On an ongoing basis, we maintain contact and confer with local government, civic, and business leaders, as well as members of the general public, about what they perceive as top-of-mind issues important to the communities we serve.

Recurring priority topics:

- Health care, particularly COVID-19 related
- Education, particularly related to the disruptions caused by COVID-19 accommodations
- Opportunities for young people, and perhaps related neighborhood crime
- Employment opportunities, the labor pool, and availability of quality housing
- Health of the local retail economy
- Drug and alcohol abuse

Area community leaders have expressed concerns relating to challenges associated with rural healthcare; workforce development and related industrial needs; infrastructure such as roads and bridges; substance abuse; and tax revenue and public services.

We strive to provide responsive and helpful programming. Further, we also work to educate and inform the people we are privileged to serve through a variety of public service announcements, local news coverage, community calendars, and other programs.

We have continued to focus programming and messaging on health, education, and economic issues related to the COVID-19 pandemic with public service announcements supporting Alabama Gov. Kay Ivey's related mandates, including messages from the governor, the Alabama Department of Public Health, Coosa Valley Medical Center, Sylacauga City Schools, and, from a national perspective, the Centers for Disease Control and the National Association of Broadcasters.

Issues and Responsive Programming

WYEA broadcast programming dealing with various issues important to the community.

1. Behind the Headlines: Our weekly half-hour *Behind the Headlines* program, focusing on local issues and concerns, airs each Sunday at 6:00 a.m. and is also streamed along with video on our websites and social media services. On March 29, the program was honored with an ABBY Award as the state's best small market public affairs program.
 - a. Jan. 10: Jim Armstrong, Executive Director, Sylacauga Parks and Recreation: Armstrong discussed the various programs the rec center offers to the community and challenges the rec center faced during COVID. The rec center had limited community involvement due to the pandemic. He also provided a

construction update on the Veterans Memorial at the Pinecrest Park walking track.

- b. Jan. 17: Amy Price and Jeff Wood, Coosa Valley Medical Center: Price and Wood joined Hannah Hammonds to discuss COVID-19 and the impact it has had on CVMC. The hospital will begin giving a limited number of the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine on Monday, Jan. 18 to those who are eligible. Both Price and Wood discussed the vaccination process, as well as the biggest challenges that CVMV has faced since last March. Price discussed how the hospital switchboard has been overwhelmed with phone calls inquiring about the vaccine which has hindered patient care. Individuals are asked to contact the Alabama Department of Public Health for inquiries about the vaccine.
- c. Jan. 24: Randy Clark and Rep. Ben Robbins: Hannah Hammonds talked with community advocate Randy Clark about how he and others clean up litter throughout the city of Sylacauga. She also had the opportunity to catch up with newly elected District 33 State Rep. Ben Robbins, with discussion of how Robbins plans to work for the people in District 33 and the ideas he will be taking to Montgomery.
- d. Jan. 31: Brett Pritchard, Coordinator of High School and Public Relations, Central Alabama Community College: Michael Brannon was joined by Pritchard. They discussed scholarships, dual enrollment, and more that CACC offers for students. Pritchard explains the difference between AP classes and dual enrollment classes and how each can benefit students wanting to further their education.
- e. Feb. 7: Sylacauga Head Baseball Coach Jeff Bell: Hannah Hammonds talked with Bell. They discussed challenges the baseball team has faced during COVID and the upcoming season. Sylacauga was set to take the field against Thorsby on Thursday, Feb. 18 at Walton Cruise Field.
- f. Feb. 14: Sylacauga Police Chief Kelley Johnson: Johnson joined Hannah Hammonds for a one-on-one interview. He discussed crime in the Sylacauga during 2020, gambling machine take backs in the Sylacauga community and how individuals should react during a routine traffic stop.
- g. Feb. 21: Tim Allen, Allen Oil Company: Allen joined Hannah Hammonds for a one-on-one interview. Allen discussed gas prices, family history in the business, fundraising for schools in the community, and the Allen Brew Market brand.
- h. Feb. 28: Jim Armstrong, Executive Director, Sylacauga Parks and Recreation: Armstrong joined Hannah Hammonds for a one-on-one interview. Armstrong discussed rec league sports, the Sylaward bike trail, and updates on the new veteran's memorial at Pinecrest Park.
- i. March 7: Dr. Jarod Speer, Childersburg Primary Care: Dr. Speer joined Hannah Hammonds for a one-on-one interview. He discussed his background in the medical field, as well as the new equipment and services Childersburg Primary Care has to offer to improve weight, muscles, and overall health.
- j. March 14: Dr. Ted Spears and Jeff Turner, Sylacauga Marble Festival: Dr. Spears and Turner joined Hannah Hammonds for a one-on-one interview. Dr. Spears highlighted details about the Marble Festival, dates for each event, and sculptors that will be in attendance. At this year's festival, Turner is reintroducing the Marble scavenger hunt that will be taking place throughout the Sylacauga community.

