Topic: Economy manufacturing

Synopsis: A trade group's measure of the health of the manufacturing sector contracted for the 14th straight month in March. And while the pace of decline was slower than expected, any pickup in jobs is still highly unlikely before next year. The Institute for Supply Management said Wednesday its Manufacturing index rose to 36.3 last month from 35.8 in February. Economists surveyed by Thomson Reuters expected the index to rise to 36.

Topic: Auto sales

Synopsis: March proved to be another dismal month of steep declines for U.S. auto sales as low consumer confidence and job uncertainty continued to keep buyers away from showrooms, but the improvement from February signaled that bargain-hunting buyers may be providing the momentum for a turnaround. Automakers sold 857,735 light vehicles last month, a 37 percent decline from a year earlier, according to Autodata Inc.

Topic: Stimulus Education

Synopsis: States are getting the first round of school dollars from the economic stimulus law this week. The Obama administration is making available half of the dollars for federal programs that fund kindergarten through 12th grade and special education.

Topic: Sleep and suicide risk

Synopsis: People who suffer chronic sleep problems are more likely to think about suicide or actually try to kill themselves, researchers said on Wednesday. The more types of sleep disturbances a person had -- such as waking up too early, difficulty falling asleep or lying awake at night -- upped the odds of suicidal thoughts, planning a suicide, or attempting it, researchers told a conference.

Topic: House, Senate poised to adopt pared-back budget Synopsis: Democrats in the House and Senate are on track to give President Barack Obama a key victory by adopting slightly pared-back versions of his \$3.6 trillion budget. Both versions are expected to pass today. Meanwhile, Republicans in both chambers are putting forward alternatives that are more generous with tax cuts and stingier with spending. None of the plans -- Obama's, House and Senate Democrats', or the competing GOP outlines -- would succeed in tamping down the deficit much below \$500 billion within five years. Also, the budget blueprints provide little guidance on how to craft subsequent Obama initiatives to reshape the U.S. health care system or combat global warming.

Topic: ACLU Vs. ICE

Synopsis: Federal authorities are violating immigrant detainees' constitutional rights by holding them for weeks at a detention facility in downtown Los Angeles that was designed as a short-term processing center, according to a lawsuit filed in U.S. District Court. The center is "regularly overcrowded, causing violence, safety hazards, and humiliation," while detainees are denied access to attorneys and courts and are rarely provided drinking water or a change of clothing, according to the lawsuit filed Wednesday by the American Civil Liberties Union of Southern California and the National Immigration Law Center.

Topic: World Autism day

Synopsis: World Autism Awareness Day - designated by the United Nations as Tuesday, April 2 - winds down, the spotlight is on why the disorder is on the increase, why the causes still elude researchers, and why early diagnosis is so important.

Topic: Job losses

Synopsis: On Friday, the Labor Department released more grim news: Another 663,000 jobs disappeared last month. That sent the unemployment rate up to 8.5 percent. This recession has been especially hard on people who work in factories. Since the recession began in December 2007, U.S. companies have wiped out 1.5 million manufacturing jobs. Yet the U.S. remains by far the world's leading manufacturer, as measured by value of goods produced

Topic: Jobless rate bolts to 8.5 percent, 663K jobs lost

Synopsis: The nation's unemployment rate jumped to 8.5 percent in March, the highest since late 1983, as a wide swath of employers eliminated 663,000 jobs. It's fresh evidence of the toll the recession has inflicted on America's workers, and economists say there's no relief in sight. If part-time and discouraged workers are factored in, the unemployment rate would have been 15.6 percent in March, the highest on records dating to 1994, according to Labor Department data released Friday. The average work week in March dropped to 33.2 hours, a new record low. Since the recession began in December 2007, the economy has lost a net total of 5.1 million jobs, with almost two-thirds of the losses occurring in the last five months.

