### AIRDATE: October 1

#### **IMMIGRANT LAY-OFFS** Topic:

Synopsis: A clothing manufacturer with a vast garment factory in downtown Los Angeles is firing about 1,800 immigrant employees in the coming days - more than a guarter of its workforceafter a federal investigation turned up irregularities in the identity documents the workers presented when they were hired. The lay-offs at the American Apparel company have become a showcase for the Obama administration's effort to reduce illegal immigration by forcing employers to dismiss unauthorized workers rather than through workplace raids.

#### Topic: **CENSUS 2010**

Duration: 30 sec

Synopsis: U.S. Census Bureau Director Robert Groves joined prominent Latino groups, labor and faith leaders and leading national Spanish-language media partners today to outline a historic campaign to ensure a full and accurate 2010 Census count of the estimated 50 million Latinos living in the United States. Members of the coalition - called the "Ya es Hora !HAGASE CONTAR!" Campaign - previewed a series of public service announcements that will begin airing today on major Spanish language media.

### AIRDATE: October 2

#### Topic: MORE UNEMPLOYMENT Duration: 30 sec The unemployment rate has hit another 26-year-high. The Labor Department Synopsis: says 263-thousand jobs were lost last month, raising the unemployment rate to nine-point-eight percent. That's up one-tenth of a percent from August. Congress today is holding a joint economic committee meeting on the new numbers. Many economists have said there are signs the economy is growing again, but today's jobs report shows job losses could continue well into the recovery, limiting the strength of any economic turnaround.

#### Topic: **IMMIGRATION REFORM**

Duration: 30 sec Although President Obama has put off an immigration overhaul until next year, Svnopsis: the federal agency in charge of approving visas is planning ahead for the possibility of giving legal status to millions of illegal immigrants, the agency's director said Thursday. Obama has told immigration officials that a legalization program would be part of legislation the White House would propose, said Mr. Mayorkas, who became director in August. The agency's goal, he said, is to be ready to expand rapidly to handle the gigantic increase in visa applications it would face if the legislation, known as Comprehensive Immigration Reform, passed Congress.

### AIRDATE: October 3

Topic: **HEALTH REFORM / EMPLOYMENT** Duration: 30 sec Synopsis: Administration officials say President Barack Obama is looking at ways to ease the burdens of laid-off workers, including possible extension of unemployment and health benefits. With the jobless rate continuing to climb, the President said in his weekly radio and Internet address that he is exploring "additional options to promote job creation." Administration aides say the options include extending enhanced unemployment-insurance benefits beyond Dec. 31, when they are set to expire. Another option is to extend a tax credit for laid-off workers who buy health insurance through the COBRA program.

#### FLU VACCINE Topic:

The largest U.S. supplier of seasonal flu vaccines says it's running behind on Synopsis: shipping vaccine for the regular, seasonal flu partly because of the crunch to produce millions of doses of the swine flu vaccine. The pharmaceutical company Sanofi Pasteur says it has shipped more than half of the 50 million doses of seasonal flu vaccine ordered by U.S. health care providers. But the French company has sent notices to customers indicating that additional doses may be delayed. Company spokeswoman Donna Cary says it could be November before some customers get the rest of their orders.

PREGNANT WOMAN AND INFLUENZA Topic: Duration: 30 sec Synopsis: A national coalition of health care and information providers for pregnant women and children has an urgent message for pregnant women concerning influenza. The normal changes of pregnancy make pregnant women at increased risk of the harmful effects of flu infection. Pregnant women are at increased risk for serious disease and even death from pandemic H1N1 influenza infection. Pregnant women, who have flu-like symptoms such as fever, cough and sore throat should contact their pregnancy care provider immediately so that flu medications can be started and further instructions can be given by their provider. They may also begin treating their fever with acetaminophen.

### AIRDATE: October 4

#### **US VISA LOTTERY** Topic: Duration: 30 sec Each year, the Diversity Lottery (DV) Program makes 55,000 immigrant visas Synopsis: available through a lottery to people who come from countries with low rates of immigration to the United States. Of such visas, 5,000 are allocated for use under NACARA beginning with DV '99. The State Department (DOS) holds the lottery every year, and randomly selects approximately 110,000 applicants from all qualified entries.

Topic: FLU VACCINE Duration: 30 sec Days before the swine flu vaccine becomes available, more than half of U.S. Synopsis: adults say they will get the vaccine for themselves and 75 percent will get it for their children, according to a survey released Friday. The team at the Harvard School of Public Health found forty percent said they would not get the H1N1 vaccine. The survey conflicts with one published earlier this week by Consumer Reports showing only 35 percent of Americans would definitely have their children vaccinated. The Harvard researchers polled 1.042 U.S. adults for what they said was a representative sample of national opinion late last month.

