During his campaign, Frederickson said he isn't a politician with a ladder to climb, but someone who wants to work for the people of Rhinelander. He believes voters were ready to take a new direction, as opposed to candidate Alex Young who had served on both city council and county board positions over the last 13 years.</p>
