QUARTERLY SIGNIFICANT PROGRAMS REPORT

July 1 – September 30, 2016

Station KWCH –DT is a CBS Network affiliate in its service area. In carrying out its responsibilities as a public trustee, the station deals with and is responsive to the principal issues arising in its community on a continuing basis. A variety of specials, public service announcements, public affairs programs and broadcasts on matter of concern to our community are supplemented, in some cases, with in-community projects. Our most significant programming, which has dealt with current community issues during the preceding three-month period, is set forth below.

There are three primary satellites of KWCH-DT which simulcast most of the programming. KBSD-DT, KBSH-DT, and KBSL-DT do insert local segments and are listed in the Supplemental Issues and Programming report for each station.

Specific Treatment of Community Issues

News stories carried in any of five daily newscasts, Monday through Friday, and on three per day newscasts on Saturday, and on two per day newscasts on Sunday, ranging in length of 45 seconds or more, address community issues.

COMMUNITY ISSUES

Crime - Channel 12 reports regularly on criminal activity throughout the entire Channel 12 viewing area as well as the rest of the country and the world. Here we are listing just a few of the stories that were included in our newscast this quarter.

Community - Events impacting the quality of life, including community caring and involvement.

Economy - The economy is of major importance to Kansas residents. Continuing growth keeps our employment rate high; new contract acquisitions by the local aircraft manufacturers, old businesses leaving town, new businesses coming in, proposed tax increases/decreases, and major weather concerns for residences and businesses. All of these factors impact the community, and are of ongoing interest and concern for our viewing audience.

Education - Channel 12 has updated its method of covering educational issues in its viewing area, with the assignment of one reporter to focus solely on education.

Environment - Environment issues and concerns are of interest to the Channel 12 viewing area and are aired regularly in our newscasts to keep our viewers as informed as possible of the latest in Environmental technology, treatments, advisories, etc.

Health & Safety - The well-being of Channel 12 viewers is always our top concern and the Channel 12 News Team is on top of every issue from traffic hazards to severe weather warnings, school closings, fire safety, disaster preparedness and emergency situations. And, with severe weather season, storm spotter training meetings are held several times a week in locations throughout the Channel 12 viewing area all over the state.

7/2/16

8am

Saline county crime stoppers is looking for whomever broke into four school construction sites. A statement says someone stole more than three thousand dollars' worth of computer equipment from the school district. If you know who's responsible, you're asked to call the county crime stoppers line.

7/3/16

5:30pm

Salina police want you to be on the look-out for this man. Police say john brown is wanted on attempted first-degree murder and aggravated battery charges. Brown is considered armed and dangerous. Police say brown is responsible for stabbing two people early this morning. If you see him - don't approach him. Instead, call the salina police department or crime stoppers at the number on your screen.

7/4/16

5pm

A Wichita man is found dead inside his home. Now police are looking into how it happened. They tell us a concerned neighbor called asking them to check the home on south Laura, near Southeast Boulevard and Mount Vernon this morning. When they arrived they found a man in his 50's dead. Police are calling the death "suspicious" but have not yet determined how the man died. We'll bring you an update on the investigation as soon as it becomes available.

7/5/16

5pm

We're following breaking news from Butler County... where authorities are searching for an escaped inmate. Investigators say Trevor long escaped twice, while he was transported from the butler county jail to Cowley County. He told a part-time prison transport officer he was sick. The officer pulled-over to let him vomit outside the vehicle. And, long ran away. After catching him, long convinced the employee to let him speak to a family member at a gas station in Augusta before transporting him to jail. He ran-off a second time and was not found. Long was convicted of child abuse last year. Officers are still looking for him.

7/6/16

4:30am

Authorities in Butler and Cowley Counties- want your help finding this man. The Cowley County Sheriff's Office says Trevor Long escaped police custody twice while being transported by a part-time prisoner transportation officer Friday. The sheriff's office says Long was picked up from the Butler County Jail where he was booked on a probation violation for a child abuse charge. Authorities say Long told the driver he was going to get sick. When the driver let him out of the vehicle, Long took off. The officer was able to catch long, and got him back into the vehicle to get him back into the car though, the officer agreed to let long say good bye to a family member at a gas station in Augusta. The officer followed through and let Long out at the gas station; that's when Long took off again. If you see him, you're asked to call police.

7/7/16

5:30am

A 32-year-old man is dead after an officer-involved shooting last night in Falcon Heights, Minnesota and his girlfriend recorded a Facebook live video of the aftermath. Philando Castile's with his girlfriend Lavisha Reynolds... And her daughter when they were pulled over for a broken tail light. A video circulating on Facebook LIVE was filmed by Reynolds showing the aftermath of the shooting. She says police asked Castile for his license and registration. And as he was reaching for his wallet, he informed officers that he had a firearm and a conceal-and-carry permit. She goes on to say that an officer then shot Castile four times. She then shows him covered in blood. The Minnesota Bureau of Criminal Apprehension is investigating this case. More than 100 people are gathered at the Governor's residence in St. Paul early this morning in protest of the shooting.

7/8/16

4:30am

a horrific scene in downtown Dallas last night 5 officers have been shot and killed...6 others are injured the shooting happened near the end of a mostly peaceful protest march supporting the black lives matter movement demonstrators were expressing outrage over police shooting deaths in Louisiana and Minnesota. Protestors scattered - some injured in the rush to get to safety. Witnesses documented the scene on social media, their cell phones capturing images of injured officers. The police chief says three people are in custody and says the shooting appears to be a coordinated plot. <"Working together with rifles, triangulated at elevated positions from different points in the downtown area where the march ended up going"> w-f-a-a in Dallas reports one suspect who was barricaded downtown is now dead. Early reports from Fox 4 in Dallas indicate that the suspect shot and killed himself police say at least one civilian was hurt as well. But authorities say it appears the shooter or shooters specifically targeted police officers.

7/9/16

8am

We're learning new details about a man arrested after a child choked on an octopus. New court documents say Matthew Gallagher first told police he fed the toddler chicken for dinner, and did not know how the child could have had an octopus lodged in his throat. The boy's mother came home from work to find Gallagher performing c-p-r on the child. She called 9-1-1. Doctors at the hospital suctioned a 2 and a half inch long octopus from the child's throat. Gallagher eventually admitted to feeding the toddler the octopus and not chicken. He's charged with aggravated child endangerment.

7/10/16

6am

The butler county sheriff says after lunch was served today... 57 inmates refused to return to their cells and lock down, after complaining about the mashed potatoes and gravy. It started at 12:30 this afternoon... When the inmates started over turning tables, breaking security cameras and TVs, and setting off fire extinguishers, the Butler County Jail called in reinforcement. The swat team, Kansas department of corrections, Augusta and El Dorado police, as well as fire and ems all responded. Herzet says their plan was to use tear gas and sting balls if necessary... But they had a hostage negotiator tell the inmates about the plan, and the inmates returned to their cells. Herzet says in his five years as sheriff, there's never been issue like this about the food. < We've not had any problems in the past with the meal service 17:23:49 we serve an excellent meal every day, three times a day. But today apparently it must've hit them wrong and they retaliated by not locking down. 17:23:58 > authorities got the situation under control at about 3:30... And no one was hurt. Herzet says the inmates involved will be disciplined, and there will be some changes made to the pods - such as better securing the furniture, to the ground.

7/11/16

6am

And a woman in Wyoming found a body! The woman says... She decided to go for a walk before work in hopes of catching a water Pokémon... Instead... She found a body lying face down in the river. She called 9-1-1 and was told to wait at the highway for a police officer. She says... Finding a body won't stop her from playing.

7/12/16

4:30am

A 9-year-old girl in Indiana found an abandoned infant in her family's backyard. Elysia Laub told the C-B-S affiliate in Indianapolis she thought it was a piglet at first because her family keeps pigs in a pen. When she walked over and realized it was a baby, she screamed for her mom. The baby, likely less than a day old, still had the placenta and umbilical cord attached. Sheriff's deputies say the girl saved the baby's life. Elysia says God led her to the backyard in the first place. <"If I wasn't there and God didn't tell my brain, if my brain didn't make me over there, we'd find a dead baby in our yard this afternoon and it would be much worse and much different"> The baby suffered sun exposure but is expected to be fine.

7/13/16

4:30am

"We have never in our lives as law enforcement officers seen such egregious treatment of pets. This was the worse of the worse for everybody involved." two people in Maryland face dozens of animal cruelty charges. We should warn you, some of this video may be disturbing. More than 300 dogs were taken from the couple's property. The animals, mostly Pomeranians, were found living in their own waste with very little food, shelter, and not even the proper amount of air in some places on the property. Many of them have already been adopted by new families.

7/14/16

5am

Wichita police chief Gordon Ramsay said his department's response to Tuesday night's protest was a success. He says his officers knew exactly what was going to happen along 13th street - and that made a huge difference for them - and for the protesters exercising their first amendment rights. <5:41 no one got hurt. There was no property damage. People got to express their emotions and, uh, you know, their first amendment rights. Um, we didn't clog up the judicial system with a bunch of arrests. 5:57 > Ramsay also says his staff are going to increase their presence in the community in the coming weeks. The first sign of that increased presence will be seen Sunday. Wichita police and protest organizers will co-host a community barbecue.

7/15/16

Noon

A man shoots his ex-girlfriend in front of family members this morning before shooting himself this happened in a neighborhood near Harrison Park at Harry and Webb Amanda Jaeger has been on the scene all morning. Amanda what's the latest?

7/16/16

6pm

A prostitution sting targeting massage parlors, leads to a year and a half in federal prison for a Wichita man. 51 year old Kay Tee was sentenced on Friday in federal court he was convicted in April of trying to entice someone to cross

state lines to engage in prostitution, using a telephone to do so he was indicted last year for trying to buy a massage parlor that would offer sexual services.

7/17/16 10pm

Let's quickly recap what we know about the shooting in Louisiana... We know three officers are dead, three are wounded. We know the shooter was killed by law enforcement on scene - but police say they are looking for additional suspects. Despite that - law enforcement say there's no threat to the public. We'll follow developments from Baton Rouge overnight. Expect an update on eyewitness news this morning tomorrow starting at four-30.

