Heather Sells, CBN News Reporter: The City of Brotherly Love is squaring off with a long-time ally -- the Boy Scouts of America. At issue: the Scout's 80-year-old headquarters building in downtown Philadelphia and the right of the Scouts to ban homosexuals from leadership. The City of Philadelphia says it will evict the Boy Scouts from their headquarters on June 1 if they don't change their policy banning homosexuals. The city says it told the Boy Scouts last June that they either need to stop "discriminating" and abide by the city's fair practice ordinance or get out of the building. Several conservative groups including the ACLJ, Conservative Defense Alliance, and the Conservative Leadership PAC have launched a campaign to support the Boy Scouts. The Cradle of Liberty Council told CBN that it's considering its options and a First Amendment action is one of them. But it remains hopeful that the matter can be resolved without litigation. Philadelphia joins several other cities including Berkeley and San Diego, CA that have recently challenged the Scout's use of public facilities. CBN host Pat Robertson meets with Governor Rick Perry (Texas) and talks about the Boys Scout issue. Boy Scouts have impacted young boys in a positive way but the law suits are negatively affecting them. There have been many issues and now this latest one. They discuss his book "On My Honor" to help the Scouts; they discuss the Supreme Court case fought over the Scouts. They discuss the Polygamist controversy and 416 children – some abused – in Texas. Texas moved in appropriately and we're getting these children in safe places so they can get on with their lives.

David Brody CBN News reports - In the House of Representatives, we know that Democrats are in control and Nancy Pelosi is the Speaker. But the true power base may rest with "The Blue Dogs." Congressman Mike Ross, D-AR, is one of the leaders of this political dog pound, and he has the pedigree to prove it. Ross said, "We're conservative, we're moderate -- we're Blue Dogs." This coalition of House Democrats was formed in 1994, the same year that Republicans took power. "We find ourselves in the middle,' Ross said, "Which, quite frankly, is where I believe America is." And their numbers are growing. They grew from 35 members to 44, courtesy of the mid-term elections. Those nine new "Blue Pups" make up nearly 20 percent of the incoming Democrats. "The Blue Dogs have the theoretical power to guide everything that happens in this new Congress," said Michael Crowley, Senior Editor of New Republic Magazine. While the Blue Dogs lean conservative on social issues, their true bread and butter is fiscal discipline like balancing the budget and reducing the debt. In their offices, you always see the growing U.S. debt chart. And the Blue Dogs can become even more powerful if they team up with the "Tuesday Group." These are moderate Republicans who have similar policy goals. Last year, the two groups combined to help pass a Republican-backed bankruptcy bill, despite pleas for unity from Democratic leaders. President Bush is watching closely and recently invited them to the White House to discuss how they can work together.