### AIRDATE: October 5

#### Topic: H1N1 VACCINES

Synopsis: Vaccinations against the H1N1 swine flu virus began in the United States this week as part of the Obama administration's mass immunization effort to help limit the worst effects of the pandemic. The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention expects up to 7 million doses of vaccine by the end of this week, mainly AstraZeneca unit MedImmune's nasal spray. The U.S. government has ordered vaccine from five companies: Sanofi-Aventis SA, CSL Ltd. Novartis AG. GlaxoSmithKline and MedImmune.

Topic: **CENSUS AND IMMIGRATION RAIDS** Duration: 30 sec With the 2010 census six months away, the Commerce Department said Svnopsis: Thursday it won't seek a halt to raids as it did in the previous census in hopes of improving participation in hard-to-count communities. In a statement, the department said it is committed to an accurate count of U.S. residents, including both legal and illegal immigrants. Spokesman Nick Kimball said officials will not ask the Homeland Security Department to stop large-scale immigration raids during the high stakes count that begins April 1.

#### Topic: H1N1 VACCINE

Duration: 30 sec Synopsis: Vaccination against the H1N1 swine flu is off to a slow start in the United States, but states have ordered more than 2 million doses of mostly nasal spray for the first patients, a top health official said Tuesday. Dr. Thomas Frieden, director of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, told a news briefing every state has ordered a share of the pandemic vaccine.

MORE CASES OF AUTISM Topic: Duration: 30 sec Synopsis: Federal health officials say greater awareness and broader definitions in spotting autism in younger children may explain some of the increase in the proportion of children with disorders. Two new government studies indicate about 1 in 100 children have autism disorders, higher than a previous estimate of 1 in 150.

#### Airdate October 7

Topic: **HEALTH CARE POLL** Duration: 30 sec A new poll suggests public opinion on health care legislation is now an even split Synopsis: and a solid gain for Democrats after September results showed 49 percent opposed. The latest Associated Press-GfK poll has found that the opposition to Obama's health care remake dropped dramatically in just a matter of weeks. Still, Americans remain divided over the complex legislation. The poll finds the public is now split 40-40. In September, only 34 percent of those polled supported the effort. Anger about health care boiled over during August town hall meetings.

Topic: AIRLINES SURCHARGE Duration: 30 sec Flying around the holidays is already more expensive and could get more so. Synopsis: Several big airlines have added \$10 surcharges for busy days around the holidays. Last month airlines added a \$10 each-way surcharge for Nov. 29 (the Sunday after Thanksgiving) and Jan. 2 and 3. Now, FareCompare.com CEO Rick Seaney notes that the same airlines have added 10 more days: Nov. 30; Dec. 19, 26, and 27; March 14, 20, 21, 28; April 11; and May 28. He said the surcharges have been added by Delta Air Lines and Northwest. American Airlines, United Airlines, Continental Airlines and US Airways. Seaney said discounters such as Southwest and JetBlue appear to be avoiding the surcharges.

#### FLU/VACCINE Topic:

Duration: 30 sec Synopsis: U.S. Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius Wednesday sought to dispel fears about the H1N1 swine flu vaccine, declaring it safe and urging parents to take precautions against the pandemic. Sebelius was seeking to ease worries about the vaccine to target the new strain of influenza that is spreading around the world and she urged the public to visit flu.gov for more information. Sebelius said it was important to protect the more vulnerable population such as children and pregnant women from the H1N1 flu.

#### Topic: **IDENTITY THEFT RING BUST**

According to AP the FBI is making dozens of arrests in the U.S. and overseas to Synopsis: crack an identity theft ring that victimized thousands of people. Laura Eimiller, an FBI spokeswoman in Los Angeles, says agents are making arrests Wednesday morning in Southern California, Nevada, North Carolina and overseas. They allegedly used computer intrusion and fraud to obtain personal information that allowed them to withdraw money from bank accounts. In "phishing," people answering an e-mail are directed to a bogus Web site where they are asked to update personal information, such as passwords and account numbers.

#### YOUTH VIOLENCE EPIDEMIC Topic: Duration: 30 sec US Attorney General Eric Holder and Education Secretary Arne Duncan made a Synopsis: trip to Chicago to meet with city leaders to discuss youth violence in the wake of the beating death of 16-year-old Derrion Albert. Holder says youth violence is an American problem and not just a Chicago problem. He says the nation was shocked at the violence on the video that captured Albert's fatal beating.

