

Interstate 94 bridge work near Fergus Falls begins July 18

DETROIT LAKES, Minn. – Motorists on Interstate 94 northwest of Fergus Falls will experience lane closures and possible delays beginning Thursday, July 18, weather permitting.

Crews will reconstruct the eastbound bridge deck on I-94 over Otter Tail County Road 21.

For approximately two weeks, motorists will experience lane closures while crews install safety barriers and temporary crossovers in the median.

For the remainder of the project, all traffic on I-94 will shift to the westbound lanes while crews reconstruct the eastbound bridge.

Flaggers will control traffic on Otter Tail County Road 21, when necessary.

This is a two year project. Next summer crews will reconstruct the westbound bridge deck.

The upgrades will prolong the life of the bridges and result in a smoother road surface.

Cities feel burden of state pension shortfalls

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) - Cities and counties across Minnesota are feeling budgets squeezed as they try to make up for shortfalls in the state pension fund.

The St. Paul Pioneer Press reports (<http://bit.ly/1ajZWIR>) that many cities have had to cut staff, reduce services, or even raise property taxes to cover the costs.

While many municipalities can find ways to reduce costs of employee health care or other benefits, pension costs are out of their control. The contribution rate is set by the Legislature, and local governments must pay.

About a decade ago, the city of St. Paul paid an average of about \$5,000 toward a police officer's pension. Last year, the tab was nearly \$11,000.

Local governments don't welcome the hikes, but realize the increases are necessary to ensure the public pensions are sustainable.

Minn. revenues exceed projections by \$463M

★ ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) - Minnesota's tax revenues for the budget year that ended June 30 came in \$463 million ahead of forecast, and state officials say that means more money will be on its way to schools.

Minnesota Management and Budget says most of the extra revenue came from higher-than-expected individual income tax payments.

Some of that is attributed to stronger-than-expected economic growth. But the department believes much of it came from wealthy taxpayers shifting income from future years into 2012 to beat higher taxes, yielding a one-time gain that'll be offset in future years.

Still, Governor Mark Dayton says the quarterly update is good news for education because a bill he signed last session requires the state to use surplus revenue to accelerate repayments of money that previous legislatures borrowed from school districts.

TARGET LAWSUIT--DISCRIMINATION

Hispanic employees sue Target for discrimination

★ FRESNO, Calif. (AP) - Three former Hispanic employees are suing Target Corporation for discrimination and retaliation, citing a training document reminding managers that not all Hispanics eat tacos and burritos, dance to salsa or wear sombreros.

The lawsuit was filed June 24th in California's Yolo County.

It alleges that Caucasian managers at a warehouse in Woodland regularly used racial slurs when addressing Hispanic workers. It cites a document featuring common stereotypes and tips on how to manage Hispanic workers.

A Target spokeswoman wouldn't comment on the lawsuit itself but says the Minneapolis-based company was sorry for the content of the document. She says it was not part of any "formal or company-wide training" and was used only at one distribution center.

The lawsuit also alleges that Target terminated many of its older

OTC to Consider Wheelage Tax

County commissioners across the state are considering "wheelage taxes" after the Legislature recently expanded the option beyond Twin Cities metro counties. It is usually \$5 or \$10 per car or truck, added on when vehicles are registered with the state each year.

Julie Ring, legislative coordinator for the Association of Minnesota Counties, says Brown, Mower and Rice counties already have approved the new tax, revenues of which go to road repairs.

Lawmakers also recently made it possible for Minnesota's 87 counties to impose a sale tax to help pay for transportation and transit projects without a referendum.

Otter Tail County Board of Commissioners will hear a presentation on Wheelage Tax at the July 16th board meeting. They need to notify the state by August 1st if they are going to add the tax. The fees would be dedicated to fixing roads.

Flatley Sentenced for Chat with Child and Gun Possession

A Perham man thought he was chatting on the computer with a 13-year-old girl from Montana. It was really a deputy in Montana posing as the child. 54-year-old John Patrick Flatley of Perham was convicted of engaging in electronic communication describing sexual conduct with a child. In a separate case he was convicted possession a weapon after dishonorable discharge from the armed forces.

Flatley will spent 90 days in jail concurrently. He was ordered to follow the recommendations of an evaluation, not to have access to internet unless he has approval of a probation agent and he will be required to register as a predatory offender.

