"It's just a beautiful way to have a memory and also to have great communication with someone that they don't even know." Garibay says girls are used to a lot of disappointment, especially through negative interactions on social media. But the AHG Pen Pal program gives them a chance to foster meaningful and lasting relationships. "It is a wonderful way for likeminded girls to really foster relationship and that's doing the old-fashioned handwritten letters that are sent to each other," says Garibay. She says writing letters to each other is "a beautiful way to have a memory and also to have great communication with someone that they don't even know." Garibay believes there's something special about writing a letter to someone you care about. She says there's "sort of a blessing there, there's a focus that takes time and means 'you are worth it, you are special.'"

Amazing Recovery</p> <p>Jeff Conaway signed up with Team ZOE to take part in the super-challenging Race Across America. The ZOE goal was to raise awareness of human trafficking, especially involving children. Brad shared about ZOE's mission and also about the annual Race Across America. That is an ultra-endurance competitive cycling race that starts in Oceanside, California, with the finish line at Annapolis, Maryland, 3,100 grueling miles later. The 7-day race got underway in June of this year. Jeff and the team were 800 or 900 miles into the race when the unimaginable happened halfway through Colorado! Jeff and his bicycle crashed at 54-miles-per hour on a descent in a remote area of the Rocky Mountains near Trinidad, Colorado. Jeff became the rider who 'went down.' As his recovery continues, "It's been a blessing. I feel great." And Jeff notes that his wife, Chloe, a nurse, was initially concerned that he would never be walking again and was fully prepared to "take care of me for the rest of her life." "From that, and where I am today is nothing short of a miracle." Now, just weeks after the crash, Jeff has gotten the green light from his medical team to go back to work. He's still "nursing" his collarbone, but his wounds have healed. He's going on daily hikes with his family and even riding a stationary bike. "Back to my normal way of life and couldn't be happier!" He explains that ZOE takes part in the coast-to-coast race every-other-year, "So as long as the team wants me back, I have every intention of being on that team" in 2025.</p>

Woody came up with the idea of donating an RV to someone in need. Woody started a non-profit called Emergency RV and in the past five years, they've been able to donate more than 130 recreational vehicles to people in need. "We've delivered those now in fires in the Pacific Northwest, we helped with the big tornadoes that happened in Kentucky a couple Christmases ago, a Native America tribe who lost about 60 homes in southern Louisiana after Hurricane Ida so we've kind of expanded and have been all over the country now," Woody says. Woody jumped into action after the fires in Hawaii. "The last five that we've sent, we put on a ship to Maui to some of the 18 firefighters who lost their homes and there's just no shelter and it's a really tight market, so we were able to get free shipping." How has providing shelter affected Woody? "It's changed me fundamentally. Things that used to bother me...you know getting a flat tire on my car or just things that happen in life...it doesn't bother me anymore. I mean, my problems are really not problems."</p>

After the pandemic, seeing that telemedicine was effective, the International Mission Board started exploring telemedicine to serve people in hard-to-reach world locations, according to Dr. Tom Hicks, the director of Global Health Strategies. A Christian medical volunteer in the States "can get a blood pressure" readout from a patient thousands of miles away. "Just put the blood pressure cuff on – and then the doctor in the U.S. is sitting at their computer and can read that. To me, what's even more impressive is the stethoscope. A nurse or a trained person overseas can lay the stethoscope on the chest, and the doctor in the U.S. can listen to the heart, diagnose murmurs," and even record an EKG. How are areas to be served chosen? "We're looking at places that have a need, that there might be an infrastructure problem so there's not a healthcare system. Or the healthcare system has been overwhelmed by a massive refugee movement or something like that." "My concern is how can we be a part of the Lord's establishing and expanding his kingdom globally? I look at the example of Jesus and I see that most of the time when Jesus is telling people about himself, pointing them to God, he is also meeting their physical needs. The telemedicine kits are being provided by way of donations, and more kits are urgently needed.</p>