Topic: Iowa Supreme Court same sex ruling

Synopsis: Gay rights activists are celebrating after Iowa's Supreme Court struck down the state's ban on same-sex marriage. The court has ruled that the ban violates the state's constitution and doesn't further government interests. The conservative Iowa Family Policy Center is dismayed at the ruling, saying "the mood is one of mourning right now." The case began in 2005 when New York-based gay rights organization Lambda Legal filed a lawsuit on behalf of six gay Iowa couples who were denied marriage licenses.

Topic: Obama economy

Synopsis: President Barack Obama says a new report on unemployment in the United States is a "stark reminder" of the global challenges created by the economic crisis. Obama spoke about the U.S. jobless picture from Baden-Baden, Germany, where he met Friday with German Chancellor Angela Merkel ahead of a NATO onference in the German resort town. Speaking about the sliding economy and the loss of jobs in the U.S., Obama said no nation can isolate itself from the global market. He said that without concerted and united global action, there will be "collective failure."

Topic: Americans to visit relatives in Cuba

Synopsis: The Obama administration intends to allow Americans to visit relatives in Cuba and send money back to their families on the communist island nation, senior U.S. officials said Saturday. President Barack Obama plans to announce the policy change before the Summit of the Americas April 17-19 in Trinidad and Tobago, according to the officials, who spoke on condition of anonymity because the announcement had not been made. Although some restrictions have been eased temporarily in legislation Obama signed last month,

lifting the bans would meet a pledge he made during the presidential campaign and could signal a new openness with Cuba.

Topic: Fed Ex Job Cuts

Synopsis: FedEx lays off one-thousand employees Friday. The cuts were announced after third-quarter earnings dropped seventy-five percent.

Topic: Border security

Synopsis: Homeland Security Secretary, Janet Napolitano and U.S. Attorney General Eric Holder met with Mexico President Felipe Calderon and members of his Cabinet, wrapping up a series of meetings on drug violence in the two countries. Among the strategies under consideration are: Changes to extradition laws in both countries to ensure that offenders get the greatest punishment possible, how to better coordinate efforts by the Mexican navy and the U.S. Coast Guard to intercept offshore smugglers, sharing surveillance data to better identify motor vehicles and railroad cars that might be smuggling drugs, weapons or bulk quantities of currency and allowing top Mexican law enforcement officials to work alongside U.S. authorities investigating stateside activites of the drug cartels.

Topic: Obama and Cuba latest

Synopsis: The Wall Street Journal is reporting that President Barack Obama intends to lift the U.S. ban on family members traveling to Cuba. The report says Obama does not intend to call for lifting the decades-long trade embargo against Cuba, which would require congressional approval.

Topic: Walt Disney layoffs

Synopsis: The news is not good for the employees of Walt Disney as the organization is going for job cuts. Now the situation is getting worse for the employees as the recession is taking a toll on all sectors and all of the sectors are feeling the heat.

Topic: More men losing jobs

Synopsis: Women are holding onto their jobs more than their male counterparts in the recession as the types of jobs women hold generally offer more stability, albeit at less pay. In the year since the recession began in December 2007, the jobless rate for men rose from 4.4% to 7.2%. At the same time, the jobless rate for women rose from 4.3% to 5.9%.

Topic: Unemployment latest

Synopsis: In the 12 months through February, the latest data available, unemployment rates for men rose at a faster pace than those for women, no matter what their education or age. It has simply been harder for men to hold onto their jobs. A year ago, in February 2008, men who had gone to college but did not earn a bachelor's degree had an unemployment rate of 4.1 percent, below the national rate of 4.5 percent. But by this February, the rate for that group had more than doubled to 8.9 percent and was well above the national rate of 8.1 percent. For women with the same education, the rate a year ago was an identical 4.1 percent. That figure has also risen, but only to 6.3 percent.

Topic: **Obama in nuclear ambitions**

Synopsis: President Barack Obama is now in Turkey, where he'll be asking its leaders for help in turning around the war in Afghanistan and blocking Iran's nuclear ambitions. He'll also point to Turkey's role in the U.S. departure from Iraq. Air Force One landed today in Ankara, where the president was greeted by U.S. diplomatic staff and the Turkish economy minister. Obama travels to Istanbul tomorrow. Small groups of protesters gathered in both Ankara and Istanbul to object to various U.S. policies. In a main Istanbul square, members of a leftist group waved Turkish flags and shouted "Obama, go home!"

