Topic: UNDOCUMENTED STUDENTS WON'T BE DEPORTED

Synopsis: Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano said Friday that illegal immigrant students and young adults who meet the criteria in last year's failed legalization bill in Congress are not a "priority" for her department's law enforcement efforts. Wading into an increasingly thorny debate, Miss Napolitano said she cannot unilaterally ignore deportations laws for broad groups of illegal immigrants, but said students and young adults who would have been legalized had last year's "Dream Act" legislation passed Congress are not a chief target of federal authorities. "I will say, and can say, that you know what? They are not, that group, if they truly meet all those criteria, and we see very few of them actually in the immigration system, if they truly meet those, they're not the priority," the secretary said at an event sponsored by NDN, a progressive think tank and advocacy group, on the future of the nation's border policies.

Topic: JOBLESS RATE REACHES LOWEST LEVEL IN 2 YEARS

Synopsis: The nation's job-creation engine revved up last month and pushed the unemployment rate to its lowest level in two years, spreading optimism the economic recovery is firmly in place and giving President Osama a political boost. The economy lured back unemployed Americans who had given up hope of getting another paycheck as increases across nearly all sectors led to 216,000 additional jobs, the Labor Department said. The unemployment rate ticked down to 8.8% - a full percentage point lowers than in November and the sharpest four-month drop in 28 years. Osama, trying to fend off a Republican push for deep budget cuts that administration officials warn could derail the recovery, said Friday that the economy was showing "signs of real strength." But he cautioned that millions of Americans still are out of work and that "we have to keep the momentum going."

Topic: CHICAGO ANTIIMMIGRATION BILL

Synopsis: A youth group meets in Chicago with a clear mission: get to the neighboring state of Indiana to help immigrants as they fight the proposed sb-590, the latest attempt to criminalize undocumented workers. And so they came to the town of East Chicago where they joined hundreds of people. Political, civilian and religious leaders demonstrated in Illinois under the slogan "No to hate", after the legislative assembly rejected 10 anti-immigrant bills attempting to duplicate Arizona's controversial law SB1070, a measure seeking to criminalize undocumented migrants. "Defeating these bills is a great victory for Illinois amid the growing anti-immigrant atmosphere in the United States", Democratic state Rep. Lisa Hernandez said during the event at Chicago Temple.

Synopsis: At the beginning of the year, it appeared that Arizona's SB 1070 would spread through the country like wildfire, with at least 24 state legislatures having introduced copycat "show me your papers" bills since the original passed in spring 2010. But to date, none of those states have passed the bills and at least 10 legislatures have killed the bills altogether. Now, with many state legislative sessions coming to a close, the fight against SB 1070 copycat legislation appears contained to just a few key battlegrounds. Converging forces have blocked the copycat bills' success. On the one hand, the bills have spurred broad opposition from immigrant and civil rights groups, as well as from business interests. On the other, a ticking clock killed several bills as legislative sessions end before lawmakers have had time to pass the controversial laws-particularly in a season in which most state political debates are dominated by budget battles.

Synopsis: As the Florida Senate Judiciary Committee gets ready to hear immigration-enforcement bill S.B. 2040 on Monday, Arizona-like measures have been cut in other state legislatures. The Immigration Policy Center points out that the legislative graveyard got a little bit bigger this week as lawmakers in Mississippi pronounced a series of restrictive immigration measures dead. More than 30 immigration-related bills-including an Arizona-style enforcement bill-failed to meet a legislative deadline due to disagreements over the laws' impact on the business community. Mississippi joins nine other states (Colorado, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Nebraska, New Hampshire, South Dakota, Virginia, and Wyoming) where legislators have cut Arizona-style enforcement bills-bills that are, according to the Washington Post editorial board, causing many businesses to speak out for fear of sharing Arizona's economic fate

Topic: CALIFORNIA "DREAM ACT"

Synopsis: Assemblyman Tim Donnelly, of Twin Peaks, will host a rally and press conference regarding Assembly Bill 26, the "Secure Immigration Enforcement Act." Special guest, Arizona State Senator Russell Pearce, who was instrumental in passing the Senate Bill 1070 in Arizona, will be speaking at the rally. Assembly Bill 26 would help law enforcement manage illegal immigration in the State and fulfills Assemblyman Donnelly's campaign pledge to introduce a bill similar to the Arizona immigration law in California. This measure would, among other things, end sanctuary cities and enforce immigration laws against employers who knowingly hire illegal aliens, which will free up jobs for citizens and eliminate incentives for people to come here illegally.

Topic: SPENDING SHOWDOWNS

Synopsis: U.S. military troops at war in Iraq and Afghanistan would receive one-week's pay instead of two in their next paycheck if the government shuts down this weekend due to the federal budget impasse, according to a senior defense official. The official, who spoke on

condition of anonymity to discuss personnel issues, said the military can't be paid during a funding lapse until a new appropriations bill or continuing resolution is passed by Congress. If the funding bill expires on April 8, it will be in the middle of the military's two-week pay period, so Pentagon would send out paychecks for just the first week of the pay period, said the official.

Topic: FAA MORE INSPECTIONS

Synopsis: The Federal Aviation Administration is expected to issue an emergency directive requiring inspection of about 175 Boeing 737s for fatigue damage following an incident in which a Southwest Airlines plane was forced to make an emergency landing after a hole ripped open in the roof. The order comes after Southwest canceled nearly 700 flights nationwide - including 16 of the 130 flights in and out of Boston - in the three days since a 5-foot gash opened up in the fuselage of a Boeing 737-300 shortly after takeoff from Phoenix on Friday.

Topic: FLORIDA IMMIGRATION LAW

Synopsis: Legislators seeking to discourage the hiring of illegal immigrants are one step closer to overhauling Florida's employment law. The State Senate's judiciary committee on Monday approved a bill requiring companies use the federal government's electronic verification program for new hires or to request those employees show state-issued identification cards. The bill also encourages local enforcement agencies to train officers to enforce federal immigration laws. Unlike previous drafts, though, the bill does not require such training due to budget constraints.

Topic: MICHIGAN ICE RAID NEAR SCHOOL

Synopsis: In a elementary school in southwest Detroit, Michigan, parents say they have experienced moments of panic, when according to them, they were pursued by immigration agents. The actions of March 31, allegedly committed by six immigration agents were denounced by immigrant activists in this city, who claim that ICE violated his own code of ethics in carrying out raids in the vicinity of schools, and so have several demands for the federal agency.