Campbell Convicted on Weapons Charge

A Fergus Falls man is going to prison for a weapons charge conviction. Homeowners near Pelican Rapids came home in July of this year to find a man they knew in their yard acting strangely. They knew the man as he was formerly married to a family member. 32-year-old Steven Deshun Campbell pretended to have found a break-in at the home and left quickly. They found a chainsaw and frozen beef tips from their freezer outside under a window. Other items were missing from the home and it had been ransacked.

Officers questioning Campbell found the stolen Playstation 3 at the apartment where he was staying.

Campbell, who has a previous burglary conviction, received 39 months in prison and credit for 59 days spent in jail for possession of a firearm. A 2nd degree burglary charge was dismissed.

The National Agricultural Statistics Service says in its weekly crop report for the week ending Sunday that the moisture might have come too late to help row crop development, while others suggested it could help put on test weight.

Winter wheat seeding was estimated at 25 percent complete.

Spring wheat harvested was 88 percent, behind last year's 100 percent but near average.

Durum wheat harvested was 63 percent, well behind last year and the average.

Corn at the mature stage was 9 percent, well behind 75 percent last year and the average of 26 percent.

Soybeans were behind last year but ahead of average in maturity.

HEALTH GRANTS

Centers in the Dakotas getting large health grant

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP) - Two Dakota centers are getting multimillion-dollar grants from the National Institutes of Health.


The Children's Health Research Center at Sanford Research in Sioux Falls is getting \$11.6 million over five years, and the University of North Dakota medical school in Grand Forks is getting \$10.5 million over that time.

The Children's Health Research Center is a nonprofit formed by Dakotas-based Sanford Health and the University of South Dakota in Vermillion. Officials there are studying congenital defects and childhood diseases.

The UND medical school will use its grant money to support a biomedical research center.

CORNFIELD CAPTURE

Transport company must pay expenses in ND escape

 A prisoner transport company's attorney says the company appreciates the help of law enforcement agencies and residents who helped capture an escaped convict who tried to hide out in a North Dakota cornfield.

Extradition Transport of America has agreed to pay \$70,000 in expenses to law enforcement agencies and farmers who helped capture Joseph Megna.

The payment is part of a settlement agreement filed in federal court. The government filed the complaint against Extradition Transport, which had been transporting Megna from Florida to Washington state in October 2011 when he escaped from a rest stop on Interstate 94. Area farmers used combines to help flush Megna from the field.

Attorney Christopher Nyhus says the company already had been working on making the financial repayments on its own before the lawsuit.

FRACKING-METHANE

Study: Methane leaks from gas drilling not huge

WASHINGTON (AP) - A new study finds that the process of drilling and fracking for natural gas doesn't seem to spew immense amounts of the greenhouse gas methane into the air, as has been feared.

The finding bolsters a big selling point for natural gas: that it's not as bad for global warming as coal. And it undercuts a major environmental argument against fracking, a process that breaks apart deep rock to recover more gas. The study doesn't address other fracking pollution concerns.

The results generally agree with earlier EPA estimates and were published by the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences.

About 90 percent of the study funding came from nine energy companies that drill for natural gas. The rest came from the Environmental Defense Fund.

Extradition to Minn Refused by M. A. Burris & M. K. Burris Again

Both Michael Alan Burris and his son, Michael Kyle Burris have refused extradition to Minnesota for a second time. They were arrested last month in Mesa, Arizona for the murder of Scott Burris. Otter Tail County Prosecutor, Michelle Eldien says the paperwork is now on its way to Governor Mark Dayton seeking to return the pair to the state. Another hearing was held Friday in Arizona. Prosecutors say Scott Burris was shot to death over a drug debt owed to his uncle.

More Charges for Former Deputy Heuer

Copper Wire Theft Damages Wahpeton Substation

9-6-13

Near midnight Wednesday, it was discovered that someone had cut a fence at an electrical substation in north Wahpeton, North Dakota and were in the process of cutting ground wires when they hit a live wire.

Otter Tail Power Company's safety services manager Eric Hamm says, "In this case, the thief, or thieves, risked severe burns or death for about \$50 worth of copper, and they put emergency responders and people who rely on electricity for life support at risk."

He says "The Department of Homeland Security considers interference with the electrical grid to be a potential act of terrorism."

Repairs to Otter Tail Power Company's substation will exceed \$30,000.

The Wahpeton Police Department is continuing the investigation and will coordinate with the Department of Homeland Security.