#### Topic: SOCIAL SECURITY NO MATCH RULE

The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) today formally issued a final rule Synopsis: rescinding the Social Security "no match" rule. The "no match" rule, which was never implemented, would have forced employers to fire workers based on discrepancies in their Social Security records. DHS first announced its plan to rescind the rule in July, and with today's publication of a final rule in the Federal Register, the rescission will go into effect in 30 days.

#### Topic: **ARPAIO LOSES POWER**

Synopsis: Maricopa County Sheriff Joe Arpaio has lost the power to arrest a person solely because of his or her immigration status but said he will continue conducting crime suppression sweeps that target illegal immigrants. Arpaio said the federal government has stripped the Maricopa County Sheriff's Office of the power to enforce federal immigration law in the field. Instead, the sheriff plans to use a state law to arrest illegal immigrants.

HEALTH CARE REFORM LATEST Duration: 30 sec Topic: Despite a report from the Congressional Budget Office that the plan would Synopsis: reduce federal deficits by \$81 billion over a decade, Republicans aren't ready to count on any savings from the health reform measure emerging from the Senate Finance Committee. Senate GOP leader Mitch McConnell says Democrats are going to fatten up that bill as it proceeds through Congress. He predicts that it will "never see the light of day." According to the Congressional Budget Office report, Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid has announced that the Finance Committee will vote Tuesday on the proposal that would expand coverage to 94 percent of eligible Americans.

Topic: **BLOOMBERG ON IMMIGRATION** Duration: 30 sec Michael Bloomberg announces plan to support immigrants in the five boroughs. Svnopsis: The mayor's plan will ensure that immigrants can contribute fully to our economy and are integrated into civic life, that the children of immigrants are properly educated, and policies to protect immigrants from exploitation. Bloomberg today unveiled a plan to better protect and assist immigrants living in the five boroughs.

Topic: **CREDIT CARD REFORM** Duration: 30 sec Synopsis: Rep. Barney Frank says Congress should move up the enactment date of its credit card reform bill to Dec. 1 because banks are raising rates on customers. Last spring, Frank helped push a bill through Congress that imposes strict new rules on lenders, including a limitation on when and how banks hike rates. Most of the rules will take effect in mid-February, a date set by Congress to give banks time to prepare for the changes.

Topic: **UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS** Duration: 30 sec The House approved on Sept. 23 a bill that would extend benefits by up to 13 Synopsis: weeks for jobless workers living in 27 states, plus the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico, with unemployment rates of 8.5 percent or higher. A look at the states in the House measure as the Senate considers extending benefits to all 50 states.

Topic:MORE SWINE FLU CASESDuration: 30 secSynopsis:Health officials say swine flu activity is picking up, with 37 states now reportingwidespread cases.Officials with the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reportedFriday that the count is up from 27 states the previous week.The figures suggest a leveling off offlu activity the previous week may have been short-lived.Meanwhile, CDC officials say stateshave ordered 3.6 million doses of swine flu vaccine for a campaign that started this week.

Topic:FORECLOSURE AIDDuration: 30 secSynopsis:The Obama administration's mortgage relief program has hit its goal of helping500,000 borrowers, almost a month ahead of schedule.The government in July gave the lendingindustry a Nov. 1 deadline to meet that goal for the \$50 billion program, which is designed toreduce foreclosures by lowering borrowers' monthly payments to more affordable levels.The lenders hit the government's goal on Oct 6, officials said Thursday.

#### Airdate October 10

Topic:HEALTH CARE REFORM LATESTDuration: 30 secSynopsis:President Barack Obama said Saturday he's seeing "unprecedented consensus"behind overhauling health care, though he acknowledged continued partisan gridlock in<br/>Congress. "The historic movement to bring real, meaningful health insurance reform to the<br/>American people gathered momentum this week as we approach the final days of this debate,"<br/>Obama said Saturday in his weekly radio and Internet video address. The consensus "includes<br/>everyone from doctors and nurses to hospitals and drug manufacturers" -- even Republican<br/>governors and former GOP lawmakers, Obama said.

Topic: **OBAMA "DON'T ASK DON'T TELL"** Duration: 30 sec Synopsis: The climate for passing gay civil rights laws has never been better, but it could be a decade before another chance comes around, the highest-ranking openly gay official in the Obama administration said Friday. A House vote Thursday put Congress on the verge of significantly expanding hate crimes law to make it a federal crime to assault people because of their sexual orientation. Later this year, Congress is expected to hold hearings on a measure prohibiting workplace discrimination -- including decisions about hiring, firing and wages -- based on sexual orientation or gender identity.

