Dairy producers are businesses that need to grow at some point to remain successful. There is often a "collision of vision" between them and those who are previous urbanites moving into the country. The two often don't understand each other and challenges come with this. There are also pluses to it. They discussed different aspects of each. There is often a disconnect between urban and agriculture and where food comes from. The dairy industry is a major portion of the state's economy. Land issues, planning and zoning can be complicated. There is no perfect solution. Both sides need to respect each other and communicate.

Last session the legislature passed it, only to have it vetoed by the Governor. She explained what it would take to have this brought to a referendum. This will allow the citizens of the state to vote on it. Julaine spoke on examples of court cases in other states that are working to undermine the

					traditional marriage structure. She believes people need to think of what is best for the children, and studies prove that traditional marriage is the best way to raise them. Society has a mentality that looks at what's best for me, what will make me happy, rather than what is best the children our future leaders.

Our whole economy is based on cheap energy costs, which are now rising. This is not good long-term planning. Promoting renewable energy and good sound economic growth can co-exist. Education is needed to help bring this about.

This mission of the center is to reach youth where they are at to make positive life changes and bring them to a relationship with Jesus Christ. There are recreation opportunities for the youth. There is a teen mother's program once a week that offers a hot meal, daycare, free diapers and acceptance from volunteer women who minister to them. The Rush is a Sunday night youth church that is designed for them and ministers in unconventional ways. Unconditional love is shown to these kids who often don't find it anywhere else. Dean feels the most pressing issues affecting the youth are violence, drugs and sex. Often they don't know what is right or wrong and need guidance. He engages kids on a one-to-one relationship. He has seen many changed lives as a result of the teen center.

He is the Pastor of Holy Cathedral Church of God in Christ in Milwaukee. The church's mission is to the entire city and focuses on families. Mentoring is a way the church reaches out to the youth. Some of the mentors are business owners, educators and doctors. It helps the youth to see they can become productive members of society. Pastor Mc Clelland believes that a church with young people is a church with a future. Connecting with youth is very important. The church has a computer enrichment lab where they can come to do homework on computers. The church takes a pro-active approach by helping youth see that they have something to offer and be involved in ministry. Pastor Mc Clelland has a background as a social worker. He spoke on what he believes are the most pressing issues affecting youth. Among them are: abuse, poverty, lack of discipline and the crumbling family unit. He works to partner with schools, businesses and law enforcement to share information about the ministries that are available at the church.

He is involved with LAMP USA and the Many Nations One Voice Conference, both in Milwaukee. The needs of families are very important to a healthy society. Knowing their God-given identities can enrich ethnic families. Neighbors should watch out for each other and offer even simple gestures to help struggling families. Families with serious issues need to know there is hope for them. Terry explained what he sees as the source of that hope, that being, that they

					know who their Creator made them to be. This brings a tremendous sense of self-worth.

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Growth/Population	PR 04-035	06/26/04	10:30 AM	29:15	Dodge County Sheriff Todd Nehls and Host George Zach discuss how current population trends are affecting the Sheriff's Department. The county is seeing people move out of major metropolitan areas into the Dodge County's countryside. This increases traffic and the need for law services. The sheriff's department is the primary law enforcement for country dwellers. Budget cuts have stifled staffing growth, so resources are managed more specifically. Sheriff Nehls discussed the ways he has implemented this. He is hoping for a recreational officer that will be responsible for patrolling parks, bodies of water, recreational trails, etc. The county is in need of water safety and rescue equipment. A good portion of these expenses could be covered by the state. Sheriff Nehls is very grateful to his staff for their hard work and dedication. He has a proactive philosophy. He prefers to work to prevent tragedies rather than reacting to one.