Topic: Metropolitan Area unemployment

Synopsis: Unemployment rates rose in all of the nation's largest metropolitan areas for the second straight month in February. The U.S. Labor Department reported Wednesday all 372 metropolitan areas tracked saw their jobless rates rise in February from a year earlier. The U.S. unemployment rate rose to 8.1 percent in February, the highest in more than 25 years.

Topic: Cancer Breast Mammograms

Synopsis: Women who believe mammograms will save their lives may be overestimating the benefits, two experts said in what is sure to be a Controversial report published Wednesday. They said fewer than 5 percent of all women whose breast tumors can be detected through screening actually have their lives saved by a mammogram. The American Cancer Society disputed these figures and said the number was 15 percent.

Topic: Bailout Plan Geithner and Mortgage scams

The Treasury secretary is warning banks that if they come to the government expecting a bailout, they may have to shake up their boardrooms. On CBS' "Face the Nation," Timothy Geithner said banks that seek "exceptional assistance" will have to undergo restructuring to help them emerge stronger. Top federal and state officials announced a broad crackdown on mortgage modification scams, accusing "criminal actors" of preying on desperate borrowers caught up in the nation's housing crisis. Government officials say scammers are seeking to take advantage of borrowers in danger of default. The frauds often involve companies with official-sounding names designed to make borrowers think they are taking advantage of the Obama administration's efforts to help modify or refinance 7 to 9 million mortgages.

The Walt Disney Co. has eliminated 1,900 jobs since Feb. 18 in its backstage operations in Orlando and California, the company confirmed. Of that total, 1,400 of the positions were in Central Florida. The company laid off 900 workers and eliminated 500 positions, the company said. In California, 200 workers lost their jobs and the company eliminated 100 positions, Disney said. The job cuts are related to an overhaul of Disney's theme-park management structure the company announced Feb. 18. The jobs were all executive, management and professional positions, the company said.

Topic: Immigration Drop House

Arizona's Department of Public Safety raided a drop house in Glendale. Authorities say a number of illegal immigrants have been detained and seven suspects are in custody. D-P-S says the people found at the house were subjected to threats with handguns, rape and electrocution.

A new study suggests almost one in five 4-year-olds in the U.S. is obese. Even more startling, the rate among American-Indians is nearly one in three. The Ohio State-Temple University study suggests obesity is also more common in Hispanic and African American youngsters. The lead author on the study says the magnitude of differences is larger than expected. Sarah Anderson says it's surprising to see differences by racial groups so early in childhood.

Topic: IMMIGRATION-LATINOS

Synopsis: Hispanics made up nearly half of the more than 1 million people who became U.S. citizens last year, according to a Hispanic advocacy group. The National Association of Latino Elected and Appointed Officials said the number of Latinos who became Americans in fiscal year 2008 more than doubled over the previous year, to 461,317. That's nearly half of the record 1,046,539 new citizens overall in 2008, a 58 percent increase from 2007.

Topic: HISPANICS-POLICE

Synopsis: A new survey suggests that a lot of Hispanics don't have much faith that they'll get fair treatment from police or the legal system. The Pew Hispanic Center finds that only 46 percent of Hispanics surveyed were confident police would treat them fairly compared to other racial or other ethnic groups. That was much lower than white respondents but higher than blacks, only 37 percent of whom thought they'd get fair treatment.

Topic: GAY MARRIAGE-VERMONT

Synopsis: Vermont has become the fourth state to legalize gay marriage -and the first to do so with a legislature's vote. The Legislature voted Tuesday to override Gov. Jim Douglas' veto of a bill allowing gays and lesbians to marry. The vote was 23-5 to override in the state Senate and 100-49 to override in the House.

