ISSUE: Environment

Topic: About 20 years ago, scientists discovered a new thermal area in Yellowstone. It was actually by accident – the area is off the beaten path in the eastern side of the park. But some infrared satellite imagery showed that the area had warm ground, which indicated things were

changing. Twenty years later, scientists are still studying the Tern Lake thermal area to further

understand it.

Topic: Warmer falls have made hunting harder, especially elk. This is affecting the Wyoming

Game and Fish Department managing elk.

ISSUE: Elections

Topic: On election night, Wyoming Public Radio's Melodie Edwards had the chance to speak with Harriet Hageman only moments after she learned she'd won Wyoming's lone seat in the U.S. House of Representatives. Edwards asked her about bringing the state together after a contentious run against Liz Cheney and Democrat Lynette Grey Bull, and about her first

priorities. Here's what Hageman had to say.

Topic: Students in Weston County schools are eating locally grown and raised foods and learning about the role of local agriculture as part of a nationwide Farm to School program.

Topic: Wyoming's many family owned ranches and farms do not always have an easy go of it and it is not always profitable. But a few are starting to look to "agri-tourism" as inspiration for some supplemental income.

ISSUE: Housing

Topic: Animal Shelters in Wyoming have seen an increase in surrenders and stray animals in the past year leading to high-capacity issues. Recently, a University of Florida report found that in many places, this high capacity is due to the decrease in spay and neuter surgeries during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic. However, in Wyoming, there's more to it than just that.

Topic: Home renters and home buyers in Wyoming are facing a crisis. Some people are homeless or on the verge of being homeless. Others cannot afford existing homes or are just one misfortune away from housing instability. While for many first-time home buyers, housing

is simply not available. Melissa Noah works with the Wyoming Housing Network, a nonprofit that develops affordable housing across the state. She spoke to Wyoming Public Radio's Friday Otuya.

Topic: The Sheridan Foster Parent Exchange is an organization that serves children in crisis and provides material support to families and foster parents taking care of them in Sheridan and Johnson counties. The demand for their services has risen this year and is expected to continue into the next. Wyoming Public Radio's Hugh Cook spoke with the Exchange's Carla Crayton about what they're doing this holiday season and what they're preparing for next year.

Topic: The Riverton Peace Mission's winter clothes drive provided around 50 people with items like coats, sleeping bags, and winter weather gear. It was the first time the Riverton Peace Mission held a clothes drive. Carol Harper helped collect donations and said the recent death of a community member made their group want to take action.

ISSUE: Wildlife

Topic: A new study highlights the importance of both protected and private lands in the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem (GYE) for wildlife migration. The study specifically focuses on elk in the GYE, which includes much of western Wyoming and is 'one of the largest nearly intact temperate-zone ecosystems on Earth,' according to the National Park Service. Lead researcher Laura Gigliotti spoke with Wyoming Public Radio's Caitlin Tan.

Topic: A new podcast from Montana State University Extension and the Western Landowners Alliance digs into the controversy of wolves. Co-host Alex Few said "Working Wild University" is

ISSUE: Community issues

Topic: Cooke City is a small mountain town in the southwest corner of Montana that is known for being the snowiest town in the state and is also a gateway town to Yellowstone National Park. In the winter, there is only one driving road into the town from the west, because to the east is a nine mile stretch of highway that is not plowed. That nine miles has created a lot of controversy amongst locals.

Topic: On an early December afternoon, grandkids, parents and grandparents huddled together in the waiting area near a Christmas tree in the Jackson Hole Airport. They were just outside of the security line taking the last minutes to spend time with each other before some of them boarded.

ISSUE: Inflation

Topic: Inflation has hit paychecks pretty hard this year as it is at a 40-year high. Decision makers in Washington, D.C. are hoping to see inflation go down. In fact, the Federal Reserve hiked interest rates by another three-quarters of a percentage point in October, putting the rate at 3.75 percentage points, up from zero in March. And while fuel prices have slowly decreased from record levels nationally and statewide, the average price of gas in Wyoming is \$3.62 per gallon, up from \$3.49 a year ago. Jared Bernstein is a member of the Council of Economic Advisers for the White House, and tackling inflation is part of his job. Wyoming Public Radio's Caitlin Tan asked him how the White House is thinking about tackling inflation and increased fuel prices in rural areas.

Topic: The cost of goods has increased in America by about nine percent over the last year, which is the largest increase in 40 years. It has affected the price of everything, including groceries, gas, clothes and hay, an essential good for livestock in our region.

ISSUE: Native American Issues

Topic: Jordan Dresser was on the Northern Arapaho Business Council as chairman for two years. He has developed quite the resume. He was appointed to a federal solutions committee, named one of the young leaders in Indian Country at large, and he's a filmmaker. However, he

was not reelected to the council. Wyoming Public Radio's Taylar Stagner caught up with Dresser in a Lander coffee shop to find out what's next for him.

ISSUE: LGBTQ +

Topic: Casper is joining a handful of towns in Wyoming with a nondiscrimination ordinance. Without a statewide hate crime bill or non discrimination bill, the ordinance brings local protections to the towns rural queer community. The ordinance was a suggestion from Casper's LGBTQ + advisory council. That suggestion was originally made 18 months ago.

Topic: Vaping and e-cigarettes have increased in popularity in recent years, largely due to the misconception that they are healthier than cigarettes. University of Wyoming researcher

Guanglong He is looking into how vaping can cause cardiac failure. Wyoming Public Radio's Taylar Stagner talked with He about his ongoing research.