It's a rare birth defect known as tetra-amelia syndrome. Nick tells us the Australian doctors were extremely apologetic that they had not detected the syndrome and offered his mother the option of abortion. For a growing boy, not having limbs and knowing what the doctors had said, gave little Nick a rough path. "Looking at my brother and sister born after me – and them having arms and legs – kind of felt a little unfair and weird. And with no answers, it's easy to start believing the lies, the little voices that say, 'you're not good enough, you're a mistake, there is no greater purpose for your life,' and so as I went to school, I was facing bullying. I went through depression at age 8 until age 12, and I felt like there was no hope for my life." During that period, Nick attempted to take his own life by drowning. Fortunately, he failed. Fast forward to today. "Here I am now at age 40, with a beautiful wife, four beautiful children, and this incredible ministry Life Without Limbs – being the hands and feet of God (even without hands & feet), standing in front of the gates of hell and redirecting traffic. I now try to encourage everyone that no matter what pain we go through, that God can do beautiful things with our broken pieces...if we give those broken pieces into his hands."</p>

Often, he will meet and greet, take the time to draw portraits, and talk about Jesus while he's sketching. At some sittings, Joe will do literally dozens of portraits, sometimes dedicating two hours to be sure no one is left out. "I just sit in the corner and draw people." Besides his in-person church work, Joe has been doing cartoons and editorial cartoons for years. It's very likely you've seen some of his professional work on sites like Baptist Press. And Joe is aware that his cartoon work gets 'borrowed' quite a bit by other media sources and just regular folks on social media. And that doesn't bother him one bit. As a matter of fact, that fits into his guidance from God, who told him, "I'm to encourage people with these." If people re-post his cartoons, all the better. Most people would consider the age 82 some years past what retirement age would be, so why does Joe keep working? "Because that's what God called me to be." As a pastor with more than 40 years' experience, a masters and a doctorate, Joe often gets private email questions from pastors about situations they're up against and Joe offers his wisdom. We asked Joe what he might say to someone who came across his artwork but does not have a relationship with Jesus. "Friend, if you don't know the Lord Jesus as your Lord and Savior, you are living beneath your privilege. There's just so much more out there for you. And it's amazing he has made himself available to you. He says, 'I stand at your door and knock' and it's up to you if you open the door."</p>
Healthcare	Closer Look	11/5/23	7:00pm	15min	<p>Tackle Childhood Obesity at Home, Church and School</p> <p>Millions of American kids suffer words like chubby or chunky – or fat – to describe their young bodies. The COVID-19 lockdowns only worsened already alarming levels of childhood obesity, as the CDC found the BMI (body mass index) in children ages 2-19 years old increase nearly doubled during the pandemic. Excess weight weakens growing muscles and joints and can lead to juvenile diabetes or even trigger life-threatening asthma</p> <p>"Prevention is what we really want, right?" says Geri Henchy, Director of Nutrition Policy at the Food Research and Action Center (FRAC). "We want kids to be in environments that are not obesogenic; where they're gonna get healthy meals, where there isn't a lot of junk food, where they have activities -- that's really gonna make a difference for kids."</p>

Family Issues	Closer Look	11/5/23	7:15pm	15min	<p>Teens Aged Out of Foster Care Get Help From ‘Dream Makers’</p> <p>Without family and often lacking life skills, former foster kids become homeless adults by the thousands, turning to drugs and crime on the streets just to survive. “Every statistic you hear that is going bad in the United States, a lot of them link back to the foster care system and those kids just not being taken care of.” Dream Makers steps in to link aged-out foster kids with practical assistance by connecting them with the generosity of strangers. “It totally up to the community to fulfill the dream.” The young adult with a need fills out an application to ask for things that teens with families could easily get from a mom or dad: like money for work clothes, or a laptop for school, or maybe a used car – but Melton says the most common dream request from these youth by far is – food.</p>