Topic: **BIRDFLU-TEST**

Synopsis: The U.S. Food and Drug Administration said Tuesday it had approved a fast test for H5N1 bird flu that can show in less than an hour if people are infected. The test should greatly speed up diagnosis and treatment of people infected with avian influenza, the FDA said.

Topic: SALMONELLA-RECALLS

Synopsis: Setton Pistachio expanded its voluntary recall of pistachios to include all roasted shell pistachios and in-shell pistachios due to possible salmonella contamination, the Terra Bella, California, company said on Monday. The withdrawal from its 2008 crop also would include raw shell pistachios that are not subsequently roasted before sale, the second-largest pistachio processor in the United States said in a statement.

Topic: DIET CHANGE AND DIABETES

Synopsis: Eating less sugar and more fiber can reduce the risk of diabetes in overweight Latino adolescents, new research shows. Furthermore, according to findings in the Archives of Pediatrics and Adolescent Medicine, elaborate programs may not be necessary to promote these dietary changes.

Topic: DREAM ACT CAMPAIGN

Synopsis: This week starts the National Dream Act Campaign. The federal DREAM Act will provide undocumented immigrant youth in the United States with conditional residency and a pathway to citizenship provided they came here before the age of 16 and maintained continuous residence for 5 years, graduate from high school or obtain a GED, attend 2 years of college or join the military and have no criminal records.

Topic: AIDS AWARENESS CAMPAIGN

Synopsis: The Obama administration announces a new campaign to refocus national attention on the HIV crisis in the United States, the first national CDC HIV/AIDS communication campaign in more than a decade.

Topic: WAIST SIZE, BODY MASS & HEART FAILURE

Synopsis: Adding to the growing evidence that a person's waist size is an important indicator of heart health, a study led by investigators at Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center (BIDMC) has found that larger waist circumference is associated with increased risk of heart failure in middle-aged and older populations of men and women. The findings, published online in the April 7 Rapid Access Report of the journal *Circulation: Heart Failure*, showed that increased waist size was a predictor of heart failure even when measurements of body mass index (BMI) fell within the normal range.

Topic: **PISTACHIOS RECALL**

Synopsis: The U.S. recall of pistachio nuts due to potential salmonella contamination widened on Wednesday as more snack makers and retailers removed products from store shelves as a precaution. PepsiCo Inc's North American snack division Frito-Lay recalled its unshelled pistachios in 1.75 ounce packages with sell-by dates between July 14, 2009 and Dec. 29, 2009. The company said it had not received any reports of illness related to the product, but was recalling it as a precaution.

Topic: OBAMA IMMIGRATION

Synopsis: President Barack Obama plans to start addressing the thorny issue of immigration reform this year, including the search for a path to legalize the status of millions of illegal immigrants, The New York Times reported Wednesday, quoting a presidential aide. Obama will speak publicly about the matter in May and bring together working groups including Democratic and Republican lawmakers over the summer to begin discussing possible legislation for as early as the fall, administration officials told the Times.

Synopsis: The hammer is about to fall on thousands of New York City workers' jobs. Mayor Michael Bloomberg, actively seeking a third term to run the City, sent letters to city agencies. Bloomberg gave agency heads until Monday (04/13) to make what he says are needed cuts.

Topic: SUGARY DRINKS AND WEIGHT LOSS

Synopsis: When it comes to losing weight, what you drink may be more important than what you eat, according to new research; it shows that cutting back on sugar-laden drinks is associated with weight loss and seems to have a bigger impact on weight than cutting back on solid foods. "Consumption of liquid calories from beverages has increased in parallel with the obesity epidemic in the US population," Dr. Benjamin Caballero of Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health and colleagues point out in the American Journal of Clinical Nutrition.

Topic: OBAMA ECONOMY

Synopsis: President Barack Obama says the economy is starting to show "glimmers of hope." Obama commented Friday after meeting with members of his economic team, including Treasury Secretary Timothy Geithner, economics adviser Larry Summers and Christina Romer, chairman of the White House Council of Economic Advisers. Obama said he's starting to see things get better. But at the same time he cautioned that the economy remains under "severe stress."

