Positively Tampa Bay: The interview segment airs weekdays on ABC Action News 9am – 10am show. The segment, called “Positively Tampa Bay”, airs Tuesdays thru Fridays and showcases community service projects, charity groups/non-profits and their services, and the efforts of local residents to make a positive impact in our community. The interview segments are typically 3 ½ minutes in length, hosted & produced by WFTS TV Director of Community Affairs Lissette Campos. During the fourth quarter of 2015, construction of the new interview set forced a temporary hiatus of the segment in October. From November to December, 23 PTB segments were produced.

During this 4th quarter, PTB was a centerpiece of this year’s expanded Angel Tree toy drive. In 2015, we partnered with 7 local units of the Salvation Army serving 5 counties – collecting toys for an estimated 17-thousand needy children. Also new to the campaign this year, our efforts to help Salvation Army units recruit more local businesses and groups to become “Angel Tree” sponsors.

Highlights are below. Because PTB’s focus was almost exclusively on Angel Tree program, the primary issues covered in the 4th quarter were limited to hunger/poverty, programs to assist low-income families, family support & social services, community spirit, volunteerism and community leadership by local businesses.

PTB interviews with Salvation Army Tampa Bay unit on December 1 & 15 - This area command, led by Majors Chip and Leisa Hall, served 5,000 children this holiday season. All families must register for the program in advance to determine eligibility. The toy drive has traditionally served the needs of un-employed and families living below the poverty line, but Salvation Army volunteers have seen an increase in the number of “working poor” families who need help during the holidays – with basic items like food, underwear and bed sheets. New Angel Tree sponsors in their area of service included BEALLS department stores in Carrollwood, Brandon, Riverview and Plant City and Hudson’s Furniture stores and The Winghouse locations in Hillsborough. Employees at Bisk Education in Tampa adopted 200 angels in 2015!
Issues Addressed: 14, 15, 20, 26, 36 & 40

PTB interview with the Salvation Army of Manatee unit on December 2nd – This area command, led by Majors Dwayne and Marion Durham, served 3,000 children from 736 families. That’s nearly double the 1,586 children the unit served in 2014. New Angel Tree sponsors in their area of service include Painting with a Twist franchise in Bradenton, which served as a drop off site for new & unwrapped toys. In all, the store collected more than 60 dolls for the Salvation Army unit there. Hudson’s Furniture store in Bradenton and Sarasota served as drop off sites for new & unwrapped toys for Angel Tree program. Issues Addressed: 14, 15, 20, 26, 36 & 40

PTB interview with the Salvation Army of Lakeland & West Polk County on Dec. 3 & 18 – This area command, led by Major Connie Morris, served 3,900 children this holiday season. The Winghouse was a new Angel Tree sponsor this year – employees at that Lakeland restaurant location adopted 100 angels. The Hudson's Furniture store on South Florida Avenue in Lakeland and the 2 BEALLS department stores in Lakeland served as a toy drop off site for this unit. Employees at the Winghouse restaurant in Lakeland adopted 75 angels. Issues Addressed: 14, 15, 20, 26, 36 & 40

PTB interview with the Salvation Army of Winter Haven and East Polk County on Dec. 4 – This area command, led by Lt. Katie Bernabe, served 1,195 children this holiday season. That's nearly 200 more "angels" than last year. Winter Haven Christian School was new to the Angel Tree program this year, adopting 220 angels. Carlton Arms apartments, Posner Park in Davenport and the Denny's restaurant in Davenport also adopted angels this year. Issues Addressed: 14, 15, 20, 26, 36 & 40

PTB interview with Salvation Army of Pasco on Dec. 8th – This area command, led by Major Ken Fagan, served 500 children in the West Pasco area this holiday season. (east Pasco is served by another non profit – who started its Christmas toy drive years prior to the Salvation Army of Pasco arriving in the area) Local businesses adopting angels this year included Suncoast Credit Union, Gulf View Preschool, Ingrams Karate Center, Frank Clinic, Baycare Health Systems, the Winghouse locations in Wesley Chapel and New Port Richey and Culver's restaurants. Issues Addressed: 14, 15, 20, 26, 36 & 40

