PROGRAM DATE SUMMARY CRIME

NEWS 04/03/2023 Investigators now say they strongly believe a person is responsible for the fire at the former Doane Stuart School in Albany last month. They don't know if it was set intentionally though and the cause is still considered undetermined. They're offering a \$10,000 reward for any information regarding the person responsible. Officials say many pieces of potential physical evidence were destroyed before they could be analyzed further.

04/04/2023 A man from Saratoga Springs has been arrested accused of threatening someone with a machete. The Saratoga County Sheriff's Office says the crime happened Sunday night at the Saratoga Lake Motel. Shawn Soderburg is charged with criminal possession of a weapon in the third degree and menacing in the 2nd degree. He's been arraigned and is currently in jail without bail.

04/06/2023 State Lawmakers proposing legislation that would upgrade penalties for those school swatting incidents. Those phony threats of violence, sending many first responders to a school campus. Now the call for action comes after multiple waves of incidents across New York State, including here in the capital region and also affecting other schools across the country. The bill would upgrade school swatting from a class A misdemeanor to a Class E felony. Lawmakers say that would increase the penalty to up to four years in prison.

04/07/2023 State Police arresting a business owner they say took thousands of dollars from customers and never even started the projects he promised to complete. Troopers say James Larkin of Wolcott, Connecticut ran a company called Blue View Windows in Albany. They say in nine months from October of 2021 to July of 2022. He took in more than \$35,000 as deposits or contract payments and never returned any of that money. Larkin is facing charges of grand larceny, petit larceny and scheming to defraud.

04/11/2023 Schenectady Police making an arrest in an Easter morning shooting. Before 6:30 on Sunday morning officers responded to Eastern Avenue and Prospect Street where they found one victim shot in the thigh and foot. A suspect was arrested later that morning. 37 year old Pierre Sanders of Schenectady now faces attempted murder and gun charges.

04/11/2023 A suspect is in custody after trying to steal guns from the Calamity Jane Store in Hudson Falls. Police found a teenage male running from the shop. Officers tracked him down on Feeder Street, not the first time Calamity Jane's has had to deal with something like this. They were broken into last October when somebody made off with guns that time as well.

04/13/2023 Seven men in Western Massachusetts are now arrested for their alleged roles in a string of catalytic converter thefts. Authorities say the men stole 500 catalytic converters throughout Massachusetts and then sold them to scrap dealers, making roughly 2 million dollars. All 7 were charged with bank theft, money laundering and transporting stolen property across state lines.

04/17/2023 A 14 year old boy is recovering after getting stabbed at a Pine Hills Library. Isaiah Anderson of Troy is now charged with one count of assault and one count of weapon's possession. Police say it happened at a library at 517 Western Avenue on Saturday. The victim was found with two small puncture wounds to his back and was treated by EMS. The suspect, a 17 year old, was found at a Greyhound Bus Station. Police say the incident appears to be the result of a dispute between the two. The suspect is expected to be arraigned this week.

04/18/2023 A 20 year old Schuylerville woman is dead after allegedly being shot by a homeowner. According to the Washington County Sheriff Jeff Murphy, Kaylin Gillis and her friends had been driving through Hebron to get to a friend's house Saturday night, when they mistakenly arrived at the wrong address. They started to pull out of the driveway when the homeowner came out of the house and shot twice. One of the bullets fatally wounding Gillis. The homeowner 65 year old Kevin Monahan is now facing a charge of 2nd degree murder.

04/18/2023 Schenectady Police have arrested a minor who allegedly made a false bomb threat at Mont Pleasant Middle School. Staff and students were moved to other city school buildings for safety several weeks ago after the school received that voicemail threat. Police were able to trace the voicemail to the minor allegedly responsible and make the arrest.

04/20/2023 Schenectady Police have arrested four people in connection to a home invasion that resulted in a shooting. Two of them are the suspected burglars and the others are residents that opened fire. Police say LeGrant Foster and Pierre Thompson broke into a home on Kings Road last night. Officers believe that they made it into the breezeway before Monique Serano and David Jackson opened fire striking one of them. The two men were arrested at Ellis Hospital where they reportedly fled to seek treatment. Serano and Jackson are accused of possessing an illegal handgun.

04/21/2023 A plea deal in the 2018 Schoharie Limo crash that left 20 people dead, will not be reinstated. An Appeals Court decided it will not allow Naumann Hussein, the Limo company's operator, to avoid prison time. The plea deal was reached in 2021, but was rejected by a different judge last year. Hussein's trial is set to start May 1st.

04/25/2023 The driver who killed a woman in a Westerlo drunk driving crash back in 2021 has finally been sentenced and will serve 10 to 32 years in prison. Andrew Gibson sentenced yesterday, more than a year after he was supposed to be, due to the fact that he tried to escape. Lisa Sperry, killed in May of 2021, when Gibson slammed his car into her minivan. In February of 2022, he was a no show at his sentencing after pleading guilty to the cash. He was captured after a domestic violence call to Police in August.

04/25/2023 Two people are now facing charges after allegedly trying to scam a Loudonville man out of thousands of dollars. Colonie Police say the man received a phone call from someone claiming to be his grandson last month, saying he had been arrested and needed \$19,000 for bail. The man contacted Police and 25 year old Xavier Buchannan and 25 year old Melissa Charles, both from Florida, were arrested and charged with attempted grand larceny. Investigators are now using this case to remind the public to be vigilant and to report any suspicious calls to Police.

04/26/2023 Employees and the owner of a local midwife practice are facing federal charges for allegedly running a fraudulent covid-19 vaccine clinic. Licensed midwife Kelly McDermott, who owns Sage-Femme Midwifery in Albany, as well as employee Kathleen Breault are facing charges of conspiracy to defraud the U.S. According to the Grand Jury indictment they enrolled Sage-Femme as an authorized covid-19 vaccine administration site with the state, but they allegedly destroyed vials of the vaccine.

04/26/2023 Schenectady is set to receive money from the state to help prevent and investigate gun violence. The City will use \$150,000 from the state to help fund a new task force focused on investigating non-fatal shootings. The Police Department hopes to extend that task force after that money runs out in June.