Synopsis: A Boston hospital has performed the nation's second face transplant on a man who suffered traumatic facial injuries from a fall. The hospital would not identify the donor or the recipient, but plans a news conference Friday afternoon. The first U.S. face transplant was done in December by doctors at Cleveland Clinic who replaced 80 percent of a woman's face with that of a female cadaver. The woman's identity has not been revealed, nor the circumstances that led to the transplant, except that her injury occurred several years ago.

Topic: **TB SCARE IL**

Synopsis: Hundreds of patients and staff at three Chicago-area hospitals may have been exposed to tuberculosis by a contagious health care worker, officials said Friday. About 300 staff and 150 patients may have been exposed at Children's Memorial Hospital, said Dr. Stan Shulman, the hospital's chief of pediatric infectious disease.

Topic: OBAMA ON ECONOMY

Synopsis: President Barack Obama says nations must confront global challenges like the financial meltdown and climate change together. Obama invoked Christian and Jewish holidays today as he used his radio and Internet address to ask Americans -- and a global audience -- to focus on areas of common interest instead of differences. Obama says Easter and Passover "are both occasions to think more deeply about the obligations we have to ourselves and the obligations we have to one another."

Synopsis: Patients should start taking drugs for the AIDS virus earlier to have the best chance of survival, researchers said Thursday. An analysis of more than 45,000 people with HIV in Europe and North America found they were 28 percent more likely to develop full-blown AIDS or die if they deferred treatment until the point currently recommended in many countries.

Topic: SALMONELLA PEANUTS

Synopsis: U.S. marshals served a warrant on a New Jersey company that has refused to recall peanut products at the center of a major salmonella outbreak, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration said Wednesday. The FDA said Westco

Fruit and Nuts Inc., an Irvington, New Jersey-based company, has refused to provide access to distribution documents and declined to recall products after an FDA request. The warrant seeks access to the records.

Topic: **OBAMA ENDS TRAVELING RESTRICTIONS TO CUBA** Synopsis: President Barack Obama opened a crack in the decades-old U.S. embargo against Cuba, allowing American telecommunications firms to start providing service to Cubans and lifting restrictions on family ties to the island. The move marked a major shift from the prior approach to Havana, as Obama ended limits on family travel and money transfers by Cubans in the United States to their homeland and spurred hopes that loosened travel restrictions could be next.

Topic: MASS LEGALIZATION VS MASS DEPORTATION

Synopsis: A new study reveals that mass immigrant legalization is a better option for the U.S. economy than mass deportation Day after day, anti-immigrant organizations try to convince the American people that immigration is a drain on the economy and that mass deportation of undocumented workers would be a boon-despite all evidence to the contrary. But the insidious truth is that immigrants play a key role in our economy; comprehensive immigration reform would bolster our nation's tax coffers and level the playing field for all workers and employers; and mass deportation is an outlandishly expensive-and equally unrealistic-proposition.

Synopsis: A judge has halted an identity theft investigation targeting illegal immigrants in Colorado, saying prosecutors wrongly seized records from an income tax preparer. The judge Monday ordered Weld County District Attorney Ken Buck to return or destroy the evidence within seven days. Buck's attorney says he will appeal. Thousands of documents had been seized from Amalia's Translation and Tax Services in Greeley after a Texas man alerted Weld County authorities that someone was using his identity. The American Civil Liberties Union's lawsuit contends the records were confidential.

Topic: ECONONOMIC CRISIS AND DIABETES

Synopsis: The economic crisis is pushing diabetics to literally risk life and limb, as many who have lost jobs and health insurance now are cutting back on, or even going without doctor visits, insulin, medicines and blood-sugar testing. Doctors report a drop in regular appointments with diabetic patients, if they come back at all. Patients more often seek tax-subsidized or charity care. And they end up in emergency rooms more often, patients and physicians say. Sales of drugs and other products used to treat and monitor the disease have dropped since the economic crisis accelerated last fall. Meanwhile, the number of people with the disease keeps growing, an additional 1.6 million Americans were diagnosed in 2007 alone.