PTB interview with Salvation Army of Clearwater & Upper Pinellas on Dec. 9 & 17 – This area command, led by Major Mike Harris, served 3,400 children this holiday season. Skycrest School and community church were new to the program this year and adopted 175 angels. Hudson's Furniture Store in Clearwater served as drop off locations for new & unwrapped toys for the Angel Tree program. Issues Addressed: 14, 15, 20, 26, 36 & 40

PTB interview with Salvation Army of St. Petersburg & Southern Pinellas on Dec 10 & 16 – This area command, led by Major Paul Fuller, served 1,800 children this holiday season. That's 300 "angels" more than last year. New angel tree sponsors this year included Sonny's BBQ in Largo, where employees adopted 50 angels. Heritage Insurance Company doubled its number of angels to 200 this year, as did Catalina Marketing Company with 200 angels! Hudson's Furniture Store in Pinellas Park served as drop off locations for new & unwrapped toys for the Angel Tree program. Issues Addressed: 14, 15, 20, 26, 36 & 40

PTB interview with maintenance employees from Tampa International Airport on Dec. 14th – Approximately 10 employees from two divisions of Delta Airline's maintenance have been adopting "angels" from the Salvation Army Angel Tree program for approximately 8 years. Combined, they adopted 12 angels. The employees come during their lunch break to pick up the angels they will be shopping for. This is originated by the team of employees who are dads and grandfathers and want to give back to the community. Issues Addressed: 26, 36 & 40

PTB interview with employees from the Hillsborough County Adult Education Program on December 15th – Mark Kenney, their supervisor, has been the TV station's "Secret Santa" for the last 5 years. He will adopt however many angels are left on the Angel Tree in our lobby 24 – 48 hours before the deadline. Kenney, a former middle school teacher, says he can't stand the idea of these children going without on Christmas morning – and most of the angels left each year are in the teenage range he taught for so many years. Kenney finally allowed us to reveal his identity upon his retirement. His employees – approx. 15 – pledged to continue adopting angels each year to honor their former boss! As part of this segment, the Scripps Howard Foundation presented \$1,000 community grant to the Salvation Army of Tampa Bay – Hillsborough. The foundation is part of the philanthropic arm of our corporate office. Issues Addressed: 26, 36 & 40

SUMMARY: After more than a decade of development, a device created by USF Associate Professor of Engineering Daniel Yeh and his team of graduate students, will soon take the next step toward solving several serious issues facing countries around the world.

In their quest to help communities with a lack of sufficient sanitation, clean water, food and reliable energy, the team will ship their first NEWgenerator unit to India for field-testing later this month.

The NEWgenerator converts waste into Nutrient fertilizers, renewable Energy, and clean Water, providing a modular and self-sustaining machine that operates completely off-grid (no water, power or sewer system required).

SUMMARY: During World War Two, soldiers learned to fear treatment as much as enemy bullets. Unsanitary conditions and equipment in field hospitals made open

wounds a breeding ground for bacteria that killed thousands, particularly the fast-acting and barely detectable gram-negative strains that caused toxic shock syndrome, meningitis, and typhoid.

Today, vast improvements in medical hygiene have greatly reduced the odds of patients being poisoned on the treatment table. And our safety is protected by an unlikely source -- the bright blue blood of the horseshoe crab.

The helmet-shaped creature has developed a unique defense to compensate for its vulnerability to infection in shallow waters. When faced with toxins produced by bacteria, amebocyte cells in the blood -- colored blue by their copper-based molecules -- identify and congeal around the invading matter, trapping the threat inside a gel-like seal that prevents it from spreading.

But mom wanted to wait as long as possible to give baby a chance to survive. So she put off cancer treatment until 33 weeks of pregnancy and delivered the baby. It was born premature. Mom and baby just got home from the hospital. Baby is still considered high risk for SIDS so he has to be connected to a heart monitor and sleep apnea machine. Mom is now set to begin cancer treatments.