04/26/2023 New York State Attorney General Letisha James is hosting a statewide gun buyback event this weekend in an effort to curb gun violence in New York. The gun buybacks will be held from 10am to 1pm. Several locations all over New York, including here in the Capital Region. Depending on what type of gun you bring in you'll receive anywhere between a \$25 to \$500 pre-paid gift card.

04/27/2023 An Altamont man will serve up to a decade or more in prison for hitting and killing a woman with his car last year. 34 year old Niskak Okure pleading guilty in February to aggravated vehicular homicide and leaving the scene of an accident. It happened on Clinton Avenue in Albany on September 14th of last year. He hit and killed 31 year old Tanisha Brathwaite. A memorial for her was established near the scene of the accident.

04/28/2023 Troy Police say they've made an arrest in the hit and run accident on Fifth Avenue, three weeks ago. Angelica Ponce of Troy has been arrested and charged with leaving the scene of a personal injury accident. Police say their investigation led them to her in Massachusetts. The pedestrian who was hit while walking on Fifth Avenue suffered significant injuries. Police say he's now recovering at home.

04/28/2023 Three current and former Rensselaer County officials are now facing criminal charges in connection to a voter fraud investigation dating back to 2021. The 3 defendants are Rich Crist, Jim Gordon and Leslie Wallace. All charged yesterday and taken into custody by the FBI with conspiracy to violate constitutional rights. That carries a maximum of ten years in prison. Gordon is also being charged with one count of witness tampering and Wallace faces an additional charge of making false statements.

04/28/2023 Police say a Troy man used a U-Haul truck and his mother's wheelchair to dump a woman's body outside of a vacant home in Albany. 45 year old Tevell Harris is charged with 2nd degree manslaughter and concealment of a human corpse, accused of dumping the body of Negera Walker outside that vacant home on Colonie Street.

05/03/2023 As more recreational cannabis shops open up across the state, cases of driving while impaired by marijuana are on the rise. Local agencies are training Drug Recognition officers, DRE's to tell if someone is under the influence of cannabis.

05/05/2023 A Latham man has entered a guilty plea in connection to a violent stabbing back in December that left a victim seriously injured. The Albany County District Attorney's Office says 41 year old Bledhar Hoxha admitted to first degree assault fully satisfying the original 8 count indictment against him, that included a charge of attempted murder. He faces 18 to 22 years behind bars when he is sentenced next month.

05/08/2023 Advocacy groups and elected officials are rallying at the capitol this morning to push for the passage of Kyra's Law, aimed to help end child homicides, in custody cases. If passed, the bill will prioritize a child's safety when making final custody and visitation decisions.

05/10/2023 A Colonie man was sentenced yesterday for several violent crimes in June of 2020. Prosecutors say he admitted to killing someone and trying to kill three others, all in the course of that one month. 20 year old Jarrell Howard has been ordered to serve 37 years to life in prison. This after pleading guilty to murder, 3 charges of attempted murder and felony weapon's possession. The Albany County D.A.'s Office says the murder happened in the city of Albany. The victim was identified as Nyjawaun Thomas. Howard was already behind bars before he was sentenced, serving 15 years for a different violent crime.

05/11/2023 Charges have been dropped against Columbia County Sheriff's Deputy Kelly Rosenstrock and her husband Alex, IRS agent Brian Hague and contractor Corey Gaylord. The group was previously accused of beating mechanic Harold Handy during a 4th of July party, but it was later revealed that Handy's attorney had attempted to strike a potentially unethical deal with one of the defendant's lawyers. Again, all charges have been dropped.

05/11/2023 A 13 year old student at Ballston Spa Middle School has been arrested, accused of threatening a school shooting via snapchat. The threat was received by several students on Tuesday, April 4th. The arrest was just made this past Monday. The student, whose name is not being released, is facing two misdemeanor charges.

05/16/2023 Former New York City Mayor Rudy Giuliani has been named in a sexual harassment lawsuit, accused of demanding sexual favors, going on alcohol fueled rants and not paying a woman for all of the work that she did for his law firm. She's now requesting 10 million dollars in damages. A representative for Giuliani denies these accusations.

05/17/2023 Saratoga Springs City leaders are working to potentially add new punishment for people carrying firearms while intoxicated. The proposal was the focus of discussion at last night's city council meeting. There was no vote on the proposed ordinance, only discussion over whether it would infringe on state law. The city ordinance would ban anyone from carrying a firearm in a public place, while under the influence of alcohol or drugs, regardless of whether you have a license to carry.

05/17/2023 A man from Washington County has been sentenced to 25 years in prison for attempting to kill his landlord. Police say Matthew Parant reacted violently to being evicted from his rental unit in White Creek last summer, firing his gun in the direction of his landlord. No injuries were reported, but Parant was found guilty of attempted murder, reckless endangerment and menacing.

05/18/2023 A verdict was reached in the Schoharie Limo trial. Prestige Limo operator Naumann Hussein found guilty on 20 counts of second degree manslaughter, that's one charge for each person killed in the crash. Testimony only lasted a week, the jury only deliberating for one day. Hussein is expected to be sentenced in two weeks, that's May 31st, but even then this legal process will not be over. Hussein's Attorney says he intends to appeal the verdict.

05/24/2023 Saratoga Springs Fire Chief Joseph Dolan is still facing 16 administrative charges of misconduct. They date from 2020 to 2022, mostly related to the Chief being paid as a city employee for work he did outside of the fire department. The allegations are administrative in nature not criminal, according to the city's public Safety Commissioner.

05/26/2023 Dennis Drue, the man responsible for a crash on the Northway nearly 11 years ago that claimed the lives of two Shen students, is now out of prison, released from custody on parole. Drue served 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ years for the drug and alcohol fueled collision that killed Deanna Rivers and Christopher Stewart. Drue was serving a 5 to 15 year sentence. His release was not voted on by the Board of Parole, but instead based on him earning what is known as limited credit time allowance.

05/30/2023 More details are to be made available later today from the Montgomery County Sheriff's Department concerning the arrest of a man accused of murdering his wife back in 2019. Michael Darling was at large and was considered armed and dangerous from Friday night through Saturday afternoon when the Sheriff reported his capture. Darling is charged with 2nd degree murder, criminal possession of a weapon and 2 counts of tampering with evidence.