Synopsis: President Barack Obama proclaimed signs of economic progress Tuesday but also warned Americans eager for good news that "by no means are we out of the woods." In a speech at Georgetown University today, Obama aimed to juggle his glass-half-full take on the economy with a determination to not be stamped as naive or overly rosy in the face of stubborn problems that linger.

Synopsis: Change to Win and AFL-CIO unveil unified immigration reform framework roadmap that lays the groundwork for an immigration system that works for America workers. Synopsis: Scientists have discovered that levels of depression vary by regions with frequent mental distress (FMD) lowest at 6.6 percent in Hawaii and highest at 14.4 percent in Kentucky. Other states including Indiana, Ohio, West Virginia and Tennessee had levels of more than 12 percent of FMD, which is described as having 14 days or more of depression and emotional problems in the past month.

Synopsis: The Pew Hispanic Center, a project of the Pew Research Center, today released a statistical profile of Mexican immigrants living in the United States. On the eve of President Obama's visit to Mexico, this profile reveals that a record 12.7 million Mexican immigrants lived in the U.S. in 2008, a 17-fold increase since 1970. Mexicans now account for 32% of all U.S. immigrants and more than one-in-ten of all persons born in Mexico now reside in the U.S. No other country in the world has as many total immigrants from all countries as the United States has immigrants from Mexico alone. More than half (55%) of Mexican immigrants in the U.S. are unauthorized. Immigrants from Mexico are younger than other immigrants and less likely to be U.S. citizens.

Topic: CONSUMER PRICES MARCH

Synopsis: Consumer prices dipped unexpectedly in March, leaving prices over the past year falling at the fastest clip in more than a half-century. The recession is expected to keep a lid on inflation as widespread layoffs dampen wage pressures and weak demand keeps companies from raising prices. The Labor Department said Wednesday that consumer prices edged down 0.1 percent last month as a drop in energy prices offset the biggest rise in tobacco prices in more than a decade.

Synopsis: A group of conservative activists are hoping to bring the issue of illegal immigration back to the front burner of California politics with a ballot measure that would create a new caste of birth certificates for children of the undocumented. An initial version of the measure was cleared to begin gathering signatures Friday, but proponents said they plan to make minor amendments and refile the measure soon. The initiative, which proponents tout as the California Taxpayer Protection Act, is intended for the June 2010 statewide ballot. For undocumented parents to obtain the new "Certificate of Live Birth With Foreign Parent," they would have to be photographed, fingerprinted and pay an additional \$75 fee.

Synopsis: Contrary to earlier findings, taking common painkillers such as ibuprofen and naproxen may not prevent Alzheimer's disease, but may delay it, U.S. researchers said Wednesday. Earlier studies had suggested that drugs known as non-steroidal anti-inflammatory or NSAIDS, which also include aspirin, could protect people from dementia. But a large study with older patients done by researchers at the University of Washington and the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs in Seattle found the dementia risk was actually higher among heavy NSAID users.

Synopsis: President Barack Obama says he wants to shield credit card users from confusing fine print and sudden rate hikes. After meeting with industry executives at the White House, Obama said "the days of any time, any reason rate hikes and late fee traps have to end." He says those in the industry who "want to act responsibly" will help the administration charge ahead with its legislation. Obama's proposed changes would keep consumers from facing sudden, surprising jumps in fees and require companies to publish their forms in plain-spoken language, with no more fine print. It would also allow for customer-friendly comparison shopping on credit-card offers and greater enforcement against violators.

Gibbs says Homeland Security Adviser John Brennan is leading the White House's response. Mexican authorities say 60 people may have died from the swine flu virus and world health officials worry it could unleash a global flu epidemic. Gibbs said Obama was not at risk during last week's trip to Mexico.