Topic: CITIES DISPUTE 2010 CENSUS COUNTS

Synopsis: In New York City, some parts of Brooklyn and Queens were mistakenly classified as vacant, according to Joseph Salvo of the city planning department. "People are saying, 'Where are these areas? Because I need an apartment,' "Salvo says. Omissions can be costly. The federal government hands out money for things such as schools and public safety based on the count. In New York, each person left out means \$3,000 a year the city won't get, says Rachael Raynoff, planning department spokeswoman. Government officials may submit Census challenges between June 1, 2011, and June 1, 2013. The bureau won't do recounts, but it will add people when local governments can prove errors. After the 2000 Census, the bureau found possible problems in 1,180 of the country's 39,000 jurisdictions. In the end, it raised the national tally by about 2,700 people. Hidalgo County, Texas, believes 8% of its rural population was missed, and the county may sue, says Jose Garza, a lawyer hired by the county. "We don't want to get caught flat-footed at the end of the day if (an appeal) doesn't work out," he says.

Topic: MORTGAGE APPLICATIONS FALL LAST WEEK

Synopsis: Mortgage applications on U.S. homes fell last week when a drop in orders for mortgage refinancing offset the high number of borrowers who sought benefit programs for government-insured loans. The Mortgage Bankers Association (MBA) said Wednesday its seasonally adjusted index mortgage applications, which includes activities home purchase and refinancing, fell 2 percent in the week ended April 1.

Topic: CALIFORNIA AB 26 AND AB 1018 REJECT

Synopsis: The Assembly Judiciary Committee on Tuesday voted down Assemblyman Tim Donnelly's bills targeting illegal immigration in California. Donnelly, R-Claremont, had presented two bills to the committee, which voted 7-3 against both, on a straight party vote. "While I am disappointed that Assembly Bill 26 will not move forward this year, I am greatly encouraged by the incredible show of support the bill received," Donnelly said on Tuesday. "This is not the end of the fight to protect citizens from the many problems caused by illegal immigration in California, and I look forward to continued work on this critical issue." Donnelly said the state spends between \$11 billion and \$22 billion in services to undocumented workers, and his bill would help reduce the cost by deterring illegal immigrants in the state.

Topic: SOCIAL SECURITY STATEMENTS

Synopsis: Social Security is going to stop mailing workers those yearly statements that say here's what you'd get if you retired at 62, 66, or 70. The agency is trying to save money so it's making the information accessible on its website. Social Security is hoping to make the transition by the end of the year. But Commissioner Michael Astrue says there are still some security issues to work out, so workers may have another year of mailed statements. He says those paper statements cost \$70 million a year to mail. The statements are sent to 150 million people each year and project future benefit payments. Some advocates note that not all people have access to computers or the internet. The decision to suspend the mailings is related to Social Security's operating budget not the talk of a possible partial government shutdown.

Topic: CALIFORNIA INMIGRATION DEBATE CHOICES

Synopsis: 12 hours in Los Angeles Epicenter became the national movement for immigration reform, from organizations and academics to immigrant advocates and activists from around the country, they debated the way forward to ensure the fair integration of immigrants to the United States . They all agreed that the recent failure of the Dream Act gave rise to higher power of anti-immigrant initiatives at the local and state levels. Some seek to criminalize undocumented workers and others intend to deny housing, education and even citizenship to children of illegal immigrants born in the U.S. which has serious potential social effects.

Topic: GAS PRICES

Synopsis: The average U.S. price of a gallon of gasoline has jumped 19 cents over the past three weeks. The Lundberg Survey of fuel prices now puts the average price for a gallon of regular at \$3.76. Analyst Trilby Lundberg said Sunday that price is 91 cents higher than it was this time last year. The national average for a gallon of mid-grade is \$3.90. For premium it's \$4.01 a gallon. Lundberg says diesel prices rose 11 cents a gallon over the past three weeks, to \$4.09. Tucson, Ariz., had the nation's lowest average price for gas at \$3.41. San Francisco had the highest at \$4.13.

Topic: ARIZONA IMMIGRATION APPEAL

Synopsis: A federal appeals court on Monday refused to lift a stay blocking major parts of Arizona's immigration law from taking effect and said the federal government is likely to be able to prove the controversial law is unconstitutional. The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals turned down an appeal filed by Gov. Jan Brewer. She had asked the appeals court to lift an injunction imposed by a federal judge in Phoenix the day before the law was to take effect on July 29, 2010. The U.S Justice Department sued to block the law, saying it violates the U.S. Constitution because enforcing immigration law is a federal issue. U.S. District Court Judge Susan Bolton issued an injunction preventing four major parts of the law from going into effect pending a trial. Monday's ruling by the three-judge appeals court panel upheld that injunction. The panel's opinion said the government is likely to succeed in its arguments that Congress has given the federal government sole authority to enforce immigration laws, and that Arizona's law violates the Supremacy Clause of the Constitution. One judge dissented.

Topic: GOV. IMMIGRATION REPORT

Synopsis: Today, the Immigration Policy Center will release DHS Progress Report: An Analysis of Immigration Policy in the Second Year of the Obama Administration. In its second year under the Obama Administration, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS)-which is responsible for the nation's three immigration agencies (USCIS, CPB, and ICE)-continues to struggle with its competing missions of providing immigration benefits and enforcing immigration laws, all within the context of an outdated and broken immigration system. Over the past year, while waiting for Congress to act, the Administration has increased its emphasis on enforcement and deportation and denied its ability to provide administrative relief. The forthcoming report finds that, while DHS has made significant progress in some areas, there is much room for improvement. The report recommends that DHS act in line with its own stated priorities and exert its executive authority to bring about much-needed reforms that can be done in the absence of Congressional action.

Topic: SPENDING SHOWDOWN

Synopsis: Details of the budget deal struck between the White House and Congress last week reveal that a large portion of the \$38 billion worth of budget cuts would be achieved by pruning money left over from previous years, axing programs President Barack Obama had already been targeting and accounting maneuvers. Cuts include some earmarks, unspent census money, leftover federal construction funding and \$2.5 billion from highway programs that could not be spent because of restrictions set by other legislation. Another \$3.5 billion comes from unused spending authority for a program that provides health care to children of lower-income families.

Topic: GEORGIA IMMIGRATION FIGHT

Synopsis: Georgia has a day left to pass an immigration bill that has some parts that are similar to Arizona's contentious law, and opposition from agriculture and business groups has made it an uphill battle even with Republicans in control. After months of public debate and private discussions, a major sticking point is whether the law should force private employers to use a federal database, called E-Verify, to check that new hires are in the U.S. legally. The Senate stripped the E-Verify requirement earlier this week, only to have the House restore it the next day.