05/31/2023 The Town of Colonie is suing the City of Albany and New York City after a group of migrants arrived at a Hotel on Wolf Road Saturday. Colonie Town Supervisor Peter Crummey claims that Albany Mayor Kathy Sheehan knew those asylum seekers were coming to Colonie before he says he was blindsided by the news on Friday night.

06/01/2023 Naumann Hussein will serve 5 to 15 years behind bars for his role in the 2018 Schoharie Limo crash. This comes after he was convicted of 20 counts of 2nd degree manslaughter, one for each of the people killed in that devastating crash. Hussein's Attorney says he's filed his notice of appeal and a bail application will be coming soon, pending that appeal. Family members of many of the victims took the stand yesterday letting the Judge and the court know the pain that they continue to endure. They say they'll make sure that they're at every parole hearing, advocating that Hussein serve the maximum sentence.

06/06/2023 Police have arrested a man in connection with a string of fires in Colonie last month, including one that spread to a church. The fire destroyed a storage shed at the Blessed Virgin Mary Church on Maxwell Road. It also damaged the siding and the roof of that Church. Colonie Police say the same suspect also set fire to seed pods along Albany Shaker, Maxwell and Everett Roads, just yesterday morning. Colonie Police also say the same suspect, 25 year old Mark Marcus of Albany started another brush fire on the traffic roundabout near Albany Shaker and Maxwell Road. He's been arraigned on a number of charges.

06/06/2023 The man allegedly connected with the deaths of his ex-wife and girlfriend is being charged with second degree murder. According to court documents, Timothy Taylor, who's charged in connection with the death of Theresa Gregg in Brooklyn and Tishaun Folkes-Taylor in Schenectady has a past pattern of alleged abuse with his ex-wife. Documents show that in 2021 Tishaun was granted an order of protection against Taylor after he was charged with choking her.

06/09/2023 The man found guilty of the 2018 murder of a 21 year old woman in Fulton County has now had his conviction overturned. The appeals court decided that Daniel Nellis, Sr. did not have a fair trial due to alleged misconduct from the prosecutor, who they say used prejudicial language in court. Nellis was serving a 40 year sentence for killing Michaela MacVilla. Her body was found in a field in Oppenheim after she vanished after leaving work at a Stewart's in St. Johnsville.

06/13/2023 A Grafton man is charged with arson and reckless endangerment for allegedly setting fire to a detached garage, next to his apartment building on State Route 2. The Rensselaer County Sheriff's Office says 61 year old Paul Coleman was arraigned on Friday and sent to the Rensselaer County Jail without bail. Stay away orders of protection are also in place for all occupants of that apartment building. Eight of them were inside, asleep at the time of the fire. The garage was completely destroyed, the apartment building was damaged and no one was injured.

06/14/2023 A man has been arrested in connection with a stabbing at a Stewart's in Cohoes on Monday night. Police responded to Stewart's on Columbia Street at around 11pm. Investigators say the suspect allegedly stabbed the victim with a screwdriver. The victim was taken to Albany Medical Center with non-life threatening injuries. Meanwhile, Police say the suspect Thomas Spears is also accused of assaulting a woman at the Columbia Gardens Apartment Complex. He's been arraigned on a number of charges and is being held in jail without bail.

06/15/2023 Northville Village Police arrested an area construction contractor in connection with the death of one of his employees. Police say that Jeremiah Weedmann reported back in May, that 38 year old James Warner died from falling off the Batchlerville Bridge, however, a subsequent investigation led officials to believe that Warner fell at a site where Weedman's contracting company had been working to replace a roof. Weedman is now being charged with tampering with physical evidence and failure to provide workman's compensation.

06/16/2023 The City of Watervliet is installing new security cameras to help fight crime. It was paid for by \$250,000 in state funding. Some are already operational in Veteran's Memorial Park. The cameras will be on streets and in other public parks within the city.

06/19/2023 Colonie Police have charged a former aide of both Governor Kathy Hochul and Former Governor Andrew Cuomo with aggravated DWI after she crashed into a telephone pole. The NY Post said Haley Vaccaro was double the legal limit when the crash happened. It also says this was her 2nd DWI arrest.

06/20/2023 A Ballston Spa man is now facing charges for allegedly damaging more than a dozen cars parked at SPAC. The 18 cars were at SPAC for the Dead & Company concert this past weekend. State Police say 24 year old Scott Bullard, allegedly damaged the cars by jumping and standing on them. Thankfully, no one was injured in these incidents. Bullard was charged with 18 counts of criminal mischief. He is due back in court next month.

06/21/2023 The Saratoga Springs Police Department applauds one of its canine officers for sniffing out drugs inside of a vehicle. Officers say canine Vas and his handler went to work on Monday in connection to an investigation that started during one of the Dead & Company concerts at SPAC over the weekend. Police say quantities of PCP, magic mushrooms, LSD, Xstacy and nitrous oxide tanks were now taken off the streets.

06/27/2023 Mavis Discount Tire has reached a settlement with families of four of the victims of the deadly 2018 Schoharie Limo crash. The terms of the settlements remained sealed for now under a court order. The families of the 20 victims of the crash sued Mavis back in 2018 claiming the company neglected the safety of the limo. Naumann Hussein, the Limo Company operator, was convicted of manslaughter last month in connection to the deadly crash.

06/27/2023 The Johnstown Funeral Home Director who mishandled human remains has been sentenced to 2 1/3 to 7 years in state prison. Brian Barnett, arrested in January of 2022 after Police found decomposing remains that families had paid him to cremate. He pleaded guilty back in March.

NEWS 04/04/2023 April is Child Abuse Prevention Month. State officials are working to build awareness to protect children from abuse. The State Office of Children and Family Services holding its annual Pinwheel Planting service in Rensselaer. Those pinwheels are the universal symbol of a childhood free of fear and trauma.

04/21/2023 New York State's annual No Empty Chair Campaign is underway. It lines up with High School Proms and graduations. It's all about warning kids about drunk and distracted driving. Posters now hang throughout schools across the state that highlight the consequences of drunk driving. The campaign runs from April 14 to April 28th.