7/18/16 Noon

Investigators in Baton Rouge are trying to determine what motivated a former marine sergeant from Missouri to open fire on police officers. Three were killed and three others were injured in the shooting on Sunday morning. Chris Martinez has the latest from Baton Rouge.

7/19/16 4:30am

Authorities discover more than 8-hundred pounds of marijuana off the coast of California. But the people who owned it were nowhere in sight. Sheriff's deputies received a call about the "Panga," which is a small drug boat. By the time they arrived, the boat was gone, but the drugs were still there... The area is known for a spot where drug runners dock their boats. <not verbatim: And the biggest concern for law enforcement and for people, is... there's a lot of narcotics. We have run into people who are heavily armed cause, as we talked about the money earlier, this could mean a lot of money for somebody > The coast guard eventually found the boat and pulled it out of the water to search for more evidence. The Department of Homeland Security is now working on the investigation.

7/20/16 5am

Akeam Ashford talked to eyewitnesses at the crime scene. One man lives nearby AND says he heard multiple gun shots. He says he told his mother to get on the floor. He didn't want his face on camera, but he told our crews what he saw next. <not verbatim: i was looking at television, i went up and looked out the window and i saw an officers car in the street, the door was open and i saw the window had been shot out, then i looked over in the car and i seen him kind of slumped over in the seat. > The Kansas City, Kansas police department is set to brief the media this morning at 10-30. Akeam will be there. We will stream it live on our website.

7/21/16 5am

A vigil in Kansas City honors Captain Robert "Dave" Melton. The Kansas City Kansas police officer was killed Tuesday afternoon - in the line of duty. Hundreds paid their respects last night in front of city hall. Investigators say a random act of violence cost Melton his life. Melton served in Iraq and Afghanistan. His colleagues say he lead by example. <not verbatim: not Terry Ziegler chief of police just a big lovable guy. Hard exterior, but soft on the inside, and well respected throughout our organization and in the community. > Melton's funeral will be Saturday.

7/22/16

5am

The Wyandotte county district attorney says Jamaal Lewis and Daqon Sipple ARE responsible for a Kansas City Kansas police captain's death. Lewis is charged with capital murder of a police officer and aggravated assault with a deadly weapon. Prosecutors say he shot and killed Captain Robert Melton. Sipple - who prosecutors describe as an accomplice - is charged with aggravated assault Melton was shot Tuesday while responding to reports of a drive-by-shooting. Police say the death was not planned like the killings in Dallas and Baton Rouge. Lewis and Sipple will be in court this morning at 10-30.

7/23/16

8am

Kansas is suing the federal government to get documents related to white house plans to move prisoners from Guantanamo bay, Cuba to fort Leavenworth. The attorney general's office says it filed a request for the documents in December but never received any. President Obama made a campaign promise to close the prison in Cuba. Fort Leavenworth considered moving the terror suspects to the Kansas prison. Members of Congress have blocked Obama's efforts to close Guantanamo.

7/24/16

5:30pm

Two people are injured in separate Wichita shootings overnight. The first happened around four a-m along east Winterberry Street near 29th and rock road. Police say a 20-year-old was shot in the leg while walking home from a party. About an hour later, a 43-year-old man was hurt in a different shooting... this one near 13th and eye-135. Police say he was shot in the face by a shotgun, but is expected to survive. Police say the shot went through a door before striking the man. No arrests have been made in either case.

7/25/16

4:30am

From finding a stranger in her house, to learning he may have injured her dog while inside. It's an update to a story we first told you about last week... after Renee Flores came home to find a man in her living room. She soon noticed her dog was hurt. Rachel Skytta explains how an anonymous donor helped in the healing.

7/26/16

4:30am

An update to a story we told you about Friday ... Police arrested a man who was hurt in a shooting in Pratt. Officers say they arrested Joshua Hamic for criminal threat, assault and criminal damage to property. Police say someone shot Hamic in the chest Friday. First responders took him a Wichita hospital for treatment. Police have not identified who shot Hamic. The shooting is still under investigation.

7/27/16

5am

An inmate who escaped a Dickinson county jail is back in custody. The Dickinson county sheriff office says they ALSO arrested warren Varelman-Morton. He's accused of helping Trent Hostetter escape from jail Monday night. Varelman-Morton will be charged with criminal damage to property and conspiracy to commit aggravated escape from custody.

7/28/16

6am

A man whose life was changed forever by serial killer Dennis Rader looks forward to a new book about b-t-k. Rader murdered 4 members of Charlie Otero's family in 1974 when he was a teenager. A new book is coming out... called "confession of a serial killer". Otero and other family of other victims chose author Katherine Ramsland to write about the crimes. They feel she will clear up misconceptions about the case. <"I look forward to the world finding the real truth and I don't know if this book will bring all of it out but it will get it closer to the truth"> in the book Rader talks about being emotionally shaken when hearing about a mass shooting on the news... but asks, "why is it that i can have normal person emotions, touched, be sad, have tears, yet do what i did." and, "i don't fit the normal mold of a serial killer... most have either abusive fathers or mothers... or something in childhood that was not normal. Both of my parents loved me and never abused me." the book comes out in September....the author is sharing royalties with families of Rader's 10 victims.

7/29/16

5am

An inmate at the Sedgwick county jail is in even more trouble this morning - accused of starting a fire inside his cell. This happened early yesterday morning. Sheriff's deputies put out the fire. They had to move other inmates to other areas because of the smoke. Medical professionals treated two inmates for minor injuries. Detectives are investigating and will present the case to the district attorney's office for charges.

7/30/16

8am

Wichita police are looking for two men connected to a shooting they say happened near a Dillon's parking lot. Officers say the victim ran to a nearby bus stop at 13th and West Street after getting shot. Police are reviewing surveillance cameras to try to identify the shooter. Investigators say he fired multiple times in the parking lot. First responders took the victim to the hospital with non-life threatening injuries.

8/1/16

5am

Hays police tell us they made an arrest in a death investigation. Police say 33-year-old timothy walker died following a fight late Saturday night. Officers arrested 25-year-old derrick smith. He's held in the Ellis county jail on second degree murder and battery charges. Investigators say - when officers arrived they found walker unconscious. Officers performed c-p-r on walker before taking him to a hospital - where he later died. The k-b-i is assisting in the investigation.

8/2/16

5pm

Police say Jerron Baxter turned himself in at the cloud county jail last week. Investigators say he stole 86 hundred dollars for personal use that was supposed to be spent on a youth football program in Concordia, primarily run by volunteers. Baxter was booked on four counts of theft, three of them felonies. Our news partners at the salina journal say the youth football program bank account was used to pay for things like Netflix and insurance payments. Police began investigating after Baxter told a cheer leading sponsor there was no money for the cheerleaders, despite recent fundraising activities. <not verbatim: our biggest problem is right now that we don't have any money basically we're not in jeopardy by any means when it comes management side of things, we're kind of in a little bit of jeopardy when it comes to money funds to try to keep the kids in good equipment. > Baxter posted a 5 thousand dollar bond. He's expected back in court later this month.

8/3/16

4:30am

Dollar general faces a 105 thousand dollar fine after inspectors found safety violations in two Kansas stores one of those stores was the location at Pawnee and Broadway where OSHA found blocked exits and covered electrical panels. OSHA cited the store five times for infractions. OSHA also cited a location in clay center for electrical, fall, and trip hazards.

8/4/16

5am

5am

10-thousand dollars' worth of cattle disappear. Now Marion county deputies are trying to figure out who stole them. The sheriff's office says someone cut a padlock to a pasture near Durham. The eight missing livestock all have yellow tags in their left ears with the name "Schafer" on those tags. The sheriff's office says the missing livestock are between 850 and 900 pounds. If you see cattle matching this description, investigators want you to call the number on your screen. We've also posted this information on our Facebook page. You can share it to spread the word and help deputies find those responsible for the theft.

8/6/16

8am

A Marion county rancher says eight cattle are still missing from his property. He says someone stole them. Livestock investigators are sending information about the cows to feedlots and sale barns. Each steer costs about 13 hundred dollars. Factfinder 12 looked into the livestock investigation unit which is handling the case. We learned this agency has handled 52 cases since it started in 20-14. They've recovered 55 stolen cattle. And found 47 stray cattle. That's estimated at more than 200-thousand dollars in value recovered.

8/7/16

10pm

A string of armed robberies at seven different Wichita businesses this weekend leaves employees across the city on edge... the suspects mostly targeted fast food restaurants and gas stations... Deedee Sun spoke with some employees who were robbed, tonight, they're hoping something will change to improve safety.

8/8/16

4:30am

8/9/16

5pm

Investigators say inmates caused a sewage backup at the Sedgwick county jail. The sheriff's office says someone flushed plastic bags, trash, and several towels down the toilets causing a blockage. That caused some flooding in an area that houses 85 inmates. This is the second time in the last two months inmates have backed the toilets up.

8/10/16

6am

New this morning. A police officer accidentally shoots and kills Florida woman in front of more than 30 people. It happened last night during a live gun demonstration as part of a self-defense class. The 73-year old was participating in a role-playing scenario called - "shoot-don't shoot." the demonstration was meant to instruct the class on making decision about using lethal force. The gun was supposed to have a blank round - but instead had a live round. The officer involved has been placed on administrative leave.

8/11/16

5pm

This just happened for a second time a couple of hours ago... Right here under these trees. It started yesterday two kids from a home across the street wanted ice cream and came out to the ice cream truck parked here. that's when the kids say the ice cream man had the door open and was naked below the waist... fondling himself. They told their parents... and when the man came back today.... their father says he came out to confront the ice cream vendor. Dad tells me... he saw the same thing again... and when he told the ice cream seller to cover up... the other man got angry. Both parents tell me they're worried for their kids and for other kids in this neighborhood... Because they've seen this same ice cream man driving around here a lot. The parents called police today... And reported the case. But police tell us investigators haven't filed their report yet.

8/12/16

5am

A couple in Wichita has a warning for parents. They say their kids saw an ice cream truck driver performing a lewd act near Alley Park on south Seneca... They say their kids saw it happen Wednesday... so when they saw the truck again Thursday, the dad went to confront the driver. And says he saw the driver doing the same thing, again. Surveillance video from a home nearby shows the truck yesterday. The father who saw the man says he's worried for not only his own kids, but others who play at this park. <not verbatim: ENRIQUE28:18 this is really disgusting because this man he sells ice cream to the kids.> the couple did file a police report about what they say happened... We're still waiting to hear what they found.