Topic: BORDER FENCE

Synopsis: A provision that would set up another 300 miles of tall fencing along the U.S.-Mexico border has been stripped from an appropriations bill. A Texas congressman says it represented "an unproductive and inefficient border security strategy" that is "out of touch with border needs." Seven border state congressmen asked the House leadership in July to strip the amendment from the final bill. As of the end of June, there were about 633 miles of pedestrian and vehicle barriers along the U.S.-Mexico border, which runs 2,100 miles. Many of the gaps in the fencing are in Texas, where landowners continue to fight the government.

#### Airdate October 11

### Topic: GAY RIGHT

Synopsis: Thousands of gay rights supporters have marched from the White House to the Capitol. They demanded that President Barack Obama keep his promises to allow gays to serve openly in the military and to work to end discrimination against gays. Rainbow flags and homemade signs dotted the crowds filling Pennsylvania Avenue in front of the White House. Many children were also among the demonstrators. A few counter-protesters also joined the crowd.

#### VACCINES H1N1 Topic:

Synopsis: A top U.S. health official says the risks from not getting the swine flu vaccine are greater than any potential risks associated with the vaccine. Dr. Anne Schuchat of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says she's surprised by all the misinformation going around about the new vaccine. She says a good safety record from past vaccines bodes well for the swine flu vaccine now becoming available.

### Airdate October 12

**BILL TO RAISE INSURANCE** Topic: Duration: 30 sec The health insurance industry is striking back against the Senate's current plan Synopsis: for health care reform claiming that the plan will not only fail to reduce costs but will actually increase the cost of coverage for the privately-insured by thousands of dollars a year. Over the weekend America's Health Insurance Plans, an industry trade group, released to its members a PricewaterhouseCoopers analysis which projected that the current Senate legislation would cause premiums for families to increase by \$4000 by the year 2019.

Topic: **IMMIGRATION REFORM BILL PREVIEW** Duration: 30 sec Synopsis: Hispanic lawmakers in the House are writing an immigration reform bill that will outline the minority community's position before the debate begins in Congress. The House and Senate are not expected to take up comprehensive immigration reform until next year, but those involved in writing the bill say the legislation being prepared by Rep. Luis Gutierrez, D-III., will lay down a marker on what is expected. Members of the Congressional Hispanic Caucus are behind the effort to lay a legislative blueprint.

#### **CENSUS CITIES** Topic:

Duration: 30 sec Synopsis: With the 2010 census looming, major U.S. cities whose residents are at high risk of being missed are struggling with a shortage of money and manpower to prepare for an accurate count. A study by the Pew Charitable Trusts, released Monday, examined preparation efforts in 11 major cities. It found only five cities had committed public funds to census outreach --Los Angeles, New York, Houston, Phoenix and Baltimore.

Topic: **US SWINE FLU LATEST** Duration: 30 sec Synopsis: The rising swine flu death toll among children has reached disturbing heights. The H1N1 virus is blamed for the deaths of 19 children over the past week, a total of 76 overall, about the number which usually die in an entire flu season ending in May. The American Medical Association comes out with its own report focusing on two major themes: children, and how to handle a massive influx of patients if the virus runs out of control.

#### Topic: ECONOMY SURVEY

Duration: 30 sec Synopsis: The worst U.S. recession since the Great Depression has ended, but weak household spending as the labor market struggles to create jobs will slow the pace of the economy's recovery, according to a survey released Monday. The survey of 44 professional forecasters released by the National Association for Business Economics, also known as the NABE, found that 80 percent of the respondents believed the economy was growing again after four straight guarters of declines.

**HEALTHCARE/SENATE** Duration: 30 sec Topic: Synopsis: Now that the Senate Finance Committee has approved its version of healthcare reform legislation, Senate Democratic leaders will merge it with a more liberal bill passed earlier by the Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pensions Committee.

**IMMIGRATION REFORM** Topic: Duration: 30 sec Synopsis: Immigrants, workers, union leaders and advocates of progressive immigration reform from 10 cities nationwide converge at the U.S. Capitol on Tuesday to call for action in Congress. Activists will gather in the morning at the Church of the Reformation in D.C., and then proceed to Congress to speak to their representatives about supporting immigration reform.

#### Topic: **PROSTATE CANCER**

Duration: 30 sec Synopsis: U.S. researchers said that men who have less invasive prostate cancer surgery -- often done robotically -- are more likely to be incontinent and have erectile dysfunction than men who have conventional open surgery,.