Topic: MARYLAND STUDENT "DREAM ACT"

Synopsis: The General Assembly in Maryland approved The Dream Act. After a turbulent journey in both the Maryland State House and Senate, legislation allowing illegal immigrants to qualify for in-state college tuition rates passed last night, as the 428th session of the Maryland General Assembly came to a close in Annapolis. Gov. Martin O'Malley (D) has pledged to sign the bill, paving the way for students to enroll in community college as early as this fall. The bill will allow undocumented high school graduates to receive in-state college tuition rates providing they meet certain criteria. The research arm for the state legislature, The Department of Legislative Services, estimated it would cost Maryland taxpayers \$778,000 in fiscal year 2014 and up to \$3.5 million in fiscal 2016 to subsidize the tuition rate undocumented students would receive. There are currently 16 community colleges in Maryland.

Topic: GAS PRICES INCREASE

Synopsis: Rising U.S. gasoline prices have damaged confidence in the country's future and forced Americans to change their spending habits and lifestyles, a Reuters/Ipsos poll released Wednesday found. The proportion of people who believe the United States is on the wrong track jumped 5 points to 69 percent from March, the poll found, the highest wrong-track figure in an Ipsos poll since President Barack Obama took office in January 2009. More than six of every 10 Americans have cut back on other expenses and reduced their driving as a result of the rising gas prices caused by tumult in North Africa and the Middle East.

Topic: FLORIDA IMMIGRATION BILL DISCUSSION

Synopsis: B7Committees in the Florida House and Senate are set to take up controversial immigration bills this week. The tougher of the two, which is being carried through the House by Rep. William Snyder, R-Stuart, is now on Thursday's crowded Economic Affairs Committee agenda after languishing for weeks. Snyder's measure faces resistance from business and immigrant-rights groups, and could be open to the same constitutional challenge at the center of the legal battles surrounding Arizona's Senate Bill 1070 because it creates new state-level crimes for immigration.

Topic: RAISE RETIREMENT AGE TO 70

Synopsis: Three Republican senators on Wednesday will propose a Social Security reform package that would raise the retirement age to 70 and cut benefits for the wealthy. Sens. Lindsey Graham (S.C.), Rand Paul (Ky.) and Mike Lee (Utah) previewed their proposal on Fox News, saying that it will put the entitlement program on a long-term path to solvency without raising taxes. The senators said that their plan would gradually raise the retirement age from 67 to 70 and would not affect individuals age 56 or older. Graham said that the proposal uses the same Congress used to raise the retirement age from 65 to 67, so that people born in 1970 would become the first group to have a retirement age of 70.

Topic: IMMIGRATION BILL INDIANA

Synopsis: Indiana Governor Mitch Daniels called on state lawmakers Wednesday to pass a proposal aimed at implementing immigration reforms in the state, adding that changes in the bill were necessary before passage. Mr. Daniels says a bill aimed at implementing an Arizona-style law should focus more on Indiana employers and less on law enforcement. The Indiana governor is the latest governor to call on state lawmakers to implement immigration reforms. "I think that legislation will be changed," Mr. Daniels said Wednesday. "I support this, to drop the law enforcement provisions that have been the ones that have bothered most people."The Indiana Republican and potential Republican presidential candidate says he hopes the law enforcement provision is removed, refusing to note whether that provision would cause him to veto the bill.

Topic: AUTHORITIES EXAMINING BANKS MOVES ON RATE

Synopsis: A published report says that federal authorities are investigating whether some major banks conspired to improperly manipulate an important interest rate before and during the financial crisis. The Wall Street Journal, citing unnamed people familiar with the inquiry, reported Thursday that the Justice Department and Securities and Exchange Commission are examining if the banks understated their borrowing costs, which help determine the London interbank offered rate, called Libor. It's an average rate set by banks each morning that measures how much they're going to charge each other for loans. It affects the costs of hundreds of trillions of dollars in loans and investments such as bonds, consumer loans and derivatives. The banks being investigated include Bank of America, Citigroup and UBS, according to the Journal article.

Topic: MARK DAYTON DROPS PAWLENTY DIRECTIVE ON IMMIGRATION

Synopsis: Minnesota Gov. Mark Dayton won't revive his Republican predecessor's directive requiring the state to participate in enforcement of federal immigration law. A spokeswoman told The Associated Press Thursday that Dayton decided against keeping or revamping the 2008 executive order from former Gov. Tim Pawlenty because it wasn't necessary. It had required state cooperation with federal authorities in areas such as customs enforcement and document fraud. Dayton spokeswoman Katie Tinucci says the order's expiration last week doesn't change anything state agents are already doing. She says Dayton considered keeping the directive, consulting with legal and public safety advisers as well as immigration advocates. Pawlenty made headlines when he announced the order and related immigration proposals as part of a get-tough approach toward illegal immigration.

Topic: IMMIGRATION BILLS

Synopsis: Three bills targeting illegal immigration are making their way through the Tennessee legislature drawing vows by the American Civil Liberties Union to pursue litigation if they become law. Other states, including Florida and Georgia, also are weighing strict measures that bear similarities to one that became law last year in Arizona, but parts of which have been blocked by the courts. Many legal experts believe the legal battle over Arizona's immigration law could reach the U.S. Supreme Court. One of the Tennessee bills would allow local law enforcement agents to question suspects about their immigration status. The other bills would require the state's employers to prove their employees are legally authorized to work in the U.S. and require agencies to verify that applicants for public benefits are legally eligible for them.

Topic: WASHINGTON DREAM ACT SENATORS LETTER TO BARACK OBAMA

Synopsis: Nevada Senator Harry Reid, Sen. Dick Durbin of Illinois and 20 other Democratic senators, today sent a letter to President Barack Obama asking him to establish a rigorous, consistent and organized process to handle requests to freeze the deportation of those youths who qualify under the DREAM Act if it were enacted into law. The Obama Administration - like the previous Bush administration has granted "deferred action" to some young people who would be eligible under the DREAM Act, however, these actions have been handled without a formal process, which leads to inconsistent handling of these cases by the various immigration services offices across the country. The senators asked the Obama Administration to consider establishing a formal process for deferred action, and to track cases of the Dream Act

Topic: HISPANICS SURPASS BLACKS IN MOST US METROS

Synopsis: Hispanics now outnumber African-Americans in more than half the metropolitan areas in the U.S., according to census figures released today. They became the largest minority group in 191 of the country's 366 metro areas, fuelled in part by the increasing black exodus from recession-hit cities in the north. The census results are already having a big political impact, as states redraw their district boundary lines according to population size and racial make-up. It's the latest in a series of releases from the 2010 census showing the changing face of America. Last month the Census Bureau reported the Hispanic population went up by 42 per cent in the last ten years to hit 50.5 million, meaning one in every six Americans is now Latino. New Latino immigrants are increasingly choosing to avoid traditional Hispanic areas in the south-west, spreading across the country instead. Many of them headed to cities such as Madison, Wisconsin and Lakeland, Florida, where the mid-decade housing boom created jobs in the construction and service industries.