Topic: NY STUDENTS FLU

Synopsis: New York City health officials say that about 75 students at a Queens high school have fallen ill with flu-like symptoms and testing is under way to rule out the strain of swine flu that has killed dozens in Mexico. The Health Department's Dr. Don Weiss said Friday that a team of agency doctors and investigators were dispatched to the private St. Francis Preparatory School the previous day after students reported fever, sore throat, cough, aches and

pains. No one has been hospitalized. The handful of sick students who remained at the school were tested for a variety of flu strains. If they're found to have a known human strain that would rule out swine flu. Results could take several days. In the meantime, the school says it's postponing an evening event and sanitizing the building over the weekend.

Synopsis: Federal regulators on Friday will privately begin telling the nation's 19 largest financial institutions how well they performed in stress tests to assess their soundness. Regulators trying to stabilize the financial system also will release the test methodology they used, which could provide clues about which banks may be in trouble -- but also could unwittingly roil the industry. The results of the stress tests won't be publicly released until May 4. The slow-motion rollout is intended to blunt market reaction to the news of which banks are healthy, which ones could fail if the recession worsens and which need more money to survive.

Synopsis: The Treasury Department says it has provided General Motors Corp. with another \$2 billion in federal loans as the giant automaker struggles to restructure. A government report revealed earlier this week that the Treasury was prepared to provide GM with up to \$5 billion more in federal loans and Chrysler with up to \$500 million more in bailout support as they race against deadlines to restructure. GM has until June 1 to complete restructuring plans that satisfy the government's auto task force, while Chrysler has until April 30.

Synopsis: At least two cases of the human swine influenza have been confirmed in Kansas, and at least eight more are suspected in students at a New York City high school, but health officials say they don't know whether they have the same virus that has killed scores of people in Mexico. HHS spokesman Bill Hall says the department is working to determine the proper precautions that Americans might need to take. The World Health Organization says the outbreak has "pandemic potential" and is urging countries to increase their vigilance. The CDC on Friday told state authorities to intensively search for any unexplained flu illnesses. Now it will have to test samples from cases in this country to see if the reported cases actually match the new virus.

Synopsis: Preliminary tests on sickened students at a New York high school likely point to swine flu in the majority of samples taken, according to New York City health officials. The Centers for Disease Control is now testing to determine the specific subtype of the strain. Up to 100 students reported feeling ill. Those results are expected Sunday or Monday. Authorities reported swine flu cases also in Kansas, California and Texas.

Topic: WORLD HEALTH ORGANIZATION- SWINE FLU "INTERNATIONAL CONCERN"

Synopsis: The World Health Organization on Saturday asked countries around the world to step up reporting and surveillance of the strain -- a combination of swine, bird and human influenza that people may have no natural immunity to -- and implement a coordinated response to contain it. WHO Director-General Margaret Chan said the outbreak of the never-before-seen virus has "pandemic potential." But she said it is still too early to tell if it would become a pandemic. WHO guidance calls for isolating the sick and blanketing everyone around them with antiviral drugs such as Tamiflu.

Synopsis: Obama said his administration would make \$2 trillion in deficit reductions in the next decade... Unlike in Mexico where the same strain appears to be killing dozens of people, cases in the United State have been mild -- and U.S. health authorities can't yet explain why.

Synopsis: New York Mayor Michael Bloomberg said Sunday that the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention confirmed that students at a city high school were infected with swine flu. About 100 students complained of flu-like symptoms at the school. Some students went to Cancun, Mexico, on a spring break trip two weeks ago. Officials expect more cases and more severe illness among Americans. Synopsis: The federal government's E-Verify program, which seeks to reduce the hiring of illegal immigrants, is becoming increasingly popular, with 1,000 new businesses signing up each week despite concerns about its reliability. More than 124,000 businesses, including nearly 10,000 in California, are signed up for the Web-based identification program that enables employers to check whether an employee is authorized to work, according to U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services. Among the employers enrolled in the state are restaurants, hospitals and temporary employment agencies.