8/13/16

8am

An update on a story you saw first on eyewitness news..... Police say they've identified an ice cream truck driver accused of fondling himself in front of children. We first showed you this surveillance video of an ice cream truck Thursday night. It was taken around the same time parents say children saw the driver fondling himself. Factfinder 12 called the company that owns the truck. It tells us the driver in question is not driving again until the investigation is complete. It also tells us the driver is an independent contractor who rents the truck from the company. We contacted the corporate offices of frosty treats. A spokesperson tells us the company does rigorous background checks. The city of Wichita does require an ice cream vendor license for ice cream truck drivers too.

8/15/16

6am

Four members of the u-s swimming team, including Ryan Lochte, were robbed at gunpoint in Rio Saturday night. All four of the athletes are safe. The swimmers say the thieves, who were posing as police officers... stopped their taxis and took their money and other personal belongings at gunpoint.

8/16/16

4:30am

He's accused of exposing himself to kids buying ice cream. Police say he turned himself in Monday it's a story you first saw last week on eyewitness news. We're learning more about Bruce Hays' criminal record... And *why he was allowed to work around children. Cowley county records show Hays was convicted on three counts of aggravated sexual battery for two women in 2008. He served jail time and after he was released, he was placed on the sex offender registry.

8/17/16

5pm

Factfinder 12 wanted to know how Thompson was hired as a teacher in Wichita while this investigation took place across the state. We asked the district back in January when charges were filed. You can see that story right now on k-w-c-h dot com.

8/18/16

6am

A standoff in valley center ends peacefully. The standoff began around 7-30 last night near 77-th north and meridian. Police say... The man inside a home wanted to harm his father. After his parents left and police arrived... The man started making threats against police. After about nearly 7 hours... The man gave up. He was taken to the hospital. <22:43:14 - Everything's done at this point. We had a peaceful ending to this thing. It was a lot of negotiations with him he's a very distraught young man and we will be taking him to the hospital to be evaluated.> no one was hurt... And no shots were fired.

8/19/16

5pm

Update: Police say one man is in custody in connection with this reported kidnapping. We're told by authorities at the scene that a young female, whose age had not been released, was taken from St. Louis County, Missouri. Police tracked her to the home in Wichita by pinging her phone. When police got to the scene at around 3:45 Friday afternoon, they found the female and arrested the man. No other details have been released, but we do know police are now talking with the female about what happened.

8/20/16

8am

We continue to ask questions.... about a deadly officer involved shooting in Hays. A Hays police officer shot and killed a 36-year old man Thursday. Investigators say the officer gave verbal commands during a traffic stop and the man did not obey. The incident escalated to a chase and the officer fired one deadly shot at another location. We are asking if the man had a weapon or threatened the officer. The Ellis county attorney says he cannot comment about this right now. The Ellis county sheriff's office and the k-b-i are handling the case.

8/21/16

10pm

Eyewitness news confirms the name of the man shot and killed by a Hays police officer last week. 36-year-old Joseph Weber was shot Thursday afternoon outside a home in Hays. Those who knew him tell us Weber had a disability. Officials are not releasing many details at this time. Ellis County Attorney Tom Drees (dreez) says officers chased Weber, and he did not follow their commands ... That's when he was shot. Authorities have still not told us whether Weber had a weapon, or threatened officers. And they are not yet saying if anybody or dash camera video was recorded.

8/22/16

4:30am

One person is shot overnight near I-135 and 21st street north... Wichita police say it happened near 11 o'clock Sunday night. Officers tell us a man was shot in the legs while driving with two other people. We're not sure if he was targeted. We do know he was brought to the hospital in good condition. Police are still looking for witnesses, so if you saw it happen or know anything, call crimestoppers.

8/23/16

5am

We'll be back in Halstead today asking questions. The city administrator and the police chief have been arrested. Last night, the city council suspended city administrator James - "J-R" Hatfield. He was arrested on charges of felony perjury. Former police chief, Steven Lewis faces charges of felony misuse of funds and misdemeanor theft. The city council made the decision to suspend Hatfield at last night's council meeting completed two executive sessions. Hatfield and Lewis posted bond and are now out of jail. We reached out to them to talk about the arrests, but we have not heard back.

8/24/16

6pm

For the first time, we hear from the father of a man who set his family's house on fire, killing his mother and sister. Devon Fasbinder joins us live from Hutchinson where she listened to the testimony.

It started as a traffic stop near Tyler and 11th... this all happened around 1am this morning... at some point shots were fired during that traffic stop ... we are trying to confirm whether those shots came from the officer or the suspect... the suspect car then took off... but deputies found it later, it had crashed and struck a house just a couple blocks from the original stop. <not verbatim: 41:23 "The white male suspect from that vehicle was transported with critical injuries to a local hospital and has since died, there are no outstanding suspects in this case and no danger to the public." > Investigators say the scene will be tied up for several hours... 9/2/16

6am

A man is shot following an argument at a west Wichita bar. Police say the man and his friend were in the parking lot of the west Wichita twin peaks when a man they were arguing with drove by a shot one of them. Wichita police tell us the shooter drove off. While the man he shot had to go to the hospital. He is expected to live.

9/3/16

9am

The k-b-i is investigating a Winfield non-profit that helps victims of domestic violence. The Cowley county attorney confirms the shelter "safe homes" is being investigated for possible misuse of grant money. The k-b-i executed a search warrant at safe homes last month. The shelter serves Cowley, Sumner, elk and Chautauqua counties, but closed its doors earlier this week. We reported earlier this year, a former Safe Homes executive was charged with theft and computer crimes in connection with her job. It's not clear whether the k-b-i investigation is linked to those charges, which were later dismissed... but a state advocacy group tells us staffing problems may have led to financial troubles for Safe Homes. Now other groups are working to help the hundreds of people who use Safe Homes each year. <not verbatim: 7:36 Everybody is really concerned about maintaining some level of service even if it's not in their community, which I think is most helpful. > Anyone who needs help can call the 24-hour state crisis hotline. 9/6/16

5:30am

A Wichita man needs to replace every single window on his home. Take a look at it. We were there before the shattered windows were boarded up. Nobody was inside this Wichita home - near maple and west - when someone shot it up. Police tell us the homeowner JUST put the house up for sale - and is expecting a baby soon. Neighbors say they're glad the house was empty. <not verbatim: Terry Wayland neighbor no doubt about it, they would have been killed. That's why when I walked in, as a mother, knowing that this young man, could have been there, it pulls at my heart.> police are not sure who's responsible for the shooting. If you know anything - call crime-stoppers.

9/7/16

4:30am

Two people run over a man police say was trying to assault a woman Wichita police say it happened last night as a woman was going to work near ninth and main. That's where officers say the woman called 911 for help after someone tried touching her. Two people driving by saw what was happening. They stopped to help. And confronted the suspect. Then hit him with their car. The man was then taken to the hospital. We're not sure if anyone involved will face criminal charges.

9/8/16

6am

Police in fort Leavenworth are investigating an assault at the Munson army health center. One employee was arrested. He's accused of assaulting 2 employees. The Munson Army Health Center is closed today while police process the crime scene. It's unknown what condition the victims are in.

9/9/16

4:30am

More than six months after the deadly shooting at excel industries in Hesston... the woman who gave the guns to the shooter pleads guilty. Sarah Hopkins admitted today to failing to report she transferred a firearm to Cedric Ford, who she knew was a convicted felon. It's part of a plea deal which will dismiss the initial, more serious charge. Jacob Albracht was in federal court earlier today to hear that plea... and spoke with a loved one of one of the victims, who is upset with the outcome.

9/10/16

9am

The search continues in Pratt County..... For a man authorities say should be considered armed and dangerous. This is the man...Bryce Siroky. The Pratt county sheriff says there's a warrant for Siroky for violation of the Kansas offender registry act. He is a registered sex offender. Siroky was at a home west of Pratt early Friday morning. That's where the manhunt started. It was called off at four-30 yesterday afternoon. If you see him or have any information on his whereabouts you're asked to call 911. We've posted his picture on Facebook so you can share it with others.

9/11/16

10pm

One person is dead ... And two others injured in a shooting outside a Kansas Walmart. Police were called to the Walmart in Shawnee around 1-30... Where they say a woman was hit in the back of the head while putting her infant into her car. A Good Samaritan tried to help and was shot multiple times, according to police. Both were taken to the hospital in critical condition. Then, Police say another witness shot and killed one of the suspects ... A second suspect ran from the scene, but was later found by a police K-9 team.

9/12/16

6am

A Johnson county deputy is killed when a truck slams into him in the middle of a traffic stop. Master Deputy Brandon Collins was a deputy for the sheriff's office for 20 years. The accident turned Collins' patrol car into a hollowed-out, ash coated wreck. Investigators say he was sitting in his vehicle when a truck crashed into his car from behind. It started a massive fire. <"The patrol car and the truck were engulfed in flames and of course we lost a deputy sheriff. Of course the other details to it I don't have it available to me right now."> The Kansas City star

reports the driver of the truck took off running, but police dogs were able to track the man down. His name has not yet been released.

<15:35:44 I sleep with one eye open, one eye closed. I'm scared. 35:49 > scared inside his own home... That's from a Wichita man after burglars broke into his apartment while he slept. In a factfinder 12 safety alert... Wichita police call that man's neighborhood a burglary hotspot after a *series of break-ins. The area covers several blocks east and west of Oliver, stretching from central to 13th street. Pilar Pedraza spoke with the man who was burglarized.

9/16/16 6am

Breaking news overnight - more police coming to garden city's high school today. People in the community called police overnight concerned about possible threats on social media. The police department responded saying the threat is an isolated incident between two students, there is not a threat towards the staff or the student body. To ease concerns of parents, the police department says it will have extra patrols at the school.

9/17/16 8am

Tomorrow marks one month since Hays Police shot and killed Joseph Weber. Investigators told us Weber fled from a traffic stop, but they still haven't said why he was stopped, if he was carrying a weapon, or if Weber threatened officers. We've reached out to investigators every day since Weber's death, but they will not release any new information. Protesters are planning on gathering outside the Hays Police Department this weekend to demand more information be released.

