-University of Nebraska Chancellor Retires

University of Nebraska Chancellor Harvey Perlman delivering his final state if the University address says UNL isn't the same university it was fifteen years ago when he became chancellor. Perlman says "We are now a far better university. There are issues on which we are regarded as the premiere source of talent and information in the world. We are engaged in cutting edge research that tries to solve some of the most intractable issues facing human conditions." Perlman says growing enrollment at UNL has resulted in increased diversity on campus which he says only serves to enhance "the stature of this uiversity. He remains confident UNL will reach it's goal of enrolling thirty thousand students, Perlman is retiring at the end of June.

-Senator defends vote to fund government

United States Senator Ben Sasse defends his vote against a bill to fund the federal government, insisting all the "shut down the government" talk in Washington presents a false choice. Senator Sasse says "What they do is they wait until the end of the year every time, then manufacture this absurd false choice between shut it down and fund it all. The senate has voted to fund the federal government through the eleventh of December. The bill goes to the House, if approved by midnight funding for the government continues as the federal fiscal year begins. The senate voted seventy eight to twenty in favor of the legislation, which left out a controversial provision to take funding away from planned parenthood. Sasse lays some blame for the budget crises at the feet of his republican leaders.

<u>Agriculture</u>

-Farm income forecast

Farm income has fallen with the drop of crop prices from the record highs of two-thousand eleven and two thousand and thirteen. University of Nebraska Lincoln Bureau of Business research, Eric Thompson says those prices are settling at a sustainable level. Thompson says "What we've seen over the last few years as crop prices have retreated from unusually high levels back to more long-term levels, the Bureaus long term economic forecast predicts another down year for agriculture, before it begins to grow again, the forecast looks three years into the future. Thompson develops the forecast along with the Nebraska Business Forecast council, a group of economists who work for U.N.L., the University of Nebraska at Omaha, utilities and various government agencies. The bottom line is that even though farmers and livestock producers might have to suffer through another year, they can expect prices to stabilize and incomes to rise long term, and that bodes well for the state economy

-The Internal Revenue service is launching a campaign with the Nebraska Department of Revenue and the states private sector tax industry to nudge Nebraskans into taking more precautions with their sensitive financial information. Christopher Miller, a spokesman for the IRS in Nebraska says identity thieves are becoming more sophisticated all the time and taxpayers need to keep up or they will become victims. Miller encourages people to use security software to protect their computers, that includes firewalls and anti-virus protection. Nebraskans have to be on guard for crooks trolling to rip you off using telephone and e-mail "phishing" cons. Your tax returns are sensitive data so you treat that information just like you would cash, don't leave it laying around. Properly dispose of old tax returns and other sensitive documents by shredding them before you put them in the trash.

-Con-Agra relocates to Chicago

Con-Agra announced yesterday a restructuring plan that includes moving the company headquarters from Omaha to Chicago. The reorganization expects to realize at least three hundred million dollars of efficiency benefits within the next three years. Part of that reorganization means a reduction in their workforce. They plan to eliminate one thousand five hundred positions at the Omaha headquarters leaving one thousand two hundred employees at the facility. Chicago mayor Rahm Emanuel says "By choosing Chicago as their new home Con-Agra foods sees the same strengths that so many other companies see in relocating their headquarters here, from talent to our transportation, to our quality of life. He says he looks forward to watching them become part of Chicago's future by creating even more jobs and opening up more opportunities for the residents of our city.