Synopsis: The nation is becoming even more diverse: More than one third of its population belongs to a minority group, and Hispanics are the fastest-growing segment. The U.S. Census Bureau reported Thursday that the minority population reached an estimated 104.6 million -- or 34 percent of the nation's total population -- on July 1, 2008, compared to 31 percent when the Census was taken in 2000. Bin Laden's remarks were aired on Wednesday by Al Jazeera television, one day after his deputy described Obama as a criminal and warned Muslims not to fall for his polished words. The comments appeared to be a drive by al Qaeda to preempt a major speech to the Muslim world that Obama is due to deliver in Egypt on Thursday.

Mukasey had issued a 33-page decision in January saying the Constitution does not entitle someone facing deportation to have a case reopened based upon shoddy work by a lawyer. Mukasey said the Justice Department does have the discretion to reopen such cases if it wishes to do so. Immigrant rights groups had criticized the Mukasey decision.

Synopsis: An aspirin a day may keep a heart attack away, but it could also increase your risk of internal bleeding. Research shows use of aspirin by patients with no heart disease history reduces non-fatal heart attacks by about one fifth. However, new data shows it also increases the risk of internal bleeding by about one third, potentially canceling out the drug's health benefits. "The currently available trial results ... do not seem to justify general guidelines advocating the routine use of aspirin in all healthy individuals above a moderate level of risk for coronary heart disease," the study authors write. For patients with a history of stroke or heart attack, long-term aspirin use reduced the risk of vascular diseases by one fifth, outweighing these patients' small risk of bleeding.

Synopsis: Each year, 75,000 American children are treated at emergency departments for trampoline-related injuries. Nearly all of these trampoline accidents occur at home so doctors are warning parents to be careful. Synopsis: A gene that is highly active in up to 20 percent of breast cancer cases might be blocked by a generically available blood pressure drug, U.S. researchers reported Tuesday. The gene, called AGTR1, caused normal breast cells to behave like cancer cells but the blood pressure drug losartan stopped them, the team at the University of Michigan found. They transplanted human tumors that expressed AGTR1 -- meaning the gene was active -- into mice. Eight weeks after they gave the mice losartan the tumors shrank by 30 percent, they reported in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences.

Synopsis: With companies in no mood to hire, the unemployment rate jumped to 9.4 percent in May, the highest in more than 25 years. But the pace of layoffs eased, with employers cutting 345,000 jobs, the fewest since September. The much smaller-than-expected reduction in payroll jobs, reported by the Labor Department on Friday, adds to evidence that the recession is loosening its hold on the country. It marked the fourth straight month that the pace of layoffs slowed. Still, the increase in the nation's unemployment rate from 8.9 percent in April underscores the difficulties that America's 14.5 million unemployed are having in finding new jobs. Economists had expected the rate to hit 9.2 percent last month.

Government experts called for sweeping safety restrictions Synopsis: Tuesday on the most widely used painkiller, including reducing the maximum dose of Tylenol and eliminating prescription drugs such as Vicodin and Percocet. The Food and Drug Administration assembled 37 experts to recommend ways to reduce deadly overdoses with acetaminophen, which is the leading cause of liver failure in the U.S. and sends 56,000 people to the emergency room annually. About 200 die each year. "We're here because there are inadvertent overdoses with this drug that are fatal and this is the one opportunity we have to do something that will have a big impact," said Dr. Judith Kramer of Duke University Medical Center.

Federal health officials say at least 12 people have been Synopsis: hospitalized in connection with a possible E.coli outbreak in beef and two of them suffered kidney failure. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, at least 23 people in nine states may have become ill after eating beef produced by JBS Swift Beef Co. of Greeley, Colo. The company recalled about 380,000 pounds of beef this week after some illnesses were reported and a government investigation showed a possible connection to the company's product. SECURITY-DIRTYBOMB/NEWYORK Topic:

Synopsis: Thousands of additional law enforcement officers within 50 miles of New York City will have access to radiation detectors for dirty bombs and nuclear devices, New York police said Wednesday. The detectors, including cell phone-sized devices that officers wear on their belts, can help uncover a dirty bomb that might be assembled outside New York and smuggled in, police said at a security conference. New York Police Department officers have used such devices for several years.