Topic: BUDGET CUTS AND MEDICAID

Synopsis: A GOP plan to cut billions of dollars from the federal budget goes before the House for a vote today. The plan cuts more than \$6 billion in spending from the budget President Barack Obama introduced in February, relying on stiff cuts to domestic agency accounts, food stamps and Medicaid.

Topic: NIF ASKS VETO OF GEORGIA BILL

Synopsis: On April 14th, the Georgia legislature approved a bill that makes it a crime for undocumented immigrants to be in Georgia and gives police the authority to investigate the immigration status of any person they encounter if they suspect that the person is in the country illegally. A similar bill was passed and signed into law last year in Arizona. The legislation now goes to the Governor for his signature. The following is a statement by Ali Noorani, Executive Director of the National Immigration Forum, a non-partisan pro-immigrant advocacy organization based in Washington. Georgia has joined Arizona in passing the most extreme anti-immigrant legislation in the country.

Topic: HEALTH PANDEMIC

Synopsis: Virus samples will be shared globally in exchange for vaccines produced from them under a landmark deal to improve preparedness for a flu pandemic, diplomats at the World Health Organization said on Saturday. Negotiators ended an all-night session with a draft agreement accepted by all countries, including the United States, the last to join the consensus, they said. Ministers were expected to adopt the deal at the WHO's annual meeting in May.

Synopsis: The clock is ticking for those who haven't filed their taxes. With the deadline quickly approaching, area tax agencies are preparing for the last minute rush. To avoid having to pay late filing penalties, you'll want to file your taxes Monday by midnight. We get three extra days to file because of a holiday in Washington DC. Emancipation Day fell on the 15th this year, and the federal government extended the filing deadline until the 18th. Tax agencies have been busy this weekend and are expecting a last minute rush Monday. If you can't file by the deadline Monday, you can file for a six month extension, but you will still have to estimate the taxes you owe.

Topic: MEAT BACTERIA

Synopsis: Meat in the U.S. may be widely contaminated with strains of drug-resistant bacteria, researchers reported Friday after testing 136 samples of beef, chicken, pork and turkey purchased at grocery stores. Nearly half of the samples - 47% - contained strains of *Staphylococcus aureus*, the type of bacteria that most commonly causes staph infections. Of those bacteria, 52% were resistant to at least three classes of antibiotics, according to a study published in the journal Clinical Infectious Diseases. DNA testing suggested the animals were the source of contamination.

Topic: AIR TRAFFIC CONTROLLERS

Synopsis: Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood says that while the government won't pay air traffic controllers to take naps while on duty, federal officials are open to other options to ensure aviation safety. LaHood announced earlier that the FAA was adding an hour to the minimum amount of time controllers must be off between shifts.

Topic: REPORT PREESCHOOL ENROLLMENT

Synopsis: According to a recently published report from researchers at University of California, Berkeley, preschool enrollment among Latinos grew steadily across the country from stark lows in the early 1990s. But from 2005 to 2009 - during the recession years - Latino preschool enrollment seems to have declined. Nationally, about one in four children younger than 5 is Latino. In San Joaquin County, the proportion is much higher: about one in two. And as early as second grade, the scores of Latino children on standardized math and language-arts tests lag those of their same-age peers. High-quality preschool programs are widely viewed as a successful means of narrowing such achievement gaps, so that many advocates worry the budget cuts and other financial constraints threatening preschool enrollment could contribute to future academic disparity.

Synopsis: Under pressure from advocates and the 2012 re-election calendar, President Barack Obama on Tuesday enlisted a diverse group of elected officials and religious, business, labor, civil rights leaders and law enforcers to help build support for a long-stalled overhaul of the nation's immigration laws. Obama is making a new attempt to fulfill his campaign pledge to enact broad changes early in his term. But his failure there has angered some Hispanics and immigrants' advocates, voters who helped elect him in 2008 and whom he'll need at the polls again next year. A White House meeting with a group of about 70 people led to no breakthroughs on the way forward, just a call to action.

Synopsis: As McDonald's makes its nationwide push to get 50,000 new employees to join its ranks, it is important to put the "McJob" in perspective. We've all heard that the average McDonald's job doesn't pay much. And you're right -- it doesn't offer compensation that is anywhere near the pay for salaried positions filled by college graduates or skilled workers. The data we've seen is that the entry-level McJob probably pays a little more than minimum wage. The company and sites that track wages suggest that many of those workers hired Tuesday will be making around \$8 an hour, depending in which area of the country they live. A full workweek at \$8 an hour gets you about \$320 before tax withholding. That's \$16,000 a year if you take two weeks off during the year for vacation. It's above the poverty line for individuals this year (\$11,136 according to the Census), but below the level for a four-person household (\$22,314).

Synopsis: Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano says she doesn't believe a spate of problems with air traffic control is exposing a potential vulnerability for terrorists. Synopsis: The U.S. government is adding new protections for travelers when airlines lose their bags, bump them off flights or hold them on the runway for hours. The airlines will also have to more clearly disclose the fees they charge. Consumer advocates say the wide-ranging regulations would improve the flying experience. Still, they wanted regulators to get even tougher on bag fees and make it easier to sue airlines over shoddy service. Beginning in late August, passengers who pay \$15 or more to check luggage will get a refund if their bag is lost. They'll also be entitled to more money -- up to \$1,330 -- if they're bumped from a flight. Airlines will have to include government taxes and fees in advertised prices.

Synopsis: An Arizona sheriff says he has been flooded with calls and emails of support from local and federal agents who back his claims that the U.S. Border Patrol has effectively ordered them to stop apprehending illegal immigrants crossing the U.S.-Mexican border. "Upper management has advised supervisors to have agents 'turn back South' (TBS) the illegal aliens (aka bodies) they detect attempting to unlawfully enter the country ... at times you even hear supervisors order the agents over the radio to 'TBS' the aliens instead of catching them," one San Diego border agent wrote in an email to Cochise County Sheriff Larry Dever. "This only causes more problems as the aliens, as you know, don't just go back to Mexico and give up. They keep trying, sometimes within 10 minutes in-between attempts, to cross illegally," continued the email, which was among a number of communications to Dever reviewed by FoxNews.com. "This makes the job for agents more dangerous. Not only are the aliens more defiant, they also begin to feel like they can get away with breaking our federal laws."

Synopsis: Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano says the color-coded terror alert system will be replaced next week by two warnings -- elevated and imminent. The new warnings could be conveyed to the public through Facebook and Twitter. Unlike the colors, the alerts will have expiration dates. The past system described the threat in five colors, from green, low risk, to red, severe. Napolitano says the threat picture in the U.S. is currently at an "elevated baseline," and future public warnings will hinge on specific and credible intelligence above and beyond that threshold. She says the terror threat to the U.S. is at its highest since 9/11 because

of the increasing number and types of international and homegrown threats. This does not mean there is a specific threat of an imminent attack.