Heroes on the Water takes soldiers up a creek with paddles or pedals. “Kayak fishing really helps veterans who are struggling with PTSD,” notes Zack Clift. H.O.W. surveys show 88% of participants say the free expedition gave them confidence to develop new relationships and a whopping 98% say it helped them relax.</p>

Natural Disaster – War	Closer Look	11/19/23	7:00pm	16min and 14min	<p>Convoy Of Hope Brings Relief to Maui, Middle East Disasters happen – but Convoy of Hope meets trouble quickly with tangible comfort and care. In August, they rushed to aid 7,000 people displaced in West Maui. “We had team members on the ground there within a couple of days of that horrific wildfire,” confirms Ethan Forhetz, VP of Public Engagement for the Christ-centered relief ministry. Famous for its band of 18-wheelers, the vast ocean between the mainland U.S. and Hawaii was no barrier. “We shipped many things over by boat, we also shipped some things over by airplane,” he explains, thanks to Convoy’s established international partnerships. Convoy provided basics like food, water and hygiene kits but also two-way radios and solar-powered battery boxes to charge fans and cellphones. The ministry is also working to fund a community of tiny houses for Lahaina residents who lost everything in the 5th deadliest wildfire in the country. “The tiny houses are free to them, there’s no charge for people to live in those houses, so we found that’s a good way to give people a sense of normalcy again.” Meanwhile, recovery remains slow for other areas of the world where Convoy continues to partner with local churches to meet basic needs. Tornadoes and hurricanes struck Mississippi and Florida in 2023, and work continues in Turkey and Syria after twin earthquakes left millions of homes in rubble. Years of drought in the Horn of Africa causes millions of people to suffer hunger. War in Ukraine rages on, and Convoy continues to provide basic food and water to refugees. More recently, the Hamas attack on Israel triggered an immediate response from Convoy, about which Ethan says they ‘can’t say much,’ in order to protect their local partners; but a 40-thousand pounds of food was quickly delivered to the area by cargo plane.</p>

Many are searching - looking for someone that cares 6. Many are empty - looking to fill a void with a relationship or substance 7. Many want a role model or mentor - An example to pour into their lives 8. Many would turn to Jesus if we showed them Jesus - He is the Answer, He fills the Void, He is the Friend 9. Many need a church that cares - Camp, conferences and retreats are great but the church needs to disciple these young people. Train them and love them. 10. Many want the truth - stop trying to be cool and just preach the Word to them. They are hungry for truth. Let's determine to reach the next generation with the gospel and love them to Jesus.

"We were all locked away," and the idea was to offer a 'dad video' to encourage or entertain people coping with the pandemic. "I put up my 'How to Tie a Tie' video on April 2 of 2020 and about a month-and-a-half later, my channel went viral! That was scary for me, but I'm grateful that I went viral for something wholesome." These days, Rob is on multiple social media channels, including Instagram, Facebook, and YouTube as Dad, How Do I? And "On TikTok, I'm The Real Dad, How Do I? because there were people who were imitating me." The videos show Rob demonstrating how to put air in your tires, unclogging a toilet, applying deodorant & cologne, how to shave, explaining an Allen Wrench, or making popcorn. Things a dad would share with a child. Why is Rob committing so much time and effort to these videos? "I think that there's definitely a need for people to understand how cool it is to be a dad. I feel like that's a mission that God has given me to try to encourage dads to hang in there, and you're needed and you're valued." It bothers him when he sees TV shows offering "stereotypes, Homer Simpson and Al Bundy...the bumbling dufus of a dad. And you know, I've met a lot of cool dads and a lot of very good dads. We need to encourage that behavior." Due to the popularity of his channel, Rob authored a book "Dad, How Do I?" which shares about important character traits for a good life, his own faith in Christ, and 58 useful 'how-tos.'</p>

Larry explains that in his mind “It’s like a theater. The screens are going all the time.