9/18/16 10pm

A police chase in north Wichita ends with an officer shooting the man involved... That man was rushed to the hospital in critical condition ... Where he is still recovering tonight. We're learning new details of what led to that

chase and shooting. We know it did involve an officer from the Wichita police department. And that nobody else was injured... now ... more than 5 hours after the shooting ... the area near 29th street north and Arkansas remains closed. We begin our coverage with Pilar Pedraza who has been at the scene all evening... She joins us with the latest.

9/19/16 6am

This is the second officer-involved shooting in Wichita since the beginning of august. That one happened near 13th and Tyler when a Sedgwick county deputy shot a man deputies say pointed a gun out his window. Sheriff Jeff Easter showed us this photo. He says you can see the gun inside that red circle. The county attorney is investigating to see if the shooting was justified. The man who was shot later died.

9/20/16 5pm

Blood tests show the man's alcohol level was twice the legal limit when police say he caused a crash that killed a Johnson county sheriff's deputy. Court documents show Adrian espinosa-flores's blood alcohol content measured point 16. The legal driving limit is point 08. He's charged with involuntary manslaughter in the accident that left master deputy Brandon Collins dead. Collins was conducting a traffic stop when he was rear ended.

9/21/16 6am

A threat is made against Kansas Wesleyan University in Salina... this email was sent to students last night - stating a verbal threat was made by someone out of state who is *not a student. The university says the threat is not racially motivated, they believe the campus is safe and security is fully aware of the situation. Anyone who sees anything suspicious is asked to call 9-1-1.

9/22/16 5am

A Towanda city clerk is under investigation -- accused of stealing money from water payments made by residents. A woman who lives in Towanda contacted factfinder 12 investigators after hearing about the possible allegations. Investigator Michael Schwanke learned this could go back months and possibly even longer.

9/23/16 5pm

Less than 24 hours after this scene outside a wichita hospital... police say they will now meet with the family of a man police shot last week. Family members have identified him as Andrew villa. Police say.... the man robbed a convenience store, led officers on a car and foot chase, and tried to steal two other cars, with people inside. Brittni Thomason joins us live to explain how the chief of police is responding to the family's protests. Brittni?

9/24/16 9am

Family members of the man shot by Wichita police... Visit him in the hospital for the first time tonight... The visit comes after Andrew Villa's family members protested outside Via Christi yesterday... Investigators say villa robbed a store, led police on a chase, and then jumped into a couple's car... Police thought he was armed, and that's why a sergeant shot him. Deedee sun spoke with the family's attorney.

9/26/16

6am

Family and friends of a man shot by Wichita police rally at the intersection where Andrew villa was shot. They say, the sergeant who shot him used excessive force. We'll learn today how many shots that police officer fired today during the daily police briefing. Villa's family says he was hit several times, more than they feel was necessary. Police chief Gordon Ramsay says villa was shot more than a week ago after he tried to rob a convenience store, lead police on a chase, then tried to steal a car while people were inside. Police say villa didn't have a gun at the time he was shot. But the incident has his family calling for change. Until this point - we've received almost no information about this case. We do know weber was shot by a Hays Police officer - six weeks ago following a traffic stop. But there are a lot of questions we're going to ask the county attorney today. Like, why was weber stopped in the first place? Did he threatened officers? Is there any video or audio that captured what happened? And was weber armed?

9/30/16

5pm

This is what that deputy's car looked like after the crash... The woman he was chasing, fled the scene. When other deputies stopped her, she got out a handgun, and pointed it at her own head. Crisis negotiators tell me they worked for hours to get the situation resolved peacefully.

However Chinn says he was able to bring himself to safety.

7/4/16

5pm

But the weather wasn't enough to stop people from setting off their own fireworks. We spoke with employees at several fireworks stands today, they tell us they had to shield their products from the rain but the weather hasn't slowed down sales. <sot verbatim: Ray Willems10"it's been a different season because we've had rain every day, but yet, people have still been in , buying, so we're doing well, but having to fight the weather cool weather has been bringing out a lot of people. She started talking to the man who said he worked for a company taking over rentals from people getting evicted. He asked for an application fee and a deposit and the property could be hers. The two even met at a Walgreens where she handed over the money. She got receipts back. But the man never actually owned the property. Now Stein-Stanley is out 450 dollars. <not verbatim: 34:31 "i get so much a month and need groceries and school supplies and i had to use that for rent where the place I'm at now." > Wichita police say you should research a person or business before paying them anything. They also say trusting your instinct can work - if something seems too good to be true, it probably is.

With a one percent sales tax increase in jeopardy...Arkansas city leaders say they'll fight it in court. A one percent sales tax increase was approved by voters earlier this year. It goes towards saving the south central Kansas medical center. The increase is at risk because of a half percent sales tax already in place that's also going toward the hospital... the state of Kansas says both of the taxes are classified as a special purpose tax. State law says a special purpose tax can be no more than one percent. Last night at the city commission meeting...the city decided pursue a motion in court to get a judgement on the tax increase. My role is to get as much current and factual information as possible to allow the president to make the best recommendation he can make and decision he can make for the betterment of the university and the community."> Boatright signed a three year contract worth 200-thousand dollars per year. For comparison--the AD at K-U makes 600-thousand per year through 20-18...and K-State's athletic director is signed through 20-20...making a whopping 775-thousand dollars.

8/27/16

The Wichita School District and the Service Employees International Union agree on salary and benefits for the upcoming school year. The agreement includes a one-time salary bonus, opportunities for promotions, and an additional 1-hundred dollar contribution to employee's health plan reserves. This agreement does not affect teachers. The union represents about 2-thousand employees in the district, including custodians, paraprofessionals, nutrition services and others.

8/29/16

Noon

Listen up if your college students are needing some kitchen appliances. It's amazon kitchen deals day. It's not quite as big as amazon prime day... But the retailer is slashing prices on kitchen electronics and appliances for prime members. You can sign up for a free 30-day trial if you're not a prime member.

All night access to k-state's hale library ends due to budget cuts. The building will now close at midnight most nights. K-state says its libraries lost nearly a million dollars over the past two years because of a drop in general funds and lower enrollment. Scaling back hours is expected to save 110 thousand dollars a year.

9/1/16

6am

Governor Brownback invites dozens of education leaders and you to help him build the next school funding formula. The governor announced yesterday his office wants to work with more than 50 school districts and interest groups going into the new legislative session. Brownback says getting the ball rolling now gives everyone involved plenty of time to find a solution before the end of next year's legislative session. The current school funding formula will expire next summer.

9/2/16

4:30am

Some Julliard alumni are taking their talents on the road. Julliard-trained musicians and actors taught students at garden city high school. They offered some tips on how to improve their performing arts skills. Students also got a chance to ask the artists questions about their careers and watch them perform. <sot verbatim: "out here in the middle of Kansas we don't really have any prestigious musical schools where they specifically specialize in music. It gives us a lot of perspective of where we want to go with our musical careers." > The artists will host a performance Tuesday at 7 p-m at garden city high school.

9/3/16

9am

Wichita children returned to the classroom last week and there's been one common theme since the start of school: the classrooms are hot. Just this week alone the district received 34 complaints about hot classrooms. You may remember, part of the budget cuts this past spring included the district ordering thermostats to be set at 76 in the summer and 70 in the winter. During the weekends and off hours the thermostat is set to 85. Teachers say they're feeling the heat. <sot verbatim: 33.28 I'm kind of like the kids, just trying to keep it lively and keep taking breaks because if you sit for too long we get real tired hot 33.36> school officials say the new set temperature has helped find flaws in units that need to be fixed. They say that's why some classrooms have been warmer. So far they've had 125 work order to inspect hot classrooms.

In case you missed it, the wildcats took on Stanford Friday night and they held their own against the best running back in the league. Students at a Kansas community college push their dean out. They accuse her of roaming the halls harassing students. Dodge City community college told us yesterday - the dean of the nursing school, Carolyn Wright, resigned. The school told us the decision was quote "in the best interest of students." we got a copy of the letter students sent to the school calling for wright's job. Here's what it claimed. Students say wright verbally harassed them - told them NOT to ask questions. And locked students out of classrooms. The letter went on to say wright created a stressful environment that made it difficult to learn.

9/14/16

6am

Investigators in Texas say the girl who was shot at a Texas school - did not know her classmate that shot her. Investigators now say shooter with the gun wanted to kill her step-brother. Instead, another girl stumbled upon the shooter - last Thursday - while they were in the bathroom. The girl tried to run away, but got shot. The shooter then committed suicide. No word on the condition of the girl who was shot.

9/15/16

6am

A kid punches his principal now, he's facing criminal charges. Police in a town outside Austin Texas say the kid and five other students got into some type of fight before lunch. Witnesses tell law enforcement the kid in question pushed past his principal. Then clocked him. Five of his classmates will also face charges for interfering with public duties.

9/16/16

6am

Two k-state girls who donned black-face then sent this snap-chat are talking for the first time since this image when viral. Paige shoemaker and Sadie Meier say, they've received death threats because of the snap. But they have a message for you that's new this morning. <"not that isn't a good thing, but that word just kinda happens in our friend group, cause we know that everyone is calm, we're a big family so that word does not offend anyone in our group and when I sent it out to my friends I knew it wouldn't offend anyone.> one of the students says she's been expelled from k-state. We're not sure if that's connected to his incident. The university said in statement that - regardless of their intentions - there's NO place for racism at k-state.

9/17/16

8am

A school in Louisiana asked students to write a poem, essay or song about living bully free. But as reporter jade Cunningham shows us, one fourth grader wanted to do something different.

9/18/16

5pm

A valley center teacher is suing, claiming the district fired her without due process. Janet Decker claims... "Breach of contract" in the lawsuit filed in Sedgwick County last week. The suit says... She got a note in April that her contract with the valley center district would not be renewed. The school board later voted to end Decker's employment in an "executive session meeting" with the teacher... But without a due process hearing. Decker argues... Although Kansas lawmakers eliminated due process for educators in 20-14, teachers who earned the right before that change are still entitled to the protection. Superintendent Cory Gibson says... District officials haven't had a chance to review the lawsuit. It seeks re-instatement of Decker's teaching position and back pay.

