Having the right tool and knowing your car may save you if you happen to end up in an emergency situation like a car fire or if your car ends up in water.

Opponents say it is a bad idea because of how poor Oregon public schools perform and how short our school years already are.

Often he says when they are in public and in uniform they are considered on-duty and are unable to get any peace and quiet.

He wants background checks. And blames President Trump in part for what he calls fanning the flames of racism in America. We also get a written statement from Republican Congressman Greg Walden.

Marie says this time they looked closely at age groups and found that seniors tended to become even more distracted with them. She says infotainment systems designed to make driving easier and hands free sometimes still create way too many distractions. Marie says on average, older drivers ages 55-75 took their eyes off the road more than eight seconds longer than younger drivers while performing simple tasks on their in-vehicle infotainment systems.

Chris says the scene was not secured as the deputies were still trying to capture a suspect armed with a rifle. But they made the choice to go in and help the deputies. One of them was badly hurt. Once the scene was secure they flew in a life flight chopper. That deputy's life was likely saved because of the bravery of the two paramedics first on the scene.

She says research shows it can actually prevent a number of different cancers. Bill tells his story about how he was diagnosed with throat cancer. He says his dental hygienist first saw something that didn't look right and asked him to think about getting checked out. After multiple bouts of chemotherapy Bill was able to get his cancer taken care of.

Alpenrose is home to 3 Little League baseball fields – Alpenrose Main has lights and is also home to the Little League Softball World Series aired nationally on ESPN. They also have a velodrome, midget racing track, Dairy-ville & opera house. All of that has been offered to the public for decades for free. If the sale goes through all that could go away and the some 60 acres on SW Portland could turn into land for perhaps 250 homes. A public hearing is happening at a Multnomah County Courthouse this upcoming Wednesday.

The judge is hearing public testimony from people who don't want Alpenrose to be sold. For over 100 years, Alpenrose has been home to more than a family dairy – it has three baseball fields, a velderome, a quarter midget track, a Dairy-ville and opera house. It's also the home of the girls Little League Softball World Series. Most everything at Alpenrose is used for free by the public.