04/21/2023 The next Red Cross Blood drive could be coming directly to you. The American Red Cross launched two new bloodmobile trucks throughout the capital region. Officials say the new bloodmobiles will help the community by going to different areas and bringing the blood donation service right to them to make it easier for people to donate and those donations are greatly needed.

04/27/2023 A new neighborhood center is opening up on Henry Johnson in Albany. Mayor Kathy Sheehan says specialists on hand will help address the concerns of the community in hopes that it will reduce crime. She says it will provide people with a more streamlined way of getting answers to certain issues, in turn, freeing up the Police to focus on fighting crime instead.

04/28/2023 An organization in Rensselaer County holding their annual take back the night walk. It's been raising awareness in the capital region for nearly 20 years now. Dozens joining the family and friends of Liza Ellen Warner as they started their walk, which wound its way around the neighborhood in East Greenbush there. The Police Department and the Clinton Heights Fire Department, leading the way.

05/01/2023 April was Autism Acceptance Month and the Autism Society Greater Hudson Region ended it strong yesterday with its Hero 5K run yesterday. Money raised goes toward providing critical services to families who needs them. One works to prevent drowning, which 91% of accidental deaths of children on the spectrum die from.

05/01/2023 The Chinese Cultural Center in Schenectady is preparing for its 50th anniversary celebration. Young performers are training hard to present a traditional retelling of the Chinese legend Journey to the West. The CCC hopes they can inspire capital region neighbors to learn and appreciate Asian culture. That celebration will be taking place at Proctor's Theater.

05/22/2023 This weekend Albany's Washington Park was all about the tulip sale. It all started Saturday with a tulip dig in the park and yesterday crowds were able to buy a bag of 30 bulbs at \$10.00 a bag. Proceeds from the tulip dig and the sale go towards efforts to restore and preserve Washington Park.

06/01/2023 A new community center is opening in the capital region for help for incoming migrants to adjust to their new life in New York. The Afghan American Community Center opened its doors this month to all migrants looking to adjust to their new surroundings. It's offering help finding jobs, getting kids enrolled in school and will help them get a driver's license.

06/12/2023 A new homeless shelter is set to open today in Saratoga Springs. The city plans to move people who are currently staying in the Woodlawn Avenue Parking Garage into the building which will support staff and resources. The City Council debated for months over the location of this shelter, receiving input from community members.

06/12/2023 The American Red Cross hosted the food and sneaker drive for veterans. The Red Cross was at the Stratton VA Medical Center running the event, collecting food and clothing for those who served. They say that their pantry has been running low in recent weeks, but won't stay that way for long, once donors start coming.

06/20/2023 The Albany Police Athletic League awards grants for local student finalists. Claudia Corradino, an 8th grade student at Hackett Middle School receiving a \$2,000 scholarship. Two runner up students receiving \$1,000 each and 5 other finalists received \$500.00 each. Organizers say the educational investments will help students set their future goals.

06/21/2023 The Watervliet Housing Authority holding their 15th annual laptops for graduating seniors ceremony. They donated fully equipped laptops to 15 students from low income housing and others in need. The Executive Director Matthew Ethier says he hopes students will use the computers to be successful and pay it forward in the future.

06/23/2023 Albany is about to open up its first ever south end based LGBTQ plus center. Trandra Lagrone, Executive Director of In Our Own Voices giving a preview of that new space. She said it's meant to provide a number of services for those in need, including employment, housing, transportation and food. It should open officially in mid July.

06/26/2023 The Albany Chapter of Huntington's Disease Society of America hosting a kick ball tournament in Ridgefield Park. The goal was to educate and raise awareness for Huntington's within the community. It's a disease that impacts 41,000 Americans and it is inherited and it causes nerve cells in the brain to break down and die. There is no cure.

06/28/2023 Local leaders in Albany announced over \$600,000 in grants for local business owners and non-profits. Funding for the Building Improvement Grants Program coming from the American Rescue Plan. 37 small businesses and non-profits through Albany are being awarded money.

06/30/2023 City leaders in Albany powered through those hazy, smoky conditions yesterday to host Bike to Work Day. This year's event was organized by Capital Streets, a local non-profit, advocating for people to explore alternatives to cars like walking, or biking to work.

NEWS 04/03/2023 The Capital region now officially has access to a local marijuana dispensary. Hundreds gathered in the rain to check out the upstate Canna-co dispensary and to find out more about affordable options this past Saturday. The shop is only one of four to receive this first initial retail license and plans to be open 7 days a week.

04/06/2023 A federal pandemic era law helping uninsured Americans get health care is coming to an end. Now states have a little over a year to determine who still qualifies to be in the Medicaid program. During the pandemic, states were prohibited from kicking people off the low income health insurance program, but those rules are now lifted. In response, Governor Kathy Hochul is proposing expanding Medicaid coverage in the state budget. This would cover nearly 8 million New Yorkers.

04/06/2023 Happening today Aldi's is opening a new location in Troy. The Grocery retailer's new location will be opening at 8:30 this morning. Normally, hours will be 9am to 8pm. The first 100 customers will receive an eco-bag filled with samples. Shoppers can also enter a sweepstakes today through Sunday to win a \$500.00 gift card.

04/07/2023 A new Medicaid pharmacy benefit program called N-Y-R-X is underway across the state. It allows pharmacies to be paid directly for the prescriptions of some 8 million New Yorkers enrolled in Medicaid. State Medicaid officials say it results in lower costs for the program as a whole.

04/10/2023 Another Cannabis dispensary is coming to the capital region. Stage One dispensary is about to open in the city of Rensselaer. The shop will be located on Broadway in the old Rensselaer County Bank. The owners say that they plan to start deliveries next month and open their storefront in June.

04/12/2023 A warning from Ellis Hospital to some patients, it says they could lose insurance coverage for services within the hospital and its network at the end of this month, due to stalled contract negotiations between the hospital and Empire Blue Cross. A notice to patients, posted on the Ellis website, explains to patients that Ellis believes current rates are not enough to cover cost of care, as operation costs have risen due to inflation and covid-19. Without a new contract, patients with Empire Blue Cross could continue to receive care through Ellis, but at much higher out-of-network rates.