9/20/16

So the Newton Medical Center stepped in and donated one. <not verbatim: 35:24: it's a peace of mind as a coach for sure but also as a parent. most of us guys are parent volunteers and coaches and board members, but i think everyone in the community and all the coaches and parents feel really comfortable and blessed to know this device will be available to all of us .> the donated a-e-d was previously used to save the life of a fan at a game in the past.

9/24/16

9am

Parents of junior league football players in valley center can feel better knowing their kids have a life-saving device ready and waiting on the sidelines, should they ever need it. Organizers with the league say the conversation about safety preparedness for the young players became even more important after the death of Luke Schemm last year. The Sharon springs high school football player suffered a fatal brain injury on the field and collapsed on the sidelines. Emily Griffin was in valley center as the newton medical center- donated the live-saving device.

9/25/16

10pm

Wichita teachers say their workload is becoming too heavy... And they want to show just how much they do... By doing less tomorrow. Education reporter Pilar Pedraza spoke with Wichita teachers, to find out more about what you can expect your child's teacher to do when union members do only what's required in their contract.

9/26/16

6am

We are expecting teachers who want to participate in the "work to contract day" to gather outside schools this morning and walk into work ten minutes before the bell, take a 40 minute uninterrupted lunch, .. Then leave ten minutes after the bell when school gets out. They are doing this to show they don't get paid enough for the hours they work... saying they work much more than what is in their contract and they want to make a statement to the school board. 7/2/16

9am

Rain is the big topic this morning as showers and storms overnight produced locally heavy rainfall and flash flooding in some locations. Many counties across central Kansas are under flood warnings (scrolling across the bottom of the screen) through mid-morning. Rainfall amounts have ranged from 2 to over 5 inches in those areas, while amounts have ranged from 0.50" to 1.50" further south into south-central Kansas. A Flash Flood Watch is in effect until Sunday morning for most of central and eastern Kansas where additional rainfall amounts of 2 to 4 inches are possible. Clouds with scattered showers and occasional storms are expected any time after 2 p.m., today with the heaviest rain likely to fall tonight through Sunday morning. Temperatures this morning are in the 60s and low 70s. Highs this afternoon will reach the upper 70s and 80s. What about tomorrow and the rest of the Holiday Weekend? Those details coming up in a few minutes.

7/3/16

5:30pm

If you live in Wichita, you know there are some parts of town that always flood when we get heavy rain. The Cowskin creek is one of those trouble spots. Rachel Skytta continues our team 12 coverage live from near there...

7/4/16

5pm

The rain also caused problems for many apartments, homes and businesses...including our news partners at k-f-d-i. As Amanda Jaeger explains, the radio station was forced to go off air temporarily.... And employees are spending their day off removing floodwater from their work basement.

7/5/16

5pm

All it takes is a few inches of water to damage a vehicle's engine. And there was much more than that covering this stretch of 61st street north over the weekend. We didn't see any cars take-on these flood waters... But we know drivers tried to make it through the water in other places.

7/6/16

4:30am

Severe weather swept through the twin cities driving wind and rain toppled trees, flooded streets and forced road closures. The storm took many drivers by surprise when it moved through during rush hour. Some drivers took their chances, taking high water head-on. Others got stuck temporarily until the water receded. The deluge left some low-lying areas completely flooded.

7/7/16

People in McPherson are dealing with another weather related issue. Straight-line winds meant a day of clean-up for lots of people there. Emergency crews are unable to locate the body of a man who went into the Arkansas River early this morning. The catholic diocese of Wichita has identified Brian Bergkamp, as the man who is missing. We've learned Bergkamp is a seminarian. Akeam Ashford explains why crews have suspended their search for the night, and what they will do starting tomorrow.

7/10/16 10pm

Emergency officials in Greenwood County update the number of structures affected by the tornadoes that moved through the county Thursday, largely in the town of eureka... The county's emergency manager says 152 structures saw some type of damage 31 of those buildings were destroyed. But there is relief coming for residents there. the county says they're wrapping up the cleaning of the tree debris, and are now focusing on building debris, and clearing any household hazardous waste... there are also people in town helping residents move forward a resource center housed inside the county community center will be back open at 10 tomorrow morning, for anyone needing help filling out disaster assistance paperwork... An i-d will be needed for those needing help officials say many people showed up to the resource center today... many of you have asked us how you can help those affected by the tornado. Check this out. Some people in Montana get a cool treat in the middle of July. A snow storm. The snow came down in some higher elevations across the state including this ski area.

7/13/16 4:30am

A stormy stretch of weather ahead. Early Wednesday, a large area of intense storms is moving east-southeastward into central Kansas, winds are still light, except near the storms, and temps are in the 60s and 70s. Early storms

Wednesday will fade followed by decreasing clouds, soaring temps and high humidity. Afternoon highs will top-out in the mid to upper 90s with heat index readings close to 105 for some. Future track shows us: decreasing clouds Wednesday afternoon. Wednesday night to Thursday morning: scattered clouds, isolated showers/storms southeastern Kansas. The floodwaters breached sandbags around her home and poured into her basement - at this point, she doesn't know where to begin. <"It's going to be a long process to get things back in working order again, livable." > Health experts are now worried about dirty water contaminating wells. Officials are asking people not to drive anywhere near flood waters. They're closing off many roads as a precaution.

7/17/16

10pm

We should prepare for a very hot week of weather across Kansas, It could be very dangerous for anyone without air conditioning or ways to keep cool. A few thunderstorms are possible in western Kansas through the evening hours, but into the overnight, it will be dry. Lows will only cool down into the 70s for most of the state. The gusty winds from earlier in the afternoon will be backing down a little bit heading into the night. Monday looks hot with a few afternoon clouds developing. 6am

Look for more sunny skies Thursday with highs topping 100 nearly statewide along with warm south breeze. Higher humidity across central and eastern Kansas will drive the heat indices, or sweat factor, to nearly 110 in a few spots this afternoon where heat advisories/excessive heat warnings are still in effect. Future track shows us: mostly sunny skies, gusty winds and intense heat Thursday afternoon.

7/22/16

6am

Heat wave's end in sight. Early Friday, skies are mostly clear, winds are light from the south, and temps are in the 70s. We can expect another sweltering summer afternoon Friday with highs close to 105 nearly statewide along with a warm south breeze. 7/24/16

5:30pm

It will still be hot and humid this week, just not as extreme as it was last week. Scattered storm chances will be around too, with the better chances happening during the night. Scattered showers and storms are expected for the overnight hours. Severe weather is not likely, but some heavier rainfall is possible. Lows will drop into the 60s and 70s. Monday will start with a chance for a few lingering showers early, then decreasing clouds into the afternoon. Highs will be in the 90s with the humidity making it feel a little hotter (mid to upper 90s) another round of storms are possible into Monday night, especially in western Kansas. At least 18 homes have been destroyed and state fire officials evacuated 20-thousand people from their homes. Firefighters are struggling to contain the flames. Check out this time lapse video. It shows flames from the Sand Fire devouring trees in Santa Clarita. The Los Angeles County Fire department says the fire is 25-percent contained.

7/28/16 6am

Storm Team 12 Weather Alert; Severe storms this evening. Early Thursday, an area of rain and storms is pushing south through western Kansas. Temps are in the 60s and 70s with light winds. Thursday's early showers and storms will fade followed by decreasing clouds into the afternoon with highs topping-out in the lower 90s. Future track shows us: a mix of sun and clouds by Thursday afternoon. Strong storms likely Thursday evening west and central then rain/storms fade by Friday morning. Friday afternoon: partly cloudy west, mostly cloudy east with a few showers/storms possible. Friday night to Saturday morning: mostly cloudy, passing showers south.

7/29/16 4:30am

Flooding from tropical storm Darby left a huge mess at Honolulu's Keechi lagoon. Trash and debris littered the water and shoreline. A lot of that trash is now out of the water and on the shoreline ready for pick-up, thanks to canoe paddlers who couldn't wait for help from the city or the state. The canoe association has next Saturday to get the lagoon ready for state canoe paddling championships. The association expects 10-thousand participants and spectators at the event.

7/30/16

8am

If you're eating breakfast right now, i apologize for this next story. A Wisconsin city says some of the beaches aren't safe to swim in... Because they're contaminated with bird waste. A sewage line break prompted the city to take water samples. The health department says the samples tested positive for unsafe bacteria, likely because of recent rain, not the busted sewage pipe. <"This is a phenomenon we see very commonly at Half Moon Lake where, you know if we see a lot of birds, and a lot of frankly, bird feces, once it rains it pulls a lot of that bacteria in to the water. > Health officials say within 24 hours of waters receding, they're usually safe to swim in again. In fact, the areas closed for tests have since reopened. The city says it plans to repair the sewage break sometime this fall.

8/1/16

5am

Intense heat and high humidity. Early Monday, skies are mostly clear, temps are in the 60s and 70s and winds are light. Monday afternoon we'll see mostly sunny skies and highs around 100 nearly statewide with gusty southerly winds. We'll also have just enough humidity to make it feel like about 105 later today.

8/2/16

6am

More heat, more humidity. Early Tuesday there are widely scattered showers/storms across the west with mostly clear skies east. Temps are in the 60s and 70s and winds are light. Look for the early showers/storms to fade Tuesday afternoon leaving behind a mix of clouds and sun. When a back hoe hit a 4-inch gas line. The back hoe was destroyed in the fire. The flames did not spread. A nearby home was evacuated as crews put out the fire. No one was hurt.

8/5/16

5am

We told you yesterday morning the national hurricane center downgraded hurricane earl to a tropical storm... But that didn't stop the storm from hitting Belize with full force. Earl blasted the country with 80 mile per hour winds and heavy rain. 8 to 12 inches of rain fell within hours as the storm weakened. Right now, earl is moving west through Guatemala and southern Mexico with winds still in the 60 mile per hour range a tropical storm warning is still in effect in Belize where some places saw destruction like this.

8/6/16

8am

Breaking news overnight... A fire swept through a bar in France, killing at least 13 people and injuring six others at a birthday party. Officials say one of the six injured has life-threatening injuries. More than 50 firefighters fought the flames, which started late last night and were put out just after midnight. Local media report the fire started in the basement when someone lit candles, then accidentally touched them to the ceiling. The front window of the bar is completely blown out and damaged.