#### **DIABETES STUDY** Topic:

Duration: 30 sec Synopsis: People who live in neighborhoods with safe sidewalks, ample parks, good public transportation and ready access to fresh fruits and vegetables are 38 percent less likely to develop diabetes than others, U.S. researchers said Monday. They said unlike a lot of other factors that influence Diabetes, creating a healthy neighborhood is one thing policymakers can do to address the epidemic of diabetes, which costs the United States more than \$116 billion in medical expenses each year.

### Airdate October 14

#### Topic: **CENSUS 2010** Duration: 30 sec Synopsis: The Commerce Department and Census Bureau declared Tuesday that an amendment by Sen. David Vitter, R-La., to require the 2010 census to ask all persons their citizenship and immigration status would scuttle any chance that the census could be done on time and would cost taxpayers hundreds of millions of dollars.

#### Topic: SWINE FLU LATEST

Vaccine maker Sanofi Pasteur said test results of its swine flu vaccine suggest Synopsis: that children under 10 may need two shots to be fully protected. The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said the news is not surprising, since this age group needs two doses of regular seasonal flu vaccine for full immunity to develop.

#### Topic: **BEEF RECALL**

Duration: 30 sec The Department of Agriculture's Food Safety and Inspection Service said that no Synopsis: illnesses have been reported from the products sold by San Diego Meat Co. The recall applies to 15-pound cases of ground beef patties and 10-pound bags of bulk ground beef produced between Oct. 7 and Oct. 12 and sold to San Diego County-area caterers and restaurants.

#### Topic: **NEW IMMIGRATION RULE**

Synopsis: A federal judge has ruled that adult children who turn 21 while waiting for familysponsored green cards have to wait anew once they "age out" of their parents' applications. U.S. District Judge James Selna ruled in Los Angeles against a group of immigrants with green cards who sued the federal government, arguing a 2002 law means grown children should be allowed into the country when their parents file new paperwork on their behalf.

#### Topic: FORD RECALL

Duration: 30 sec Synopsis: Ford Motor Co is expanding its largest ever recall -- involving faulty cruise control deactivation switches that have caused fires -- by 4.5 million vehicles, regulators and company officials said Tuesday. The action effectively closes out a 10-year saga over the switches made by Texas Instruments that has led to more than a half-dozen recalls at Ford covering 14 million registered vehicles, the automaker said in a letter to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA).

#### Airdate October 15

#### Topic: MORE FORECLOSURES

Duration: 30 sec U.S. foreclosure filings climbed to a record in the third guarter as lenders seized Synopsis: more properties from delinquent borrowers, according to RealtyTrac Inc. A total of 937,840 homes received a default or auction notice or were repossessed by banks, a 23 percent increase from a year earlier, the Irvine, California-based seller of default data said today in a report. One out of every 136 U.S. households received a filing, the highest quarterly rate in records dating to January 2005.

CIGARETTE FEDERAL LAW "LIGHT" Topic: Duration: 30 sec Synopsis: The National Cancer Institute states that smokers will compensate for the lower level of nicotine in light cigarettes by inhaling more deeply, taking larger, more rapid, or more frequent puffs, and smoke extra cigarettes each day. The National Cancer Institute also states that, "researchers also found that the strategies used by the tobacco industry to advertise and promote light cigarettes are intended to reassure smokers, to discourage them from quitting, and to lead consumers to perceive filtered and light cigarettes as safer alternatives to regular cigarettes."

Topic: **TYLENOL AND VACCINES** Duration: 30 sec A new study suggests that giving babies Tylenol to prevent fever when they get Synopsis: vaccinated may make the shots a little less effective. It's the first major study to tie reduced immunity to the use of fever-lowering medicines. The study only looked at preventive use of Tylenol -- not whether it is OK to use after a fever develops. The effect was small and the vast majority of kids still got enough protection from vaccines. But doctors at the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention say the results make "a compelling case" against routinely giving Tylenol right after a shot.

### Airdate October 16

Topic: **IMMIGRATION ENFORCEMENT** Duration: 30 sec Synopsis: The Homeland Security Department says it has completed agreements with 55 state and law enforcement agencies to help arrest and deport immigration violators. But one of those agreements would limit Maricopa County, Ariz., Sheriff Joe Arpaio and his deputies to checking only the immigration status of jail inmates. Arpaio is the subject of a Justice Department investigation triggered by complaints of racial profiling.

#### Topic: **INFLUENZA LATEST**

#### Duration: 30 sec

Synopsis: The swine flu is causing an unprecedented amount of illness so early in the fall -and federal health officials said Friday that 11 more children have died in the past week. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says about half of the child deaths since September have been among teenagers. And overall for the country, deaths from pneumonia and flu-like illnesses have passed what CDC considers an epidemic level. About 6 percent of all doctor visits are for flu-like illnesses, levels not normally seen until later in the fall. Also the vaccination has been slow because of production of time frame.