04/25/2023 Advocates at the State Capitol pushing for the Medical Aid in Dying Act, which would allow doctors to prescribe terminally ill patients medicine that would help them die peacefully. Medical aid in dying is legal in ten states, but has yet to find success here in New York State. Advocates have been pushing for it for the past eight years.

04/27/2023 Some lawmakers are pushing for an increase in the minimum wage to be included in the state budget now. State Senator Jessica Ramos is sponsoring a bill which would bring the minimum wage to more than \$21.00 an hour by 2026. No word yet on the progress of the budget, but it's now almost 4 weeks late.

04/28/2023 Governor Kathy Hochul says a conceptual agreement has been reached for the state's 2024 budget. She says key initiatives are included, like changes to criminal justice reform and investments in housing and education. This agreement comes 27 days after the budget's initial due date. The budget, clocking in right now at 229 billion dollars and the Governor says it's balanced. Hochul noted it includes changes to judicial discretion and five and a half billion dollars allocated to the energy crisis.

05/02/2023 Around 5 million New Yorkers enrolled in Medicaid will be getting expanded dental coverage, thanks to a federal class action lawsuit against the Department of Health. The settlement is now forcing Medicaid to focus on treating and keeping teeth that can be saved, rather than extracting them.

05/03/2023 The State Budget has finally passed, here in Albany, a little over a month since it was due. The Legislature wrapped up shortly before 11:30 last night. Assembly member Pat Fahey says she's disappointed that housing didn't get more funding, but she is happy with the money going towards higher education. Republicans like Senator Jim Tedisco, however, say more needs to be done to keep New Yorkers here in this state.

05/04/2023 The Town of Guilderland Zoning Board approved a special use permit for construction of that Costco. The board approved it unanimously 4-0. Two board members recused themselves from voting. Part of the decision, there will also be a CDTA Bus stop added and a traffic circle there in the area of Western Avenue.

05/05/2023 Rising costs due to inflation have made things much harder on New Yorkers. Governor Kathy Hochul says the budget should help families with young children. The State's Child Tax Credit is now expanded to include families with kids under the age of three. New York's minimum wage will be increasing as well. Starting next year minimum wage earners will make \$16.00 an hour in New York City and \$15.00 an hour upstate, but some lawmakers say a lot more needs to be done to keep people in New York State.

05/05/2023 New York State's Thruway System needs a boost in funding if it wants to continue to be safe and operation, according to those running the Thruway. In Albany alone, about 14 million vehicles pass through on the Thruway each day. Funding for the Thruway comes from profits made from rest areas and tolls and those tolls are expected to increase in January of 2024. Some experts say while the recent toll hike will help fund the Thruway, others say it won't be enough.

05/09/2023 Protestors at the capitol were led away in handcuffs, including actress Susan Sarandon, protesting New York State's minimum wage. Advocates for the group, One Fair Wage, say the recently passed minimum wage increase doesn't include restaurant workers who receive tips.

05/11/2023 Advocates continue to push for the Medical Aid in Dying Act to help end suffering for those terminally ill adults with a prognosis of 6 months or less to live. 10 states and Washington D.C. currently have laws on the books for this. However, it is unlikely to pass here in New York. Recently Vermont amended its law to include out of state residents.

05/17/2023 More than 200,000 Jeep SUVs are being recalled globally due to a fire risk. The recall covers Jeep Cherokees with the model years 2014 through 2016. Jeep says water could get inside the lift gate control computer and catch fire. Owners are being warned to park their vehicles outside and away from structures and other cars. The automaker is now working to develop a fix for this issue and says it will be sending out letters to owners starting June 30th.

05/18/2023 A group of NYS Lawmakers want wine to be available in grocery stores, but wine and liquor stores are pushing back, saying it would devastate small businesses. Right now they're the only ones aside from wineries that can sell wine. With this new bill, grocery stores would get additional incentives to sell New York produced wines. Sponsors hope to pass it this legislative session, but they only have 11 days to do that.

05/23/2023 Turnout was low last night at a public hearing to submit comments on proposed toll hikes on the Thruway. Only five people showed up, this was at Glenmont Elementary School. It was the third of four hearings. Tolls would increase by 5 percent in 2024 and another five percent in 2027. For drivers not using EZ Pass, tolls would now be 75 percent higher. There will be one more hearing in early June and it will be virtual.

06/01/2023 Governor Kathy Hochul and SUNY Chancellor John King laid out new funding for the college system at this year's state of the university address. Governor Hochul highlighted the 1.4 billion dollars allocated for SUNY capital projects. Chancellor King says he wants to make hands-on internships a key part for students moving forward.

06/08/2023 Officials are urging New Yorkers to renew their Medicaid eligibility or shop around for coverage if they're no longer eligible. During covid, Congress prohibited states from dropping anyone from Medicaid regardless of eligibility. With the pandemic emergency over, some people are eligible for auto-renewal, but you need to make sure your contact information is updated so you're getting that notice.

06/09/2023 Another marijuana dispensary is launching a delivery service in the Capital Region. Stage One Dispensary is under construction in Rensselaer, but while they get their physical location ready, the owners are delivering cannabis products to customer's homes. They accept orders seven days a week and they plan to open their physical location in July.

06/13/2023 New state regulations that aim to crack down on unlicensed and untested cannabis dispensaries will soon take effect. The Office of Cannabis Management will adopt the new measures that include criminalizing the sale of unlicensed cannabis products and create a new tax fraud crime for vendors, who knowingly fail to collect or pay the required taxes.

06/13/2023 A change to the city code in Hudson could allow for more big name retail box stores to open up shop. The current city code states that stores and restaurants within the city limits cannot have more than 4 locations, which is meant to preserve Hudson's quote unique charm and character. The proposed amendment would remove that 4 location limitation.

06/14/2023 Some new data from the state cannabis regulators, showing that the cannabis industry is making progress despite a slower than expected roll out of retail marijuana sales. According to the Office of Cannabis Management, 13 dispensaries have opened statewide and more than 40 are actively working towards opening. Dispensaries have brought in more than 20 million dollars in sales, since the start of this year. Last month's sales also increased by 10 percent over the month before.

