ISSUE: Environment

Topic: The Head of the Environmental Protection Agency recently visited Wyoming. Administrator

Michael Regan said he wanted to learn more about carbon capture and storage technology and power

plant emissions.

Topic: The deadly wildfires in Maui are raising questions about the power of wind-driven fires. Twenty years ago, two huge wind-driven fires engulfed the forests along Yellowstone National Park's eastern

Topic: The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) released a long-awaited draft proposal of how it will

misinformation.

Time: Sagebrush ecosystem conservation got another big boost in September, thanks to the Biden Administration's Bipartisan Infrastructure Law. The US Fish and Wildlife Service announced more than

\$10.5 million of funding for projects throughout the West and on the Wind River Reservation.

ISSUE: Outdoor recreation

Topic: Atlantic City, Wyoming is not to be confused with the gambling mecca out east. Rather, it's an old, unincorporated gold mining town, off the beaten path between the Wind River Mountain Range

and the Red Desert. The population sign reads 'about 57.' But another boom is here.

Topic: Tens of thousands of mule deer and pronghorn died in southwest Wyoming this past winter and spring, causing the Wyoming Game and Fish Department to drastically reduce the hunting season. But some hunters are taking it a step further.

Topic: Fall means it's hunting season for many residents in our region. One popular way to hunt and fish is to lease land from private property owners for a more one-of-a-kind experience, and technology is changing the way people find these opportunities.

Topic: Wildlife managers across the West have been stocking high, alpine lakes with fish for decades. New research is looking into how that history changed the Rocky Mountain environment and the genetics of the fish themselves.

ISSUE: Women's issues

Topic: In 1923, Eleanor Davis became the first known woman to climb the Grand Teton – the second tallest peak in Wyoming. A hundred years later, this all-female group of climbers along with an allfemale team of guides were getting ready to summit the peak to celebrate her legacy.

Topic: Eleanor Davis became the first known woman to climb the Grand Teton in 1923 – a hundred years later, a group of all women summited the peak in her honor. The centennial celebration also brought together a panel of five trailblazing women who shared reflections on other record-setting accomplishments in the mountain range.

ISSUE: Agriculture

Topic: WPR collaborated with the My Wild Land film series team to do a deep dive on ranchers who are doing just that - preserving their open spaces for both ranching and wildlife. If you've been a Wyoming Public Radio (WPR) listener for sometime, you might have heard some of our coverage on conservation easements. They are a legally binding contract that's sometimes used by landowners that can help keep

wide open spaces...open.

ISSUE: Water issues

Topic: Wyoming is the headwaters for the Colorado River system, which supplies 40 million people across seven states and Mexico. As we've heard a lot about in the last year, parts of the system reached historic low water levels, causing states to consider drastic measures to save water. And the consensus is that everyone is going to have to learn to live with less water. So, Wyoming has formed a committee that'll try to protect some of that water for its users.

ISSUE: Energy

Topic: Just southeast of Rawlins on the Overland Trail Ranch, federal and local officials broke ground with shovels on the TransWest Express Transmission Project. It will be a 732-mile powerline that will transfer Wyoming's wind-generated electricity to the southwest. This is just one way the Biden Administration hopes to achieve 100 percent 'clean' energy by 2035.

Topic: Black Jewel was a coal company that operated in four states – Kentucky, Virginia, West Virginia and Wyoming - and this July marked the fourth anniversary of the company filing for bankruptcy. Many miners in all four states had no notice and were left without paychecks or jobs. Award-winning journalist Ken Ward Jr. is based in West Virginia and has followed the story of Black Jewel. He recently published a story for ProPublica about the company's mishandling, specifically in the Appalachian region.

Topic: The first anniversary of the controversial Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) recently passed. So far, a great majority of red states are taking advantage of the money from the act. And a recent analysis by the think tank RMI shows that Wyoming could get more than seven billion dollars from the climate-related provisions of the IRA if it took full advantage of it. Wyoming Public Radio's Kamila Kudelska spoke with Inside Climate News reporter Marianne Lavelle on her reporting of how the state could get that money and why so many red states are taking advantage of it.

Topic: Wyoming's Governor Mark Gordon is the leader of a group of western governors for the next year, and his goal is to explore 'decarbonization' as a way to address climate change. Gordon recently held a workshop in Gillette, which Wyoming Public Radio's energy reporter Caitlin Tan attended. She spoke with WPR's news director Kamila Kudelska.

ISSUE: Wildlife

Topic: For the first time, Wyoming is outlining specifically how it will manage its 22 state-operated elk feedgrounds going forward. The department released a draft plan, and it is a shift from how the state has historically done things.

Topic: Wyoming is talking about the greater sage-grouse again: a polarizing topic that has been in conversation amongst western states over the last couple of decades. The federal government wants to expand the bird's protected range, and the state is skeptical about that plan. So, state officials and locals recently put their heads together about it to craft their own plan.

Topic: Bears are making their way into Jackson Hole to forage for berries as they get ready to hibernate. Grand Teton National Park is advising people to be cautious on roadways. Cole Stewart with Bear Wise Jackson Hole has been helping lead the charge to keep people informed about the region's new rules around keeping properties bear safe. This includes having bear resistant trash cans in many parts of Teton County. He recently spoke with Jackson Hole Community Radio's Hanna Merzbach about keeping locals and bears safe.

ISSUE: Science

Topic: The University of Wyoming State Vet Lab has a biocontainment facility, and within that there's a necropsy facility. It was used recently for the first time to diagnose animal infections that have the potential to transfer to humans.

ISSUE: Politics

Topic: Early last month, the Laramie City Council voted on whether or not they would create a Police Advisory Board. This vote was the culmination of years of debate — debate which saw thousands of Laramie residents taking to the streets, signing petitions, and giving hours of public comment at city council meetings. However, despite all that arguing, the councilors arrived at a unanimous decision. The Police Advisory Board was approved.

ISSUE: Solutions

Topic: How does an underfunded and overworked rural police department help a community feel more supported? Riverton's new police chief is hoping a Community Service Officer program could help.

ISSUE: Community issues

Topic: The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (LDS) has decided to build a Temple in Cody. A Temple is not just a church. To LDS members, also known as Mormons, it has a special purpose and a special construction. That construction has drawn criticism from neighbors because its large lighted tower will be more than 100 feet tall from the ground. That's about the height of a ten story building in a rural neighborhood. The town of Cody doesn't have a ten story building.

Topic: Librarians nationwide have been feeling the heat from their communities. It's been no different in Wyoming. For the past two years, the Campbell County Public Library has been the center of community outrage. The main issue is relocating or removing books on sex education and LGBTQ+ issues for children and teens. That debate recently escalated.

ISSUE: LGBTQ+ issues

Topic: The term "misgendering" means referring to someone by pronouns they don't identify with. It's a common social faux pas when it's done accidentally and considered rude when done on purpose. But what about when it's done in legal filings? One Cornell law professor, Chan Tov McNamarah, believes it should actually be considered professional misconduct on the part of the lawyer doing it. Wyoming Public Radio's Jeff Victor spoke with McNamarah about their argument that misgendering ought to be considered misconduct.

Topic: In Wyoming, July 3rd is known to some as "Treaty Day" – a day that commemorates the signing of the Fort Bridger Treaty of 1868. The Eastern Shoshone and Shoshone-Bannock tribes signed this treaty with the U.S. government 155 years ago, creating what is now the Wind River Reservation. This year, the Fort Bridger Historic Site made some changes to its annual Treaty Day celebration to emphasize the ongoing presence of tribal communities in the area.
