized and protected.

Latino activists and immigration reform advocates knew going into the midterms that 2014 wasn't the ideal election to punish Republicans for killing a path to citizenship for undocumented immigrants. The House was largely insulated from any serious challenge, few Senate races up for grabs had significant Latino voting populations, and turnout in off years tends to draw older, white, conservative voters. Even by that standard, however, Tuesday night was rough. Nationally, Democrats won 64% of Latino voters, according to exit polls - exactly halfway between their 60% level in 2010 and 68% in 2012. The numbers suggest the GOP still has major hurdles with one of the fastest-growing voting blocs in the nation, an issue that will loom large in 2016.