06/16/2023 In Vermont, people will soon be able to bet on their favorite sports teams online. Governor Phil Scott signing a bill to legalize mobile sports betting. First the state will hold a 30 day public hearing period, put out a request for proposals to sports booking operators who will then have the opportunity to submit prospective bids. Leaders hoping to have that system fully in place by the end of the year.

06/23/2023 Governor Kathy Hochul says New York State is cracking down on unlicensed cannabis sales in the state. The governor says unlicensed businesses selling cannabis are now subject to fines of \$10,000 per day. Fines can double if they continue to sell, once a notice of violation is delivered and placed on the businesses window.

06/28/2023 Amtrak has suspended the Adirondack service line between New York City and Montreal. This coming at the worst possible time, peak tourist season. Local officials are now pushing Amtrak to reverse their decision or at least offer routes into the Adirondacks this summer. In a statement Amtrak said its rail partner Canadian National has implemented reduced speed regulations in Canada, due to heat, impacting the Amtrak Adirondack route. They went on to say trains 68 & 69 would therefore begin and end in Albany until further notice.

06/28/2023 Town officials in Guilderland are deliberating over whether to give the developer of a proposed Costco a more than 2 million tax break. The Town's Industrial Development Agency is questioning the Pyramid Corporation about the project. The Pyramid Corporation also owns Crossgates. One of the questions is why Pyramid has more than quadrupled its initial tax break request from \$400,000 dollars to more than 2.1 million dollars. A decision on whether to grant Pyramid's request could happen as early as next month, but an exact date has not been given.

06/29/2023 Hundreds of thousands of pounds of cannabis are unable to be sold in New York State, with many blaming the state for a slow roll-out of legal recreational sales. Now State lawmakers and Native Americans are calling on the Governor to act fast and sign legislation to address the oversupply. The Shinnecock Nation says it's ready to purchase 10 million dollars worth of cannabis products from cultivators. Legislation to allow that has passed both the Assembly and the Senate. All it needs is the Governor's signature.

NEWS 04/07/2023 Residents voiced their concerns over the safety of Kenwood Avenue in Bethlehem, always considered a residential street. Kenwood Avenue is home to schools, Religious institutions, ball fields and the rail trail. It's causing concerns for pedestrian safety. To remedy it, the Town Supervisor wants to lower the speed limit starting with Kenwood, currently it's 30 miles per hour, they want to lower it to 25.

04/13/2023 Albany County officials unveiling new sustainability programs ahead of Earth Day later this month, including a new design for reusable tote bags, funded through fees that were collected for paper and plastic bags. The county is also partnering with the State DEC to collect data on greenhouse gas emissions from county buildings and local businesses.

04/14/2023 A local group known as Kenwood Reserve is organizing to support the preservation of the historic former home of the Doane Stuart School, which was also once a convent, also known as the Kenwood Academy. After a fire tore through there last month the group has established a petition. They're looking for 1,000 signatures to support their work and preserve that site.

04/18/2023 Many local communities are celebrating Earth Week by organizing clean up events.

Leaders from across the Mohawk Valley are partnering with environmental and economic development groups to host a cleanup event this Saturday as part of keep Mohawk Valley Beautiful, made up of volunteers from 6 counties.

04/24/2023 An earthquake hit upstate New York yesterday, strong enough for neighbors in the capital region to feel the shake. The 3.6 magnitude earthquake was a shock no one expected. Volcano Discovery confirmed the earthquake happened just after 2 yesterday afternoon. The epicenter was in Watertown, in Jefferson County. Those who live in Ballston Spa, Saratoga Springs, Latham and Troy say they felt it too and described the earthquake as light shaking. In total, Volcano Discovery reports just under 870 of its users reported feeling the earthquake.

05/04/2023 One of the proposals that made the final state budget, a ban on natural gas appliances in new construction. For those who already have a gas stove, gas furnace that they love, no need to worry. The state budget requires all electric heating and cooking appliances in new buildings, new construction. Those buildings shorter than 7 stories need to comply by the year 2026, for taller buildings they must comply by 2029.

05/08/2023 Community members in Malta say they are outraged over a proposal to build a new State Police Barracks in their neighborhood, in Luther Forest. The current State Police Barracks is located on Route 9. If it's moved to the Luther Forest area, Neighborhood community members say that trees will have to be cut down. They're not happy about that and have formed a committee to stop that barracks from being built.

05/12/2023 Poestenkill residents expressed concern after last night's town meeting to address PFAS contamination in their drinking water. Dozens filling the fire house as the LaBarge Engineering Group presented a $5 \frac{1}{2}$ million dollar solution to that contaminated water supply. Nearly 60 percent of that money would be covered by grants, but still leaves the town and residents on the hook for the rest.

05/31/2023 With summer just around the corner, Albany County is taking the initiative to help you prevent skin cancer. They're installing automatic sunscreen dispensers throughout area parks, countywide. The announcement coincides with Melanoma Awareness Month and helps the county's efforts to raise awareness about the risks and prevention of skin cancer.

06/01/2023 More local students will soon be riding electric buses to school. The Chatham School District received a grant from the EPA to buy five of them. School officials say taking advantage of that federal money will help reduce the cost of new buses for taxpayers and will also improve safety for students.

06/02/2023 New York State is seeing an elevated fire risk with the summer like temperatures that we've been seeing. According to the DEC, the entire state is at a high risk for brush fires heading into the weekend. Local fire departments are urging people to exercise caution when handling any flammable materials outside to prevent outdoor fires.

06/06/2023 An air quality advisory has been issued for the entire capital region and the Adirondacks. That means high levels of pollution are expected to exceed the threshold for health concerns. New Yorkers are urged to follow a couple of energy saving and pollution reducing steps, including using mass transit instead of driving, combining necessary car trips, turning off unnecessary lights, use fans, not air conditioners and limit use of household appliances like dishwashers.