8/7/16

10pm

A warming trend will kick in and take us back into the 90s for much of the upcoming week. High humidity will make it feel even hotter for many areas of central and eastern Kansas. A few showers and storms are possible for south central and eastern Kansas for tonight/early Monday. Some lightning and heavy rainfall is expected, but the threat of severe storms is quite low. Low temperatures will fall back into the 60s and low 70s. After a cloudy start to the day Monday, we should see some peeks of sunshine heading into the afternoon. That will warm temperatures into the upper 80s and some low 90s (for southern Kansas).

The chance for storms drops off heading into Tuesday and Wednesday. At the same time, hotter air pushes back across the area. Most of the state will be well into the 90s until the next cold front arrives Thursday night, bringing a chance for scattered storms and a late-week cool down for the area.

The district includes portions of the county northeast of Hays. The k-d-h-e asks that you don't ingest any water before boiling it.

8/11/16

5pm

Scattered storms will be possible throughout the night. Once the rain moves out, milder air settles in for the upcoming weekend. The humidity will also be trending lower too. Storms that move through Kansas during the overnight hours should not be severe, but could produce some gusty winds to 40 mph and dangerous lightning. Low temperatures will range from the low 60s in the northwest to low 70s near Wichita. North winds should help usher some cooler weather for Friday. Highs will be in the mid-80s with decreasing clouds into the afternoon. The humidity won't go down until Friday night and early Saturday. The weekend looks pretty nice with highs in the 80s and sunshine for both Saturday and Sunday.

8am

A nice weekend as we end the summer vacation season. Dry weather conditions and temperatures slightly below normal for this time of year. High pressure over the Rockies will slide across the northern Plains over the weekend and will be the dominant weather feature across the region. This means tranquil weather and comfortable temperatures and humidity. A weak weather disturbance will roll off the high plains tonight bringing a slight chance of showers and storms to northwest Kansas this afternoon/evening. Otherwise, most areas remain dry and most clear. Highs will reach the 80s to near 90 today and Sunday with overnight lows in the upper 50s and 60s tonight. Heat and humidity return. Early Monday, clouds cover eastern Kansas with mostly clear skies to the west. Winds are light, and temps in the 50s and 60s. Monday afternoon looks mostly sunny and warm with highs in the upper 80s to around 90. The humidity will be a bit higher but it won't really get sticky again until midweek. Future track shows us: decreasing clouds Monday afternoon. Monday night into Tuesday morning: a few passing clouds. Tuesday afternoon: mostly sunny, a bit more humid and warmer. Flood waters are receding in Baton Rouge, and now the cleanup begins. Eleven people died and thousands are still in shelters after historic flooding. More than 40 thousand homes are damaged. Because many of those areas had never flooded before, few residents had flood insurance. In one of the hardest hit areas of east Baton Rouge, only 1 in 8 homes and businesses are covered. <not verbatim: "really, it hasn't hit me in the sense of how long it's going to take to get back together" (:38)> as areas dry out, there's new flooding downstream. 20 parishes are now federal disaster areas.

8/18/16

6am

A lava flow in Hawaii causes a surge in visitors. The flow began in May... But didn't reach the water until the end of last month. Officials say... 4-to-5 thousand visitors pass through the area a day. It's the first time lava from the volcano on Hawaii's big island has entered the Pacific Ocean in three years.

8/19/16

5pm

Firefighters are gaining ground on a wildfire burning east of Los Angeles. Some evacuation orders were lifted today. The bluecut fire has burned about 60 square miles, destroying almost 100 homes and 200 other buildings. Charles Gill and his family are living in a trailer next to their home. Their house is okay, but doesn't have electricity or water. <not verbatim: "All these people you care about, you live close to, all you work hard for, it could've been gone in an instant, and it was for so many people. So just, (chokes up) feeling very blessed." > The fire is about 26 percent contained. The cause is under investigation.

8/20/16

6pm

<not verbatim: "This is the worst I've ever seen in like 10 years. They have houses that's never even had water in their yards, and now they have water in their houses."> The clean-up continues in Louisiana today, following widespread flooding there... officials say, thousands of people have submitted insurance claims, but many do not have flood insurance. There's also more than 80,000 residents registered with FEMA, trying to get federal disaster assistance. The lieutenant governor of Louisiana says, the state is desperately trying to help as many people as possible. <not verbatim: "We're trying to get supplies to those people that are in their homes. We've got an army of volunteers and faith-based groups that are starting to help people mock out their homes. But as you saw, we still have areas that are flooded." > He says, at least 20 parishes are affected by the recent flooding and it will take some time before things start to look normal again. President Obama is expected to visit Louisiana on Tuesday. The White House says, the president wants to remind the people of Louisiana, that the government will do everything it can to help out.

8/21/16

10pm

Days after torrential rain across south-central Kansas... emotions range from relief - to heartbreak. We have your full team 12 coverage of the problems caused by Friday night's storms... As well as what comes next for many people affected by the flooding.

8/22/16

6am

People in Mulvane are still cleaning up after Friday's rainfall. Friday's rain comes as some people are packing up and getting out. People living in the Mulvane mobile home park have until the end of the month to leave. THE PARK'S previous owner failed to pay thousands of dollars for water and sewer service. Those who live near the river say... They relied on their neighbor's help to get to safety. For many... the worry is what lies next. <14:39:02 so now it's like, we don't have a choice, and we do have to go.... And then this. It's like, ok, how much more can we take? 39:13 > many say they're still looking for an affordable place to move... and fear... they won't be able to sell their trailers to help finance their move.

8/23/16

4:30am

Wind-blown warm-up; Higher humidity too, then more storms. Early Tuesday, skies are mostly clear to partly cloudy, winds are fresh and temps are in the 60s and 70s. Look for a mix of clouds and sun Tuesday afternoon with highs ranging from the upper 80s east to the lower 90s across western Kansas along with gusty southerly winds statewide. Future track shows us: mostly sunny to partly cloudy skies Tuesday afternoon. Tuesday night to Wednesday morning: passing clouds; isolated showers far west and southeast. One person has died following weekend flooding in Norton County. The sheriff's office says crews found the body of a man who was trapped in a vehicle that slid into floodwaters. The sheriff's office says a tree-limb smashed through his car, allowing flood waters inside. Crews weren't able to save him. They say, the waters were so fast they were concerned for their own safety.

9/8/16

Noon

Super Doppler Radar shows the morning storms moving off to the east of Wichita. Just a few showers are showing up in the west. A Flash Flood Watch is in effect through the night for some of south central and eastern Kansas.

9/9/16

6am

Another round of flooding rains. Early Friday, skies are clear west, where there's some patchy dense fog, with heavy rain/non-severe storms moving east across eastern Kansas. Winds are light, temps are in the 60s and 70s. Friday afternoon a strong cold front with push into eastern Kansas sparking line of thunderstorms and the potential for more locally heavy rainfall through evening. Future track shows us: clearing west, storms and heavy rain likely southeast as cold front plows through Friday afternoon. Friday night to Saturday morning: rain and storms move out; clearing, much cooler. Saturday afternoon: sunny but cooler. Saturday night to Sunday morning: clear and very cool. Rain/storms likely Friday; showers/storms possible Monday night and Tuesday. Highs cooling to around 80 this weekend then back to near 90 again Monday followed by another dip to around 80 midweek.

Let's go back to that video we just showed you of flooding in Sedgwick County. The cedar ridge mobile home park, near south hydraulic, is just one of many areas around town that got drenched following yesterday's heavy rain. We spoke with Shauna Paulin who lives in the park...she says she left before the rain started coming down, but some of her neighbors weren't so fortunate. Now they're pretty much stuck. <not verbatim: we had a lot of rain here and it did flood down at the end, but nothing like this. the pond was down so the water did eventually recede in to the pond, but the pond is full back there, there's no overflow for

it...so this water is not going anywhere it's going to sit here until something is done about that.> Paulin says, the property owner told her and several of her neighbors...that it probably won't be until Monday before they can truly access the situation.

9/11/16

5:30pm

Rescuers respond to flood-related calls around the clock near the Ninnescah (*ninn*-eh-ska) River ... After days of heavy rain left the river flowing out of its banks. First responders rescued five people trying to get back to their flooded home overnight near Belle Plaine. Dispatchers tell us ... Authorities have responded to about 25 water rescues in that area since the flooding started Thursday. A second day of dry weather is helping the water recede a little. People who live near the Bartlett Arboretum in Belle Plaine say the roads are finally dry enough to drive on ... But the arboretum is under water. One man says he hasn't seen flooding this bad in the 37 years he's lived there. <not verbatim: "with all the rain, i really wasn't that much surprised. i just didn't think it would get this high, but other than that, mother nature, she has her own way of doing things, ya know?" > A dry start to the work week should help some of those flooded areas... But more rain is expected later this week. Meteorologist Rodney Price is in the storm center with a look ahead.

9/12/16

6am

Relief for Belle Plaine. The national weather service JUST cancelled the flood warning for the Ninnescah River. The area saw major flooding this weekend. Residents we spoke with say they're used to a little bit of flooding every once and a while - just not this bad. <"nothing you can do. Just hope that you get your stuff out of the way. Some stuff you get out. Some stuff you lose." > Dennis Duerksen estimates the flooding near his home is four feet deep at some points. Mark - we know people and south-central Kansas are watching the river levels, especially the walnut river in Winfield can we expect them to fall in the next few days?

9/13/16

6am

K-d-h-e will take questions from anyone concerned about groundwater contamination in a part of west Wichita. We told you last week how the health department is concerned about the area highlighted in red and blue. That's a stretch of maize road between maple and Kellogg. And another part of maize up by central. That meeting will be at the Tyler Road Baptist church - just north of Kellogg on Tyler. The meeting starts at six tonight.

9/14/16

6am

Today is opening day for a major-economic boost to the Winfield area. Organizers hope rain like this stays far away from the walnut valley festival. Anna auld is live to tell us what crews are doing to make sure people have a place...to stay safe, instead of soaked.

