I. AGRICULTURE AND COMMERCE

News at 10pm – July 30, 2009

Amanda Manatt reported the Arkansas Livestock Show Association is checking out sites for new state fairgrounds. The group's put out a request for proposals and responses are due tomorrow. Saline County is among locations asking to be considered. Fair officials are looking for a spot that would allow for expansion. It would also need to be within 35 miles of the current fairgrounds on Roosevelt Road in Little Rock and be visible from an interstate.

Christina Munoz reported a potentially untapped market and an invitation from the Chinese government has Lieutenant Governor Bill Halter traveling to China this weekend for a week of meetings and trade-related discussions.

News on Nightside – September 09, 2009

Duration: 00:00:49

Scott Inman reported it's almost State Fair season in Arkansas but it could be the last State Fair in Little Rock. The Arkansas State Fair commission is planning to take bids from any community 35 miles or less from Little Rock to possibly host the fair. So far Saline County and Jacksonville have expressed interest, but Carlisle is the only community to formally submit a bid. Little Rock has already presented a new plan to the commission which provides for more space and major renovations. All proposals are due to the Fair Commission by September 15th.

II. CONSUMER AND LABOR

News on Live at 5pm – July 29, 2009

Duration: 00:00:38

Scott Inman reported the state lottery commission voted unanimously today to join the multi-state lottery. Director Ernie Passailaigue says fifty percent of the profits will go back to the state for education funding. The other half is for prizes, which can get pretty big, the minimum jackpot is 20 million dollars. Director Ernie Passailaigue says the state could begin selling tickets before the end of the year. The commission also worked to approve a budget and lottery positions today.

News on Live at 5 – August 24, 2009

Scott Inman reported Oaklawn Park reports a 65 percent jump in the money wagered on its electronic games of skill. The Arkansas Racing Commission said gamblers wagered 29 million dollars on the games last month which is up from 18-million in July 2008. Lawmakers voted to allow Hot Springs and West Memphis to hold elections on electronic gaming machines at the towns' race tracks four years ago voters in both cities approved the games the following year.

News on Nightside at 10pm – September 24, 2009

Scott Inman reported we're less than three weeks from the launch of the Arkansas lottery. It was a big day for the commission. The first of more than 15-hundred retailers received their lottery machine today. Department of Human Services officials attended one of the final lottery commission meetings today, to talk about the prevention and treatment of gambling addiction. The commission will spend 200-thousand dollars on the creation of a state gambling helpline as well as costs associated with counseling addicts. Laffoon says the helpline will launch in early October.

III. CRIME AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE

News on Daybreak – July 29, 2009 Duration: 00:00:45

Beth Hunt reported the capital murder trial for the man accused of killing our colleague Anne Pressly has been delayed until November 2nd. The trial of Curtis Vance was set to begin in September ... but a judge yesterday granted the defense's request for more time. Vance also withdrew his hand-written motion asking to get rid of his attorneys. Vance also faces a separate rape charge in Marianna. Trial in that case is set for October 26th.

News on Saturday Daybreak – August 29, 2009 Duration: 00:00:31

Amanda Manatt reported a Pulaski County Judge has approved a motion filed by attorneys for the man accused of killing our friend and colleague Anne Pressly. Judge Chris Piazza will allow DNA testing of evidence from a Lee County rape case against defendant Curtis Vance. Vance's attorneys say they need to do their own testing to defend Vance against rape allegations, because prosecutors plan to use the case against Vance in his capital murder trial. Defense attorneys say they don't expect testing to delay the trial, which is set to begin November second.

News Daybreak – September 18, 2009 Duration: 00:00:47

Beth Hunt reported the Pulaski County Humane Society is nursing a horse back to health after a disturbing case of abuse in Independence County. The horse obviously was in a lot of pain. Doctor Medlock gave it pain medication when they went to transport the horse and you can see the wounds, this was really bad. This is one of the worst that we have ever seen. Ferguson is charged with DWI and humane society officials say he will also face animal cruelty charges.

IV. DEFENSE AND VETERAN AFFAIRS (Secretary of State)

News on Nightside at 10pm – July 8, 2009 Duration: 00:00:48

Christina reported more than three hundred soldiers with the Army Reserve's 90th Brigade left Little Rock today, eventually headed for Iraq. Friends, family members, and Governor Mike Beebe, gathered to honor the soldiers with a send off ceremony this morning at the Statehouse Convention Center. It's the first time the entire 90th has been deployed since World War II. The men and women, from 40 different states, will be moving excess equipment left behind during troop withdrawal. The brigade will be in Iraq a year. Governor Beebe highlighted the sacrifice the soldiers' families will make, too. For Dennis Bailey and his family, this is the fourth deployment.

News on Saturday 6pm – August 22, 2009 Duration: 00:00:42

Pamela Smith reported that colors are inactivated for a military unit in Arkansas today. The 90th Regional Readiness command held a special ceremony in honor of the event. The historical command dates back to World War I. The 90th stretches across 5 states and encompassed more than 260 units. It had been reactivated during world war two. Bragadier Christopher Cline spoke today about what it means when the colors are rolled up. That signifies the unit is being inactivated and once those colors are cased, they are taken into storage where they wait possible re-activation in the future. To conclude the special ceremony an inactivation dinner is being held this evening.

