



## 'A Heart of Hope' returns for a second year

Gospel concert, health screenings launch community wellness program. honoring Warren Mackey

ALBANY, N.Y. - Jan 27, 2023 — When Denyse Mackey conceived of "A Heart of Hope," her goal was to save just one life. The preventative health screening campaign that took place between February and April of 2022 exceeded that.

The community-wide campaign will kick off again this year with an in-person wellness campaign at 5 PM followed by a Gospel concert on Wednesday, Feb. 1, at 6 p.m. at Metropolitan Baptist Church located at 105 2nd Ave. in Albany. Admission is free and various faith-based organizations including Capital Area Council of Churches, Metropolitan Church and Hudson River Baptist Association, will be awarded scholarship funding in appreciation for their partnership in this wellness movement. The American Heart Association is offering blood pressure screenings and CPR trainings from 5 to 6 p.m.

"We know of three people whose lives were potentially saved because they got screened and found cancer-related risks," Mackey said. "That's three people who have more time with their families, with their friends, and who can savor their lives more fully. I can't think of a better way to honor my late husband than by saving lives. The impact last year was so rewarding, I can't wait to see what happens in 2023."

Warren Mackey passed away on Feb. 1, 2021, after a 10-year journey of cardiomyopathy and complications from heart surgery while waiting for a heart transplant. Denyse Mackey is a cancer survivor and BRCA warrior, and she created The Warren and Denyse Mackey Foundation, Inc., that invests in the community through scholarships, youth development in the underserved community, and cancer/heart initiatives.

This year, "A Heart of Hope" is expanding on its passion to serve the brown-skinned community, and to engage with the underserved community. Churches were the leaders in last year's campaign, and "A Heart of Hope" is reaching out to other community organizations this year, especially those serving the Latino community.

Thanks to a partnership with Albany Medical Center, the American Cancer Society and MVP Healthcare, anyone in the Capital District will be eligible for free cancer screenings or a primary care visit, with or without insurance. Participants that complete the recommended screenings are eligible for a \$50 gift card from the Foundation, while supplies last. Albany Med and the American Cancer Society have established a Heart of Hope concierge phone line for

personalized assessments and appointment scheduling for various cancer screenings or exams, including screenings for breast, colon, lung, skin, prostate and cervical cancers. The American Heart Association is providing information about heart disease and stroke, and the Center for Donation and Transplant has established a website for organ donation registration in honor of Warren Mackey.

"The importance of regular screenings cannot be overstated," said Dennis P. McKenna, MD, president and CEO of the Albany Med Health System. "Screenings can find, or even prevent, cancer at early stages before any symptoms appear. We can find a cure together. Albany Med is honored to raise awareness and expand access to proper cancer screenings with the Warren and Denyse Mackey Foundation and its Heart of Hope Wellness Campaign. Community is the cornerstone of our mission to save lives."

"At MVP Health Care, we know access to health care services and preventative medicine is vital to the early detection and treatment of diseases like cancer and heart disease," said MVP Health Care's President and CEO, Chris Del Vecchio. "We are proud to partner with the Warren and Denyse Mackey Foundation for the Heart of Hope Wellness Campaign to raise awareness and provide screening services to people throughout the Capital Region in a collective effort to build healthy communities."

"Only 36% of people consider regular cancer and other screenings essential to their overall health, yet we know that regular screenings can help find certain cancers early, when they are most likely to be treated successfully," said Joni Richter, Cancer Support Strategic Partnerships Manager, The American Cancer Society. "A Heart of Hope can help you determine which screenings are right for you, where you can get screened safely, and what to do if you don't have insurance. This is what health equity is all about — making sure we get rid of barriers so everyone can get screened."

"We know that heart disease disproportionately affects African-Americans," said Michael-Aaron Poindexter, Corporate Executive at Broadview Federal Credit Union, Pastor of Macedonia Baptist Church, and board member of the American Heart Association in the Capital Region. "I am not only proud to serve as a board member, but I am proud of the Warren and Denyse Mackey Foundation. As someone who knew Warren personally and benefited from his humor, drive, and mentorship, I see firsthand how his legacy to improve his community lives on through this foundation. At the Heart Association, we constantly strive to reduce inequities in health care, and we are happy to continue to work with Denyse as this program expands."

"The need for organ, eye and tissue donors in New York is great," said Laura Fissette, the senior hospital & community services specialist at the Center for Donation and Transplant. "There are approximately 8,500 men, women and children in NY that are waiting for a lifesaving transplant. Sadly, one of them dies every 15 hours because they didn't get their life saving transplant in time. You have the power to Donate Life. All New Yorkers 16 years old and up can register to save lives by signing up as an organ, eye and tissue donors. One organ donor can save up to eight people's lives and enhance up to 75 others through tissue donation."

"Our bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit, and we need to be good stewards of them," said Rev. Constance Knight, Pastor of Welcome Chapel Baptist Church, and moderator of the Hudson River Frontier Missionary Baptist Association, a group of 22 churches that stretch from Hudson to Glens Falls, and participate in A Heart of Hope. "We have seen with COVID that those most affected had pre-existing conditions. If we get healthy, that is a great way of preventing and fighting COVID. We encourage everyone to be healthy, reduce their weight and

"Food insecurity is a year-round challenge; it doesn't stop after the holidays," said Regional Food Bank of Northeastern New York Chief Executive Officer Molly Nicol. Together we can make a positive difference in our community."

Food distribution to families increased by nearly 40% in 2020 and has remained at elevated levels compared to the historical norm. The Regional Food Bank of Northeastern New York provided nearly 48 million pounds of food to the community in 2022, equating to roughly 40 million meals.