Synopsis: A U.S. senator called Sunday for a "no-ride list" for Amtrak trains after intelligence gleaned from the raid on Osama bin Laden's compound pointed to potential attacks on the national rail system. Sen. Charles Schumer said he would also push for added funding for rail security and commuter and passenger train track inspections and more monitoring of stations nationwide. U.S. officials last week said evidence found after the raid on the al Qaeda leader's hideout in Pakistan indicated there had been discussions about a possible attack on a U.S. train on Sept. 11, 2011 -- the ten-year anniversary of the New York and Washington attacks orchestrated by bin Laden.

Synopsis: Arizona Gov. Jan Brewer announced Monday she will ask the U.S. Supreme Court to overturn a ruling that put the most controversial parts of the state's immigration enforcement law on hold. The planned appeal to the high court comes after Brewer lost an appeal April 11, when a three-judge panel of the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals refused to reverse a lower court's order that prevented key parts of the law from being enforced. The panel said federal officials were likely to prove the law is unconstitutional and succeed in their argument that Congress has given the federal government sole authority to enforce immigration laws.

Topic: UTAH IMMIGRATION

Synopsis: Two civil rights groups asked a federal judge Friday to stop a Utah immigration law from taking effect next week, saying it would create a police state and violate constitutional rights to due process. The American Civil Liberties Union and the National Immigration Law Center sought the injunction in federal court in Salt Lake City seeking to delay the law, which is modeled on Arizona's enforcement measure. Because the law could force people to prove their citizenship when arrested for any crime, there is the very real danger of racial profiling by police officers if it goes into effect, said Karen Tumlin, the law center's managing attorney.

Synopsis: The average price for a gallon of gasoline in the United States rose 11.98 cents in the past two weeks, but last week's fall in crude oil prices may signal lower costs to come, an industry analyst said on Sunday. The national average for self-serve, regular unleaded gas was \$4 per gallon on May 6, up 11.98 cents from April 22, according to the nationwide Lundberg Survey. This was still below the all-time high of \$4.11 on July, 11, 2008, and last week's fall in crude oil prices may lead to a 8- to 12-cent drop in prices at the pump over the next few weeks.

Synopsis: U.S. safety regulators are investigating a fuel tank problem that could affect more than 2.7 million Ford F-150 pickup trucks. No injuries have been reported from the possible defect. The agency is looking into trucks from the 1997 through 2001 model years. NHTSA's investigations often lead to recalls.

Synopsis: Describing the border with Mexico as more secure than ever, President Barack Obama says Republicans who insisted on tougher enforcement should now be ready to move on and deal with comprehensive immigration reform. But instead, he says they're still demanding more. In a speech in Texas along the border today, Obama pointed to an increase in border agents, and the near-completion of a border fence. And he said more cargo is being screened. But he said Republicans will "never be satisfied." from majority Republicans in the House. He's trying to convince Hispanic voters that he's not the one standing in the way of immigration reform.

House Republicans voted to end debate by calling for an immediate vote on the bill, shutting down debate on amendments after four hours of sometimes heated discussion. Democrats roundly criticized the tactic almost as emotionally as the underlying legislation, and faulted House Speaker Joe Straus for allowing the maneuver

Topic: UTAH IMMIGRATION LAW

Synopsis: People arrested for serious crimes in Utah will be required to prove their citizenship - and those stopped for minor offenses may be too -- under a new immigration law that took effect Tuesday. Civil rights groups are seeking to block the law on constitutional grounds, and a judge will consider whether to halt its enforcement at a hearing set for Tuesday afternoon. The law, signed by Republican Gov. Gary Herbert in March, requires police to check the citizenship status of anyone arrested for a felony or class-A misdemeanor, while giving them discretion to check the citizenship of those stopped for traffic infractions and other lesser offenses. Class A misdemeanors include theft, negligent homicide and criminal mischief, while felonies range from aggravated burglary to rape and murder.

Synopsis: Illegal immigrants who meet certain conditions will be able to pay in-state college tuition in Maryland under a bill signed Tuesday by Gov. Martin O'Malley at a time when many other states are taking a harder stance against illegal immigration. The Democratic governor posed for five sets of photographs during a ceremony to accommodate the large number of supporters in attendance to see one of the high-profile bill signed. Supporters cheered the occasion outside the Maryland State House, chanting: "Yes, we can".

Synopsis: New York City will launch a new national emergency alert system by the end of the year that will send messages to cell phones during disasters. Mayor Michael Bloomberg made the announcement Tuesday at a news conference overlooking the World Trade Center site. He says the new technology will give the public clear and accurate information about imminent safety threats. The mayor says it will be geographically targeted and send messages to all cell phone users. He was joined by FCC Communications Commission Chairman Julius Genachowski, as well as federal and local officials. The alert plan was approved by Congress in 2006 under the Warning Alert and Response Network Act. The system also will be launched in Washington by the end of the year.

Synopsis: Two of the government's most popular programs for the elderly, Medicare and Social Security, will run out of money sooner than expected as a slow-growing economy saps revenues, a report on Friday said. Trustees for the two funds said the Medicare trust fund is projected to exhaust its funds in 2024, not 2029 as estimated last year, and that the Social Security retirement program will run out of money in 2036, not 2037 as previously thought. The latest projections hit in the middle of an intense debate between the Obama administration and opposition Republicans about how to rein in the nation's runaway debt, set to hit the legal limit of \$14.3 trillion on Monday.

Topic: GEORGIA ANTI IMMIGRANT LAW

Synopsis: Georgia's Republican governor signed Friday a tough new state law cracking down on illegal immigrants that is similar to one enacted in Arizona last year, handing new powers to police in the southern U.S. state. The law authorizes police in Georgia to investigate the immigration status of criminal suspects they think may be in the country illegally. It also requires many private employers to check the immigration status of newly hired workers on a federal database called E-Verify. Enforcement of U.S. immigration laws traditionally is handled by federal, not state, authorities. The Georgia measure is the latest to gain favor among Republicans at the state level who accuse Democratic President Barack Obama and the federal government of failing to stem illegal immigration.

Synopsis: A computer glitch corrupted the State Department's annual worldwide lottery for U.S. immigrant visas and the results will be scratched, the Obama administration said Friday, disappointing tens of thousands of would-be immigrants who were notified this year that they had won a chance to come and live legally in the United States. Nearly 15 million people had entered the 2012 lottery hoping to win one of 50,000 U.S. immigrant visas available under a wild-card program for people who otherwise would have little hope of getting a coveted U.S. visa. Applicants for the random drawing do not have to have the usual family or employer sponsor. The lottery selects 90,000 winners, a total that is then winnowed down through attrition, interviews and strict educational and occupational criteria.