06/07/2023 Environmental advocates are asking state leaders to stop a company by the name of Holtec from dumping alleged radioactive chemicals into the Hudson River, near New York City. The disposal part of the plan to decommission the Indian Point Power Plant just north of NYC. Rather than dumping it in the Hudson River, advocates hope it can be held in tanks to decompose naturally.

06/20/2023 A portion of the Thruway eastbound running through Schenectady County was closed for about an hour yesterday due to a chemical spill. Four boxes of a fungicide powder fell from a vehicle between Exits 26 and 25A. One of those boxes was hit by cars, prompting the need for cleanup. The road was back open around 3:30 yesterday afternoon. The State DEC says there are no impacts to storm drains or surface water.

06/20/2023 Senator Chuck Schumer of New York is launching his push to make New York State a hub for clean energy across the Northeast. The push comes as New York has received just over a billion dollars in federal funding. One of the recipients of that funding is Plug Power's Giga Factory. It employs over 400 people and works to create green hydrogen energy and products. Senator Schumer hopes to make that facility the center of a proposed hub.

06/26/2023 Residents of the Colonial Village Mobile Home Park in Cobleskill have been under a boil water advisory for nearly a year now after e-coli was found in their water supply last July. The Cobleskill Town Clerk saying that the park has the ability to access clean town water, but that the Park's Management has not yet taken the steps to make that happen.

NEWS 04/05/2023 Happening today, a rally for Health Care workers calling on Governor Kathy Hochul to expand worker benefits in the state budget. Nurses, Doctors and other staff plan to rally during their lunch break outside their individual institutions, banging on pots and pans to raise the alarm of New York's Health Care crisis, also the need to close the Medicaid coverage gap in the state's final budget.

04/06/2023 The leader of the St. Clare's Hospital workers fighting for their pensions is calling for the Pope to step in and help. Mary Hartshorne wrote an open letter to Pope Francis saying the end of the pension funds in 2018 was the pinnacle of lies and deception from the St. Clare's Board and the Albany Roman Catholic Diocese. She says that the 1,100 pensioners have nowhere else to turn now, especially in light of the Diocese declaring bankruptcy.

04/12/2023 The New York State Department of Labor is sharing new details on updated sexual harassment prevention training. The statewide training has to be updated every five years and the Department of Labor focused specifically on how the pandemic has changed how and where people work.

04/19/2023 School Districts across New York continue to grapple with the shortage of bus drivers and in the Shen District they have put out a general notice to parents about the problem. School transportation officials have combined bus routes for Shen as a result of the shortage there.

04/26/2023 A new report from U-Albany showing that New York's health care industry is starting to recover from the pandemic. The report finding jobs and health care grew between the years of 2020 and 2021, although they have not returned to those pre-pandemic levels. The most difficult positions to fill have been registered nurses and home health care aides. However, more people are graduating from nurse and social work programs, something leaders say is good news.

04/28/2023 Some state lawmakers are pushing for legislation they say would empower nail salon workers. An estimated 6,000 salons across the state employ both documented and undocumented immigrants. This bill would create a council of nail salon workers and state officials to discuss wages and workplace safety.

06/13/2023 Albany leaders are pushing for the federal government to reduce the work authorization period for asylum seekers. Asylees, here in the capital region, currently have to wait at least 180 days before they can receive authorization to work in the United States, but Albany Mayor Kathy Sheehan is pushing for that wait period to reduced to 30 days.

Debbie Ross Retires After 41 Years as Resident House Director at Ronald McDonald House Charities® of the Capital Region

ALBANY, N.Y. – After more than 41 years at the helm of the Albany Ronald McDonald House, resident director Debbie Ross has officially retired. Though she will soon move out of the Victorian home on S. Lake Avenue where she has worked and lived since 1981, Ross will forever be the foundation and the heart of "The House That Love Built."

"From its very origins, Debbie Ross has been the healing heart and soul of the Ronald McDonald House," says Dr. Bill Cromie, founding board member. "She has brought comfort and inspiration to tens of thousands of families living through the worst moments in their life. After 41 years of wonderful service, she deserves a joyful retirement full of blessings, as she has been a blessing to so many others."

Debbie Ross was hired as a young social worker to open the doors of a new Ronald McDonald House in Albany, NY — originally an eight-bedroom home for families with seriously ill children receiving care at nearby Albany Medical Center. Seven years later, she oversaw the House's first expansion, doubling the organization's capacity to welcome families in need. In 2015, Ross was a driving force behind the House's next expansion, bringing it to its current 25-bedroom capacity and curating every detail to maintain a warm, homelike, and loving environment for each family that walks through the doors. Over the course of her distinguished career, Ross has welcomed more than 23,000 families to "The House That Love Built" and has had a profound impact on more lives than anyone can count.

As Ross managed day-to-day operations at the Ronald McDonald House and continually cultivated the compassion of the community to help the House grow, she also played a critical role in developing new programs at Ronald McDonald House Charities of the Capital Region (RMHC-CR). Today, in addition to the House, the organization operates the Ronald McDonald Family Room and Comfort Cart inside the Bernard & Millie Duker Children's Hospital at Albany Med, offers support to NICU families through the HOPE (Helping Our Preemies Excel) program, and runs the first-of-its-kind Ronald McDonald Family Retreat at Krantz Cottage in Lake George. For many years, Ross dreamed of developing a program that would give families with very sick children a chance to spend quality time together and make memories far away from the hospital. Through her dedicated efforts, that dream became a reality with the opening of the Ronald McDonald Family Retreat in July of 2021.

"It has been such a privilege to wake up every morning and walk down the stairs of the Ronald McDonald House as resident house director," says Ross. "I've found great purpose in my life by helping families with sick children in absolutely any way possible. Even in retirement, that will always be my passion. For more than 41 years, I have been a witness to so much love poured out from our community. That love is what built this house, what sustains this house, and what I hope will always be at the very core of RMHC of the Capital Region."

Ross retires as the longest-serving resident house director in the global RMHC network, which spans 49 countries and regions and more than 380 Ronald McDonald House programs around the world. She has been recognized with

numerous awards and accolades over the last four decades, including the Distinguished Service Award presented at RMHC-CR's 40 Years of Love anniversary celebration in 2022. Most importantly, she has dedicated not just her career but her entire life to caring for sick and injured children and their families with love and compassion. She leaves a legacy that will continue to shape how RMHC-CR meets the needs of families for years to come.