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Growth/Population	PR 04-022	05/01/04	12:00 PM	29:15	Mr. Chris Swartz, the Sussex Village Administrator and Host JoAnne Stoddard discuss Sussex and how they work to accommodate growth and maintain a small town atmosphere and a sense of community. The state's Smart Growth Law was discussed and how village officials are working to put that in action. Sussex had an incredible surge of growth a number of years back, which overburdened the system. Growth had to be slowed to a maintainable amount. A goal of Sussex is to have a downtown area that will create a community living room. Visual continuity and its history are part of what will make the downtown their very own. New industry was pursued and as a result of that, 70-80 new ones were created and 3 corporate centers came to town. Many of those have 500+ employees. Manufacturers pay 18-20% of village taxes, which is a very high level. They discussed the 2020 plan that will be part of Smart Growth. The goal is to have a major limited commercial area, a great balance of residential, commercial, industry and a range of housing types. Mr. Swartz likes the idea of contracting for services with surrounding communities. Some of this is already being done.

Chris is the Executive Director of the Milwaukee Community Service Corps, a non-profit organization that helps young adults find meaningful employment. The mission of the MCSC is to help disadvantaged young adults and engage them to better themselves and the public. The program is labor intensive and geared towards construction, manufacturing and craftsmanship. One-third of the graduates enroll in post-secondary education. Many become entrepreneurs. Students are paid a wage to be in the program. Some may

					need to get their drivers license and GED. Half of their funding comes from fee-for-services. The MCSC develops relationships with contractors and the youth do work for them. An initiative is underway to work on cleaning up Lake Michigan. They are working on water quality issues that come about from water run-off. The Marquette Interchange is facing a major upgrade and Chris is working to have his students involved in this. He spoke on a success story of a former student who now has a very good career.
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Education/Schools	PR 04-026	05/08/04	12:00 PM	29:15	Host Jerry Sherstad welcomes Daren Sievers, the Dean of Students at Slinger High School. The school has seen much growth in the last several years and has moved from being more rural to being more suburban. It has become more college-prep orientated. The school's curriculum has changed to meet these needs. The Youth Options Program was discussed. It is a state-mandated program that is paid for by the local school districts. The students are sent to secondary schools (technical schools or colleges) for advanced classed that cannot be offered by the school district. It is very good for the students as it helps prepare them for college. A drawback is that it is funded by the taxpayers. The students who have taken courses have proved to be very responsible. Mr. Sievers is Advisor to the Volunteer Core Group. The club performs community services in the inner city of Milwaukee, and also to other community endeavors. They go monthly to a soup kitchen and help feed the homeless people. There are always more kids that want to do it than there is room for. Working at the soup kitchen gives the kids a perspective on the importance of education while remaining sensitive to those who are less fortunate.

Thalia explained what a business incubator is, and how it helps entrepreneurs in their business ventures. The incubator she is involved with is a technical empowerment one. It houses 15 businesses. The incubator provides support, shared resources and below market rent rates. There is a graduation policy for the businesses to move out on their own after a number of years. There is an incredibly high success rate for those businesses that have been incubated. Small businesses are very important- as the Governor realizes this. He says it is something the state needs to build upon. The incubators create jobs at a cost factor of \$1200- which is very low. Different resources for entrepreneurs in the state were also discussed.

The YMCA not only serves Beaver Dam, but the surrounding communities. Youth programs from baby to teens were

					discussed and how each not only provides recreation, but also character development. There will be many summer programs and camps coming up. Financial help is available to those who cannot afford to pay.

He is the Pastor of Holy Cathedral Church of God in Christ. Part of the way the church reaches out to the community is through Word of Hope Ministries, which has a Family Technology Resource Center. It is open to anyone in Milwaukee to come and learn basic computer skills or to get a GED at no cost to the recipients. Some people have underlying needs such as AODA, housing, family, etc. The church connects those people with agencies that can help them. The church helps people with skills in obtaining and retaining employment. They also work directly with employers. Holy Cathedral received a sizable federal grant to help them administer a program that helps ex-offenders after they leave jail. It is called Ready for Work and helps them reintegrate into society and obtain employment. The church also provides a spiritual foundation and helps them be ware of their self-worth.

Brenda works on job retention and bringing in quality jobs to the county. She detailed the number of opportunities for citizens to be involved, as she considers their input to be very important. Controlled and managed growth is very important. Residential growth is tremendous in the county. Land use issues are a concern. Agriculture is affected by all the growth. Business clusters were discussed. Clusters are a group of similar companies in a geographical area. Other counties are involved in clusters, including Dodge. The businesses work together to prevent outsourcing to foreign countries and other reasons. A comprehensive survey was done to determine what is needed in the county. The cost of healthcare was a key priority. Another thing she would hope to see is more dialogue between industry and educational institutions.