Synopsis: With the federal government hitting its \$14.3-trillion debt limit, Treasury officials have started a complex fiscal juggling act to postpone the date when the government can no longer pay its bills. Also gone from the bill are provisions that bar children of illegal immigrants from receiving tuition assistance for postsecondary education, allow state agencies to report illegal immigrants who apply for state or federal aid, require employers to verify the immigration status of potential employees, outlaw the practice of illegal immigrants seeking work as an independent contractor and making it a crime to pick up illegal immigrants for the purpose of employing them. It now goes to the House, which hopes to wrap up its business by the end of next week.

The so-called Texas Plant-Expressed Vaccine Consortium announced the manufacturing initiative Wednesday. It will be headquartered in a 145,000-square-foot facility to be built on 21 acres at the Texas A&M Health Science Center in Bryan. Giroir said the consortium hopes to have the new vaccine in clinical trials by mid- to late 2011.

Synopsis: Using a mobile phone may increase the risk of developing certain types of brain tumor and consumers should consider ways of reducing their exposure, World Health Organization (WHO) cancer experts said on Tuesday. A working group of 31 scientists from 14 countries meeting at the WHO's International Agency for Research on Cancer (IARC) said a review of all the available scientific evidence suggested cell phone use should be classified as "possibly carcinogenic". The classification, which puts mobile phone use in the same broad IARC cancer risk category as lead, chloroform and coffee, could spur the United Nations health body to look again at its guidelines on mobile phones, the scientists said. But more lengthy and detailed research is needed before a more definitive answer on any link can be given.

Synopsis: Gov. Rick Perry, a Texas House Republican is pressing for an immigration enforcement bill that has been one of the most controversial issues before the Legislature this year. Rep. Burt Solomons of Carrollton has filed a new version of the so-called sanctuary cities bill. It bans police agencies from adopting policies that prohibit officers from asking people they detain whether they are in the country legally. The bill was one of Perry's top priorities in the regular session but it failed without a vote in the Senate. Perry, a Republican, has not yet added it to the agenda of the 30-day special session which began Tuesday, but said he still considers it an important issue. Perry's agenda items so far include bills on school spending, Medicaid and congressional redistricting. He has the power to add more. None of Texas' major cities claim to be sanctuary cities, but many police departments discourage their officers from asking about immigration status. Democrats in the House and Senate fiercely oppose the measure and Hispanic lawmakers say they worry police will use the law to harass Latinos. The immigration bill will likely pass if Perry adds it to the agenda.

Topic: CALIFORNIA CHEAPEST INSURANCE

Synopsis:

California is now closer to have medical insurance to cover more than fifty thousand low-income people. The state Senate yesterday adopted it by 25 votes to 14 legislation that would make this possible. If it becomes law, those who earn less than 20 thousand dollars a year will be able to buy quality assurance for only \$ 30 a month.

The crime, "willful failure to complete or carry an alien registration document," would be punishable by a \$100 fine and 30 days in jail. The Senate voted 25-7 and the House of Representatives voted 67-29 for the plan, House Bill 56. Supporters said it was similar to a tough immigration law passed by Arizona last year. The bill will become law if Gov. Robert Bentley signs it.

Topic: SUPREME COURT/ILLEGAL IMMIGRANT CRACK DOWN

Synopsis:

The Supreme Court has ordered a federal appeals court to take a new look at a Pennsylvania city's crackdown on employment and housing for illegal immigrants following the high court's recent decision upholding an Arizona employer sanctions law. The court on Monday threw out the ruling by the 3rd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Philadelphia preventing the city of Hazleton from enforcing regulations that deny permits to business that hire illegal immigrants and fine landlords who rent to them. The measures inspired similar laws around the country, including the one in Arizona that deals only with penalties for employers. The justices typically order lower courts to re-examine cases in light of a high court decision on a similar topic.

Topic: ARIZONA'S ILLEGAL IMMIGRANTS STRESSING PRISONS, LEGAL SYSTEM

Synopsis:

They shuffle into the courtroom in shackles, still wearing the dust-covered clothes and shoes from when they crossed the desert into the U.S. from Mexico. The 70 illegal immigrants, mostly men in their 20s and 30s, fill the 16-seat jury box and seven rows of wooden benches normally reserved for the public in Tucson's gleaming federal courthouse. The courtroom is expansive, with a regally high ceiling, and is filled with the pungent smell of dried sweat. In only an hour or so, the dozens of immigrants will agree to plead guilty and be sentenced in a process that could play out for months for most federal defendants. The scene offers a window into a federal immigration enforcement effort that is pushing the limits of the U.S. justice system, overwhelming federal judges and escalating the ranks of Latinos sent to prison.

Topic: SECURE COMMUNITY

Synopsis:

The Los Angeles City Council has voted 11-1 to support state efforts to withdraw from a Homeland Security program that requires fingerprints of arrestees to be shared with immigration agents. Tuesday's vote adds Los Angeles to a growing list of cities and states questioning whether the Secure Communities program is eroding trust between immigrants and police. Several states have withdrawn from the program. The California Assembly has voted to withdraw. A Senate vote is pending. The city's chief legislative analyst says nearly 70 percent of people deported under the program have no convictions or were accused of minor offenses. The program allows immigration agents to check fingerprints of arrestees against Homeland Security records and take action.

Topic: DEBIT CARDS FEE

Synopsis:

After months of intensive lobbying by banks, the Senate is slated to vote Wednesday on a controversial bill that would delay changes to debit-card swipe fees that would cost the industry billions of dollars. Sen. Jon Tester (D-Mont.) unveiled revised legislation Tuesday that requires four banking regulators to study the issue for six months. The Federal Reserve would then have an additional six months to rewrite the rules governing swipe fees. Tester's original bill called for a two-year delay and would have required Congress to vote again to approve additional action. The debate centers on the fees that merchants must pay banks each time a debit card is swiped.

Scientists developing treatments for the devastating brain disorder Creutzfeldt-Jakob Disease (CJD) have unexpectedly blocked the onset of Alzheimer's disease, the most common cause of dementia. Researchers said they were "thrilled" at the unexpected discovery that two antibodies - extensively studied in relation to CJD - may also have an effect on Alzheimer's disease. Almost 500,000 people a year in the UK and 20 million worldwide suffer from Alzheimer's. The finding, published in Nature Communications, represents a "significant step forward in the battle to develop drugs to treat Alzheimer's disease," they say. The lead came from an American study by researchers at Yale University in 2009, which showed prion proteins causing CJD also play a role in Alzheimer's disease.