Retired Broadview Executive to receive inaugural Lifestyle Change Award

Barb Hess will be recognized for her work promoting health and wellness as a top volunteer with the American Heart Association

ALBANY, N.Y. – May 17, 2023 — Retired Broadview Federal Credit Union executive Barb Hess has been a champion of the American Heart Association for years. She has chaired the Go Red for Women Luncheon and Capital Region Heart Walk and served on and chaired the association's board of directors. More important, Hess brought the association's mission of healthy living to the hundreds of people who worked at Broadview Federal Credit Union, formerly known as SEFCU, and the entire Capital Region community.

The American Heart Association will honor Barb Hess, recently retired chief administrative officer at Broadview, with its inaugural Lifestyle Change Award at the Capital Region Heart Walk at the W. Averell Harriman State Office Building Campus on June 4.

"We created this award so we can acknowledge the changes that people make to improve their health," said Kaweeda Adams, chair of the Board of Directors of the American Heart Association in the Capital Region. "When thinking about a worthy recipient for the first year, we immediately thought of all the ways Barb has worked with the American Heart Association. By living our mission, and championing our message of health and wellness at her workplace and in our community, she has made it possible for many people to know what steps they can take to improve their health. Barb always walked the walk, and made it easy for others to take that walk, too."

"This award feels so meaningful, and it brought a tear to my eye," Hess said. "I'm really humbled and honored to be the first person selected for this award."

Hess' work with the American Heart Association began in 2009, when she chaired the Go Red for Women Luncheon. She then joined the board of directors, and chaired the Capital Region Heart Walk in 2014. Throughout that time, she also served on committees for the Go Red movement and the Heart Walk.

"In addition to supporting us, Barb brought the American Heart Association to Broadview," Adams said. "Under her leadership, the credit union's buildings always illuminated red on Wear Red Day, during American Heart Month, and the organization hosted many Glow Red ceremonies. Staff at Broadview always support our events, and I suspect they are following Barb's strong lead. From hosting 'Healthy Cupcake Wars,' and basketball games on the company court to selling paper hearts in local branches, like Barb, Broadview always brings its A-game to support the Heart Association."

Hess also brought the BetterU to then-SEFCU, where staff could participate in a 12-week heart-health improvement program.

"When I first started with the Heart Association, I didn't realize the serious risk that heart disease poses to all of us - women, men, and children," Hess said. "Knowing that while some forms of cardiovascular disease are not preventable, many are. There are opportunities for us to avoid, minimize, or mitigate very dangerous heart-related issues. Medical professionals are the real heroes, but those of us who are not can become heroes by developing awareness about heart disease, talking about it, and supporting the cause any way we can."

Hess said that as the credit union family of companies became more connected with the American Heart Association, a culture of employee well-being and wellness grew at the organization. And, she said, it was often fun.

"When I started with the Go Red for Women Luncheon, we were about 70% female, so it was a game-changer to address the biggest threat to women's health, heart disease," she said. "The Heart Walk is a grassroots movement, and so many people in our organization have contributed in one way or another. People have walked, donated, and participated in fundraising events at our locations. We've had a lot of laughs and fun, to support camaraderie and teamwork even as we do this important work. The two don't have to be mutually exclusive."

Bringing the knowledge of health and wellbeing to her workplace increased Hess' enjoyment of her work.

"I was at Broadview - then SEFCU - for 25 years," she said. "I felt like I had the best job on the planet all that time. It's a very supportive organization, and especially supportive of my efforts and the American Heart Association. That started at the top, with our CEO Michael Castellana."

When she and coworkers were at Heart Association events, Hess always found touching moments, many of which began with her own coworkers.

"We've lost active employees to heart disease, and we have employees whose children are born with heart defects," Hess said. "Stroke survivors within our organization have shared their stories with us and throughout the community. When you go to the Heart Walk, you realize that this is a disease that touches everyone. We hear the stories of children born with congenital heart defects, who had surgeries right after they were born. We see the amazing work the cardiologists do in our community and you see the families and friends who rally around the survivors, and the people there in memory of someone, or to support someone. You realize that heart disease and stroke touches everyone in some way."

Hess also knows firsthand how stroke can affect someone. Her father had a debilitating stroke when he was 69.

"He lived with very limited speech and mobility until his early 80s," Hess said. "The difficult thing about that was what we didn't know – we didn't know the warning signs that would have told us he was having a stroke. That's a deeply troubling thought, and if we'd known the acronym FAST – Face Drooping, Arm Weakness, Slurred Speech, Time to Call 911 – there might have been a different outcome."

Recently retired, Hess and her husband Tom plan a lot of travel, including visiting their adult daughter, Rachel, and new grandchild. The Niskayuna resident is looking forward to more skiing and gardening – and re-engaging with activities of daily life.

"I used to like to grocery shop, and cook," she said. "As days got busier, that became a chore, not a joy. Now that I have time again, I'm enjoying cooking and even grocery shopping."

She remains active in the community, and will continue volunteering.

"Spreading the word, educating others – hopefully, that can prevent the kind of suffering that otherwise, people might be facing," she said. "Knowledge is power."

In future years, the Lifestyle Change Award will go to someone who makes changes that improve their health. Hess had simple advice for them.

"Small changes can make a big difference," she said. "You don't have to change everything all at once. Changes are cumulative and contagious. When you start to make them, there's a snowball effect, and the success of those changes will lead to more. It's a marathon, not a sprint."

Registration for the 5K run begins at 7 a.m., and the run itself starts at 8 a.m. Walk activities begin at 9 a.m. The Walk program begins at 10:15 a.m. and the 1- or 3-mile walk steps off at 10:45 a.m. 13-year-old Emma Duncan will share her story of living with congenital heart defects. Heather Wells will share her story of having a stroke at 47 years old. Barb Hess, retired chief administrative officer at Broadview Federal Credit Union, will receive the first Lifestyle Change Award. Funds raised help the American Heart Association fight the No. 1 and No. 5 killers of all Americans, heart disease and stroke. 


