- 4) The need for volunteer action to support programs and services for non profit agencies within the service area.
- 5) The need for education about domestic abuse.

Bay Area Food Bank

WZEW-FM sponsored a food drive for the BayArea Food Bank at the 92 Zew 2nd Tuesday Allstar Christmas Bash at The Shed the 2nd Tuesday of December 2011 and ongoing through January 2012. We collected non-perishable during an ongoing live on air broadcast.

Habitat For Humanity

WZEW helped promote Habitat For Humanity ReStore grand opening for their new Mobile location and encouraged volunteerism with Habitat building projects and donation efforts.

Dog River Clearwater Revival

WZEW actively promoted DRCCR events and clean up programs in 1Q 2012. DRCCR focuses on cleaning and preventing litter and pollution in the Dog River area and throughout Mobile and Baldwin counties. Efforts have included children's education programs on pollution and responsible guardianship of natural references, cleanup days and promotion of installation of litter traps in the Dog River area.

The Mobile/Baldwin area has many cases of this that go unreported and the promotion of Penelope House has helped increase awareness of the problem and what help victims can receive.

GES Recycling

WZEW assisted Goodwill Easter Seals of the Gulf Coast in their efforts to promote and increase recycling through their onsite data recycling programs which keeps electronics with dangerous chemicals out of area landfills and helps residents control their personal data through secure data destruction. The program also provides employment opportunities to individuals in the Mobile/Baldwin area who have special needs.

Red Cross / LifeSouth Blood Drives

To honor Dr. King's legacy, the Alabama Coastal Foundation (ACF) is hosting a "MLK Day of Service: Clean Up our Downtown Waterfront" event at Cooper Riverside Park on Monday, January 16 from 1:30pm-4:00pm. 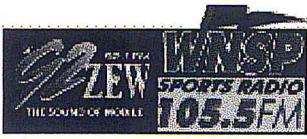

Adoption and Microchip/Rabies Clinic Set for January 28 at Eastern Shore Pet Hospital

Fairhope, AL -The Haven will be holding its first low-cost life-saving Rabies and Microchip Clinic for 2012 at the Eastern Shore Pet Hospital on Plantation Blvd in Fairhope on January 28. The times will be 11am to 3pm. Dr. Ron Shindler and his dedicated staff will be administering the rabies shots and microchips to those who want one or both. "The Haven's mission of eliminating euthanasia as a means of animal control is a noble one and we want to be part of that," said Dr. Shindler. The price will be \$10 for a rabies shot and \$10 for a microchip. The Haven will also be transporting some of their available animals to the event via their M.A.R.U. (Mobile Animal Rescue Unit) and offering them for adoption.

Rabies is a serious viral disease that affects warm-blooded animals. It is often thought of affecting primarily dogs and cats. While the incidence of rabies in domesticated animals has been virtually eliminated, the occurrence in bats, raccoons, skunks and other wild mammals is still prevalent. Because of its high communicability,

getting a rabies shot for our pets is required by law.

While micro-chipping is not required by law, it can be an important investment for the owner since even the best behaved animal can suddenly go missing. Executive Director Mike Graham points out that the simple act of inserting a microchip into the animal can increase the odds that the pet will be returned to the owner if found. Says Graham, "By compiling the monthly shelter intake and outcome reports from our four partnering animal control shelters in Baldwin County, we are monitoring an increase in the number of pets being reunited with their owners which reduces the euthanasia rate".

If you're looking for your next best friend, or if your pet needs a rabies shot or microchip, mark you calendar to come to the Eastern Shore Animal Hospital on January 28.

The Haven rescues, re-habilitates, and re-homes over 900 animals each year serving Baldwin County since 2000. Scale Back Alabama kicks off sixth year, featuring *Biggest Loser* winners

Today marks the kickoff of Scale Back Alabama, a statewide weight-loss contest designed to help Alabama fight obesity and to encourage participants to develop lifelong healthy habits. The program, now in its sixth year, has resulted in a total weight loss of nearly 760,000 pounds and healthier lifestyles for thousands of individuals.

In the last 15 years Alabama has seen its obesity rate double, and the state was recently named the second most obese state in the nation in a report from the Trust for America's Health and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. More than 30 medical conditions are associated with obesity, including heart disease and diabetes, but adopting a healthy lifestyle can lower the risk of developing such diseases.

