The Prince William County Department of Economic Development will likely change its address this fall. The Prince William Board of Supervisors approved the department's request to break its current lease at Linden Lakes in the Manassas area in order to move into a new space at Heritage Village Plaza on Heathcote Boulevard in Gainesville. According to county documents, the move was necessary because of a lack of space at the current facility. The new facility, which the department plans to occupy by October, will be 7,000 square feet, compared with 5,280 at the current one.

The owners of the house at 9300 Prescott Ave. in Manassas have all but run out of time. The Manassas City Council is set to begin the demolition process next week, with a scheduled vote to authorize an asbestos inspection as the first step the city must take before tearing down the house. The saga of the so-called Prescott House and what to do with it began in 1996 when the Manassas City Council sent owner Dorothy Feagan a "demolition by neglect" violation notice, according to a timeline compiled by city staff. Over the intervening years, several city councils sent a number of violation notices, filed court complaints, placed liens and declared the house unsafe. The house is over 100 years old and is also owned by Bank of America. However, they did not respond to requests either.