According to her, she is not finding a poor economy and sluggish job market. She has seen steady job growth in the last 6-8 months. Many manufacturers are experiencing a shortage of skilled people. Education and retraining are needed to be employable and being able to move ahead. It is important to have an attitude to learn. Services that job agencies offer were discussed. Employers utilize employment agencies because many companies have staff cut to the bone. An agency is able to help find the most qualified fit for jobs they have available. Agencies counsel potential employees on how to dress, how their appearance, timeliness, and attitude affects the outcome of a job interview. The very important 1 st impression was talked about. It is important to have a solid work history. Benefits and health insurance are major issues for employers. This can hold back hiring in some cases.

He spoke on how the state is faring in employment issues at this time. The state has had to develop partnerships with different sectors. High schools

					and technical schools have adjusted their curriculum to meet changing needs. The university system is geared towards job creation. Many students are non-traditional- they have lost their jobs, are older and may be training for a whole new career. Senator Fitzgerald talked about the Jobs Creation Act which helps to eliminate beuacracy and red tape for corporations wanting to expand and/or move into the state. The Single Sales factor also has been good for companies- it bases the tax burden on sales related just to the state of Wisconsin. The Legislature would like to work more specifically with utilities to bring in more needed power for companies. They also discussed the state of agriculture in the state and how that has changed a lot. Legislature hopes to address tax rates and come up with better strategies for long-term positions.
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Family Issues	PR 04-039	05/31/04	10:30 AM	29:15	Jean Buschke, the Executive Director of PAVE, and Host Jerry Sherstad examine the issues families face and the fact that some of these lead to domestic violence. PAVE stands for People Against a Violent Environment. PAVE offers a round the clock staffed shelter in an undisclosed location. Economic pressures and the general lack of respect we see today can contribute to domestic violence. There are different types of violence. Verbal abuse is one that no one can see and she thinks it can be harder to recover from that than physical abuse. Violence tears at the whole fabric of our society. It affects children whether or not they are a direct recipient of it. When someone comes to the PAVE shelter, they are given time to just be quiet. They can stay as long as they want as long as they are working on a plan to move forward. Families are under many pressures that can contribute to domestic violence. Sexual assault of children was discussed. Parents need to talk about these things with their children. We need to be proactive about teaching them what it. PAVE sponsors community meetings to help make the public aware of how to deal with this.

Dr. Pitter is a pediatrician and spoke on issues facing youth. She believes the level of violence and exposure to sex are major concerns. Youth are a generation that seem to be raising themselves. Many are without proper supervision. Children are raising children, as in the case of teen pregnancies. Sexually transmitted diseases are harder to treat and can have devastating consequences. Violence has escalated. Our society says anything goes. Dr. Pitter believes the absence of love, and looking for it in all the wrong places are major factors. Obesity and other health factors of youth were discussed. She believes people need to turn to their heavenly Father for true change in their lives, no matter what the situation.

The District has an excellent student body and good curriculum. They will be working together next year with the Dodgeland School District to share courses. They also work with MPTC. Mr. Carlson feels it is important for small districts to stay technically upgraded. In small schools teachers and students get to know each other better. He hopes to expand working with other districts. Schools all over the state are experiencing budget cuts and Hustisford is no exception. They write grants and have received several that will allow for programs to start

					or expand. It is important to develop good relations with the community. People need to be aware of what is going on. The number one goal is to serve the students. The community must be involved in the schools and parents must come in and be made to feel welcomed. The schools offer classes for community members after hours. Hustisford has excellent extracurricular programs for it's students. Mr. Carlson states that we must look ahead to 5-10 years down the road. He believes education will look quite different then.