News on Sunday at 10pm– September 27, 2009 Duration: 00:00:27

Pamela Smith reported the FBI has released the security tapes showing the chaos that immediately followed the 1995 bombing of the Oklahoma City Federal Building. The recordings show people

from nearby buildings rushing to help victims after the fertilizer bomb was detonated. They do not show the actual explosion. The videos were used as evidence in the trial of Timothy McVeigh, the man convicted and executed in 2001 for the crime. The blast killed 168 people and injured hundreds.

V. EDUCATION AND YOUTH

News at 6 pm – July 08, 2009

Christina Munoz reported that it's a very special day for historians in Arkansas, or for anyone who's interested in preserving the state's history. Channel 7's owners, Allbritton Communications, announced today that they are "gifting" KATV's video archive library to the University of Arkansas. In a ceremony in Washington, DC Allbritton Chairman and CEO Robert Allbritton ceremoniously handed over a video tape to University officials. That tape represents just one of the thousands of video tapes that will now become part of the David and Barbara Pryor Center for Oral and Visual History. The video library contains historical material and news stories going back several decades and now thanks to the Allbrittons, the Pryors and the University, that material will be preserved digitally, and will become accessible on the web. We'll keep you posted as the transferring of KATV's archives to the University proceeds, and tonight at six we'll hear from the Allbritton family on the importance of this gift.

She had just begun her freshman year at Drake University in Iowa on a music scholarship.

VI. HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

News on Live at 5 – July 24, 2009

Scott Inman reported state health and education officials are expanding the number of flu vaccinations in schools in hopes of reducing the spread of seasonal flu this fall. Nurse consultant Paula Smith says 146 of Arkansas' 244 school districts and 24 charter schools have scheduled flu shot clinics and the Health Department will more than double the supply of seasonal flu vaccine it provides to schools from 280-thousand to 685-thousand. Money for the program comes from 86 million dollars in tobacco tax increases governor Mike Beebe signed into law February 17.

News at 6pm – August 17, 2009**Duration: 00:00:40**

Scott Inman reported the Pulaski County Coroner says he knows what caused an 18 year old football player's death last week, but is not releasing the information. Meantime, the body of Courtney Stone has been released to his family. Life is a very precious thing particularly when you have a young man that's a first generation college student that's excited in life about being the first in his family to go to school. His death is still under investigation. Services will be held in Earle, Saturday at 1pm.

News on Daybreak – September 28, 2009**Duration: 00:00:28**

Beth Hunt reported Arkansas Childrens Hospital is in the running for a contest hosted by the Childrens' Miracle Network. The non-profit organization is giving away three ultimate gamerooms to childrens hospitals across the country who receives the most online votes. Christina Munoz reported Governor Mike Beebe's first pay check of the new fiscal year will be missing eighty-four dollars and 93 cents. That's because Beebe rejected a pay raise earlier this year and state finance officials say it will be withheld from his paychecks starting this Friday. The money will be sent back to the state treasury, which complies with a legal ruling that Beebe couldn't just reject the increase in pay, but could give it back to the state. Beebe said he declined the raise because of the economy.

News on Midday– August 4, 2009**Duration: 00:00:43**

Jason Pederson reported plans for the historic Ray Winder Field advanced a bit further. Monday, the Little Rock City Board passed a resolution on the future of the ball park. Mayor Mark Stodola put forth the proposal that would include both UAMS and the Little Rock Zoo. The Mayor says the decision is good progress and it is moving in a positive direction for all parties. Chancelor Wilson indicated that if there are organizations that can come forward and maintain the ballpark and use it on a short term basis until they have permanent plans for facilities there they are willing to entertain those and have people play. So it could be a win-win all the way around. The board also voted Monday to slash the city's budget by more than two million dollars.

Heather Crawford reported the Iraqi journalist best known for throwing his shoes at former President George W Bush is out of prison. Muntadhar Al-Zeidi was released this morning after spending nine months in prison for his act of protest. The incident made him a hero around the Arab and Muslim worlds. He also says he was tortured after his arrest. He was originally sentenced to three years in prison, but that was reduced to one - and he was released three months early for good behavior.

The Arkansas center for Jewish life unveiled the new Torah scroll at a ceremony this morning. The Torah, the first five books of the bible, means so much to the Jewish community, they do not copy it. All 304-thousand letters are painstakingly written out by hand. A scribe began this one in December. Rabbi Pinchus Ciment says he hopes the community realizes how special this really is. "I just think it's important that all people from different avenues and levels of observance of Jewish people feel so touched by being able to participate in something they could not get living in Arkansas. They have to go to a larger community to do so." People from as far as Africa and France came to help in writing this torah scroll.

FCC Schedule for Closed-Captioning Requirements

The following phase-in schedule applies to the captioning and broadcast of all new programming. It is measured on a calendar-quarter basis and a 20-hour broadcast day, as programming between 2am and 6am does not have to be captioned.

- Between January 1, 2000, and December 31, 2001, program distributors must provide at least 450 hours of captioned programming per calendar quarter, which is approximately five hours per day. If the program distributor provides less than 450 hours of new programming, then 95 percent of its new programming must be captioned.
- Between January 1, 2002, and December 31, 2003, program distributors must provide at least 900 hours of captioned video programming per calendar quarter, or 10 hours per day. If the programming distributor provides less than 900 hours of new programming, then 95 percent of its new programming must be captioned.
- Between January 1, 2004, and December 31, 2005, program distributors must provide at least an average of 1,350 hours of captioned video programming per calendar quarter, or 15 hours per day. If the program distributor provides less than 1,350 hours of new programming, then 95 percent of its new programming must be captioned.
- As of January 1, 2006, and thereafter, 100 percent of the program distributors' new programming must be captioned.
