MOST SIGNIFICANT COMMUNITY ISSUES COVERED THIS OUARTER:

Public Safety/Education:

Our stations went wall to wall when Hurricane Isaac moved into the Gulf of Mexico, with updates every 15 minutes once the storm threatened our local area and for days after it made landfall, flooding homes and causing tornado damage. We kept listeners up to date on the air, as well as through the Stormwatch Radar feature on our station websites, and facebook/twitter updates.

Hurricane Isaac was a slow-moving tropical cyclone that caused severe damage along the northern Gulf Coast of the United States in late-August 2012. Prior to becoming a hurricane, Isaac attained one of the lowest barometric pressure measurements, on August 28, for any storm below hurricane strength, with a pressure of 976 mbar (hPa). The ninth tropical cyclone, ninth named storm, and fourth hurricane of the 2012 Atlantic hurricane season, Isaac developed from a tropical wave located east of the Lesser Antilles on August 21, strengthening into a tropical storm later that day. Isaac passed over Hispaniola and Cuba as a strong tropical storm, killing at least 34 people in Hispaniola, before it entered the Gulf of Mexico. Once Isaac got into the gulf, it was forecasted to become a strong category 2 hurricane. However, the land interaction with Hispaniola disrupted the system and prevented a solid core from developing until just before landfall. Due to its size, a high storm surge and a large area of tropical storm force winds was observed. Isaac reached hurricane strength the morning of August 28. The storm made its first U.S. landfall at 6:45 p.m. CDT that evening (2345 UTC), near the mouth of the Mississippi River. It made a second and final landfall at 2:00 a.m. CDT (0700 UTC) the next morning at Port Fourchon, Louisiana.

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GULF COAST ISSUES:

"Gulf Coast Issues" is a half hour community service program that airs each weekend on all 4 of our Clear Channel stations. Different topics are discussed each week, at the discretion of the News Director.

"Gulf Coast Issues" airs on WQYZ 6:30p each Saturday.

Our stations also ran 40 minutes of news, weather and traffic covering issues such as taxpayer money, budget issues in state government and how it will affect local residents, cuts to schools and institutions of high learning and more 40 min's per week

July 7-8:

Ken Feinberg, the Administrator of the BP Oil Spill wrote a book on his legal experiences, which include decision to help dole out the settlement money to residents affected by the spill. We focused on that, as well as the distribution of funds after 9-11...and the differences between the two.

July 14-15:

We spoke with Martha Duvall about the upcoming benefit for the local Red Cross as follows:

July 21-22:

We aired Senator Roger Wicker's comments on the senate floor with regard to the following:

Senator Roger Wicker (R-Miss.) on Wednesday spoke on the Senate Floor about the looming spending cuts that are mandated by sequestration. The cuts are set to take effect on Jan. 3, 2013, and could threaten more than 1 million jobs nationwide. This is especially important locally, where our states largest employer is Huntington Ingalls Industries, where they build military ships.

In part, Wicker said: "Admiral Mike Mullen, the former Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, put it simply, our debt is our number one national security threat. And yet, severe across-the-board cuts to the Department of Defense are not the way to address the security threat, and they are not the way to achieve long-term fiscal responsibility. Federal debt is a national security threat – to be sure – but so would be unilaterally cutting key funding to America's men and women in uniform."

We followed Wicker's comments with an interview with Paul Antinori - Constitutional Expert and Author of *"CONVENTION: To Resurrect The US Constitution"* to discuss the following:

- What are the key Constitutional differences between Romneycare and Obamacare?
- Why must the Constitution be the backbone of any argument against Obamacare?
- How was the Supreme Court's ruling key in the fight to restore the Constitution?
- What governor's have used the Constitution as their argument in electing not to enact Obamacare?
- How will a Constitutional Convention help to restore the US Constitution?

She is also Executive Director/Founder of nonprofit, LAYIBI Village, Inc. Special panel guests include high school students from throughout Jackson County. Aug 11-12:

State-by-State Report Details What Legislators Can Do to Fight Cancer Through Public Policy

Jane Streets, State Lead Ambassador for Mississippi American Cancer Society, is available for LIVE interviews Thursday, August 9

Nearly two-thirds of all states are falling short in the fight against cancer, according to a new report by the American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network (ACS CAN), the non-profit advocacy affiliate of the American Cancer Society. The annual report, *How Do You Measure Up? A Progress Report on State Legislative Activity to Reduce Cancer Incidence and Mortality*, now in its 10th year, is a blueprint for state legislators on how to effectively prevent and treat cancer through strong tobacco control policies, improving access to care and adequately funding cancer screening programs.

How Do You Measure Up? found that only two states — Delaware and Vermont — are making progress in enacting and strengthening policies that fight cancer, while 16 others and the District of Columbia have shown mixed results and 32 more are falling short. **Mississippi is falling short, meeting none of ACS CAN's benchmarks in the seven issues.**

The report identifies specific policy actions that state legislatures can take to fight cancer, including adequate breast and cervical cancer early detection program funding; colorectal screening coverage laws; comprehensive smoke-free laws; tobacco prevention program funding; and increased tobacco taxes. The 2012 report adds two new measures, tanning bed bans for minors and access to palliative care to treat pain and other symptoms of the disease. *How Do You Measure Up?* also examines state efforts to implement provisions of the Affordable Care Act (ACA) that benefit people with chronic diseases, such as cancer. To help guide state policymakers, the report provides grades of red, yellow and green based on a current snapshot of state laws.

Nearly 1.6 million people in the United States will be diagnosed with cancer in 2012 and more than 570,000 people will die from the disease this year alone. In Mississippi in 2012, more than 15,000 people will be diagnosed with cancer and 6,000 will die from it. With the knowledge we have today, we could prevent roughly half of cancer deaths

in the United States. Research shows that achieving that goal requires stronger tobacco control laws, better access to cancer screening and treatments and policies that support proper nutrition and physical activity.

SUGGESTED QUESTIONS FOR JOANNE BUZAGLO RMT: CANCER PAIN

Why is cancer pain under diagnosed and under treated?

Are cancer patients afraid to be fully honest about their level of pain? Why?

Is there a social stigma around pain? Do cancer patients believe they have to "suck it up"?

What's the best way to talk about pain with your doctor? What Is most helpful to doctors?

Could it be that patients are afraid that if they focus or admit to pain it will make it worse?

We hear the phrase pain management. Is that more than prescription drugs?

With cancer, is the pain just due to the disease itself? Or can the treatment cause pain as well?

Do doctors, by and large, have a good grounding in pain management with cancer patients?

What can patients do to better communicate with the doctor? How can they develop a vocabulary for discussing pain?

Do any racial, ethnic, or age groups in particular have difficulty discussing pain with their doctors? How does a child communicate pain and the severity of it?

When someone is experiencing chronic or acute pain because of cancer, the people around them—caretakers and family members – are also affected. Should they be included in the pain management program?

Can the emotional and psychological factors surrounding a diagnosis of cancer affect the amount of pain patient experiences?

The statistics on under treatment of cancer pain are kind of frightening, especially among African Americans. How much less adequately is cancer pain treated in minorities?

If pain is undertreated, that affects quality of life and can even affect recovery itself, can't it?

Why do you think pain is undertreated so often?

Are there communication barriers between minorities and doctors that keep African American patients from getting the pain relief they need?

How come African Americans are reluctant to complain about pain?

A lot of the drugs you need to treat cancer pain are powerful. But are a lot of doctors afraid to treat pain adequately?

So what should patients do about it? What should families do?
