Lung Cancer Awareness Month is observed annually in November and highlights the need for more education to better understand the disease. Lung cancer is the leading cause of cancer death among both men and women in the United States. Fewer than 1 in 7 lung cancer patients will be diagnosed in the earliest stage, when the disease is most treatable. Often lung cancer patients have no obvious specific symptoms at the beginning of the disease.

<p>October 24th, 2023,</p>	<p>Health Moms and Healthy Babies</p>	<p>Julia Means and Brenda Buchanan – Ascension Wisconsin St. Joseph’s Hospital</p>	<p>Infant mortality is a crisis in Milwaukee, where babies born to African-American girls and women, especially in the central city, die at a very high rate – the most tragic health disparity in the city. African-American infants are far more likely to die before age 1 than Caucasian infants. Each year, an average of 100 Milwaukee infants die before their first birthday, and black babies are nearly three times more likely to die than white infants. This rate, the infant mortality rate, is a complex problem related to poverty, race, and health disparities that take a communitywide effort to address. Between 2000 and 2014, the maternal mortality rate in the U.S. increased by 26 percent, while it decreased in nearly every other country. And stark disparities in maternal deaths exist, as Black women are more than three times as likely to die from pregnancy-related causes as white women. Additionally, for every person who dies due to a pregnancy-related complication, dozens more suffer from unexpected outcomes from pregnancy that result in both short- and long-term consequences to a person’s health.</p>

Breast cancer is a disease in which malignant (cancer) cells form in the tissues of the breast. Black women are 40% more susceptible to breast cancer, with breast cancer being the second leading cause of death in African American women - so awareness is key.
October 3rd, 2023	Ovarian Cancer Awareness	Julia Means and Brenda Buchanan Ascension Wisconsin St. Joseph's Hospital	The American Cancer Society estimates that 19,710 women will be diagnosed with ovarian cancer in the United States and 13,270 deaths will occur from this type of cancer in 2023. About half of all cases occur in women over the age of 63. The earlier ovarian cancer is found and treated, the better a woman's chance for survival. Most women with ovarian cancer are diagnosed with advanced-stage disease (Stage III or IV). This is because the symptoms, particularly in the early stages, are often not severe and present vaguely. Ovarian cancer occurs when cancerous cells develop in, near, or on the outer layer of one or both ovaries. There are many types of ovarian