#### Topic: **ARPAIO: MORE RAIDS**

Duration: 30 sec Maricopa County Sheriff Joe Arpaio has launched a crime and immigration Synopsis: sweep in the Phoenix area, less than a day after officials in Washington limited his powers to make federal immigration arrests. The federal government stripped the controversial Arpaio of his power to let 100 deputies make such arrests but renewed another deal that lets 60 jails officers determine the immigration status of people in jail. The sweeps Friday in some heavily Latino areas have drawn criticism that Arpaio's deputies racially profile people, a charge that the sheriff denies. Arpaio says his deputies can still detain illegal immigrants as long as they are turned over to federal authorities within a day or two.

### Airdate October 17

Topic: **OBAMA HEALTH** Duration: 30 sec Synopsis: Top White House advisers Valerie Jarrett and David Axelrod are saying President Barack Obama still believes a government-run health care option would best meet his reform goals. But they say he's not demanding that it be in the overhaul legislation. The White House and lawmakers are trying to blend five versions of health care legislation into something that will pass Congress.

Topic: **DEATH FROM INFLUENZA** Duration: 30 sec Synopsis: Hospitals, churches, firehouses and even taxi companies are loading up on hand sanitizer, changing behavior and taking other steps to prevent the spread of swine flu. Bottles of hand sanitizer are within sight of passengers in all 16 taxis operated by Yellow Cab of Iowa City. When people filed into Church of Our Saviour on Sunday in Cocoa Beach, Fla., they bumped fists with priest Sean Heslin instead of shaking hands. Many workplaces and other spots where people gather urge hand-sanitizer use and frequent hand washing.

Synopsis: Crime in Los Angeles County dropped again in 2009 despite rising unemployment and the bad economy, continuing a slide that has pushed homicides to levels not seen since the 1960s. Killings dropped about 17% in Los Angeles and by nearly a quarter in areas patrolled by the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department. Together, the agencies investigated about 500 killings through Sunday -- a sharp drop in bloodshed compared with the more than 1,500 in 1992, the year of the Los Angeles riots.

disease risk. However, studies measure socioeconomic status in various ways -- by people's education or current job or current family income, for instance -- and it is not clear whether all of those factors are equally important.

A day after saying the system worked, Napolitano said her words had been taken out of context.

#### Topic: RETAIL SALES GO UP

Synopsis: Stocks edged higher in early trading Monday as investors returning from a long holiday weekend were heartened by good news on retail sales. Shares of major retailers rose after data showed shoppers opened their wallets more this holiday season, a good sign that consumers are feeling better about the economy. Consumer spending is one of the biggest drivers of economic growth and is vital to a sustained recovery.

Synopsis: An Oklahoma company is voluntarily recalling about 248,000 pounds of beef. Officials with National Steak and Poultry say the beef products may be related to an outbreak of illnesses related to e-coli. The USDA's food safety and inspection service found out about the potential problem while investigating a cluster of illnesses connected to non-intact steaks in the following states: Michigan, Colorado, Iowa, Kansas, South Dakota and Washington.

### Topic: OBAMA SPEECH ON TERRORIST PLOT

Synopsis: A wing of al Qaeda claimed responsibility for a failed Christmas Day attack on a U.S.bound passenger plane, and President Barack Obama vowed to bring "every element" of U.S. power against those who threaten Americans' safety. Speaking during a vacation in Hawaii, Obama said, "We will not rest until we find all who were involved and hold them accountable." "We will continue to use every element of our national power to disrupt, to dismantle and defeat the violent extremists who threaten us..." Obama added.

#### Duration: 30 seconds Topic: **NEW YORK LOW CRIME RATE**

Synopsis: This year has been the safest in New York City in more than four decades, with the murder rate down to levels not seen since the early 1960s, police said Monday. As of Sunday, 461 murders had been committed, down from 516 in 2008 and the lowest number since comparable record-keeping began in 1963, the New York Police Department said. The FBI also said New York was the safest U.S. big city in 2009. Crime in New York has been falling for several years in a decline widely attributed to a "broken windows" strategy of no tolerance for even the smallest infraction.

Synopsis: The immigration debate takes a technological turn with a new cell phone device that helps illegal immigrants crossing the desert into the U.S. find water. Both believe it will save the lives of hundreds of people who die each year during their trek across "Devil's Highway."