The American Civil Liberties Union and the ACLU of Alabama said today that they will file, in coalition with other civil rights groups, a lawsuit challenging the constitutionality of Alabama's draconian anti-immigrant law before it goes into effect Sept. 1. HB 56, even more restrictive than Arizona's SB1070 which it was inspired by, was signed into law this morning by Alabama Gov. Scott Bentley. The law's key provisions sanction discriminatory and unconstitutional practices by police officers, landlords and employers by inviting racial profiling of Latinos and others based on how they look or talk, violating the First Amendment and interfering with federal law. Under the extreme law, Alabama public schools will require children to provide proof of citizenship when enrolling in kindergarten and grade school and require police to demand "papers" from people they stop whom they suspect are not authorized to be in the U.S.

The plight of undocumented immigrants in the United States is no stranger to the lives of Latino voters and a majority (53%) admit to having met someone who has no papers, and a quarter (25%) claim to know an individual or family who is facing deportation proceedings or have been deported. This was revealed by the survey Impremedia / Latino Decisions (LD), the third in a series of six national surveys that explore the views of the Latino population more integrated into American society: the registered voters. Alabama schools will soon have to check if students are in the country legally and people stopped for any reason could be arrested on suspicion of immigration violations under a sweeping law being called the nation's most restrictive against illegal immigration. Advocacy groups promised to challenge the sweeping measure signed by Gov. Robert Bentley on Thursday, which they call even more severe than the one in Arizona that is being challenged in court. In addition, it requires all businesses to check the legal status of workers using a federal system called E-Verify and makes it a crime to knowingly give an illegal immigrant a ride. "It is clearly unconstitutional. It's mean-spirited, racist, and we think a court will enjoin it," said Mary Bauer, legal director for the Southern Poverty Law Center.

The analysis based largely on previously unreleased data from the polling firm Bendixen & Amandi's 2008 National Survey of Latinos on the Environment - provides new evidence that toxic mercury pollution, which primarily comes from coal-fired plants, constitutes a clear and present danger to the health of the Latino community. According to the previously unpublished sections of the Sierra Club survey, 31 percent of Latinos fish regularly, and 76 percent of those eat and share what they catch with their families. These families include young children and women of childbearing age, the two most vulnerable population sectors to mercury poisoning.

SYNOPSIS:

Wal-Mart scored a big victory on Monday when the Supreme Court threw out the largest sexdiscrimination case in U.S. history, but it has been forced to address the issues raised in the suit. Since the sex-bias lawsuit was given class action status in 2004 on behalf of 1.6 million women, Wal-Mart Stores Inc. has added more policies for advancing women in the workplace. As a result, Wal-Mart says the percentage of entry and midlevel women managers has increased over the past five years from 38.8 percent to 41.2 percent. Some analysts say Wal-Mart is moving in the right direction, but has a ways to go. They note that there is only one woman among CEO Mike Duke's 11 direct reports.

SYNOPSIS:

A new study suggests that food allergies affect more children than government health officials estimate. The advocacy group-funded study in the Journal of Pediatrics says one in 13 children in the U.S. has some type of food allergy, and researchers say 40 percent of those children suffer severe reactions. Typical signs of a true food allergy include skin rashes, wheezing, tightness in the throat or difficulty breathing. In the study of more than 40,000 children, 8 percent had food allergies, and peanuts and milk were the most common sources.

SYNOPSIS:

Old-time, backroom politics faced down hundreds of chanting protesters from each side of the highly charged gay marriage debate in New York on Monday as the issue stalled again over whether religious groups could be protected from discrimination charges under a same-sex marriage law. After a three-hour conference behind closed doors, while groups from each side waited in a stifling hot hallway, Senate Republicans emerged without comment. Andrew Cuomo, who made same-sex marriage a major initiative.

Millions of homeowners in distress are getting some unexpected breathing room - lots of it in some places. In New York State, it would take lenders 62 years at their current pace, the longest time frame in the nation, to repossess the 213,000 houses now in severe default or foreclosure, according to calculations by LPS Applied Analytics, a prominent real estate data firm. Clearing the pipeline in New Jersey, which like New York handles foreclosures through the courts, would take 49 years. In Florida, Massachusetts and Illinois, it would take a decade. In the 27 states where the courts play no role in foreclosures, the pace is much more brisk - three years in California, two years in Nevada and Colorado - but the dynamic is the same: the foreclosure system is bogged down by the volume of cases, borrowers are fighting to keep their houses and many lenders seem to be in no hurry to add repossessed houses to their books.

Menendez and his colleagues said the Comprehensive Immigration Reform Act of 2011 will focus on strengthening border security, tougher worksite enforcement, and a requirement that the roughly 11 million undocumented in the U.S. register with the government. The legislation was drafted, Menendez said, with the intention of making it more palatable to those in Congress who prefer a tough approach to immigration.

A bill that requires police in South Carolina to check suspects' immigration status and mandates that all businesses check their hires through a federal online system received final legislative approval Tuesday. The House voted 69-43 to agree with the Senate's changes and send the bill to Gov. Nikki Haley, whose spokesman confirmed she will sign it. House Speaker Bobby Harrell noted South Carolina is the latest in a string of states to place similar requirements on law enforcement. "If Washington refuses to effectively support our law enforcement officers by enforcing immigration laws, it is left up to the states to stand up and do what is right," said Harrell, R-Charleston. "That is exactly what South Carolina did today by making sure our officers have the enforcement tools they need during this time of federal indecision."

Topic: CHOLESTEROL AND DIABETES RISK

SYNOPSIS:

Cholesterol-lowering drugs called statins, which have been shown to lower a person's risk for heart attack, can also slightly increase a patient's risk for developing diabetes, particularly at higher doses. The findings, based on new analyses of five clinical trials involving 32,752 patients, raise new questions about how much we really know about the long term effects of statins, which are the most widely prescribed drugs in the US. Doctors cautioned that patients should not overreact to the diabetes news, saying that the increased diabetes risk is very small, and that the benefits of statin therapy still far outweigh any side effects. "I don't think it's very clinically important," said Steven E Nissen, chairman of cardiology at the Cleveland Clinic. "What I worry about here is that people will read this story and say, 'I don't want to get diabetes so I'm going to stop my statin,' and then they have a heart attack."

Topic: TENNESSEE UNDOCUMENT PEOPLE LAWSUIT

SYNOPSIS:

In the first ruling of its kind in the federal court system in Tennessee and three surrounding states, a Knoxville magistrate judge is blocking a KUB contractor from trying to defeat a lawsuit over back wages by attacking the immigration status of the workers who filed it. U.S. Magistrate Judge Bruce Guyton acknowledged in his ruling the legal weightiness of the issue at hand for businesses and workers in the federal 6th Circuit, which includes Tennessee, Kentucky, Ohio and Michigan. "The court finds that the issue now before the court is an issue of first impression," Guyton wrote in a ruling released late last week.