- k. March 31: Micah Harris, Operator of Chick-Fil-A Sylacauga: Harris joined Hannah Hammonds for a one-on-one interview. Harris highlighted what it's like to be a Chick-Fil-A franchisee, community involvement, challenges Chick-Fil-A Sylacauga has faced during the COVID-19 pandemic, and the roadmap to reopening the dining area.
 - l. March 28: Ashton Fowler, Sylacauga City Councilman, District 1: Fowler joined Hannah Hammonds for a one-on-one interview. Fowler went in depth discussing Sylacauga's new garbage collection service, the coyote problem in Valley View and Taylor Estates, and what Sylacauga residents can look forward in the coming months.

Length averaged three minutes and included local news and well as information solicited from and contributed by listeners, local organizations, and local government agencies.

Kevin Davis, journalist, author of "*The Brain Defense: Murder in Manhattan and the Dawn of Neuroscience in America's Courtrooms*"

In the past 25 years, neuroscience has become a prominent factor in many court cases. Defense attorneys are successfully arguing that a defendant may not be responsible for a crime or should receive a lesser punishment because of brain abnormalities or injuries. Mr. Davis discussed how this is changing how judges and juries define responsibility and assign punishment.

Richard Horowitz, MD, Lyme disease expert, founder of the Hudson Valley Healing Arts Center in Hyde Park, NY, author of "*How Can I Get Better?: An Action Plan For Treating Resistant Lyme And Chronic Disease*"

Dr. Horowitz said victims of Lyme disease are often misdiagnosed with other illnesses such as chronic fatigue syndrome, fibromyalgia, multiple sclerosis, or rheumatoid arthritis. He added that the number of Lyme cases is growing at an alarming rate each year, reaching epidemic proportions. He explained how to identify symptoms and work with a qualified specialist for the best possible treatment outcome.

Peter Vincent Pry, PhD, Executive Director of the Task Force on National and Homeland Security, Director of the United States Nuclear Strategy Forum, both of which are Congressional Advisory Boards, former chief of staff of the Congressional EMP Commission, author of "*EMP Manhattan Project: Organizing for Survival Against an Electromagnetic Pulse Catastrophe*"

Dr. Pry explained the serious threat posed by an electromagnetic pulse (EMP), either naturally-occurring or from a manmade source. He discussed the potential sources of an attack. He said up to 90% of the US population would be dead within a year after such an event. He also outlined the basic steps that could protect the national electrical grid and explained why the US government has failed to act.

Ric Edelman, personal finance expert, Chairman/CEO of Edelman Financial Services, LLC

Mr. Edelman has devised a plan he calls “baby bonds,” targeting retirement security. The plan would act as a supplement to Social Security, but it could eventually replace it. The plan would not be at the expense of taxpayers or government borrowing. He said at birth, children would receive an account with \$7,500 via money from investors in government bonds, similar to Series EE bonds. He said an investment at birth in this type of proposal would grow to become the equivalent of an average person’s Social Security benefit.

Harrison Fell, PhD, Associate Professor of Energy Economics at North Carolina State University

Prof. Fell shared the results of his recent study that found that the environmental benefits of renewable power generation vary significantly, depending on what type of conventional power generation that the renewable energy is replacing. He explained why environmental benefits often cross regional lines. He said he hopes that his findings will help target future renewable energy investments in places where they can have the greatest impact.

Jason Nagata, MD, MSc, Assistant Professor of Pediatrics at the University of California, San Francisco

Dr. Nagata led a recent study that found a 25% increase in food insufficiency during the COVID-19 lockdowns. Food insufficiency, the most extreme form of food insecurity, occurs when families do not have enough food to eat. He found that black and Latino Americans had over twice the risk of food insufficiency compared to whites. He said hunger, exhaustion, and worrying about not getting enough food to eat may worsen depression and anxiety symptoms, but that free groceries from food banks and similar sources alleviated the mental health burden of food insufficiency.

Justin Ezekowitz, MBBCh, MSc, Co-Director, Canadian VIGOUR Centre, Director of Cardiovascular Research and Professor in the Division of Cardiology at the University of Alberta

Prof. Ezekowitz led a study that found that women face a 20% higher risk than men of death or heart failure during the five years following a heart attack. He outlined the potential reasons for this trend and how it may be addressed. He said the increasing availability of new procedures to diagnose and treat heart attacks at smaller hospitals has improved survival rates for all patients.

Dr. Spiller explained what child is most at risk, how adults can prevent children and adolescents from gaining access to these drugs, and how to properly dispose of unused prescriptions.

Michelle Macy, MD, Pediatric Emergency Care Specialist at Lurie Children's Hospital of Chicago, Associate Professor of Pediatrics at Northwestern University Feinberg School of Medicine

Dr. Macy surveyed parents in Chicago during the early months of the pandemic and found that 23 percent of families were hesitant to seek emergency care for their child. She said the greatest reluctance was found in families of color. She offered examples of the most common ER visits that were left untreated and why this is such a great concern. She said that even nine months into the pandemic, ERs are still seeing far fewer patients than normal.
