Mexico's National Water Commission said Orlene could cause mudslides, rising river and stream levels, and flooding in low-lying areas.

The Food and Drug Administration said the new companies will have until October 2025 to make sure their formulas comply with federal standards for nutrition, labeling and manufacturing.

The new owners must maintain it as a Coast Guard navigational aid, observe historic preservation standards and sign an agreement with the Navy about when it can be accessed.
