A Montgomery County judge dismissed a lawsuit against Montgomery College accusing it of illegally offering reduced tuition rates to illegal immigrants. Plaintiff: Judicial Watch argued the policy has cost the state millions of dollars by allowing illegal immigrants who are entitled by federal law to a K-12 education, but not a college education to attend school at a reduced rate. Meanwhile the Obama administration will halt deportation proceedings on a case-by-case basis against illegal who meet certain criteria such as: attending school, head of household and serving in the military.