Today's news conference featured interviews with two University of Alabama graduates who know firsthand the benefits of making healthy choices. Olivia Ward won the 11th season *Biggest Loser* contest, and her sister, Hannah Curlee was first runner-up. The sisters lost a combined 249 pounds during the competition and now travel the country encouraging Americans to eat less and move more. During the 2012 Scale Back Alabama contest, they will share valuable advice with participants through weekly emails that offer health tips and encouragement.

"Programs like Scale Back Alabama highlight the necessity of making healthy choices," said Dr. Donald Williamson, state health officer. "Even small changes can have a huge impact on an individual's weight and overall health."

Scale Back Alabama 2012 begins Jan. 21. The 10-week contest is free of charge and is targeted to adults 18 and older. It primarily focuses on the workplace and utilizes local businesses, schools and organizations as weigh-in sites. To participate, teams of four register and have their initial weigh in at a local site during the week of Jan. 21-27. Participants who complete the contest and are on a team in which every member loses at least 10 pounds are placed in a drawing for one of three grand prizes, the top prize being \$1,000 per team member.

“Scale Back Alabama has been the catalyst for thousands of people across the state to increase their physical activity and incorporate nutritious food into their diets,” said Donald Jones, Scale Back Alabama chairman and administrator of Marion Regional Medical Center in Hamilton, Ala. “It’s great to see Alabamians taking charge of their health and embracing healthier lifestyles.”

One of the more recent additions to the contest has been a school competition. “We have more than 50 K through 12 schools participating in this year’s contest,” said Dr. Williamson. “The school competition is an extension of the Health Department’s efforts to promote better health among teachers and faculty in the hopes that it will also affect the students. It’s a similar approach to the overall campaign which has resulted in healthier families due to the emphasis on adults in the workplace.”

During the 10-week contest participants will not only receive useful information about diet and exercise, they will also be able to join in outdoor activities that promote healthy living. Each week Scale Back Alabama will provide information about events offered by Fresh Air Family, an Alabama-based organization that offers free and low-cost programs to promote exercise and the outdoors. Additionally, during the 10 weeks of the program, Alabama’s 22 state parks will offer a free one-day pass to Scale Back Alabama participants who show their weigh-in card.

To emphasize the importance of exercise and to prove that it can be fun, three participating organizations developed Scale Back Alabama dance routines that were showcased at the kickoff news conference and are posted on the Scale Back Alabama website. Other organizations participating in the contest are encouraged to create their own dances and send them to contest sponsors for the website.

Caleb Mosley is a 16-year-old student at Baker High School who has been battling a terrible disease for almost 6 years now.

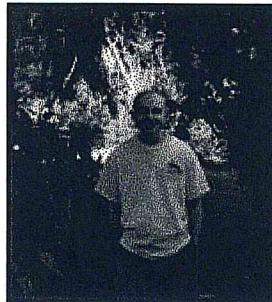

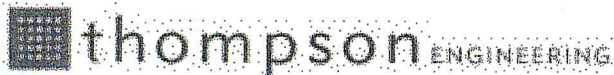

The non-profit animal shelter is responsible for leading the four municipal animal control shelters into creating a no-kill society for companion pets, caring for over 70 homeless cats and dogs at the shelter on any given day, and finding loving homes for these homeless, injured, neglected and abused and abandoned animals. All animals are vaccinated, evaluated both behaviorally and medically, fed, watered and marketed until they find their forever home.

Tornadoes impact Alabama's blood supply

In the wake of the deadly tornadoes that swept through Alabama on Monday, LifeSouth Community Blood Centers says that blood donors are needed immediately to meet a shortage of blood statewide.

"The tornadoes didn't cause an increase in the usage of blood, but the devastation severely hampered our donors' ability to make it to our donor centers and our bloodmobiles, especially in Central and Northern Alabama," said LifeSouth's Director of District Operations J.D.

Pettyjohn. "While all blood types are needed, the need for donors with negative blood types is especially great."

LifeSouth is the largest supplier of blood products in the state of Alabama. Pettyjohn said the current shortage has impacted the entire state, not just areas affected by Monday's storms.
