She too drank much like her father did, and now they lean on each other for support to stay clean.</p> <p>Alana found herself in horrific debt when finishing college, not because she had borrowed money for intuition, but because her parents used her name to take out lines of credit that had gone into collection. She lived in constant fear due to the debt situation and alcohol would quell her nerves. She finally went to AA, where she says spent too much time blaming others for her happiness.</p> <p>Bob took his last drink in May of 1976. He dropped out of high school at 17 & learned to play the guitar & had unlimited access to alcohol. He finally decided to seek help.</p> <p>Dorothy has been sober for 23 years. Debtors Anonymous/ Alcohol Abuse	Steppin' Out	<p>Dan was never a huge spender but would spend money that he didn't have. He was an "under-earner" – he never brought in enough money so he was always in debt. He had a compulsive disorder, which eventually he ended up homeless temporarily. He got into recovery & turned his life around.</p> <p>Meghan took her first drink at 16 years old. She couldn't be an overachiever & drink too much. She was always trying to be something she wasn't. Alcohol Abuse	Steppin' Out	<p>Father Roger spends his time helping those in need, and that often includes addicts. He lives with the same "open secret" and too is a recovering addict. Roger learned his alcoholism was genetic; that his family was a family of drinkers. He studied theater and soon found his way getting small roles. While he revisited the idea of joining the priesthood throughout his life, he still gravitated towards his alcoholism. But eventually he would have his first moment of clarity on the Brooklyn Bride, waking up from a blackout drunk on a ledge of the bridge's span.</p>	1/18/15	7:00-8:49am

		<p>drinking created an environment which neither of her parents took care of her; they neglected her. She was raised to learn to love only alcoholics.</p> <p>Nancy was married to an alcoholic for more than 20 years. She would make excuses for him but he spent more and more time drunk. Her moment of clarity came one day when her husband was jailed for driving intoxicated & needed to be picked up from jail, and she decided to not drop everything to come pick him up.</p> <p>Linda grew up in an alcoholic home. Her mother was the drinker and still is. She remembers fearing coming home when her mother was there, as she was often made the target of her mother's intoxicated aggression; slight things could set off her mother, prompting verbal berating, whippings and beatings. She was emotionally unavailable.</p>		
Alcohol/ Drug Abuse/Gambling	Steppin' Out	<p>Paul's last bet was many years ago. His life revolved around gambling from the time he was a youngster. It wasn't about winning or losing, his focus became on gambling. He grew up and got married, but his gambling persisted.</p> <p>Sophie's problematic compulsive gambling started later in life, when she was 60-years old. She had achieved sobriety from other addictions much earlier but started gambling as an activity and it quickly progressed into a problem.</p> <p>Mike is a recovering alcoholic and enjoyed sobriety but then he tried meth, and he loved it. He would combine his meth use with marijuana and club/sex drugs like ecstasy. Within two years, he was unemployed and unemployable.</p> <p>Lee grew up a gay male and could not be comfortable. But one day at age 17, he had his first drink. He thinks that first drink led to an increased comfort & confidence, which led to his use of crystal meth. Alcohol/ Drug Abuse	Steppin' Out	<p>Robert is a recovering addict and a member of Narcotics Anonymous. His use of drugs was a result of attempts to escape his home life. In fifth grade, he was drinking on his own and by sixth grade he was using marijuana.</p> <p>Bob had his first drink at age of 8. His grandfather would regularly serve him homemade wine. Drinking became a regular part of his life and into high school he found his way into marijuana and psychedelics.</p> <p>Fred first got intoxicated at age 10. It was easy for him to get access to alcohol and eventually drugs, as his father was dealing drugs.</p> <p>Paul was a good student and athlete in a top-notch primary school, but he lacked confidence. His first drunk experience came a short time later and he remembered the "magic" the alcohol provided.</p>	2/8/15	7:00-8:52am

		12. Everything came to a head on 2/21/03, he returned home high after promising to quit again when his wife said she was leaving and taking the children. Without a word of warning, he grabbed the SKS assault rifle he kept loaded beside the bed and put it under his chin and pulled the trigger. After years of healing following the attempt of suicide, he remembered when he first woke up in the hospital he said he wanted to tell people the truth about the drugs.		
Food Addiction/ Alcohol Abuse/ Gambling Addiction	Steppin' Out	Pat spent much of her life suffering from a food addiction, but not long after she gained sobriety from her improper eating, she fell into a long spate of alcoholism. She ate to the point she became morbidly obese. She was able to control her eating eventually, just in time to begin a bad relationship with alcohol which gave her the same feelings of comfort. Gambling Addiction	Steppin' Out	Rick started gambling in his teen years. When he won, he was elated and euphoric and it was a high he would chase for the next ten years. Today he is the operator of Algamus, a treatment center dedicated specifically to recovery from gambling addictions in a residential setting. Ed began his gambling career in his twenties, and like many who first start out, won big until he stopped winning. He ended up owing a list of people for money he gambled away. Unhealthy Relationships	Steppin' Out	Like many women, Petra thought love was "taking care of someone." Her absorption with "care-taking" almost sent her over the edge, and she found her way back through the fellowship of Al-Anon. Greg felt the only way he could earn love in relationships was to completely devote himself to taking care of "her" – whoever "her" happened to be. It led to a life of isolation, and not until he entered recovery could he see that his issues with women stemmed from his unhealthy relationship with his mother.	3/15/15	7:00-8:47am
Gambling Addiction	Steppin' Out	Howard is a compulsive gambler. He can remember the day he became sober from gambling. Anthony grew up in a gambling-free household. Alcohol/ Drug Abuse	Steppin' Out	Ananda entered the recovery process via Al-Anon after wanting to end her own life. She grew up in a home with alcoholic and drug-addicted parents. They used eight-year-old Ananda to traffic the drugs. Irene is a "double winner" – part of a special group of people who are members of the fellowship of both Alcoholics Anonymous and Al-Anon.
