We had a chance to speak with Idaho House Speaker Scott Bedke, about the amendment. So speaker we wanted to talk about the constitutional amendment HJR4 which essentially will lock in the boundaries of the legislative districts, but the quantity at 35 so we'd have 35 senators 70 House members. Tell us why this is a good idea I know you're a big advocate of it. Speaker Scott Bedke: Well it boils down to representation. Your, our constitution says that when we redistrict the state, every 10 years as we will this this coming year that we can have as few as 30 legislative districts, or as many as 35. And we've always had 35 ever since the 1990 and so that's the number that we're used to, but it boils down to this question would you rather share your representative, and your senator with 50,000 people, or would you rather share him with, with 65,000 people that that's it's just a mathematical exercise, you take the population of the state and it's anticipated that the population that is census will say that Idaho has a little over 1.8 million people, and you do the math there and you divide the divide that by 35, you get a smaller number than you do a few divided by, let's say, 30, or 32, you know that it boils down to that and that you know so that has huge ramifications in a state like Idaho where you have sparsely populated areas and we have more concentrations of population the rural parts of the state, but it's also not good for the suburban parts of our state and back to the How many people do you want to share your representative with question is what this boils down to so we have the latitude of changing that. In those instances I do my best to have them stay, I show a radiologist, even though that's not normally our, you know procedure. And I do my best so that we can get them taken care of in a timely fashion. So we proceed with ultrasound biopsy if needed. Get them all set up for that if there's something that is not normal. There's always coordination. And in fact, I think there's a, the highest level of collaboration I've ever seen from a regional healthcare standpoint, because of from a normal sense of things we're kind of viewed as competitors but in the sense we're all on the same team. How is a hospital chosen? Sometimes it's about, the timing and where they're at geographically as to where that patient may or may not be taken. And, and then even once there, they may be taken to any facility is determined by the medical staff at that at that facility that that another place for care is is more aptly suited there, then a transfer request would be put into place and so and true regardless of whether it's a COVID patient or your trauma patient or anything is that just the flow of patient care , Hospitals have the ability to flex staffing and resources in times of increased volume, because that's the way staffing plans are built. But when you have sustained volume that exceeds the anticipated, or amount of staffing plans put together, then you have nurses who are picking up extra shifts that are working overtime. And for a period of time they're not having that chance to recuperate, mentally, emotionally, physically, and that's where we're reaching a point of burnout.