The segment was filmed on location at the school district office. Mr. Bieri feels Mayville offers excellent opportunities for its students. He also spoke on the challenges the district is having due to state budget cuts. They were able to finish the new budget without cutting out any course offerings. Mr. Bieri talked about how schools are funded. Enrollment is done and that greatly affects the amount of revenue from the state. The community desires quality education, the state has cut down on funding and no one wants their property taxes raised. This does present quite a challenge to the district. The district is working very hard to provide the best quality education for its students in the midst of these challenges. The guest for the second half of the show was Mayville High School Principal Lee Zarnott. He and Host Jackie Kahlhamer talked about the High School and what it offers to the students. The segment was filmed at the Mavville School District office. MHS has a very impressive scholarship program for a school of its size. Half of this year's graduating seniors received a scholarship. He spoke on the curriculum the school offers. There are courses for those who are college bound and those who plan to enter directly into the workforce. The school has established relationships with

					other organizations outside of itself. This is very important for the school and community. Parental and community input is very important.

Black students account for 64% of the MPS student body. The gap must be closed, as it

					<p>will affect the economy of the city and life opportunities for these children. Milwaukee has the highest dropout rate for African American students in the country. Dr. Onick teaches a mentoring/coaching program for MPS principals that focuses on bringing out the brilliance of each student rather than trying to "fix someone". It is vital for schools to set goals and identify standards. There is a quality of teaching that is critical for success. Schools that have applied these are seeing the gap reduced. A rigorous curriculum must be offered. The Milwaukee Partnership Academy has been formed that brings together many and various organizations. They are being asked what they are committed to do to close this gap.</p>

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Gene Kapp and Jay Sekulow Chief Counsel for American Center for Law & Justice discuss the same sex marriage issue. The State of Massachusetts has legalized same sex marriage and is the first state that has mandated under state law through the court process - four un-elected judges decision, not legislature process. Jay explains in 1996 Hawaii first attempted to use the courts to legislate from the bench. Roll-in is played from that 1996 case. Jay explains that the case in Massachusetts (4-3 decision) is now requiring a Federal Marriage Amendment that is now in committee in Congress. Gene and Jay discuss Justice Scalia's dissenting opinion in Lawrence v. Texas (2003) case. They discuss why the amendment is necessary. Jay addresses questions from viewers calling in.

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Gene Kapp and Jay Sekulow, Chief Justice American Center for Law & Justice discuss that America is in the greatest struggle for the institution of marriage in U.S. history. Jay talks about the Supreme Court decision *Murphy v Ramsey* (1885) stating that a marriage was between a man and a woman and four un-elected judges in the state of Massachusetts have changed that. He says this decision by these judges will impact the rest of the country and this is why it is necessary for a constitutional amendment.

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Gene Kapp and Jay Sekulow Chief Counsel for American Center for Law & Justice discuss a Supreme Court historic case heard in September before the court was back in session. It was regarding campaign finance reform in which students whose free speech rights were being denied. This was part of the larger case and says there is an exception in the legislation that a minor, 17 years and younger could not participate in political campaigns a prohibition about students making campaign contributions. A group of minors from across America were represented by ACLJ in this case to insure that their rights were protected. The Supreme Court's decision was a unanimous decision for the students. Roll-in of the case that aired on C-Span and CBN News. Jay and Gene discuss the Tinker v Des Moines 1969 case where the court stated, "Students do not shed their constitutional rights to freedom of speech or expression at the schoolhouse gate." In the Supreme Court case (McConnell v FEC (2004)) they discuss Justice William Rehnquist's statement. Jay takes callers from viewers addressing teacher/student questions.

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Gene Kapp and Jay Sekulow Chief Counsel for American Center for Law & Justice answers viewer calls regarding students' rights in classroom. Jay discusses the case of Bridget a 16 years old student who wanted a Bible Club at her public school. The case went to the Supreme Court Jay quotes Justice Sandra Day O'Connor who said there was a crucial difference between government speech endorsing religion and student speech, which is protected. Jay talks about this statement of Justice O'Connor changed the scope of what has been allowed in public schools and is being used to argue current trial cases. Another viewer calls in a question regarding students being allowed to read their Bible at school. Jay explains the student's rights to read their Bible on school grounds. Gene Kapp and Jay discuss the history of the ACLU regarding reading the Bible on school grounds. Jay hears another question from a parent whose child sang a Christian song at a middle school talent show and was told to choose another song. Jay explains why that is a violation of student's free speech rights and why the school cannot censor it out.