9/15/16

6am

China is cleaning up this destruction this morning as a typhoon Meranti moves inland. People in one city say, they've never seen damage like this before. Cars, buried beneath debris and windows shattered from more than 230 mile and hour winds. Almost a million people near where the storm moved ashore lost power. While the typhoon is weakening right now, it's expected to bring a lot of rain and flooding to parts of china.

9/16/16

6am

The cold front sweeping through south-central Kansas did damage last night out west. You're look at storm damage just south of Colby in Thomas County. That's where a tree fell through a building and damaged a patio.

9/17/16

8am

Butler county officials are investigating a deadly shooting near El Dorado. Butler County Sheriff Kelly Herzet says a deputy found a man lying on the ground on the side of the turnpike near El Dorado. The man was taken to the hospital for a gunshot wound to the chest. He later died. Herzet says they are investigating the shooting as a murder until they can prove different.

9/18/16

10pm

People in North Carolina are feeling the effects of a pipeline rupture several states away... Several gas stations in Raleigh are out of all gasoline... They do have diesel. That's after officials shut down a portion of the Colonial Pipeline after a leak in Alabama. North Carolina is one of about five states in the southeast dealing with a gas shortage. Experts say the jump in gas prices could be felt nationwide... They expect a rise of up to 15 cents per gallon.

9/19/16

5pm

Normally, we should be around 81 degrees for this time of the year, but we've already jumped way past that this afternoon. So far, we've already hit the low 90s across the state. These highs might be well above average for this time of the year, but they're not quite record-breaking. In order to break those records for high temperatures today, we'd have to reach the upper 90s to low triple digits. It might be warm, but we won't hit 100 this afternoon.

9/20/16

5pm

You may have felt an earthquake overnight. A 3-point-9 earthquake centered over Medford, Oklahoma could be felt here in Kansas. If you think you felt an earthquake.... You can always check-on the storm team 12 app. Just make sure the earthquake layer is turned on.

More wind, more heat, more humidity. Early Wednesday, skies are partly to mostly cloudy, winds are light and temps are in the 50s, 60s and 70s. Firefighters were unable to get to her when they first arrived, and found her body after putting the flames out. Investigators are still working to determine what sparked the fire.

9/26/16

6am

Water is heading for downtown cedar rapids. Look at the Cedar River, it's near flood stage and expected to flow past its banks into the city in a matter of hours. Much of downtown cedar rapids is empty right now - it's under a mandatory evacuation order. Forecasters are confident that area will see flooding. While other areas, it's a crap-shoot. Some of those affected feel optimistic as people come together to help one another. <it really makes you look at what you have especially when you look around at the wonderful that are always there to help you no matter what. What matters in this world is there's always good that comes with it." > The Cedar River is expected to crest tomorrow.

9/27/16

6am

Not toasty but a bit warmer Tuesday. Early Tuesday, skies are clear, winds are light and temps are in the 40s and 50s. Tuesday afternoon look for sunny skies, light winds and it will be a bit warmer than Monday with highs topping out in the low to mid 80s. Future track shows us: sunny skies, light winds, warmer temps Tuesday afternoon.

9/28/16

6am

Staying dry but cooling down. Early Wednesday, skies are clear, winds are light and temps are in the 40s and 50s. Fema denies a request from the state of Kansas..... Asking for a federal disaster declaration for a number of counties affected by tornadoes, winds, and flooding in May. Governor Sam Brownback appealed an original denial for federal money... to help nearly three dozen counties recover. Fema says the damage caused by the storms does not warrant a major disaster declaration.

They're saying it could take up to two years. Each case kinda has its own varieties or whatever and each case reacts differently to the virus so you never know. 48 HOURS: “Power and Passion” (9:00-10:00p) - a report on the investigation into the death of Alabama real estate agent Angel Downs, who was found dead from a gunshot wound to the head, by her own weapon, outside her Gulf Shores, Alabama condo in 2010. At the time of her death, she was involved with Stephen Nodine, a well-liked Alabama politician with connections in Washington D.C. Though married and the father of a young son, Nodine dated Downs for six years. Friends and family say Angel wanted him to get a divorce, but he refused to give up his double life. On the night of her death, Nodine says he dropped Downs off, and then left to go back to his wife. Within two weeks, Stephen Nodine was indicted for murder and arrested. The timing raised eyebrows, because District Attorney Judy Newcomb was up for re-election, something which Nodine’s attorney says was an opportunity to have some high-profile prosecution immediately before the election. Nodine’s problems multiplied: he was charged with a violation of the seldom-used federal statute which prohibits drug users from using guns. Much of the evidence in the case was circumstantial, including alleged stalking and beatings, and a previous suicide attempt by Downs. Even the state’s own Medical Examiner Eugene Hart could not settle on the circumstances of death. He called it inconclusive. The Georgia State Medical Examiner was called in; he deemed Downs’ death a homicide. Jurors deliberated and a mistrial was declared. Stephen Nodine was a free man for four months; he agreed to plead guilty to the federal gun charge -- possessing a gun while using drugs. After convening a new grand jury, the new District Attorney Hallie Dixon, made the decision that Nodine not be charged again with murder. The family then went over Dixon’s head and demanded a Special Prosecutor. Nodine was to be retried for murder. Surprisingly, there was a plea deal and an admission -- the prosecutors did not have proof beyond a reasonable doubt in the case. The state of Alabama dropped the murder and stalking charges. Nodine pled guilty to perjury for lying on a legal form. He also agreed to plead no contest to a charge that he harassed Angel Downs with e-mails and text messages. **Epilogue for the 07/02/16 rebroadcast:** Nodine’s wife divorced him. He violated the terms of his probation and ended up back in jail. Now, out of jail, and unable to find a job, he has decided to move to Florida. Lee Barnett was in the midst of a bitter divorce with then-husband Harris Todd. Barnett had married him even though he said he did not want children. Problems began after she became pregnant. They went to counseling, and during this period a doctor diagnosed her as having hyperthymic temperament, a form of bipolar disorder. After Savanna was born, she filed for divorce. Harris counter-sued. The judge sided with Todd. Barnett then started to make plans to leave with 11-month-old Savanna. She obtained fake documents (birth certificates and passports) and disappeared. An FBI manhunt ensued. She was vilified in the press. In 1999, Harris Todd told 48 HOURS that she was mentally ill. Barnett countered with her side of the story: she cut off all contact with her family and headed to Europe, then Malaysia, Singapore, South Africa, Botswana and Australia. Along the way, she met and married Alex Geldenhuys, and had another child, Reece. Unbeknownst to Savanna, she became Samantha Geldenhuys. While they were on the run, Barnett also kept a secret diary for her daughter, planning one day to tell her the story of her life. In 2011, the FBI got a tip that Barnett was living in Australia. Samantha learned about her past from the agents. In 2013, Barnett was extradited to the United States. Samantha has read all the transcripts and the diaries and has a new understanding of her mother. Barnett pled guilty to all charges and spent 21 months in prison. Samantha eventually met her father and described it as a surreal experience. Investigation revealed that the Tiaffay marriage had begun to crumble; they had separated, but shared custody of their daughter. Police focused on the husband, but George had a solid alibi. Police also discovered an earlier robbery and a strange clue the robber left behind. Forty-eight hours into the investigation, detectives received a crucial tip from a local resident, William Pennix (aka “Big Will”) – a friend had told him that he had just killed a woman. The tip led investigators to a homeless man named “Greyhound” (Noel Stevens) who lived in the

desert away from the Las Vegas strip. Police believed that George Tiaffay had befriended Stevens, and manipulated his friend with the promise of cash if he would kill his wife. They also matched the murder weapon with merchandise that the two men are seen shopping for, on video footage acquired by the police. Stevens and Tiaffay were arrested. Stevens pleaded guilty in 2013 to Shauna's murder. In a pre-trial deal, he agreed to testify against George Tiaffay once prosecutors promised not to seek the death penalty against him. 48 HOURS: “Kiss of Death and the Google Exec” (9:00 – 10:00p) - an updated rebroadcast about the investigation into the 2013 drug-related death of Google executive Forrest Hayes and an investigation of Alix Tichelman, the woman charged with killing him, whose ex-boyfriend also died of a lethal overdose. Hayes, a successful, wealthy, married Santa Cruz, California technology genius was found dead from a heroin overdose aboard his 46-foot yacht. The yacht had been outfitted with a sophisticated security system, which eventually led investigators to Alix Tichelman, a young woman with whom he had a secret liaison aboard the yacht. Hayes and Tichelman met on an online dating service known for connecting wealthy men with women looking to be spoiled. The video footage recorded Tichelman injecting Hayes, cleaning up the scene and stepping over him to leave. At issue is whether Tichelman knew Hayes was in distress when she left, as police maintain, or if his death was accidental, as public defenders representing Tichelman claim. Tichelman led a troubled life which included eating disorders, drugs, and specialized schools. Investigators learned that just months before Hayes’ death, Tichelman’s then-boyfriend, Dean Riopelle, an Atlanta night club owner, also died from a heroin overdose. After an elaborate sting, Tichelman was arrested for the death of Forrest Hayes. Riopelle’s death, originally classified as accidental, is being given a second look by Georgia authorities. UPDATE: On May 19, 2015, after nearly a year in jail, and now clean and sober, Tichelman pleads guilty to involuntary manslaughter as well as lesser charges and is sentenced to six years in the local jail, but with credit served, she will likely serve just over two years. Then, a bombshell from the prosecution: the Hayes family told them they never wanted Alix Tichelman charged and would have been happy if the case had been dismissed. They never wanted the video from the yacht from the incident and the previous six months to be made public, as the public defenders has been requesting for months. Finally, Marshburn told police what he was up to and they told him to continue with his investigation. Holbert confessed to Marshburn, that Bordeaux had learned that Holbert was a sex offender, which offered a motive. In 2014, Marshburn decided time was up and convinced Holbert to lead him to Kelly Bordeaux’s body. The footage shown from the subsequent arrest video is the first broadcast of a confession captured by a police officer’s bodycam. She had many close friends; she dated, was a spendthrift, and owned a big house in San Clemente, California. At work, she met the much younger engineer Paul Curry. He was extremely smart, rubbed many people the wrong way, was a member of Mensa, and bragged about winning thousands of dollars on “Jeopardy”. Only after they married in 1992, did she learn of Paul’s two ex-wives and three children. She had several life insurance policies; Curry was the beneficiary on some. Curry also asked her to take out an additional \$1million policy, but she never did. Friends told her to dump him. In 1993, she became violently ill, needing hospitalization: poisoning was suspected after lab workers discovered lidocaine in a contaminated IV bag. The investigation focused on one person: Paul Curry. Five months later, she was again hit with a mystery illness. Her IV bag again was again tampered with.