SYNOPSIS:

Women who get silicone breast implants are likely to need additional surgery within 10 years to address complications such as rupturing of the device, U.S. health regulators said on Wednesday. The Food and Drug Administration will work to revise safety labels for silicone breast implants after reviewing data from several long-term studies, which also showed that the products had a small link to a rare form of cancer.

TOPIC: SITTING TOO LONG CAN SHORTEN YOUR LIFE

SYNOPSIS:

That might sound ridiculous -- or obvious -- depending on your perspective, but the findings don't come from a fringe study. They come from the American Cancer Society, whose researchers studied 123,216 people's health outcomes during a 14-year period. In particular, the American Cancer Society study finds that women who sit for more than six hours a day were about 40% more likely to die during the course of the study than those who sat fewer than three hours per day. Men were about 20% more likely to die.

TOPIC: LAMAR SMITH SECURE VISAS ACT

SYNOPSIS:

The House Judiciary Committee today passed the Secure Visas Act. The bill (H.R.1741), introduced last month by Rep. Lamar Smith (R-TX), would unconstitutionally eliminate judicial review of executive branch decisions to revoke visas, running contrary to clear Supreme Court precedent and Congress' own legislation enacted in 2004. A similar bill eliminating judicial review has also been introduced in the Senate.

Topic: SOUTH CAROLINA IMMIGRATION BILL

Synopsis: South Carolina Gov. Nikki Haley has signed an illegal immigration law that requires police to call federal immigration officials if they suspect someone is in the country illegally. That question must follow an arrest or traffic stop for something else. The law bars officers from holding someone solely on that suspicion. The Republican governor signed the bill Monday and said the new law won't lead to racial profiling. She stressed that her own parents were legal immigrants to this country. They are from India. Profiling is one issue the American Civil Liberties Union is raising as problematic in its vow to sue over the law. The legislation also makes it a felony to make fake photo identification for illegal immigrants.

Topic: GEORGIA'S NEW ILLEGAL IMMIGRATION LAW

synopsis: A U.S. federal judge Monday blocked key parts of Georgia's new illegal immigration crackdown from taking effect July 1. Judge Thomas Thrash issued a preliminary injunction halting Georgia from authorizing police officers to question criminal suspects about their immigration status. He also blocked portions of the measure, passed by the Republican-controlled state legislature and signed by Republican Governor Nathan Deal in May, which would make it a crime to knowingly harbor or transport an illegal immigrant. Enforcement of U.S. immigration laws traditionally is handled by federal, not state, authorities. But many Republicans fault federal efforts to stem illegal immigration. Georgia is the latest U.S. state to pass tough immigration legislation only to have it blocked in the courts. Courts have also halted key parts of laws passed by Arizona and Indiana. Meanwhile, South Carolina Republican Governor Nikki Haley Monday signed into law a bill that requires police to check the immigration status of anyone they stop or arrest for another reason and suspect may be in the country illegally.

Topic: HOME PRICES

Synopsis: Home prices in most major U.S. cities rose in April for the first time in eight months, boosted by an annual wave of spring buying. But the increases may be temporary. The sharpest increases were in Washington, D.C., followed by San Francisco, Atlanta and Seattle. But six areas hit their lowest levels in nearly four years: Charlotte, Chicago, Detroit, Las Vegas, Miami and Tampa.

Topic: DREAM ACT

Synopsis: Congressional Democrats are making a push to pass the DREAM Act - the long-simmering legislation that would create a path to citizenship for illegal immigrants brought into the country as children - with the first-ever Senate hearing on the legislation set for Tuesday. Some big guns, including Education Secretary Arne Duncan and Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano, are set to testify at the session chaired by Sen. Dick Durbin (D-III.) and hosted by the Senate Judiciary's Subcommittee on Immigration, Refugees and Border Security. The legislation, first introduced in 2001 and reintroduced several times since then, had earlier received the support of some Republicans but has fallen short of passage. Most recently, late last year, Senate Democrats attempted to fold the act into a defense-spending bill, only to see it filibustered. An effort to pass the DREAM Act separately also failed. The bill would make it possible for people brought into the country as children to apply for citizenship after spending several years in the country and completing two years of college or military service. Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid (D-Nev.) reintroduced the bill in May. This time, backers are focusing on the potential economic benefits of a path to citizenship.

Topic: MAMMOGRAMS HELP PREVENT BREAST CANCER

Synopsis: The longest-running breast cancer screening study ever conducted has shown that regular mammograms prevent deaths from breast cancer, and the number of lives saved increases over time, an international research team said on Tuesday. The study of 130,000 women in two communities in Sweden showed 30 percent fewer women in the screening group died of breast cancer and that this effect persisted year after year.

Synopsis:

Unemployment rates rose last month in more than half of the nation's largest metro areas, driven higher by weak private-sector hiring and natural disasters. The Labor Department says the unemployment rate increased in 210 metro areas in May. It fell in 131 cities and remained unchanged in 37. That's a sharp reversal from April, when unemployment rates dropped in more than 90 percent of metro areas.

Topic: Community Members will Gather to Protest Unjust Criminalization of Immigrants in Los Angeles County and Demand Accountability from Law Enforcement Officials Synopsis:

A coalition of national and community civil rights organizations will announce a legal challenge during a press conference at the headquarters of the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department. The announcement will be immediately followed by a demonstration protesting increased collaboration between the Los Angeles Sheriff's Department and federal immigration enforcement officials. Los Angeles County was among the first to enter into agreements that authorized peace officers to funnel immigrants from the criminal justice system into the deportation pipeline. As the nation's most populous county, these controversial agreements have led to increased deportation of community members, tearing apart families and wreaking havoc on community policing efforts.

Topic: Up to 220,000 California children excluded from health care reform due to

immigrant status

Synopsis:

Restrictions on eligibility for health care reform programs will result in the potential exclusion of up to 220,000 children from affordable health care coverage in California, according to a new policy brief from the UCLA Center for Health Policy Research. The number represents approximately 20 percent of all uninsured children in California. Of those children, up to 40,000 may be eligible for coverage but may not apply, due to confusion about new rules governing access to both the California Health Benefit Exchange and the state's expanded Medi-Cal program. The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act of 2010 (ACA) restricts its health insurance expansions in ways that exclude many uninsured children in California who are immigrants or have immigrant parents. And the policy brief's authors note that immigrant parents, potentially misinterpreting eligibility requirements for these new programs, may not enroll their eligible citizen children.

Topic: IMMIGRATION TEXAS

Synopsis:

Powerful business interests helped to scuttle proposed immigration restrictions in Texas Wednesday, further evidence that Republicans in some states are facing resistance among their own supporters to an immigration clampdown. The "sanctuary cities" bill would have barred cities from stopping police departments from asking about immigration status of people who are detained or arrested. It died when the Texas legislature adjourned without passing it.