# Topic: TYLENOL RECALL

Synopsis: A voluntary recall of Tylenol Arthritis Pain Caplets is being expanded because of consumer reports of an unusual moldy odor with the 100-count bottles, the U.S. Food and Drug administration said. The FDA and Johnson & Johnson were expanding the recall to all available product lots of the pain caplets with the distinctive red EZ-open cap. Health effects of the compound have not been well studied, but the events reported to the company have been temporary and not serious.

# Topic: CONSUMER CONFIDENCE RISES

Synopsis: A more upbeat outlook on jobs pushed Americans' confidence in the economy higher in December for the second month in a row, a survey said. Consumers' expectations for the job market over the next six months reached their highest level in two years, but Americans remain gloomy about their current prospects. The Conference Board said its Consumer Confidence Index rose to 52.9, up from a revised 50.6 in November, but the reading is still far short of the 90 that would signify a solid economy.

#### Duration: 30 seconds Topic: **AIRPORT SCREENING**

Synopsis: Privacy concerns are helping thwart large-scale use of high-tech scanners that might have spotted the would-be plane bomber Christmas Day. Full-body scanners show great detail, including body contours, but critics say they amount to a virtual strip-search. In June, the House voted overwhelmingly to prohibit the use of whole-body imaging for primary screening. They're currently used for primary screening at six airports, and for secondary screening at 13 more. Supporters say such scanners provide the best protection for the widest range of threats.

#### Duration: 30 seconds Topic: H1N1 PANDEMIC

Synopsis: The H1N1 flu pandemic may not be conquered until 2011 and continued vigilance is required against the virus which can still mutate, the head of the World Health Organization said. WHO Director-General Margaret Chan also warned that although countries have shored up their defenses against the first influenza pandemic in more than 40 years, they remain ill-prepared for mass outbreaks of the deadlier bird flu virus.

# Topic: NEW IMMIGRATION POLL

Synopsis: In contrast to many national religious leaders who are lobbying for increases in immigration, a new Zogby poll of likely voters who belong to the same religious communities finds strong support for reducing overall immigration. Moreover, members strongly disagree with their leaders' contention that more immigrant workers need to be allowed into the country. Also, most parishioners and congregants prefer more enforcement to cause illegal workers to go home, rather than legalization of illegal immigrants, which most religious leaders prefer.

# Topic: HOME PRICES RISE

Synopsis: Home prices rise for the fifth month in a row in October, but the recovery continues to be uneven with only 11 of the 20 metros tracked showing gains. The Standard & Poor's/Case-Shiller home price index released Tuesday edged up 0.4% to a seasonally adjusted reading of 145.36 in October. The index was off 7.3% from October last year. Eleven of the 20 cities posted month-over-month gains with San Francisco and Detroit posting the largest increases.

# Topic: GM DISCOUNTS

Synopsis: General Motors Co. is offering deep discounts on its remaining Saturn and Pontiac vehicles as it looks to move the leftover inventory of the soon-to-be-dead brands, according to a published report. The automaker will pay dealers \$7,000 for every new Saturn or Pontiac left on their lot if the vehicle is moved to dealer-operated rental or service fleets, according to The Wall Street Journal, which cited a letter mailed to dealers.

# Topic: OBAMA ON TERRORIST ATACK

Synopsis: President Barack Obama said Tuesday that the intelligence community had bits of information that should have been pieced together and that would have triggered "red flags" and possibly prevented the Christmas Day attempted terror attack on a Detroit-bound airliner. "There was a mix of human and systemic failures that contributed to this potential catastrophic breach of security," Obama said. Officials said Obama chose to make a second statement in as many days because a morning briefing offered him new information in the government's possession about the suspect's activities and thinking, along with al-Qaida's plans.

# Topic: NEW LICENSE MEASURES IN FLORIDA

Synopsis: Starting Jan. 1, Florida drivers will need more proof of identity in order to apply for a new driver's license or state-issued ID card. Drivers will have to prove their identification, with documents such as an original birth certificate or valid passport; their Social Security number, with the card itself or a pay stub or W-2 form; and their residency, with two forms of identification, such as a voter registration card or an electric bill. The changes are a result of a federal law known as Real ID, which Congress passed in 2005 partly in response to the Sept. 11 attacks and concerns that drivers' licenses were too easy to get.

# Topic: US HAD INFORMATION PREVIOUS TO FAILED TERRORIST ATTACK

Synopsis: President Barack Obama says the intelligence community had information that it should have pieced together before the Christmas Day attempted terror attack on a Detroit-bound airliner. Obama says the security system failed to connect the dots. He's due an early report from his homeland security and counterterrorism adviser tomorrow on how a man with suspected ties to al-Qaida was able to board the Northwest Airlines flight with explosives.