Friends believed that Curry wanted to kill Linda and cash in -- but Linda remained loyal. Six months later, Linda died. The cause of death was attributed to nicotine poisoning and Ambien overdose. Her death was ruled a homicide, but Paul Curry was never charged. Linda had drafted a note giving her sister half of her estate. Curry was beside himself even though she left him the house and close to a half-a-million dollars. The case grew cold. Afterwards, Paul Curry's lies came to light: he was a complete fraud. He was not an engineer; in fact, he did not even have a college degree. He left town. In 2002, the case was re-opened by the Orange County Sheriff's Department. In 2008, Sergeant Yvonne Shull felt she had enough information to present to the prosecutor. Curry was located in Salina, Kansas where he was living a new life. He was tricked into a meeting, believing he was talking to local detectives, but all the while talking to Sergeant Shull. Using the information he spoke about in the interview, he was arrested and charged with murder. At trial, the prosecutor used Mark Curry's own words to win the case. Instead of murdering Olsen, he went to the authorities in Los Angeles, California, and agreed to wear a wire. In October 2013, Fuhrmann got Guglielmelli to repeat that he would pay \$80,000 to have Olsen killed. To the authorities, it was a clear-cut case of murder for hire; Guglielmelli was arrested. Guglielmelli, in a telephone interview from jail, claims he is the victim; he was conned by Richard Fuhrmann. Authorities agree that Fuhrmann is a con man, but the conspiracy to kill Olsen was very real. In a surprise move, they offered Guglielmelli a plea deal: plead guilty to attempted murder in the second degree and serve only nine years in jail. He accepted. In a telephone interview from prison, Guglielmelli discusses his decision. Olsen is proceeding with the divorce and worries about the future. Bohn’s attorney asserts he was abandoned by his mother Maureen O’Connell, a wealthy publishing executive, and he experienced profound neglect and abuse that caused a mental illness called Intermittent Explosive Disorder. Prosecutors dismissed his claims and they assert that audio recorded in an accidental phone call made while Thomas was still alive suggest Bohn knew exactly what he was doing. At trial, the Ivy League grad and Wall Street lawyer is found guilty of murder. Friends and family of Julie Gonzales maintain that Art’s version of events is completely out of character for Julie. And the police investigation uncovered that Gonzales was having an affair with a co-worker, Cara Kast, who was also involved with another FBI agent. Due to the outcome of the two previous trials, both the prosecution and defense agreed to a bench trial. During the proceedings, prosecutors suggested Art Gonzales relied on his FBI training to stage a crime scene to cover up a murder, while the defense maintained the evidence backed up Art’s claim of self-defense. In the end, the judge reluctantly declared Gonzales not guilty of manslaughter. The case drew so much attention it was made into a made-for-television movie. During the trial, Chambers pleaded guilty to the lesser charge of first degree manslaughter and served fifteen years in prison. In 2003, after his release from prison, he was interviewed by 48 HOURS. He spoke about his relationship with Jennifer Levin and the events leading up to her death and still maintains that he did not intend to harm her. He hoped to put his life back together, get a job and stay out of trouble. Things did not work out as he had hoped. **Epilogue for the 08/20/16 updated rebroadcast:** In 2004, Chambers was arrested and charged with possession of a controlled substance and driving with a suspended license. He pled guilty and spent 100 days in jail. Three years later he was arrested again, along with his girlfriend, and charged with selling drugs out of his apartment. In a deal, the girlfriend was sentenced to probation; Chambers pled guilty in exchange for a sentence of 19 years in prison. His earliest release date is 2024. The Levins have never accepted any apology from Robert Chambers. This

48 HOURS: “Hollywood Secrets” (9:00 - 10:00p) – an updated rebroadcast on the investigation into the 2008 murder of Juliana Redding, an aspiring actress and model and the subsequent trial. Redding was found dead in her Santa Monica, California home. According to authorities, the killer hoped to erase any evidence of the crime; trying to blow up the entire crime scene by leaving the gas on and a candle burning. This did not happen, and there was plenty of DNA evidence remaining at the scene. A sometime boyfriend, John Gilmore, who had a history of violent behavior had an alibi and was cleared. Further investigation led to the discovery that Redding had recently broken up with her wealthy boyfriend, Dr. Munir Uwayda after learning he had a wife and children in Lebanon. Investigators also learned of a lucrative business deal offered to Redding’s pharmacist father. Less than week after the deal fell apart, Redding was dead. Inside the home, police found evidence of a struggle and DNA evidence that led to a woman: Kelly Soo Park. Park was in the employ of Dr. Uwayda. She was arrested and within days Uwayda had vanished. Five years later, the trial commenced. While authorities thought the case was a slam dunk, the defense, with the help of jury consultant, Lee Meihls, presented a bold argument of DNA transference. The eventual outcome: Park was found not guilty. On-screen text graphic: The fraud investigation of Doctor Munir Uwaydah continues. His California Medical license has been canceled. Kelly Soo Park is living in southern California managing a restaurant. **Epilogue for the 09/03/16 updated rebroadcast:** Two years after her acquittal, Kelly Soo Park was arrested and back in court. She and a dozen fellow associates pleaded guilty to a number of fraud charges related to the medical practice. Dr. Uwaydah’s whereabouts are unknown. He and his staff allegedly tricked 21 people into thinking he would perform their operations -- instead, they were done by a physician’s assistant, which is against the law. Park’s bail was originally \$10 million dollars. It was later reduced after charges relating to disfiguring patients were dropped. In April 2016, Park was released on bail. Investigation exposed a web of strained family relationships, bondage/domination allegations, claims of extramarital affairs, and

estranged relatives, including Michele's own children from previous marriages. Michele changed her story to say that Greg killed himself and she cleaned up the scene to protect their young daughter from the truth. Police believed Michele was the killer, but with little physical evidence, the district attorney offered a plea deal – plead guilty to tampering with evidence and “deadly conduct”. She accepted. While being interviewed by 48 HOURS for the original broadcast, Michele changed her story once again, contradicting herself. The judge threw out the deal and ordered her to stand trial for murder. During the trial, Michele changed her story again, this time saying it was a suicide. The prosecution used the 48 HOURS interview to their advantage, because she had added an additional fact, claiming that it was not only an intruder, but that she thinks she knew who it was. She was found guilty of murder. Following the conviction, Michelle Fletcher, Greg Williams' sister and the widow of his best friend, Brynn Fletcher, says that she now believes that Michele Williams was also somehow responsible for Brynn's death, also by gunshot, which authorities had classified as a suicide. She suggests that Fletcher was about to tell her brother truths which Michele Williams did not want Greg to learn about. Michele Williams denied any involvement.

On his commute home from work, Noll stopped at a red light. A BMW pulled up alongside of him -- shots rang out -- and Noll was killed instantly. At first, it seemed to be a case of road rage and the case grabbed headlines throughout the city. The BMW was distinctive and police went to work. A few weeks later, police got a tip that Dinh Bowman, a young man described as a genius who had entered college at age 12 and now was a robotics engineer with his own business, owned a vehicle that matched the lead. Police investigation led to information that Bowman had a fixation with James Bond, was an expert marksman, and just wanted to kill someone for the thrill of it; and his wife, dentist Jennifer Bowman, may have had knowledge of the crime and possibly have been an accomplice. Bowman was arrested and held on \$10 million bond. At his 2014 trial, a portrait of pre-meditated murder was described to the jury by the prosecutors. Bowman, his appearance changed dramatically, claimed he was the victim: he had fired in self-defense, then threw out evidence and did not call police because he panicked. In 2011, Thomas Kolman was found dead by his wife, Linda, in his car outside of a gym he frequented. At first, no foul play was suspected; Kolman suffered from sleep apnea and was slightly obese. However, the medical examiner found an unusual drug in Tom’s system -- midazolam -- a sedative sometimes used by those in the dental profession, and the death was ruled a homicide. Further investigation revealed that his best friend, Dr. Gilberto Nunez, was having an affair with his wife, Linda Kolman. Nunez told police Kolman knew about it and was fine with it. There were hundreds of text messages between all the parties, including some where Nunez impersonated other people. Even the name of the CIA was dragged into the case through a fake ID. It took four years for prosecutors to charge Nunez with second-degree murder and forgery. Nunez hired two top New York City defense attorneys who presented a very different scenario, saying Tom Kolman died of natural causes, insisting this was a murder case without a murder. The verdict: Nunez was acquitted of the murder charges and found guilty on the forgery charges. The Kolman family was unhappy with the verdict. Some former jurors were interviewed and were adamant that there were too many unanswered questions to prove the murder charges. **On-screen text graphic:** Gilberto Nunez is expected to be sentenced on his forgery related charges later this year. The investigation revealed she had regularly used the popular social media app Kik, which allows communications to be anonymous, and was communicating with 18-year-old Virginia Tech freshman David Eisenhauer. Her body was found 90 miles away. Eisenhauer and his accomplice, fellow Virginia Tech student Natalie Keepers, were arrested on abduction and murder charges. (2) In 2013, Branden Syrotchen of Spokane, Washington, found out that Elizabeth, his 15-year-old daughter, was communicating with a 30-year-old man she had also befriended on the Kik app. The two were planning to run away together. Because the police were not able to act

without actual evidence of a crime, Branden hatched a plan to save his daughter. The man, Jason Richards, tried to turn his crime into a love story, but he eventually pleaded guilty to child rape and luring charges. Also featured in the broadcast is an interview with an online predator who details how easy it is to lure children using social apps. Ted Livingston, CEO of the billion dollar social app Kik, was asked questions regarding the safety of children using the app during a recent conference and claimed his app is as safe as the competition. **On-screen text graphic:** David Eisenhower and Natalie Keepers are scheduled to be tried separately next March. If convicted, they could face life in prison with no parole. Jason Richards is scheduled to be released from prison on June 3, 2017.