# Topic: NEW FLORIDA ID REGULATIONS

Synopsis: Starting Jan. 1, Florida drivers will have to meet beefed-up identity-verification requirements in order to renew their driver's license or obtain a new one. If you are renewing, you are allowed a ``convenience'' renewal by mail or via the Internet between office visits. Old driver's license will no longer be accepted as a primary proof of identity.

# Topic: POSSIBLE FIRST CASE OF ANTHRAX

Synopsis: Health experts suspect a rare gastrointestinal anthrax case may be linked to a recent drumming circle in New Hampshire. A woman who was stricken with the potentially fatal illness may have swallowed spores released into the air during a drumming exhibition she attended Dec. 4 at the United Campus Ministry center in Durham.

#### Topic: CENSUS 2010

Synopsis: As the U.S. Census Bureau gears up to make an actual count of the U.S. population on April 1, it estimates that the final figure will be 308,400, 408, representing an increase of 0.9% over 2009. The bureau says one birth is expected to occur every eight seconds in the United States and one death every 12 seconds. Net international migrations add one person every 37 seconds to the U.S. population. By combining those figures, the bureau estimates that the population grows by one person every 14 seconds.

## Topic: WHITE HOUSE IMMIGRATION REFORM

Synopsis: With the healthcare battle still unfinished, the Obama administration has been laying plans to take up an issue that could prove even more divisive -- a major overhaul of the nation's immigration system. Senior White House aides privately have assured Latino activists that the president will back legislation next year to provide a path to citizenship for the estimated 12 million illegal immigrants living in the United States.

### Topic: SWINE FLU NOT AS CATCHY

Synopsis: H1N1 swine flu is less catchy than previous pandemic flu bugs, a household study finds. The study looked at 216 two- to six-person households in which one family member came down with a confirmed case of 2009 H1N1 swine flu. Only 13% of family members caught the flu from the infected person. Strikingly, children aged 18 or younger were twice as likely to catch H1N1 swine flu from an infected family member as were family members aged 19 to 50. And people over 50 were about 80% less likely to catch the flu as were younger adults.

### Topic: NEW YORK CITY MARKS FEWER CRIME

Synopsis: Calling a sharp drop in overall violence throughout America's most populous city "one for the record books," New York Mayor Michael Bloomberg announced that 2009 saw historic crime-rate declines across the city's five boroughs. According to the mayor's office, there have been 461 homicides to date in 2009. That number is down nearly 11% from the same time a year

ago, with 516 murders recorded in 2008. Bloomberg said 2009 is on track to have the fewest murders in New York City's history since reliable recordkeeping began in 1963.

Topic: **NY TIMES: GOVERNMENT HAD WARNING ON THE FAILED TERRORIST ATTACK** Synopsis: New York Times reports that two officials said the government had intelligence from Yemen before Friday that leaders of a branch of Al Qaeda were talking about "a Nigerian" being prepared for a terrorist attack. While the attacker was not named, officials said it would have been evident had it been compared to information about the 23-year-old Nigerian charged with trying to blow up an American passenger jet on Christmas Day.

### Topic: IMMIGRATION 2009

Synopsis: Immigration prosecution rose to record levels in 2009 as the Obama administration kept up aggressive enforcement that began under President George W. Bush. Nearly 27,000 people faced serious federal charges relating to immigration in 2009, according to Chief Justice John Roberts' annual year-end report on the judiciary. More than three-fourths were accused of illegally re-entering the United States after having previously been sent home. Immigration cases increased by about a fifth over the previous year and made up a third of all new criminal filings in U.S. district courts in the government spending year that ended Sept. 30. The statistics were compiled by the Administrative Office of the U.S. Courts.

# Topic: OBAMA PRELIMINARY REPORT ON SECURITY

Synopsis: President Barack Obama is to receive a preliminary report Thursday on how a 23-yearold Nigerian with suspected terrorist ties managed to board a plane he is accused of attempting to bomb on Christmas Day, along with recommendations on how to prevent a sequel. The report is just the first step in what is shaping up to be an Obama-led effort to change the nation's intelligence practices after an attack that failed not because of U.S. anti-terrorism policies, but despite them. Administration officials said the system to protect the nation's skies from terrorists was deeply flawed and, even then the government failed to follow its own directives.

### Topic: NEBRASKA HEALTHCARE

Synopsis: Republican attorneys general in 13 states say congressional leaders must remove Nebraska's political deal from the federal health care reform bill or face legal action, according to a letter provided to The Associated Press Wednesday.
